INTRODUCTION

When writing this section for the Annual Report I was struck by a number of key themes that underpin our work in what has been another highly successful year for Northamptonshire Carers. Those themes are;

- Growth and Diversification and Key services
- Workforce
- Carers Needs
- Diversity and Inclusion
- Partnerships and Integrated services

In terms of Growth and Diversification and Key services I suppose the year is summed up from the perspective of more services for people than ever before. However, within that it is worth highlighting the following:

- Increased work from our Carers Support Line and Carers Assessment Teams
- High referrals to both Adult and Young Carers services
- New Social Prescribing work
- Work on the Integrated Care across Northamptonshire Transformation Programme focusing on Multi-Disciplinary Team Membership at Primary Care Network locality levels, Dementia Hubs and Community Asset Group approaches for Long Term Health conditions, Breathing Space for COPD, Pumped up for coronary heart disease and groups for Dementia and Diabetes.

We have also as well as the above received new funding to support Mental Health and Dementia Carers providing Carers breaks and education. We have also seen growth via our Regulated Care overnight service and via our hospital discharge work which is being recognized nationally. Our Young Carers service also continues to flourish and develop. Our network of Carers support Groups, Cafes, specialist groups and music and leisure groups also continue to do splendid work, receive great feedback, and be well attended.

In terms of workforce, we are blessed with an ever-growing team of Staff, Volunteers, Peer Supporters - the quality of these teams is what enables us to be able to do all that we do. One thing that was wonderful this year was to be able to present long service awards to our Staff and Volunteers and Trustees who have been with us on our journey. It was very humbling to see the number of years people have been with the Organisation and the huge contribution they have made and most importantly the difference that has made to Carers. We have grown from small beginnings to now be a large local Charity and much of that is down to our excellent team.

Carers needs are always the starting point for the work we do and the best thing as we emerge from the challenges and sadness of the Pandemic has been to see so many of you as we have moved back fully to face to face and group work. We will continue to prioritize work around what Carers needs are and are pleased this year to have won new funding and allocated additional resources to Carers breaks, our Support Line and Group work with Carers. We are also acutely aware of the strains on Carers own health and wellbeing and the financial challenges they face in these difficult times.

As part of our work on the new Carers strategy for Northamptonshire via the Carers Partnership we have conducted a large survey around Carers needs and issues and will link this also into our own service planning and delivery.

The particularly important theme of Diversity and Inclusion has been a real focus for us this year. The Organisation signed up to the Big Promise and much work has and is going on around this with the Organisation being cited as a good practice model. We have also via funding from Carers Trust been working on our Action for Carers Project in terms of identifying and working with hard-to-reach groups of Carers; we want to ensure that Northamptonshire is accessible to all who need us.

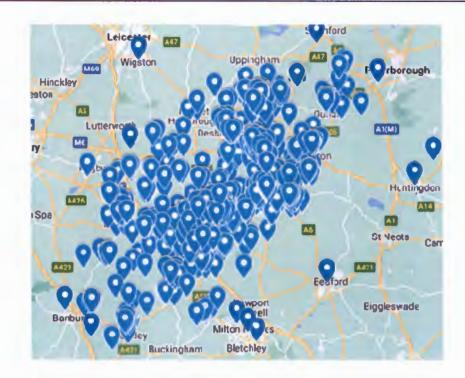

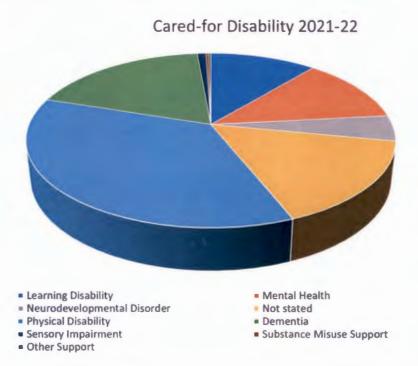

Northamptonshire Carers Annual Outcomes 2021 Organisational Impact Statement

Carers of all ages across diverse communities in Northamptonshire trust by being connected to Northamptonshire Carers they will be welcomed and listened to, supported and connected to other Carers. Carers will experience improvements in knowledge, confidence, wellbeing, their quality of life, be less isolated and more able to continue their caring role.

