

Trustees are made aware of the Constitution and the policies on Safeguarding and Equality & Diversity and of the three Charity Commission guidance documents on public benefit PB1, PB2 and PB3.

The Pilton Green Man CIO is the umbrella organisation for three Sub-Committees running the Pilton Green Man Day in July, Pilton Theatre Productions running the Pilton Panto in February, and a Sub-Committee running



fundraising for the Friends of Manning's Pit. At least one trustee is an active member of each Sub-Committee. An additional trustee with specific responsibility for Manning's Pit was appointed in January 2022.

Pilton Theatre Productions was unable to put on a pantomime in February 2021 because of Covid-19 restrictions. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown, Pilton Green Man Day in July 2021 was also cancelled by the Sub-Committee.

The three operating sub-committees carry out risk assessments of their operations and also prepare detailed event management plans as appropriate. A H&S policy and related procedures were developed in relation to the management of the Manning's Pit land purchased in June 2021. These will be reviewed annually.

To promote good citizenship for the public benefit by facilitating the development of a volunteer force to assist the community, in particular but not exclusively those members of the community who are in need, in such ways as the trustees may from time to time decide. To advance such charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the trustees see fit, in particular, but not limited to, the promotion of the arts and advancement of education in the history of Pilton, primarily but not exclusively, for the benefit of the people of the Pilton ward of Barnstaple, Devon and will be achieved through the making of grants or providing other support.

The trustees usually meet four times a year to ensure that the organisation of the Pilton Green Man Day, the Pilton Panto and fundraising by the Friends of Manning's Pit are satisfactory and to consider applications for awards and the completion reports from projects to which awards have been made.

We confirm that the trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

The charitable objectives are met by making small grants available to community organisations, charities, groups and individuals to carry out projects which will benefit the people of Pilton. The geographical area of Pilton covers the area approximately from the ND District Hospital to Pottington and from Bradiford to Raleigh and Yeo Vale and there is a resident population of around 5,000.

Since October 2019 the Trustees have supported the raising of funds by the Friends of Manning's Pit Sub-committee and in June 2021 the CIO purchased for the community about 18 acres of land. In connection with this the CIO is also registered with HMRC to enable the collection of Gift Aid on monies donated.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Remedial Work on the Bells of St Mary's Church

An award of £500 was made in 2020 to the Bellringers of St Mary's Church, Pilton, towards essential repairs to the bell frame which was in need of cleaning and corrosion protection. This work cost a total of £18,000 which was raised by the bellringers, four of whom also provided labour to reduce the cost from £30,000.

The work was delayed because of Covid-19 but was finally carried out successfully during 2021 and the £500 award was made and the bells of St Mary's Church were heard again in June.

Award to Kai Chappell

An award of £200 to help with the cost of a trip to Kira Farm, Uganda, was also approved in 2020. Kai Chappell, who lives in Pilton, was expecting to travel to Kira Farm, near Kampala, Uganda, during the visit of the group from Pilton Community College in October 2020. Kira Farm is a development for young people coming from deprived and abusive backgrounds, which teaches them life and career skills.

Unfortunately, all visits to Uganda were cancelled in both 2020 and 2021 so payment of this award has not been requested.

Friends of Manning's Pit Campaign

During 2021, a further £29,241 was raised towards the Friends of Manning's Pit Campaign to Buy Manning's Pit for the community as a result of which the total funds raised reached £200,000 and approximately 18 acres of land were successfully purchased for the community in June.

Bradiford Pocket Garden

In October an award of £400 was made to the 'Bradiford and Pilton in Bloom' sub-committee of the 'Barnstaple in Bloom' organisation to make improvements to a lapsed, community garden area in Bradiford. The project will add planters and raised beds, shrubs, perennials and herbs, and a bench, to create a pleasant, calm area for use by the community. Some clearing and planting work has already been done by the volunteer team and the rest will be completed in the spring of 2022.

Pilton Infants' School Stage

In December an award of £1,000 was made to the Pilton Infants' School PTFA towards to purchase of a new stage for the school hall because the existing stage was no longer fit for purpose. The new stage was successfully completed in time for the annual nativity play at the end of the Christmas term.

The reserves policy of the CIO is to hold a sum equivalent to the loss which might be incurred in a worse case of complete washout of the Pilton Green Man Day, about £8,000.

During 2021, the Friends of Manning's Pit Sub-Committee raised a further £29,241 towards the possible purchase of Manning's Pit.

Beyond the monies raised for the purchase of Manning's Pit, the charity has received no income during 2021 as there was no Pilton Panto and no Pilton Green Man Day. The excess funds from the purchase of Manning's Pit have formed a £4,146 fund, after expenses, for management of the land and which are held in the separate Manning's Pit account for that specific use.
