Executive summary

The Creative Dimension Trust is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (registration no. 1166443) established in 2016.

TCDT offers workshops designed to give talented young people the skills and confidence to pursue a career in which core hand skills - i.e. a high degree of manual dexterity, draftsmanship and the ability to understand and (re)construct 3-Dimensional structures - are prerequisite.

The workshops are taught by Craft Specialists who are acknowledged leaders in their professions. These are not kid's art courses – the goal is to learn, experiment, gain confidence, take inspiration from the best, and have exposure to career opportunities. Students gain an awareness of what is possible, and how to achieve it.







The Crafts Council has published reports on the crafts sector in the UK. It estimates that in 2018, crafts contributed £3.4bn to the UK economy, with 11,620 UK crafts businesses employing 149,510 people. Annual exports from the UK crafts sector total over £5bn. However, the Crafts Council reports that there is a pipeline problem in the supply of new talent given a disconnect in craft higher education. Additionally, about 40% of those working in craft are over 50 and 80% are male.

In November 2019, the Crafts Council project 'Supporting Diversity and Expertise Development in the Contemporary Craft Economy' reported barriers for people in minority groups to become professional makers which are social, cultural, and economic. It concludes that "For those who are not from a relatively privileged background or with the necessary networks and educational level, it is particularly difficult to make a career and be adequately recognised in the sector."

While extra-curricular courses and networks support and nurture talent in activities such as music or sport, there is no equivalent for crafts.

Delivery

Industry professionals recognise there is a particular gap in the school curriculum for two of the core skills taught on TCDT workshops – hand skills and visual sensitivity. Other skills such as organisation and planning, focus and concentration, and teamwork apply to professional practice in general.

The transferable skills developed include:

- 1. Manual skills: including accuracy, appropriate use of equipment, technical problem solving and dexterity
- 2. Visual sensitivity: including observational skills, sensitivity to different materials and understanding of their use
- 3. Organisation and planning: including following a brief in an allocated time and related quality of final work
- 4. Focus and concentration: including attention to detail
- 5. Teamwork: including ability to work alongside, and at times, together with other students and attendance

All in-person Workshops include a drawing and design component directed by Sarah Hocombe, an internationally renowned fresco painter.

Partnerships

Every TCDT workshop is about partnership – with artists, schools, museums, corporations, livery companies, architecture firms, curators, and others. We have worked with partners ranging from Building Crafts College to Buckingham Palace to Zone Creations to The National Glass Centre.

Last year, Fortnum & Mason kindly agreed to The Creative Dimension Trust holding an exhibition of student work as a window display at its iconic London Piccadilly store for two weeks in September. The design consisted of a surreal window featuring a sky painted backdrop with a table laid for dinner complete with student work, including marbled wine glasses, leather masks, a sugar paste flower arrangement, surrealist ceramic tiles, Perspex candelabras and plates decorated with silhouettes.

Also in 2021, TCDT partnered with Craven Dunnill Jackfield, the leading manufacturer of traditionally-styled, decorative ceramic tiles, to deliver a workshop at Dulwich College in August. The stunning tiles decorated by the students during the workshop are now on display at the Craven Dunnill Jackfield museum in the historic Ironbridge Gorge, Shropshire until the end of December.

Measurement

Since 2019, TCDT has focused on its accreditation program to offer students the opportunity to earn a respected and valuable credential to aid their career progression. The key is to evaluate whether students transformed a 2-D concept into a 3-D form, and how well they achieved it.

In September 2019, TCDT assembled an independent expert committee of educators and employers to explore the concept of accreditation. An independent accreditation committee was formed in 2020 consisting of industry professionals, Principal of City & Guilds of London Art School, and the Accreditation specialist from ABRSM. TCDT piloted accreditation in 2020, with tutors asked to fill in a simple tick-box evaluation form. In the Winter and Spring of 2021, Accreditation went live. Student received grades of Working Towards, Pass, Merit and Distinction and written evaluations to guide their next steps.

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Students are awarded a credential for each workshop they attend. The techniques evaluated are specific to the subject of each workshop i.e. wood turning, stone carving and gilding.

Impact

Students complete a questionnaire at the conclusion of each Workshop. We monitor student use of TCDT work to support applications for further study or jobs. Students are encouraged to enroll in further workshops to continue to broaden their horizons. Our social media blogs encourage students to share experiences and encourage others to join workshops. A number of students have remaining engaged by giving back as assistant tutors.

Students use work completed during workshop to support applications for course places, work placements, and jobs.

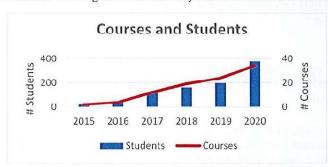
In addition to workshops, TCDT offers work experience to help students begin their career paths. Students have been placed with craft specialists and at architecture firms.