Northamptonshire Carer's Theory of Change was co-produced by a working group of stakeholders consisting of Adult and Young Carers, former Carers, Northamptonshire Carers workers and Trustees from diverse communities in Northamptonshire.

Outcomes achieved 2021

The table below shows outcomes achieved throughout 2021:

Due to the effects of the pandemic Carers are presenting with higher levels of need and told us about the following difficulties and fears for the future.

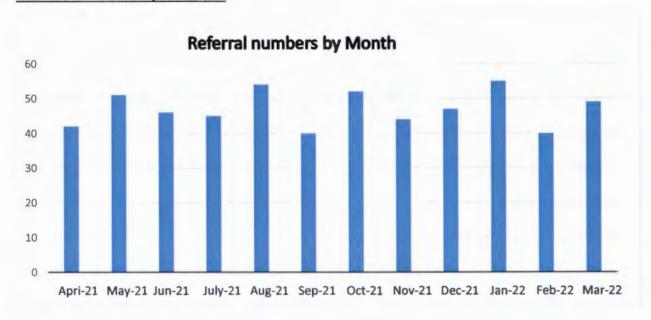
Carers reported the effects of barriers within Health and Social Care systems as a significant support need. 'I would say that my support needs are related to stress and anger over trying to get the right support (for the cared for persons)...trying to get both parents and authorities to listen... the pandemic has not helped this situation.' Carers also cited fears for what would happen in the future as a support need '....feelings of inadequacy, fears for the future as we are parents in our 70s.' Carers also viewed not being able to take a break as a support need 'Just need respite' and I need someone to come in and befriend my mother to allow me to get out of the house.'

Carers cited Northamptonshire Carers as a key source of support that was easy to access but expressed frustration and burn out around having to fight for services and support for the cared for person. 'Getting medical care feels like a constant fight' and 'very easy with Northamptonshire Carers. All others it's a hell of a fight.' and '...just seem to go on waiting lists but never get to the top' and 'Social care has been a particular challenge, mostly due to the pandemic... lately due to availability of carers.'

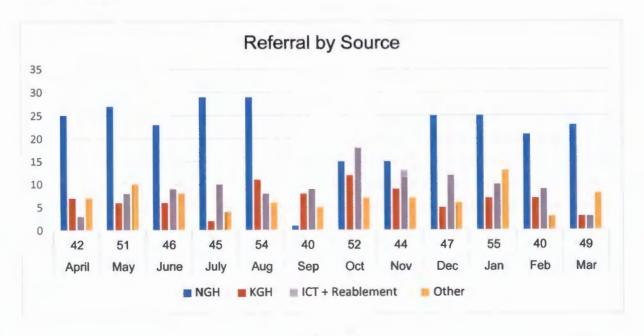
Finally, Carers told us that 'knowing that the cared for person is safe' is their main priority, but their feedback also shows that they are struggling to achieve this more than ever before.

Overnight care 12-month report

Number of referrals per month:



We have had a total of 565 referrals in this 12-month period completed. A further 96 have either been refused as not appropriate or cancelled. The numbers of referrals against delivery are very similar. This is due to the way referrals are taken and capacity is informed daily. During the past 12 months, the figures have remined quite stable and returned quickly to pre-pandemic levels and above.

NGH and KGH are the two acute hospitals and NGH has the most referrals. ICT and the reablement teams are usually the next highest referrals due to the links with daytime hospital discharges and often they undertake the first assessment at home. The referrals in this area have changed due to recent changes in the referral responsibilities.

Others – these referrals come from across the county from GPs, EMAS, Adult social care and voluntary sector providers or professionals. Many of these referrals are identified as having a family carer in place and there has been a breakdown in the dynamics of the situation such as the carer being admitted to hospital and the cared for needing some short intervention.

