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Objects and Public Benefit Statement

The RSPCA Sussex North Branch is an unincorporated charitable association and a separately registered branch of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (the Society), carrying out its direct animal welfare work in the areas of Crawley, Horsham and Haywards Heath and outlying villages.

The objects of the Branch are to promote the work and objects of the Society - to promote kindness and to prevent or suppress cruelty to animals by all lawful means in accordance with the policies of the Society.

The Trustees have reviewed the outcomes and achievements of our objectives and activities for the year, to ensure they remain focused on our charitable aims and continue to deliver benefits to the public. We have complied with the duty under the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission.

Advancement of Animal Welfare

Under the Charities Act 2006, the advancement of animal welfare is recognised as a distinct statutory charitable purpose. This legislation and the Animal Welfare Act of the same year indicate an acceptance by the Society that treating living creatures with compassion has a moral benefit for the public as a whole. Whilst this public benefit is clear, it is sometimes difficult to quantify and must be balanced against any detriment.

The Branch's animal welfare work, although local in nature, benefits society at large and also aims to help people in need with the care of their animals. The Chairman's report highlights the Branch's main activities and demonstrates the benefit provided to the public. All our charitable activities as described in more detail in the Chairman's report focus on promoting kindness and preventing or suppressing cruelty to animals and are undertaken to further these purposes for the public benefit.

Charitable Activities pursued for the Public Benefit

Sussex North Branch supports our local inspectors and members of the public by taking in free of charge, mistreated or abandoned animals, (primarily cats but very occasionally dogs), including pets whose owners suffer ill health or financial difficulties or pass away. The Society's Inspectorate (as well as providing education, information and advice) rescues animals in distress and enforces laws against the cruel mistreatment of animals in England and Wales by bringing prosecutions. This work is key to "the prevention or suppression of cruelty" part of the RSPCA objects and promotes humane sentiments towards animals which involves moral benefit to humankind.

We provide subsidised veterinary treatment for animals that are sick or injured and belong to local people on low incomes. We do this through our partnership clinic. This work benefits those on means tested benefits by giving them financial help to obtain care for companion animals in need of veterinary treatment.

We provide subsidised neutering and microchipping of cats and cross breed dogs for those in the branch area on low incomes or who are claiming certain Government benefits. We do this via a voucher scheme. This work helps to control dog/cat populations through neutering and benefits by giving them financial assistance to help neuter and microchip companion animals, thereby promoting responsible pet ownership.

We rehome animals in need at a low cost to people willing and able to have a companion animal.



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
Whilst we recognise that companion animals provide measurable benefits to people's physical and mental health, we consider the provision of pets as a subsidiary to the main charitable aim of this service, which is to reduce animal suffering.

Our policy to charge a reasonable adoption fee for animals aims to highlight the ongoing personal and financial commitment of pet ownership. It would not be in the best interests of animals, and therefore would fall outside our objects to re-home to those who could not afford them. The public benefits because Sussex North branch ensures that rehomed pets are healthy, have been neutered, vaccinated, micro-chipped and vet checked before being re-homed. We take in free of charge lost animals and take steps to reunite them with their owners. This work benefits our local community (including local authorities) by preventing straying and posing a risk to themselves and to people through road traffic accidents.

We respond to enquiries (both direct and via the Society's national call centre) from the public about animals locally. The public benefits from knowing that we can intervene to assist animals in need.

The public benefits through the promotion of responsible pet ownership. Within the terms of our governing document, we support the National Society and other local RSPCA branches by providing funds, when requested, to assist other welfare incentives carried out within our branch area.

We provide volunteering opportunities for those who wish to support our work, including trusteeship, help in the cattery and fundraising. This benefits local people by providing the possibility of doing work which is compassionate and rewarding.

Operating expenditure of $\pounds47,216$ is 45.19% higher than operating income of $\pounds32,598$ resulting in a net loss of $\pounds14,618$ with available funds at year end of $\pounds323,534$.

Incoming Resources

Income of £32,598 was 59% less than the previous year. No legacies were received during 2021 which have been a large source of income in previous years. The RSPCA door to door grant received amounted to £24,134, however £14,333 of this was deducted in branch contribution, so just £9,801 actually reached branch funds.

