Para 1.17 and 1.19	To achieve the aims of the charity, SAF provides affordable counselling to couples, families, adults, and children and young people. SAF believes in the importance of prevention and delivers wellbeing workshops as an educational tool for individuals to understand mental health issues better and gain tools to increase resilience. We work with several funders to provide free counselling to communities with high levels of deprivation. Additionally, SAF delivers counselling services at schools within deprived areas.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.	Para 1.20	 During the reporting period, SAF continued to focus on organisational development in line with its sustainability strategy. This included continuing our growth of Child & Adolescent services, in partnership with schools situated in areas of deprivation. This led to the delivery of 7,200 sessions reaching 1,200 children and young people. Our school partners increased to 14. SAF's adult services reached 400 people experiencing mental health issues through the delivery of 2,400 counselling sessions. 274 of those adults were enrolled in SAF's Pay-As-You-Can program, offering free or low-cost counselling to people living in poverty or low financial means. Additionally to SAF counselling services, 8 Wellbeing Workshops were delivered across the year and 10 CPD sessions were delivered to the volunteer and therapy team. Working with Islington Council and the Peabody Housing Association, SAF provided free sessions to their service users in specific geographic areas. During this period, SAF recruited a new part time member of staff to manage

administrative duties to support the growth of SAF services. In line with SAF's sustainability strategy, reliance on grant funding was reduced by 26% and income generated through counselling activities increased by 130%

Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held	Para 1.22	SAF holds 3 month's expenditure as reserves in the event the charity faces circumstances that may result in winding up. Reserves for this period are calculated at £4,490	
Amount of reserves held	Para 1.22	£2,156. Currently at a deficit of £2,334 SAF received £15600 less in grant funding than the previous year. Coupled with the rise in core operational costs and an increase in staffing, this has affected the ability to close the deficit of reserves. Self-generated income offset some losses and whilst overall income reduced by 3.7%, the significant increase in self-generated funds is a big step for SAF's sustainability and will enable the balancing of its reserve funds.

A description of the principal risks facing the charity	Para 1.46	As a charity utilising the support of volunteers to deliver its services, SAF faces a risk of operational difficulties in the event volunteers can no longer be recruited. To minimise this, SAF works with a universities and colleges who provide counselling courses and rely on placement opportunities to complete studies. This enables us to mitigate this risk.
		Grant funding continues to be a vital support for SAF income and whilst SAF has made big gains in increasing self-generated income, the charity is not yet fully sustainable. Therefore, SAF faces the risk of financially losses.
		Reputational damage is a risk that faces most charities. Whilst this risk is small, SAF ensures it works to follow best practice as a charity and as a BACP accredited service in order to reduce this risk further.