Many carers are struggling with their caring roles due to the level of care provision and patient needs. This has also been noticed by the care staff providing the delivery.

Numbers of nights of delivery:

We have had available in this period 1,820 nights based on 52 weeks. We have delivered 1,851 nights.

Despite the difficulties and ability to deliver the service in this past 12 months the service has remained consistent.

The average service delivery over the 12 months per patient is 3.2 nights.

Covid 19 impacts

We are continuing to work to tight constraints with full PPE use, infections monitoring and risk assessing each patient for the safety of the patient and their loved ones and our staff.

Our diligence has proven that we have had a very low level of infection across the past 2 years by following guidance and allowing staff to use equipment in a manner they feel is safe. Care staff still prefer to use masks and infections controls moving forwards.

The use of the PPE portal and free vaccines has been invaluable to the service.

Patient feedback for the 12-month period

Providing feedback on this type of service is quite difficult due to the nature of the service and short provision. This can be measured in beds saved and hospital prevention but by the patient this is usually verbal comments as below.

The questions asked:

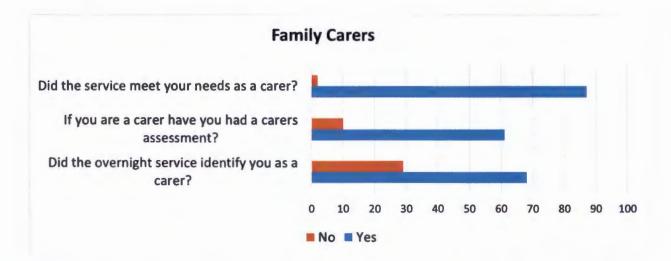
- 1. Did the service meet your needs and expectations?
- 2. Have you returned to hospital since your discharge?
- 3. What tasks were you supported with?
- 4. Do you have a family carer?
- 5. Is your carer registered with Northamptonshire Carers?

All have reported their satisfaction (Appendix 1) with the service using words such as 'Professional', 'above and beyond', 'caring', 'punctual', and 'provided information'.

Unpaid family carers

97 carers have been identified.

Of the 565 patients' referrals we found that of those patients and their families 97were carers which is 17.16%. This is an increase of 3 % on our last report

Some patients have a family Carer at home that have not been identified and referrals still come across with no carer identified even though they are. We will refer onwards and link Carers to the wrap around services for support. On the third question where a No was identified this is because these carers are already registered prior to the service delivery

Many family members do not wish to be recognised as a Carer but take the contact information for the future

Day service Report

Day time Report

The daytime service is provided to Carers free of charge for a short period of time. The service is delivered with an initial home visit assessment followed by 6 weeks of care delivery to support the carer.

Most of the service are delivered in 2 hours' time scales with flexibility built in for Carers needs and events

The care provided can be variable depending on the needs of the cared for and their Carers.

After a six-week period the Carer can offer a donation and we will endeavour to provide additional service above the free period.

Some Carers wish to continue and offer donations for extra weeks the income form this over a 7-month period in 2021 to 2022 is £4,550

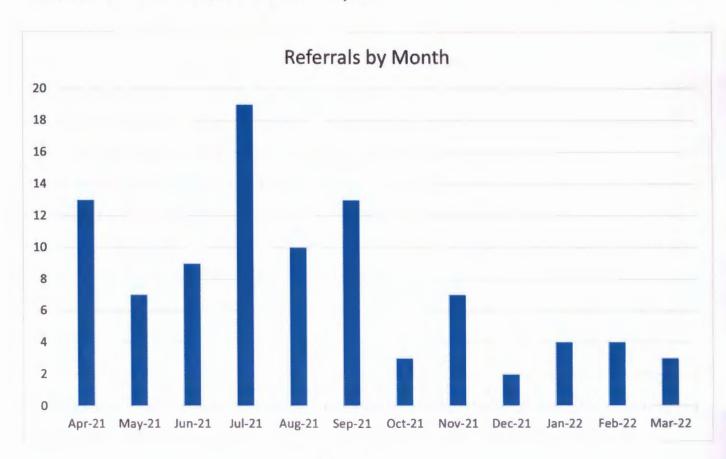
What have we delivered?