Resources Expended

Expenditure of £47,216 was slightly down on the previous year (20%) although our spending on welfare assistance and rehoming costs both increased during 2021 compared to 2020.

We continue to see requests for financial assistance by pet owners who are receiving state benefits and cannot afford full cost veterinary treatment. We have set aside £20k for this fund.

Our partnership clinic is closed to new clients due to the difficulties in recruiting new vets and so once the chic is back to full time staff numbers we expect to see an increase in clients and expenditure here, therefore a further £20k was set aside for this area of our work.

Our reserves stand at 6.35 times expenditure and although interest rates are very low and our investments are not seeing huge dividends, our funds remain high and we approach the merger with Brighton Branch in a healthy financial position.



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Chair's Report 2021

of the RSPCA Sussex North Branch

The beginning of 2021 continued as 2020 had ended with the continuation of the restrictions to control the pandemic continuing to have a significant impact on the operation of our branch. The cattery remained closed for the early part of the year, volunteers restricted in what support work they could provide, virtual home visits for rehoming of animals, external fund-raising events on hold, and meetings confined to virtual ones by Google Meet.

We did, however, continue with the great support from Arthur Lodge vets, to assist with home visiting and delivery of cats, and to Becks Cattery who provided private boarding for cats due to the closure of our own cattery. Demand for welfare assistance grew as the pandemic impacted on people's income and we continued to support those in need even though our own clinic based in Roffey had to remain closed due to staffing availability.

By the third quarter of the year, things began to improve as restrictions were lifted and we were able to gradually recommence operations with the reopening of the cattery, after a great refurbishment effort from our volunteers and Trustees, volunteer effort sprang back into action and we started to have face to face meetings at the Bolney Stage. In August Anita transitioned the chair to myself and it was great that I finally got to meet all my colleagues face to face.

As you can see from the accompanying reports, we have plenty achievements to be proud of, with a strong financial standing, home visitor efforts, and continued high standard of delivery from our local Inspectorate.

On a personal note, I would like to thank all my fellow Trustees and volunteers for their patience, continued belief, and support during what was a very difficult year for the branch. A special thanks to Anita for her chairmanship of the branch over the past few years, Jo for her financial know-how keeping us financially sound and Pat for her persistence to galvanise the team into getting the cattery operational again. Our thoughts are with you Pat during your time of illness and wish you a full recovery in 2022.

As with all challenging times, we must look to the future, opportunities come for those that are patient, hardworking and continue to believe in the cause.

Looking forward, we are keen to develop and expand the branch services and develop a preventative agenda as well as our current welfare operation, to support the National Society's Mission 'to ensure animals have a good life by rescuing and caring for those in need, by advocating on behalf of all animals and by inspiring everyone to treat them with compassion and respect'.

At the time of writing, we have now entered the due diligence phase as set out in the National Society's guidance for Mergers with a joint working party being set up to complete the merger in 2022. We are also initiating a number of tactical and supporting initiatives such as communication sessions to interested public bodies and the strengthening of our volunteer team with the appointment of Volunteer Co-ordinator and a rehoming Co-ordinator.

It gives me great pleasure to present to you the annual report for the Sussex Inspectorate for 2021.

Once again, this year has proved to be another difficult year. Covid 19 has continued to play a very disruptive role in all of our daily lives. We survived multiple lockdowns and movement restrictions throughout the year with the mutation of Covid -19 to include the latest Omicron variant. It would appear we will start 2022 where we left off at the end of 2021.

This year we picked up three multi animal cases from two properties and one caravan with over 100 animals being removed. Two cases are still proceeding through the investigation process with assistance from Sussex Police. However, with the hard work and dedication of staff at Leybourne Animal Centre and Brighton Branch's Patcham Animal Centre we were able to rescue these dogs, provide them with the necessary veterinary care and much needed TLC. Eventually all of them were rehomed to new and caring homes.

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One case involved dealing with 36 puppies and one adult dog in a two berth caravan. This is the extent of puppy farming still occurring. But working with Sussex Police Rural Crime Team as well as local council licensing departments, we are slowly but surely making in-roads in reducing the number of incidents of puppy farming.

