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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2021.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's constitution, the Charities Act 2011 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The financial statements have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice, which is referred to in the Regulations, but which has since been withdrawn.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

A revised Constitution was agreed in October 2017 which was designed to enable the charity to move towards being a Company Limited by Guarantee (company number 11450146). This transition has not yet been completed, pending some revisions to the charitable aims to be agreed with the Charities Commission.

We are working with our accountants to align the accounting dates of the charity and the new Company and intend to agree any final changes to the constitution at a future General Meeting. The current Trustees will become the directors of the company subject to elections at the future AGM.

During the year we have maintained stability within the board with numerous strategy sessions to steer the charity in the direction to maximise the impact the charity can have within it's communities.

Trustees are appointed or reappointed annually in the Annual General Meeting Risk management The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Objectives and aims Liverpool Cancer Care Self Help Group is an independent registered charity with a single aim: to help local people affected by cancer improve their health and wellbeing. The charity operates under the names Liverpool Sunflowers and / or Liverpool Cancer Support Centre. We offer a broad range of support services which reflect the needs of local people living with cancer. Our target outcomes mirror local and national NHS target outcomes for cancer (encouraging early discharge / reducing emergency admissions / reducing repeat admissions / reducing reliance on prescriptions / reducing DNAs) meaning we can be confident that our work reduces the burden on the local NHS. The services we offer are free or highly subsidised to ensure that beneficiaries have the support they need. Anyone over the age of 18 who lives in Merseyside and is affected by cancer can register with us.

We monitor their progress and over 98% of our clientele have reported Improved overall health, fitness and wellbeing. All the services we provide aim to help our clients maintain or improve their physical and mental wellbeing and encourage a healthy lifestyle. The services reflect the changing needs of local people and reflect the latest research in complementary therapies.

We continue to offer Cancer rehabilitation exercise classes, counselling, complementary therapies, day retreats, art therapies, support groups and social opportunities. In the past year we have also run courses in stress management, mindfulness, relaxation and breathwork. Our services have been enhanced this year by working in partnership with other charities. We have established a strong relationship with Penny Brohn UK, a leading cancer charity to deliver the Living Well with Cancer course.

One of the main objectives we strived for iis to have a huge positive impact in the North of the City to offer services akin to those we offer here to people in greater need. Through funding from the Peter O'Sullevan Voice of Racing, we opened up a centre at Aintree Racecourse two days a week offering Penny Brohn retreats, counselling, mindfulness and nutrition. This has seen us break boundaries with the likes of Macmillan and other cancer centres to create partnerships and closer working criteria.

We have established a funding model that draws on a diverse mix of sources from grants, donors and fundraising events which is providing a sustainable pathway for development. The charity has continued to grow its service provision, both increasing the number of service users and improving on the delivery of performance targets. During the year we have seen a fall in direct employment costs and an increase in sessional costs for contractors delivering classes and other services. These services are increasingly paid for by voluntary donations that are reflected in our increased income from donations.

Public benefit

When planning activities for the beneficiaries of the charity, the trustees are mindful of the charity commissions guidelines on public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Achievements in the year 1st April 2020 - 31st March 2021.

This year has been severely disrupted by the Covid-19 Pandemic with key members of staff were furloughed during the course of the year. Furlough meant that the Sunflowers Office and service delivery hub were closed for a period between 16th March 2020 to 19th May 2021 and this meant that services provided on-site at the Sunflowers Centre were closed. The charity did, however, continue to function during this period and has responded to the difficulties presented by the pandemic by restructuring our services to meet the needs of people affected by cancer on Merseyside. This work has been sustained by those staff who were not furloughed by contractors and volunteers.

While the Centre was closed, we were unable to offer many of the classes and services that are usually provided by the charity. In response to these circumstances, the Trustees supported the development of new services to meet our objectives as a charity serving the needs of people affected by cancer. New services were developed through on-line classes using Zoom and Facebook. The online services that were provided during this period offered a range of weekly classes and advice sessions to support exercise health nutrition and the opportunity for people to meet, albeit online. During this period 2680 people participated in these classes. The success of these new forms of provision means that these will form an addition to our services once we are able to resume the full range of services offered before the pandemic.

Alongside these classes the Charity recognised the growing need for counselling which was increasing during lockdown because of the difficulties faced by people undergoing cancer treatment or receiving diagnoses. The need for counselling provision was increased further by the threat of Covid-19, especially for vulnerable people who were immunosuppressed.

Demand for our counselling services was further increased by the impact of social isolation and the difficulties that clients were experiencing with access to GP services. By December we were looking at ways to expand the service to meet the needs of new and existing clients and this led to a restructuring of the existing service to provide a much expanded counselling service supported by an increased number of counsellors. During the period from January 2021 the number of counsellors increased from 8 to 23 and the number of clients increased for vulnerable people with cancer dealing with isolation during lockdown. In response to these problems the charity transformed its counselling service to meet those needs by operating a telephone and online counselling service.

The pandemic significantly affected the Charity's income during the first half of the year and the furloughing of some staff had been essential for the survival of the Charity. As the rule for furlough changed to allow some flexible working the operation of the telephone and counselling service could be operated and developed more effectively with the service being run mainly through volunteer counsellors working from home. Governance of the charity has been maintained through regular Trustee meetings.

The fundraising activity of the charity has also been affected by the pandemic, the furloughing of staff and the lockdowns imposed by government. One long-standing fundraising activity through collections at Liverpool Airport was halted because of restrictions and low passenger, other fundraising events were cancelled and, for a charity that depends upon regular new fundraising activity, this has proved a challenge. Fortunately we were successful during this period in obtaining some grant funding to support the restructuring of our activities and this funding combined with the furloughing of some staff has meant that we were able to ensure that the charity has remained viable and sustainable for the present.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The charity has maintained its policy to maintain a reserve in addition to restricted funds equivalent to three months' expenditure. The reserves amounting to £62,225 (2020 £28,978) is above the three months general expenditure in the last financial year amounting to £42,105.

The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities and will reinforce our aim to provide a sustainable service within the community. The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to manage exposure to the major risks.

Total income amounted to £156,309 (2020 £177,938).

Unrestricted funds have increased in the current year by £33,247 Restricted funds have decreased by £10,333.

The total funds carried forward at 31 March 2021 amounted to £69,125 (2020 - £46,211).

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Redundancy and termination payments

Redundancy and termination payments are made in line with statutory requirements under employment contracts.