577 visits

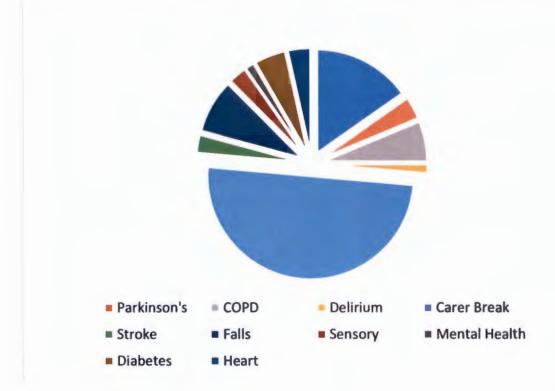
68 Referrals of carers were referred through our internal resources and staff only 4 coming through external resources such as Adult social care or other community hubs

Referral Reasons:

All referrals for the day service were for Carers Breaks as the primary reason but for the cared for the primary care needs were varied with Dementia taking up the largest proportion of support needs with falls and COPD following closely behind.



Feedback:

The service has received numerous verbal compliments about he services but especially about the staff, Yvette, Sally and Sylwia who have settled into their roles and have gone above and beyond to support Carers.

The thanks and donations for on-going service are reflective of the support Carers Have had and how they say thank you to the staff.

Example:

Yvette recently went above and beyond when a Carer was due to go into hospital for surgery. Yvette arranged for his wife to go into a placement whilst he was unable to care for his wife. Yvette sourced the placement, spoke to social workers, GP's and the placement itself so they knew her husband was having surgery, then on the day the Carer went into hospital she took the lady to her placement and made sure she was unpacked and settled in. Yvette then made sure her colleagues had all the contact details so they would be able to go over, should it be needed, before going on leave herself.

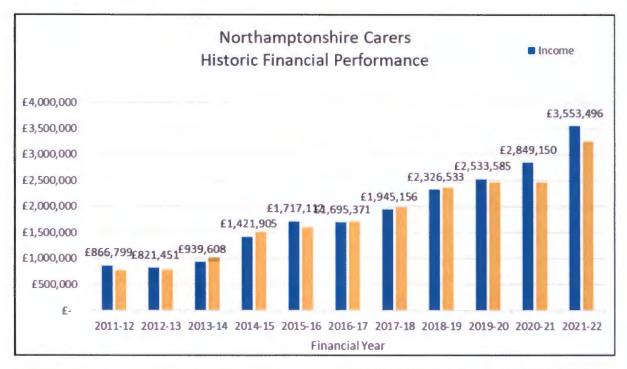

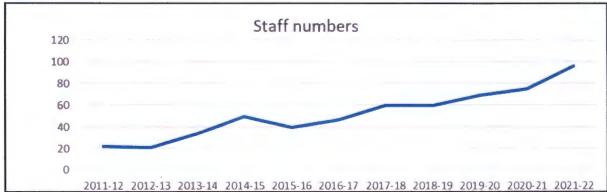
FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

Details of the charity's activities are given in the trustees report above and in the financial statements which follow.

In the year ended 31 March 2022 the charity made a surplus of £300,806 in relation to gross income of £3,553,496 (2021: £387,199 surplus on gross income of £2,849,150). Income had increased by 24.7% in 2021/22 compared to 12.5% in 2020/21. This is a substantial increase in the level of income, quite remarkable given the backdrop of COVID which has badly affected the income of so many charities, and is continuing the positive trend for surpluses commenced in 2020. While our income has risen strongly, this is matched by the increase in the size of the organisation during 2021-22 and the number of carers we are assisting, and our costs have increased accordingly (hence the reduction year on year in our surplus). However, it is worth noting that our carry-forward figure continues to increase, providing considerable robustness in our budgeting going forward. The following two graphs show how our finances and staffing has changed over the last 10 years.





