The trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 December 2021 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes. The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Notts Gymnastics Report of the trustees for the year ending 31 December 2021

2021 Overview

Following an unprecedented 2020, we headed into 2021 still navigating the impacts of the COVID19 pandemic, and the 3rd national lockdown.

We were pleased to capitalise on the evolvement of the furlough scheme to enable more of our coaches to work from home to deliver sessions to our gymnasts and they flipped almost seamlessly to remote classes of basic strength & flexibility work alongside fun & competitive events to break up the routine.

When the gym reopened in April, we progressively restored all our activities and by the end of the year we were delighted to be fully operational once more including our drop-in sessions and parties. We opened our doors to parents and were able to see the return of our Notts Open event and the beloved Christmas Display.

Our parents continued to support us in our fundraising efforts; most notably the Reach the Peak Challenge we ran in March, raising sufficient funds to purchase a much-needed new trampoline. Ahead of the Tokyo Olympics BG generously supported the purchase of a set of Senoh Bars which were transported to "Lilleshall for the "teams". final preparations. Other equipment expenditures were trestrained given the climate and limited to maintenance & repairs only.

After a nearly 2-year hiatus our gymnasts returned to competition, with great success across all levels. Our elite gymnasts were able to perform internationally again with Luke, Sam M & Becky representing GB while Lottie had success for England. All National squad places were retained, and a substantial haul of medals & regional titles were secured. After 11 years with Notts (bookending his illustrious career) Sam Oldham retired from competition but has very much remained part of the team. We supported Becky in making a change of clubs — which though very sad was the right thing for her. Finally, we were delighted to welcome Frank Baines & Natasha Coates to the team.

Outside of the gym we continued to work with the Council regarding the future of our site & were delighted to be included as part of the Minister for Sport's visit to the area in July. Between our members and support from a local councillor we proudly installed a defibrillator in response to the tragic news of the sudden death by cardiac arrest of Josh Downie (a former Notts gymnast and brother to Becky & Ellie Downie). Lastly we invested in a new email system to improve our record keeping and auditability.

On the team front we said sad farewells to Jonathan, Charlotte, Aidan & Alan as they moved onto pastures new. We adjusted roles for Lucy, Tyler & Susannah to support their development and welcomed two new faces in Bryony & Joe. In terms of CPD, as examinations restarted 3 of our team achieved their Level 1 coaching qualifications & another progressed his Level 3 while 2 of our staff were selected for prestigious UK sport courses. We launched a Kickstart initiative to support recruitment & revamped our pay policies & appraisal / performance review processes. Our elite women's gymnasts were supported by Nick Ruddock and our Trustees were strengthened by the Addition of Demi to our Board.

From a welfare perspective we continued to feel the impact of allegations raised from the Athlete A / Gymnast Alliance movement as investigations progress. We remain wholly committed to working proactively with BG to improve the culture of our sport and focusing on our members as children first

and gymnasts second. The interim update from the Whyte Review shared there had been 390 submissions concerning 90 clubs with 39 referrals to statutory authorities. To support our aspirations here Lorna joined the team bringing a valuable new perspective and with the additional resource an opportunity to reach out to parents more broadly. Overall we are pleased that the dialogue with the team on this dimension continues to grow and become firmly embedded in the way we do things.

Although in practical terms our operations have returned to normal we anticipate ongoing effects for our staff & members alike and will continue to factor this into our outlook as we head into 2022.

Notes to the financial statements

1 Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the second edition of the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice issued in October 2019, applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015), the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Notts Gymnastics Academy meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The Charity reported a cash inflow of £55,362 for the year. The trustees consider that the charity will continue to operate for the foreseeable future and have prepared the accounts on a going concern basis.

Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the items of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured-reliably.

Income from government grants and other grants, whether capital grants or revenue grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the items of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the Trust's work or for specific artistic projects being undertaken by the Trust.

Notes to the financial statements

Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Operating leases

The charity classifies the lease of printing, specialist lighting and audio equipment as operating leases; the title to the equipment remains with the lessor and the equipment is replaced every 5 years whilst the economic life of such equipment is normally 10 years. Rental charges are charged on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives as follows:

Plant, equipment, and motor vehicles - 15% Reducing Balance

Stock

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Donated items of stock are recognised at fair value which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay for the items on the open market.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Notes to the financial statements

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme, and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

Legal status of the Trust

The Trust is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £5 per member of the charity.