The Creative Dimension Trust has formed an Alumni Committee. The ex-students are the charity's ambassadors who visit schools and colleges to share their experiences and recruit new students, publish an annual alumni newsletter, and run an Instagram account where alumni share their stories and talk jobs.

In 2019, TCDT launched *My Creative Career*, a series of videos with leading makers and designers who answer questions posed by TCDT students and alumni to share what they have learned along their personal routes to success. TCDT has been running for almost seven years and served almost 1000 students.





Since the first lockdown in March 2020 we have delivered sixty-two workshops with 1,485 hours of tuition.

This has all been made possible by our tutors' enthusiastic response to moving on-line. This required

- 1) adding suitable subjects like embroidery, weaving, calligraphy,
- 2) sending out care packages of art materials which our students enjoyed receiving with great joy and delight, and
- 3) putting the necessary technology in place

We managed to deliver our first on-line workshops within two weeks of the initial school closures. A big thanks go to our committed, world-class tutors!

In time, we learned a lot about on-line teaching. In fact, we found that going on-line even had advantages.

- By working in cyber space, we can now reach students in every part of the UK.
- By pre-recording parts of workshop, we give tutors more time for interactive sessions and even one-on-one tuition.
- In some cases, we find on-line teaching helps bring out and encourage less social students.

Feedback from students and parents told us The Creative Dimension was a really bright spot in a difficult time when lives were disrupted and activities limited.

We will continue to offer a mix of on-line and venue-based workshops and keep our UK-wide following.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The charity has five trustees who meet three times every year. The identification of potential new trustees is carried out by the board, the aim being to appoint those with the appropriate expertise and experience for the charity's work. On agreeing to become a trustee of the charity, they are thoroughly briefed by their co-trustees on the history of the trust, the day-to-day management, the responsibilities of the trustees, the current objectives and future plans. The trustees are also encouraged to attend any courses. The trustees consider that they and the CEO comprise the key management of the charity in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating the charity on a day to day basis. The trustees receive no remuneration.

Organisational structure

The trustees are ultimately responsible for the policies, activities and assets of the charity. They meet three times every year to review developments with regard to the charity, its activities and to make any important decisions. When necessary, the trustees seek advice and support from the charity's professional advisers.

Charity Governance Code

The Trustees considered the Charity Governance Code in detail and will continue to give due regard to the Code's seven principles of organizational purpose, leadership, integrity, decision-making, risk and control, board effectiveness, diversity, and openness and accountability. The Trustees will continue to review the Code annually.

Risk management

In line with the requirement for trustees to undertake a risk assessment exercise and report on the same in their annual report, the trustees have looked at the risks. The trustees have identified five main areas where risks may occur:

- Governance and management
- Operational
- Financial
- Reputational
- Laws, regulations, external and environmental

Governance and management looks at the risk the charity might suffer from the lack of direction, the skills and training of the trustees and the good use of its funds.

Operational looks at the risk inherent in the charity's activities including continuity of staff and lack of a disaster recovery policy.

Financial risks include those arising as a result of poor budgetary control, inappropriate spending, poor accounting and inappropriate investment policies.

Reputational looks at the possible damage to the charity's reputation.

Laws, regulations, external and environmental looks at the effects of government policies and the consequences of non-compliance with the laws and regulations.

Having assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular to its finances, the trustees believe that by monitoring reserve levels, by ensuring that controls exist over the key financial systems, and by examining the operational and business risks faced by the charity, they have established effective systems to mitigate those risks.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Charitable objectives

The Trust's charitable objectives are:

To advance education in arts and crafts and in related conservation skills for the public benefit in such ways as the trustees think fit.

Significant activities

The Creative Dimension Trust is a charity that organises Craft Workshops for young people between 14-19 years who love working with their hands. The fully funded workshops are taught by some of the world's leading craft specialists, who want to inspire the next generation.

In discovering new techniques, workshop students build the confidence needed to pursue a career where core hand skills

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

The Trustees are satisfied that all awards made during the year are for the benefit of the public and the benefits of each and every award are clearly identifiable.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Successes in 2022 include

- 36 workshops (11 new subjects)
- 68% of students rated workshops 10 out of 10
- 80% applied for further workshops
- 497 applications for 264 places (53% accepted)

Over time, TCDT has learned a great deal about online teaching. In fact, we found that going online even had advantages.

- By working in cyber space, we can now reach students in every part of the UK.
- By pre-recording parts of workshop, we give tutors more time for interactive sessions and even one-on-one tuition.
- In some cases, we find online teaching helps bring out and encourage less confident students

Feedback from students and parents told us The Creative Dimension was a really bright spot in a difficult time when lives were disrupted and activities limited.

