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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Charity's principal objective is to relieve the need of parents-to-be and parents with their infants aged 0-2 within the Brighton and Hove area by the provision of parent infant psychological therapy.

BrightPIP's vision is to change the future for vulnerable babies, one baby at a time in Brighton and Hove. We want every baby in our community to grow up feeling safe, secure and loved. Our mission is to intervene at the earliest time with families to support parents to have positive relationships with their children. We intend to ensure parent-infant psychological therapy (PIP) is freely available to all families in Brighton and Hove who need it.

Brighton PIP Ltd is a charity offering intensive support to expectant parents and those with new babies up until the age of three. Through individual therapy or group sessions, we help parents fulfil their child's needs by understanding the world through their eyes and by tuning into signals they send out. Our work strengthens the parent-infant relationship, helping to form a loving bond which is crucial for a child's future well-being.

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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

This has been a busy and year for BrightPIP and we are proud of the service we have been able to deliver to families. We are looking forward to a developing and expanding our operations over the coming year.

In the 2020-2021 we saw a huge 450% increase in the number of families accessing our service. This year, 2021-2022, we have managed to sustain and meet the needs of this increased level of referrals, which is a big achievement.

Our Covid Relief project has continued to be highly successful with clients reporting that are very satisfied with the support they have received. This project offers families up to 3 sessions of parent-infant therapy mostly via Zoom, or by telephone. This offer has been accessed by 142 families overall, and 89 families over the last financial year. Families and referrers have reported that they have found this approach easy to access and supportive of the struggles of parenting in the pandemic. We have received direct funding for this project from Sussex Community Foundation, Brighton and Hove Contain Outbreak Fund, National Lottery and Comic Relief. We are most grateful for their support. Some feedback on the Covid Family Relief project:

'So much has changed. I feel like I am better able to make sense of things, and my own feelings. Just being given that emotional support, and preparation made such a difference' (BrightPIP service user)

"I feel that my relationship with my child has improved completely" (BrightPIP service user)

The most helpful parts were having space and an invitation to tell my story, to be heard, for my baby's early birth to be taken seriously as a trauma and having the option to include my partner in the work. A couple of times our therapist reflected back something I had said and I felt truty seen and understood which was powerful' (BrightPIP service user)

Really helpful and beneficial to talk through and explore my experiences of my pregnancy, birth and postnatal experiences which were during the COVID-19 lockdowns and how this affected me emotionally, particularly with a king term health condition also. Very grateful and appreciative for (BrightPIP practitioner's) gentle and empathetic approach. Her insights have really helped my healing through my birth grief (BrightPIP service user)

It is an excellent much needed service. The therapists are very supportive and the women I refer feel that they can open up much more' (Health Visitor)

Since September 2021, we have been dedicating time to developing and planning our new pilot project to bring the Attachment and Bio-behavioural Catch-up (ABC) method, to the UK from the USA. ABC is one of the USA's most well evidenced approaches to promoting positive carer-infant relationships. We think this approach could be transformative within the UK. Our founder and Clinical Lead, Dr Kerry Taylor, and one of our Clinical Psychologists, Dr Bea Birtwell, were trained in ABC in March 2022 and are now starting to roll the work out to families. This project is grant funded by the Winston Churchill Activate Fund.

We have continued to deliver our project commissioned through Brighton and Hove City Council's Partners in Change Hub, allowing us to deliver parent-infant therapy and bespoke interventions to families within Social Care. So far this project has worked with 20 families. Feedback and outcomes for this project have been positive, so much so that the City Council have doubled the funding for this project to now run 2 days/week. Some feedback from families and referrers has been:

This year we have delivered training to 44 Clinical Psychology doctoral trainees students and to groups of Social Workers and Foster Carers in Brighton and Hove. We continue to actively support several families through individual commissioning and new adoptive parents through the Adoption Support Fund. Some feedback from Social Workers and Foster Carers this year on BrightPIP training:

"[I have learned...] how our observations as social workers can inform us more and consider the mental health needs of the infant. I would like to consider how we can develop our screening further at the FDFF to incorporate infant mental health."

"I feel more confident in my observations of parents and infants and how to analyse the situation using this lens"

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

"It helped me think more about noticing concerns when assessing parents and different approaches that can be used to help support parents bond with their children."

"I have attended a lot of training and since March a lot of virtual training, and quality is not always consistent, however, I found your approach excellent and it made the training a lot more enjoyable. You were clearly very knowledgeable not only about the topic but also about the training... It is difficult when we are all so incredibly busy at the moment to keep attention within training and make it feel worth taking the time to do but you truly did this"

"I hope to foster babies in future and this helps me to understand the issues they might have and the reasons why."