We wish to offer our thanks to Sussex Police for their invaluable assistance. Our thanks also go to East Sussex and West Sussex Fire and Rescue Service for the many occasions that they have helped with rescues of animals that have got themselves trapped or in difficulty and we have needed their equipment and manpower to resolve the situation. David Buck, our go to solicitor who has and continues to provide us with his excellent presentation of evidence in our cases at court.

Of course, we have not forgotten the RSPCA animal centres that take in our animals, care for them and eventually rehome them. Our sincere thanks to the Branch catteries and kennels that board, care for and rehome our animals, usually at very short notice and at the most inconvenient times, and to the experts who care for our sick and injured wildlife until they have been rehabilitated and are able to be released back into the wild.

I would also like to thank the Regional Board and all the Local Branches for having the trust and confidence in field officers in developing the Inspectorate Welfare Fund for the region. This has been a brilliant tool for officers to really help those who need that bit of support in difficult times. There have been so many incidents where we were able to help senior citizens get their animal to the vet and assist if not pay for the treatment especially in these hard times. The appreciation for our help brings home the reason why we do what we do.

We are not the only charity that goes to great effort for the benefit of animal welfare and I wish to acknowledge other organisations that provide us with invaluable assistance. Thank you to Folly Wildlife for their excellent work for the welfare of wildlife, WADARS (Worthing and District Animals Rescue Services) for assisting us on numerous occasions going to rescues when we could not get there fast enough and Brent Lodge Wildlife Hospital in the Chichester area. We also work very closely with Sara Smith and Claire Gordon of World Horse Welfare to improve the welfare of equines in the area.

Our highly skilled intelligence teams also need a mention, who use state of the art technology to trace some of the miscreants who mistakenly think that by running off to other parts of the country they can escape the consequences of their cruel or neglectful actions.

Finally, on behalf of everyone in the Sussex group, a big thank you to all of the Sussex Branches members and volunteers for making us feel so welcome at your meetings and for all the difficult and invaluable work you have done throughout 2021. Without you dedicating your time and efforts we would not be able to achieve all that we do.

To give you a taste of what we do, here are just a few of the things that we dealt with in the past year that you may find interesting.


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
The Year of the Rescues:

Throughout the year, Inspector Carter, our National Deputy Coordinator for Equine has been to numerous roundups this year. Working with other organisations as World Horse Welfare, British Horse Society, Redwings, etc., removing over 300 horses from Wales, the Midlands and East Anglia. This is a herculean effort to organise staff, transport, vets, stabling etc. But this is a brilliant example of organisations working for the same goal helping each other for the benefit of animal welfare.



Inspector <u>Tony Woodley</u> responded to several calls from the members of the public of a gull hanging 40 ft in the air entangled in with fishing line which got wrapped up in the limbs of a tree on an island in the middle of a pond in Crawley. West Sussex Fire and Rescue were called and attended plus with the assistance of local council workings who supplied an inflatable boat to eventually rescue the gull. The bird suffered minor feather damage and made a full recovery and was later released back into the wild.





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We continue to help cats get out of self made predicaments as we see with Inspector Rachel Smith had on Easter Monday. Frank, a young male neutered cat from St. Leonards, East Sussex was missing for 36 hours when his owner found him 60ft up a tree on some wasteland quite a distance from home. The owner tried calling some tree surgeons but none were willing to come out on the bank holiday. Once Inspector Smith arrived, she called East Sussex Fire and Rescue who were able to get poor Frank out of the tree and was taken home by his very appreciative owner.



This was previously mentioned, in the following pictures are the 36 puppies and one 9 month old golden lab found in a two berth caravan which you can see through the passenger side window being loaded up onto a removal lorry at the scene.

The dog and puppies were inside the caravan. The puppies were all golden, black and chocolate labradors, dachshunds, and it was obvious this was for the puppy trade. As we all know the market for puppies was in high demand and when there is money to be made, unscrubulous people will always want to cash in. But they did not this time, the puppies were seized and rehomed to by increase.