One characteristic of the organisation's income prior to this financial year (which has continued into the current financial year and is expected to be a feature of our income in years to come) is that we receive substantial grant funding paid into our accounts at the end of the year to cover expenditure during the following year – this has the rather unwanted effect of artificially increasing our current assets and thus our carry forward figure in the reported financial year, while at the same time increasing expenditure unmatched by income in the following financial year. This increases the difficulty of monitoring and reviewing surpluses in our monthly management accounting.

In last year's Annual Report we stated that our challenge for the next few years is to maintain growth without compromising the quality of what we deliver. As we expected, our costs have risen, not just for the direct delivery of services but also in the support areas which are essential for the smooth running of the organisation.

We stated in 2020-21 that our goals were to:

- Continue our growth in services to carers
- · Continue to actively and successfully manage our costs
- · Maintain at least three months of operational reserves
- · Continue to deliver a more modest surplus each year

These goals continue to be achieved, and much credit is due to the staff and volunteers who continue to make this possible.

At 31 March 2022 the charity has reserves of £1,234,724 of which £520,868 is held on restricted funds, and £280,580 represents the book value of the charity's freehold office in Wellingborough.

Reserves policy

The Trustees policy, in line with Charity Commission guidance is to create and maintain a level of free (i.e. readily realisable) reserves sufficient to allow the organisation to operate for a minimum of three months without income. This level was achieved and will continue to be kept under review and recalculated when necessary. Note that as the levels of income and expenditure increase, the level of reserves required to achieve our reserve target also increases.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Charity constitution

Northamptonshire Carers is a Registered Charity and a Company Limited by Guarantee and has both a Memorandum of Association and Articles of Association, which were most recently reviewed and updated in early 2022. In preparing this report and accounts the trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Charity follows the process around Trustee Recruitment in the following way:-

- a) Annual skills knowledge and experience mapping of current Trustee Board against organisational and strategic need. This both highlights strength based positions but also flags up any gaps. This would then lead into a potential recruitment process for Trustees. This would take one of two forms. Either the Charity would identify the need for a topic specialist around a certain area or there would be a general recruitment process with the vacancy being advertised via internal and external networks.
- b) There is then a formal process of application and interviews by members of the Board.
- c) On most occasions, a newly appointed Trustee will join the Board on an ongoing basis (subject of course to the election rules). However, the constitution of the Charity does also allow for a Trustee to be appointed for a set period of time around a particular specialism or need for the organisation.
- d) The Charity follows good practice guidance around Trustee recruitment and induction from the Charity Commission.

Organisational Structure

The number of trustees shall be up to 12, at least 9 of who shall be elected from the membership of the Charity, 3 of who may be co-opted by the remaining trustees. At least 7 of the trustees shall be or have been Carers. If the number is less than 12, then numbers shall be reduced in proportion.

The Organisation is fortunate in the membership and skills of the board with Trustees that not only have personal experience of the Caring role but also experience and qualifications related to, Health and Social Care, Education, Primary Care, Communications, the legal profession and business.

Decision making

The major funders may nominate up to 3 trustees, but these shall be non-voting members. The trustees are responsible for the appointment of Honorary Officers. Our objectives are secured through delegation of day-to-day activity to the Director and his staff. These objectives are elaborated on in the ensuing paragraphs of this report.

Induction and training of new trustees

An induction is prepared and delivered when a Trustee commences their role.

This includes background on the organisation and its services, the role of the volunteer, a list of all staff members and volunteers, an overview of the organisation structure and Management, copies of all the relevant policies including the Volunteer Policy, essential procedures, details of on-going training and reviews and other information as appropriate to the volunteer role.

There is a trial period of 3 months to give the organisation and the volunteer time to discover if they are suited to each other. A review is made midway through the trial period and also at the end. However, at any time the Organisation and the Volunteer may terminate the agreement, preferably by mutual consent.

