 The A.P.C.M. consists of 2 parts, part A the Vestry meeting to elect Church
 Wardens where attendees do not have to be on parish electoral roll, but have to be
 on the council electoral roll. Part B is the Annual Parochial Church Meeting where
 attendees are only eligible to vote if on parish electoral roll.

Paul said this is a sad year as we have lost Michael Booth a sitting Church Warden. Michael made a huge contribution to the life of the parish. He grew up in Hawkshaw and at Maine Road in 1961 at a Billy Graham rally, gave his life to Jesus. He was a gentle, wonderful caring Christian and we are all sorry for Geraldine's and the family's loss.

He will be greatly missed.

Patronage of parish.

After the death of Frederick Whowell, his widow passed the Whowell family share of the patronage to the CPAS patronage board early in 2020. The patronage for the Parish of Holcombe & Hawkshaw is now shared jointly between the CPAS Patronage Board and The Rector of Bury. Patrons have an important role when appointing incumbents to the parish.

 sent to the three schools, to Ian and Layna Fleming and to Kathryn and Julia for
 running the Travellers.
- To all the governors of S^t Mary's and Emmanuel Holcombe schools for their continuing hard work.
- To those who have contributed to outreach and care to the elderly.

The pastoral scheme was approved by the Church Commissioners under the Pastoral Measure 1983. Under the Church Representation Rules (rule 12) we are able to change the representation to the P.C.C. in a way that better reflects the development of the parish.

However, there is a process to follow, which means that we cannot change the arrangements for immediate effect in this meeting. A way forward would be for the P.C.C. to review the arrangements and, if required there could be a special church meeting about this.

It also has maintenance responsibility for S^t Mary, Hawkshaw, Emmanuel Church, Holcombe and Emmanuel Church Centre and Canon Lewis Hall, Longsight Road, Holcombe Brook.

Emmanuel Holcombe Team Report 2021

2021 was unsurprisingly a strange year. The Emmanuel, Holcombe Team met three times during the year. Of course many of the regular activities and some minor building work did not take place.

Covid 19 Restrictions

We were able to hold regular service this year, with various restriction such a social distancing, one way systems, mask wearing, etc.

Building work

Our plans for building work were put to the DAC and their feedback generally supported our plans, but required clarification of some areas of work, resulting in some changes to plan drawings and the updated plans being submitted in the second half of 2021. We expect approval early in 2022. There have been numerous minor repairs throughout the year

Services

The decision to stop the 8am Holy Communion Service 1662 was taken as numbers attending had dropped, (even before the pandemic), to around five people, (including Clergy, Warden and Assistant). We continued to provide video Choral Evensong and Compline until July when actual services re-started. It had been decided that Choral Evensong would rejoin our schedule of services, with an evening Holy Communion 1662 about four times per year.

Family and Children Provision

Jo Sumsion started Weekly Coffee Mornings for parents and carers of our School children on Wednesday at 9am, (also Tuesday at St Mary's), which has been successful in attracting around 8 or 9 adults and a couple of toddlers each week.

For the future we are looking at family provision with a possible Café Church and have re-introduced regular Family and Parade Services.

Our thanks go to the numerous people who offer their time, skills, advice and support to all of the work at Emmanuel, Holcombe, we are extremely grateful.

No Report Received

Fabric Report 2021

Due to the continuing Coronavirus Pandemic a lot of the usual building work has been restricted The general condition of all three buildings is however generally satisfactory and where there are defects and problems they are being noted and remedied when possible. Much work has been done in continuing to ensure the buildings were Covid safe, including the drawing up a comprehensive Risk Assessments, devising one way systems, spacing seating, provision of sanitiser, etc.

Emmanuel Church, Holcombe

We continue to rely on our band of volunteers who do many minor repairs. The plans for the development within the building have developed further this year. The DAC are considering our responses to concerns they had raised. We believe the Faculty will be approved early in 2022.

There is a problem with rain leaking into the church from the clock tower and also through lead flashing on the south aisle, the problem is being investigated.

Emmanuel Church Centre

The building and surrounding gardens are in a generally good state of repair, due in no small part to the dedicated work of volunteers, which has continued, during the pandemic. At one working party a group painted the E.C.C. interior walls.

The five yearly electrical system inspection was conducted with only minor recommendations, and several electrical repairs being completed at the same time.

St. Mary's, Hawkshaw

The grounds/garden and graveyard are well maintained and in good order. There are signs of general wear and tear in the church building which is to be expected as the building is used a lot; so interior decoration will have to be addressed soon.

Some thought needs to be given to a replacement heating system in the near future.

It is a continuous battle with slipping slates and leaking gutter systems, but overall these have held up reasonably well under some testing times.