"I absolutely loved it. It was really good. I use it a lot now. I like training that I can use, and this was something I can use all the time".

"Lots of opportunities to ask questions and discuss thoughts, with confirmation of understanding throughout"

We have made strong progress towards our strategic aims and objectives. In April 2021 we were successful in obtaining a 3-year grant from Children in Need to part fund a much needed Service and Development Manger post for 15 hours a week over 3 Years. Recruitment to this post was successful and Alex Paterson started in this role in January 2022.

We have further developed our committee of trustees/directors with 4 new members standing for election at this year's AGM.

In October 2021 we were honoured to become Cardens Accountants' Charity of the year for 2021, who kindly raised and donated £2,000 in their end of year charity quiz. We also ran our first fundraising event in September 2021, at the Brighton marathon and the Brighton Marathon 10K with an amazing group of people (including clinicians, previous service-users and Trustees) who raised over £3,600 which will be used to support the work we do, reaching babies and parents that need help across the city. We are immensely grateful to both the runners and Cardens Accountants.

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in the planning of future activities.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial review and reserves policy

During the year the charity made a surplus of £637 on unrestricted funds which was added to reserves brought forward of £17,738 making a total of £18,375. The charity has a reserves policy which atms to hold at least three months running costs at any one time. In the reporting year the charity met its budget objectives set in the previous year and continued to remain robust despite the difficult financial climate in which it operated.

The principal funding sources for the reporting year are shown in note 4.

FUTURE PLANS

In the coming year, we will continue to work towards sustainable growth and providing a city-wide service across Brighton and Hove to meet the needs of local families. Our main focus will be:

- Transitioning from the Covid Relief project to a broader core offer of 6 sessions of parent-intervention. In making this change we hope to embed the positive learning outcomes of the pandemic, through for example continuing to embrace hybrid delivery of in person and online intervention online. A longer intervention will allow us to do work of greater depth with families and facilitate lasting change for babies.

-In our ABC pilot we will be engaging with 10 families to deliver the 10 week intervention. We have already had invitations to disseminate our findings nationally through both the Parent-Infant Foundation and the Association of Infant Mental Health.

-The governments Best Start Strategy is gathering pace across the country. On a local basis we have been asked to meet with East Sussex County Council, to discuss their Family Hubs project. Brighton and Hove City Council have asked us to be part of a Starting Well Delivery Plan sub-group and their review of early intervention services.

- 2021-21 was a successful year for us in terms of grant funding, but we are aware of the need to diversify our income streams. We have already signed up for the Brighton Half Marathon in February 2022 and will be looking for further funding opportunities throughout the year. We also have plans to develop and market our training and adoption support offers.

-Our project with Brighton and Hove City Council's Partners in Change Hub is continuing with reserved capacity for young parents and those who are Care experienced.

- Internally we are looking to build our internal structures and processes as we enter a new phase of BrightPIP's development. This will include creating an established PAYE role for our Chief Executive, as well employing a part-time administrator.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Governing document Brighton PIP Ltd is a company by Guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 14 March 2016 as amended 7 February 2017 and 23 January 2018. It is registered as a Charity with the Charities Commission registered from 9 February 2018. Brighton PIP Ltd took over the activities of BrightPIP CIC (registered number \$356566) on 1 April 2018.

Organisational structure

The directors manage the business of the charity and may exercise all the powers of the charity unless they are subject to any restrictions imposed by the Companies Act, the articles or any special resolution. The first directors shall be those persons notified to Companies House as the first directors of the charity. Subsequent directors may be appointed by ordinary resolution by the charity. The directors may delegate any of their powers or functions to a committee of two or more directors but the terms of any delegation must be recorded in the minute book.

Decision making

The directors shall manage the business of the charity and may exercise all the powers of the charity unless they are subject to any restrictions imposed by the Companies Act, the articles or any special resolution.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS102, have been prepared in accordance with the Cherities SORP (FRS102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard FRS102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest f.

The trustces/directors consider that there are no material uncertainties about the company's ability to continue as a going concern. The trustees have taken advantage of the various sources of Government support during the COVID-19 pandemic and consider that it will not have a significant impact on the company's ability to continue trading. Income from trading activities is expected to reduce due to the lockdown conditions and steps are being taken to make cost savings. The trustees regard any impact to be short term rather than affecting the company's ability to continue as a going concern. There are no material uncertainties affecting the current year's accounts.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has ontiflement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