Key management remuneration

All organisational roles including Management ones are set within NJC scales as published and used by the Statutory and Voluntary Sector. Occasionally, a role or piece of work may have a performance related pay element to it.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Risk assessment

The Trustees do not believe there are any substantial risks beyond those liabilities disclosed in the Annual Report and Accounts. However, the programme of public sector spending cuts and resultant reductions in statutory funding to third sector organisations will continue to impact on the third sector, Carers and service users, both from the point of view of our delivery of services and also in increasing the need for those services. While the impact of COVID-19 is easing, this has caused changes in our working practices and the delivery of services, however the public sector funding picture is now cloudier than ever and economic pressures are now the greatest area of risk for the organisation.

Our key risks going forward are therefore:

- Inflation affecting our costs and the financial situation of carers
- Public sector funding given post-COVID debt and interest rates, there is going to be even more
 pressure to reduce funding to help carers
- Recruitment and achievement of target led expenditure

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Northamptonshire Carers for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP:
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent:
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware; and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Statutory information

Northamptonshire Carers is a charitable company, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The charity's registered number and registered office can be found on the Company information page.

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The presentation currency for the financial statements is the Pound Sterling (£).

Significant Judgements and Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the company accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed within the individual accounting policies below.

Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

Income

All income, including government grants, is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

The greater part of payroll costs are allocated specifically to the projects or funding streams on which the employees work. Similarly, where possible, overheads are specifically allocated. Remaining payroll, administrative and core costs are then apportioned on an estimated percentage basis related to the overall time input or expected cost of separate projects or funding streams.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 2% on cost Holiday Lodges - 10% on cost

Computer equipment - 25% on reducing balance

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items of property, plant and equipment.

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each balance sheet date. The selection of these residual values and estimated lives requires the exercise of judgement. The directors are required to assess whether there is an indication of impairment to the carrying value of assets. In making that assessment, judgements are made in estimating value in use. The directors consider that the individual carrying values of assets are supportable by their value in use.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash at banks and in hand and short term deposits with an original maturity date of three months or less.

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in the SOFA under administrative expenses.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the entity after deducting all of its financial liabilities.

Where the contractual obligations of financial instruments are equivalent to a similar debt instrument, those financial instruments are classed as financial liabilities. Financial liabilities are presented as such in the balance sheet. Finance costs and gains or losses relating to financial liabilities are included in the profit and loss account. Finance costs are calculated so as to produce a constant rate of return on the outstanding liability.

The Children in Need fund is to provide monthly group sessions of fun activities for young carers aged 5 - 15 across Northamptonshire.

The Community Foundation fund is to carry out the Young Carer Ambassador Programme.

The Carers Trust fund is to provide information to older carers of someone with dementia about end of life care. To do so in a group setting with the aim of establishing self-sustaining support groups beyond the life of the grant.

The Carers Music fund is to provide music related activates to female carers.

The Children in Need Sibling Support fund is to provide sibling carers support for young carers aged 5-18 across Northamptonshire.

The Age-Well fund is to provide services to carers ages over 65.

The Northants Police & Crime Commissioner fund is to raise awareness of crime and fraud with the elderly in Wellingborough.

The My Mental Health fund is to raise awareness through activates for mental health for young and young adult carers aged 5-24.

The Rank Grant fund is to be used to in line with the work carried out with local GP surgeries.

The John Salmons Legacy fund last year was to be used to co-ordinate activities specifically designed for elderly carers whilst finding suitable options for the person they care-for so the carer can have a break. This year's fund is a contribution towards sports activities for parent carers in Towcester area. Grant facilitated by Northamptonshire Community Foundation.

The Wellingborough Council fund is to be used for short breaks for older carers and personal care component for the cared-for person.

The Northamptonshire Sport fund is to used for running bespoke groups sessions for carers.

The Northamptonshire Community Foundation fund is to used for the carers advocacy project.

The Northamptonshire General Hospital fund is to be used patients discharged from NGH.

The Connecting Carers Services Collaboration fund is to be used in reducing carer social isolation and increase resources to tackle carer loneliness.

The Thinking Well fund is to be used to support people living with Dementia and their carers.