Feedback from the DAC with regards to the kitchen/toilets/sound desk/storage plans showed that they approved in principle but at present cannot support the proposal, resulting in some changes to plan drawings and fresh plans will be submitted in 2022.

General Comments

We thank everyone who works quietly behind the scenes cleaning, washing the linen, cleaning the brass and silver, flower arranging or sound, PA and streaming technicians, Deputy Wardens and last, but not least, the sidemen and women who play such an important role in welcoming people to our services.

The practical help and financial assistance of many people continues to play a major part in the care of the buildings, and our grateful thanks go to everyone who has contributed in any way.

P.C.C. Review of the Year 2021

The P.C.C. met eight times during 2021, all but two of the meetings taking place via Zoom. An average of 17 members attended each meeting. In addition, the Parish Leadership Team (P.L.T.) met every few weeks via Zoom with delegated authority to approve or initiate certain measures where necessary, reporting back to P.C.C.

So much of the business of both the P.C.C. and P.L.T. centred around the impact of Covid 19, discussing ways to mitigate its damaging effect on the church's ability to worship together, provide for fellowship and spread the gospel.

The following matters were considered during the year:

Treasurer's Report:

The P.C.C. received an update on our financial position at each meeting. Following the previous year's success in paying the Parish Share in full, David Lomax advised that there would be a shortfall of £4,000 during 2021.

Covid Restrictions:

The P.C.C. ensured that all government rules and Church of England advice was adhered to throughout the year. Much of the planning relating to Covid was conducted at P.L.T. meetings allowing for a more timely response to the ever changing situation. Services continued to

be streamed online and other activities such as Open the Book were pre-recorded and available on YouTube. In July a survey was carried out to gauge the feelings of the congregations in regard to the relaxing of Covid-safe measures. The responses from this online survey informed the P.C.C.'s decisions.

Holy Communion:

There is a legal requirement to provide Holy Communion within the parish and the Bishop must be informed of any changes in pattern. While Covid levels were very high, Holy Communion took place twice a month at Holcombe and once a month at E.C.C. only. As the year progressed a more comprehensive pattern emerged across the parish, but with Holy Communion being in one kind, (bread only) with wafers instead of bread as a temporary measure.

Mission Communities:

The Diocese will be divided into 33 Mission Communities, the Bury and Rossendale Deanery comprising five Mission Community areas. This will come into effect during 2022. The P.C.C. discussed the implications of such a pooling of resources and the need to replace retiring stipendiary clergy.

Mission and Outreach:

Experience Easter took place outside for our two church schools. Easter trails for families were organised at all three centres. "Thy Kingdom Come" booklets were distributed between Ascension and Pentecost. Digital Family Prayer Adventure maps were also distributed through the schools. There was an opportunity to remember departed lovedones at E.C.C. in November. Experience

Christmas took place in Hawkshaw and Holcombe Churches, but had to be abandoned for Holcombe Brook Primary School due to rising Covid infections.

With Jo Sumsion's role as Children and Families Ministry Facilitator commencing in September opportunities for mission and outreach were identified. These included a weekly morning drop-in for parents of school children at both Holcombe and Hawkshaw and the introduction of Camp-fire Church at E.C.C.

Children's Work:

The year started with little scope for providing substantial children's and young people's work. Work sheets were made available for younger children at Hawkshaw Church during services and, as restrictions lifted, activities were provided outside. However, from September, Cellar youth club and Sunday School resumed.

Ordination and Licensing:

During July Ian Fleming was ordained and Jo Sumsion was licensed as Lay Reader.

Children and Families Ministry Facilitator:

In 2021 the P.C.C. approved funding for the employment of a Children and Families Ministry Facilitator to work 15 hours per week. The position was duly advertised and following a rigorous interview process carried out by a small team, the P.C.C. was delighted to appoint Jo Sumsion to the position. Jo thus started in her new role in September. Jo Venn agreed to be her line manager and will continue to monitor and support Jo's progress going forward.

Safeguarding:

During the course of the year Liz Webber took over from Elaine Allum as Safeguarding Officer. The members of the P.C.C., along with people in various other relevant roles, were required to undertake online safeguarding training.

Health and Safety:

A revised Health and Safety policy and new Emergency Plan were approved by the P.C.C.

Buildings:

Various plans for projects to improve facilities at both Holcombe and Hawkshaw Churches made slow progress through the Diocesan Advisory Committee and the P.C.C. was kept updated as relevant.

Church Groups:

Regular groups such as mid-week meetings resumed from September.

Training:

A.L.M. training was approved for several members of the parish and First Aid training took place in November.

