Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 July 2022

Structure, Governance and Management

Objectives and activities

Summary of the objectives of the charity

To advance, improve, develop, and maintain public education in the art and science of music in all aspects by the presentation of public orchestral concerts; and for the general purposes of such charitable bodies or for such other purposes as shall be exclusively charitable as the committee may from time to time decide.

Summary of the main activities in relation to these objects

Following the easing of government restrictions regarding the Covid-19 pandemic, the Orchestra was able to present five concerts during the year. However, due to the fact that we still had to observe social distancing, the number of people allowed in the audience was restricted. All guidelines were adhered to ensuring personal safety during this period.

Achievements and Performance

This has been an interesting year for the orchestra emerging from lockdown.

Due to lockdown and Covid-19 and having no concerts last season, we performed just five concerts, rather than the usual six not knowing what the pandemic situation would be. Despite this, our income has held well and, whilst we did put a restriction on ticket sales to adhere to social distancing, we did sell out. This was very encouraging, when many people were still nervous attending concerts and not knowing if our previous audience were to return. We therefore received income from ticket sales, subscriptions, fundraising from Amazon and raffle tickets at the Friends concert.

Returning to regular rehearsals and concerts has meant there were the usual venue hire costs, music hire, soloist fees, Musical Director and Leader fees and any other ad hoc fees relevant to the running of the Orchestra.

Membership

We are again thrilled to welcome new members and will continue to use subscriptions to cover rehearsal costs.

Friends' Scheme

The Friends' scheme was resumed during this year, and the income from them is vitally important to the Orchestra, and we thank them for their support for last year and in the coming year.

Ticket Sales

We will continue with our policy to offer heavily discounted seats to children at all concerts. It was a successful year for ticket sales considering the restricted numbers on audience for each concert. We also had the best-selling Christmas concert the Orchestra has had in some years. Despite the limited capacity, all but one concert sold out throughout the season which demonstrates audiences still wish to engage with live music.

Thanks

Appreciation is due to all who serve on the committee. These essential roles have been fulfilled by considerable time sacrifice and without which the Orchestra could not operate. Thanks also goes to our Musical Director for his support and guidance. We were pleased to welcome Emily Groom for her first year as leader. Special thanks go to members of the Orchestra acting as Web Master while setting up a new website, the writing of comprehensive program notes for our concerts, and acting as Librarian Assistant.

Future Plans

Now restrictions have been eased, we look forward to rehearsals performing challenging and innovating programs, inspiring audiences, and giving Northampton access to an Orchestra it can be proud of.

Financial Review

The Orchestra's primary income is still member subscriptions to cover rehearsal costs and ticket sales to cover concert costs. The Friends' membership covers the costs of the Friends concert at the end of the season.

Our main expenses are rehearsal costs, concert hall and music hire and conductor's fees. There was one exceptional cost for this season for a new website for the NSO. As a result, there is a small shortfall but luckily, we are in a position to absorb the loss due to funds we have in our savings accounts, due to the generous legacy gift from a previous year.

Reserves policy

The committee continued to deliver its policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed (the free reserves) held by the charity should be at least 12 months of the resources expended.

Investment policy

The Orchestra has again benefitted from the interest received from reserves held at Market Harborough Building Society in both the 60 day and 7-day notice accounts. Both accounts are held under dual signatory and are protected by the FSCS and are held under dual signatory.

Risk review

As sufficient funds are held in reserve, there is no immediate risk. However, the committee will continue to assess the situation and act accordingly.

Independent Examiners

CVS Northamptonshire were appointed to undertake an Independent Examination of the Orchestra's accounts during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity. This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice SORP (FRS102) issued 1st October 2019, and the Charities Act 2011.

Public Benefit Statement

Northampton Symphony Orchestra promotes classical concerts which increase the amount of quality live classical music concerts in the Northamptonshire area. The Orchestra provides heavily discounted seats for under sixteens to encourage appreciation of orchestral music in the young. Through weekly rehearsals local musicians are provided an opportunity to engage in the art of classical music performance by playing in one of the leading amateur orchestras in the UK. NSO does not provide tuition.

Responsibilities of the trustees

The main obligation of the committee in preparing the accounts is to give a true and fair view of the Orchestra's incoming resources and application of resources during the year and of its state of affairs at the end of the year. The committee is responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Orchestra and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice — Accounting and Reporting by Charities. The committee is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Orchestra and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other forms of abuse.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" and SORP (FRS102) issued on 1st October 2019, and applicable UK Accounting Standard and the Charities Act 2011.

Fixed Assets

There are no fixed assets.

Income

Income is brought into account on receivable basis in the year in which it is received.

Intangible Income

Intangible income, in the form of donated facilities and voluntary help etc., is not included in the financial statements since it is not considered practicable to quantify such income.

Expenditure

Expenditure is stated inclusive of value added tax, and is brought into account in the year in which it is due. Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the costs relates directly to the activity.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purposes and are as general funds. Designated funds are unrestricted funds are designated by the committee for particular purposes.

Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor/funder. There are currently no restricted funds.