The Direct Carers Connections fund is to be used for the Direct Carers Connections project.

The Carers Trust- Young Carers fund is to be used on young carers, half for carers aged under 16 and the remaining half for young carers over 16 years old.

The NCC- Infection control grant is to be used on limiting the spread of COVID-19 within the charity.

The NHS-Long COVID 19 fund is to used to support patients who suffer from long COVID.

The Staff Wellbeing fund is to be used to support and maintain the wellbeing of the staff at Northamptonshire Carers.

The NCC- Dementia Pathway fund is to be used to support the dementia pathway project.

The NHS Befriending Project fund is to be used for the befriending volunteer project.

The Carers Trust Dementia work fund is to be used for the befriending project.

The Property Fund relates to insurance proceeds to be spent on the repair of the charity's freehold property following flood damage.

The National Lottery - Caring Together fund is to be used for the coordination and delivery of group activities for the adult carers and volunteer Carers Champion programme.

The Margaret Giffen fund is to be used for a young carer worker covering Kettering and Corby.

The Hardship fund relates to a Personal Health Budget/Direct payment third party agreement for an individual with complex needs. Northamptonshire Carers support this via agreements with the ICB and Children's Trust, administering this as a third-party organisation in line with NHS/LA guidance and also providing the Carers Assessments as part of this.

The Northampton General Hospital funding is for the hospital discharge and Carers support service at NGH, costs are for staff team salaries and expenses.

The ICAN funding is to support work on the ICAN transformation programme within the ICS, funding is for salaries re coordination, MDT members at PCN level, LTHC Community asset group staff and costs, work on the Dementia pathway, People advisory Group and sub-contracting with SERVE re countywide befriending service.

The Planning for tomorrow fund is a Carers Trust grant providing one-to-one and group support for former carers following a bereavement.

The Masonic Charitable fund is for wellbeing workshop groups for young carers.

The CRSDF fund is the Carers Trust Carers Respite Support Development Fund. Enabled piloting innovative ways of providing individualised respite including a sports activity club, country part walks and trips for parent carers.

The Disability inclusive sports club fund was a donation from the Disc charity in south Northants to run and provide a disabled sports group in that area.

The Time for Me fund is made up of individual grants issued to adult and young carers to provide a break from caring.

The Making Carers Count fund is a Carers Trust Equality and Diversity project aiming to increase the reach with black and Asian communities of carers.

The Social Prescribing funding is to support our role as a locality provider in the SPRING Social prescribing services in Northamptonshire with our area being Wellingborough.

The Dementia Community asset funding is from a local Trust to support the provision of groups and support for those with Dementia and their Carers in Northamptonshire (Kirby Laing Foundation).

The CCG Surge funding is NHS system pressures funding to support hospital discharge in the county, the funding covers care costs, staff at the Hospital, and funding to aid discharge such as Transport, cleaning and decluttering, equipment, house adaptations etc.

The NHS Pulmonary Rehab funding is working in partnership with local NHS and leisure centre providers to redesign the Pulmonary Rehabilitation (PR) pathway. PR is an exercise course for patients with lung conditions such as COPD. This money paid for NHS triage of patients, upskilling of fitness professionals to deliver the course and leisure centre staffing costs.

The Mental Health Northants is funding from the MHNC via NHS pandemic recovery monies to support Carers respite and breaks and psychoeducation. Funding is around regulated care breaks, sitting services and information and training sessions for Carers.

The NHS Rapid testing is for COVID-19 tests.

The NHS COVID-19 support is for regulated care staff COVID-19 support.

The Desborough Trust is for a trip.

Transfers between funds

The transfer from the Carers Music Fund to the General fund represents expenditure relating to the Carers Music Fund in 2020 that was misallocated to the General Fund.

The transfer from the General Fund to National Lottery Fund is due to an overspend on the restricted fund.

The transfer from the Hardship Fund to the General Fund represents expenditure in the prior year that relates to the Hardship Fund income but was allocated to the General Fund in last years accounts.