Michael Booth:

Sadly, during the year we lost Michael Booth, Churchwarden, Lay Reader and long-serving member of the P.C.C.. His death has left a huge gap in the life of our Parish, particularly within the Hawkshaw family, and he will be greatly missed.

Verger:

Eric Shortt was appointed Verger at Hawkshaw Church.

School Governors:

The P.C.C. endorsed the appointments of several members of the church to the governing bodies of our church schools.

George Sandiford Legacy:

A legacy of £25,000 was received from George Sandiford who worshipped at Emmanuel Church Centre.

Report for the Bridge, Bentley and Ramsbottom Trust for 2021.

The work of the Trust has continued during the year with Trustees actively looking for ways to help those in need. Please read the promotional information below and if we can help anyone in need please let them know about the Trust.

The Expenditure for the year was £5724.

Grants were awarded in the following ways:

(1) 'One off' book grants to University students, (23) Welfare, and (1) Educational.

The Bridge, Bentley, Ramsbottom Trust was created as an amalgamation of the John T. Bridge and three other smaller charitable trusts in 2002.



Bridge Bentley Ramsbottom Trust has small grants available to those in need living within a three mile radius of Emmanuel, Holcombe Church, Holcombe or those living within the Bury Deanery as defined on 1st January 2020.

The five Trustees treat each application in strictest confidence. Applications are welcomed from people of any faith or none.

The Diocese of Manchester, the Deanery of Bury and Rossendale Synod Report 2021

The meetings of Synod gives representatives valuable opportunities to meet and discuss matters with members of other parishes across the deanery. Each parish is entitled to representation according to their size. Our Electoral Roll entitled us to four members.

The Deanery Synod met two this year.

New Deanery

This year saw the formation of a new Deanery: the former Bury, Rossendale, Radcliffe and Prestwich deaneries were combined to form **ONE** deanery: the Deanery of Bury and Rossendale with **ONE** area Dean. The new Area Dean is Revd Canon Dr. Rachel Mann, who was Area Dean of Withington, Incumbent of St. Nicholas Burnage and Curate of S¹. Chad Ladybarn (Manchester Diocese). In June, Mrs. Kathryn Pollard was appointed as Deanery Lay Chair.

The inaugural meeting was held on 6th July, via Zoom with a further meeting in September, also via Zoom.

The year has again been overshadowed by the Covid Pandemic. As reported last year the main focus of this year has been the formation of the Mission Communities throughout the diocese. Our deanery is to be divided into five Mission Communities. Our parish will be Mission Community 3 comprising Holcombe and Hawkshaw, Ramsbottom Team and S'. Anne, Tottington.

Mission Community Leader

We will start this new way of working from January 2022. As part of that process it is hoped to make appointments of all Mission Community Leaders between January and June 2022. P.C.C.'s, Wardens and congregations were asked to put names forward late in 2021.

Focal Leader

Within the each Mission Community, every centre of worship will have a named focal leader who will provide the pastoral care for that centre. This will be either a stipendiary priest, (who may also be the mission community leader), another ordained minister, or a lay person – such as a Reader, or Authorised Lay Minister (A.L.M.), or any other suitable lay person – who is appointed to the role. There will be a focus on developing specific ministries and skills to meet the needs of local people. They should be appointed by 2023

Safeguarding Report 2021

Psalm 82 verse 3 says, 'Defend the weak and the fatherless, uphold the case of the poor and the oppressed. Rescue the weak and the needy and deliver them from the hand of the wicked.' As a church, we want to ensure that the children and vulnerable adults in our community are protected. We recognise the calling and duty to love and care for the vulnerable and marginalised and protect all from abuse. The Parish of Holcombe and Hawkshaw continue to follow the Bishops' Safeguarding Policy and Practice Guidance and continue to review our own Safeguarding Policy annually.

I recently took over the role of Parish Safeguarding Officer from Elaine Allum, which coincided with groups restarting following closures due to the Coronavirus Pandemic and a change in policy which now requires DBS checks and Parish Safeguarding Training to be updated every three years as opposed to five years, as it had been previously. This has meant a lot of people have needed DBS checks updating in the past few months and I'm extremely grateful to everyone who has completed applications during this time. Many people have also completed their Diocesan Safeguarding Training, though we still have a number of people needing to do this, in order to ensure we meet the criteria as set out by the diocese. Part of the problem has been due to the leadership courses being oversubscribed, I hope these will become more readily available during the coming months.

There has been one safeguarding report which has needed to be investigated over the last year.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. Ensuring your DBS and Safeguarding Training requirements are up to date, alongside acting on any concerns you might have, regarding children and vulnerable adults, is absolutely necessary for all those in qualifying roles.