The Accreditation Program awarded 260 grades, which was been recognized by the independent Accreditation Committee as a good result.

The trustees welcomed Sandra Smith as a new trustee. Sandra re-joined the British Museum in February 2019 as Head of Collection Care after an absence of 17 years during which she was Head of Conservation and Technical Services at the V&A.

Donations

The trustees would like to thank most warmly all those who support us financially with donations and grants.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Summary

Income for the year was £96,665 (2021 £148,500). Expenditure was £150,004 (2021 £134,397). As a result, for the year ended 31 March 2022, there was a deficit of £53,339 (2021 surplus £14,103).

Reserves Policy

The trustees intend to build adequate reserves to cover budgeted costs and will maintain an appropriate budget for future years. Target unrestricted reserves are up to 6 months of operating expenditure, estimated in the region of £67,000. As at 31 March 2022, unrestricted reserves included grants received during the year, totalling £1/5,813, which are for use in future years.

Going Concern

The Trustees of the Charity have concluded that there are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Charity to continue as a going concern. Even with the ongoing challenges of Coronavirus and Covid-19 in 2022, the Trustees are of the opinion that the Charity will still have sufficient resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

TCDT is offering thirteen workshops this Spring (vs. 3-4 in the past), as spreading offerings throughout the year leads to better recruiting. Eighteen summer and autumn workshops are now fully planned with more to come. Experience has shown that students are more likely to apply for workshops with simple and easy to understand titles where they believe they can succeed (e.g. dressmaking, sewing, jewellery making).

TCDT is linking up with more warrant holders. This is an ideal arrangement as TCDT supplies the students and the warrant holder supplies the tutor free of charge in fulfilling their social responsibility programs.

The work of students on the AHMM model-making workshop with the theme *Living Under the Sea* will be the centrepiece of the 'WONDERS OF THE UNDERSEA WORLD' window at Fortnum & Mason. Demand for places is very high. The theme is visually rich and well suited to the varied Workshops, with others contributing including Glass (anemones), Flameworking (bubbles and seaweed), Sugar Craft (coral), Jewellery (turquoise beads), Woodturning (jars and lids), Stoneworking (fossils) and Gilding.

Leathersellers' will host the annual event for supporters, students, and tutors in September. The Company has agreed to allow use of its Court Room for a bazaar which will raise funds through the sale of student work. Hermès UK Managing Director Bertrand Michaud will be guest speaker.

Alumni committee members will continue to make school visits, promoting TCDT to about thirty students each time.

Based on a Hermes Paris program, two staff will tutor ten students after school one day a week for six weeks. The pilot will take place at Maria Fidelis School near Kings Cross in the autumn.

More workshops in Livery Halls this summer, given good availability. Clothworkers' Hall will host a week-long workshop with tabletop looms. Students will also be given a tour of the Hall by the Archivist.

Painter Rene Gonzalez is now filming and editing workshops while Tuesday Riddell continues to post. This will ensure TCDT showcases its outstanding tutors and venues. The website continues to promote upcoming workshops and report on activities.

TCDT is now offering on-line workshops for adults, which allow them to learn enjoy while revenues raised go to supporting the charity.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared for the year to 31st March 2022.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policies below or the notes to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, Update Bulletin 1 issued on 2 February 2016, Update Bulletin 2 issued October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011. The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The accounts are presented in sterling and are rounded to the nearest pound.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Preparation of the financial statements requires the trustees to make significant judgements and estimates. The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty or any key judgements made in the preparation of the financial statements.

Assessment of going concern

The trustees have assessed whether the use of the going concern assumption is appropriate in preparing these financial statements. The trustees have made this assessment in respect to a period of one year from the date of approval of these financial statements. The trustees of the charity have concluded that there are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees are of the opinion that the charity will have sufficient resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due. The Trustees of the Charity have concluded that there are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Charity to continue as a going concern. Given the ongoing challenges of Coronavirus and Covid-19 in 2022, the Trustees are of the opinion that the Charity will still have sufficient resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due.

Income

All income is included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income, it is probable that it will be received, and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Donations in kind are valued at the going market rate for the services and facilities required to carry out the charitable activity at the point it is received.

Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Allocation and apportionment of costs Direct costs are allocated to the activity to which they relate. Any shared costs will be apportioned should the trustees deem it necessary. In-kind expenditure is valued at the going market rate for the services and facilities required to carry out the charitable activity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at their settlement amount, less any provision for non-recoverability. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid. They have been discounted to the present value of the future cash receipt where such discounting is material.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand represents such accounts and instruments that are available on demand or have a maturity of less than three months from the date of acquisition.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are recognised at the amount the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt. They have been discounted to the present value of the future cash payment where such discounting is material.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