Thank you to everyone, for the collective effort in making our churches as safe as we can.

SAFEGUARDING POLICY PROMOTING A SAFER CHURCH

The following policy was agreed at the Parochial Church Council (P.C.C.) meeting held on 14^{th} March 2022.

In accordance with the Church of England Safeguarding Policy our church is committed to:

- Promoting a safer environment and culture.
- Safely recruiting and supporting all those with any responsibility related to children, young people and vulnerable adults within the church.
- Responding promptly to every safeguarding concern or allegation.
- Caring pastorally for victims/survivors of abuse and other affected persons.
- Caring pastorally for those who are the subject of concerns or allegations of abuse and other affected persons.
- Responding to those that may pose a present risk to others.

The Parish will:

- Create a safe and caring place for all.
- Have a named Parish Safeguarding Officer (P.S.O.) to work with the incumbent and the P.C.C. to implement policy and procedures.
- Safely recruit, train and support all those with any responsibility for children, young people and adults to have the confidence and skills to recognise and respond to abuse.
- Ensure that there is appropriate insurance cover for all activities involving children and adults undertaken in the name of the parish.
- Display in church premises and on the Parish website the details of who to contact if there are safeguarding concerns or support needs.
- Listen to and take seriously all those who disclose abuse.
- Take steps to protect children and adults when a safeguarding concern of any kind arises, following House of Bishops guidance, including notifying the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser (D.S.A.) and statutory agencies immediately.
- Offer support to victims/survivors of abuse regardless of the type of abuse, when or where it occurred.
- Care for and monitor any member of the church community who may pose a risk to children and adults whilst maintaining appropriate confidentiality and the safety of all parties.
- Ensure that health and safety policy, procedures and risk assessments are in place and that these are reviewed annually.
- Review the implementation of the Safeguarding Policy, Procedures and Practices at least annually.

Each person who works within this church community will agree to abide by this policy and the guidelines established by this church.


St Mary's Church of England Primary School



E.C.C. Prayer Group

Activities during 2021 were severely reduced by the Covid pandemic.

The usual opportunity for private prayer and reflection on Good Friday



(2nd April) was significantly pared down, with E.C.C. open from 10a.m.-12 noon with much-reduced input.


Open the book

Children and Families Ministry Facilitator

In July we held sessions for the Year 6 pupils at St. Mary's, Emmanuel and Holcombe Brook Primary schools, using the 'It's Your Move' material from Scripture Union to help them to prepare for the transition to secondary school.

In July we also began to prepare for restarting Sunday school at Hawkshaw after the long break due to restrictions. Leaders met together to plan and prepare to make sure that everything was in place for the start of the September term when, finally, the groups would be able to meet again.

In planning for September, I could see the need for parents, particularly those new to the schools, to have the opportunity to meet together and get to know each other, especially after spending 18 months in lockdown with their little ones. Weekly coffee mornings have started in St Mary's and Holcombe for the respective parents and carers, after they have dropped off at school and there's always plenty of cake!

We have contact with our church schools each week. We lead whole school collective worship on a rota - Paul, Ian and Robert and Jo Dolman, (Bolton circuit Methodist youth worker) - are all involved. Each week, I have been into Emmanuel to lead class worship for a different class over a half term. We have explored the values of generosity and compassion.

I have also been helping to run the choir at St. Mary's and a good number of children and their families have joined us to sing with the church music group for All Age Worship.

We've also held special services for our schools at Harvest and Christmas.

In December, we were able to invite the schools into church to Experience Christmas at Emmanuel and St. Mary's. One at a time, each class joined us for a session to explore the Christmas story with interactive storytelling and reflective activities. Unfortunately, with the rise in Covid rates towards the end of term, we had to cancel the two days we had planned to take Holcombe Brook Primary school through a similar experience at Emmanuel Church Centre. We hope to be able to offer them Experience Easter Outside.

Last term we were also planning towards the starting up of Campfire Church, which met for the first time on 9th January. This is a new initiative aimed at engaging and encouraging people of all ages to meet with God and grow in faith while meeting in an outdoor environment. We plan to meet on the second Sunday of each month at 3pm in the garden of Emmanuel Church Centre. I have been successful applying for a grant from the diocese's Family Worship and Beyond Fund for Campfire Church and we have been given the full £750 towards the start up and running costs.

Looking forward, we will be running Marriage Preparation on two Saturdays in February, supporting family life from the outset, and we are planning to take the children in Year 3 to Year 6 for a weekend to Yorkshire camps in March.

Thank you to all the volunteers who work tirelessly and inspire in so many ways. Our children and families' ministry could not happen without each one of you.


