## Objectives and activities

Suffolk Law Centre strives for a just and equal society where everyone's rights are valued and protected. We do this by providing legal support, services, information and education to the diverse communities of Suffolk and across East Anglia (and beyond). As a registered charity it is our purpose to alleviate poverty and to improve access to services. Our goal is to empower the people of Suffolk to understand and assert their legal rights. Equality runs as a core through everything we do.

#### **Our Activities:**

We aim to provide legal services to help the diverse communities of Suffolk and to a lesser extent across East Anglia (and beyond).

- · to gain equal access to justice
- · challenge disadvantage and inequality, and
- · to understand their legal rights, obligations and protections

#### Our Charitable Objects:

The relief of poverty, suffering and distress and the advancement of education among people living or working in Suffolk and East Anglia generally and such other places as the Trustees shall determine (including within her Majesty's Prisons), by the provision of Legal Advice and Assistance, Representation and Information which they could not otherwise afford through lack of means.

#### Public benefit

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on Public Benefit including, The Public Benefit Requirement (PB1), Running a Charity (PB2) and Reporting (PB3).

- **9. EU Settled Status (EUSS) Complex Cases Project:** Building on our partnership with Law Centres Network 2019-20, we continued this service to provide level 1 immigration advice to support EU citizens to apply for settled status with firstly an extension to this grant to September 2020, and then a separate partnership with NCLS. In 2020-21, we supported 67 people with their applications.
- 10. AB Charitable Trust: Unrestricted funding which supports the salary of our Practice Manager.
- 11. Ipswich Borough Council Community Cash Grant: Core funding to support our activities and meet some of our core staff costs and overheads.
- 12. EIRA Voucher Scheme (via University of Suffolk): In conjunction with the University of Suffolk's Computing Course Leader (School of Engineering, Arts, Science and Technology), we secured funds to support the development of online forms.
- **13.** Access To Justice Foundation Funder Plus: Grant funding from the National Lottery Community Fund to support learning and development, including consultancy and one place on the Legal Aid Practitioner's Group (LAPG) Management and Leadership programme.
- **14. Donations from City lawyers:** Through the initiative of Roger Finbow we have received various donations from high-net-worth individuals which has gone towards funding our part time Family Solicitor.

#### Financial review

The charity continues to be dependent on grant funding to achieve its objectives. In the year under review the trustees are grateful to all those funders. The support from these organisations has ensured that Suffolk Law Centre continues to exist and to deliver services to the most vulnerable people of Suffolk.

Further information about our income and expenditure is set out in the Statement of Financial Activities and supporting notes.

The legal costs mostly relate to addressing a complex complaint from a member of the public which required obtaining specialist counsels advice based upon which the complaint was not upheld. This was one-off expenditure. Any cash resources not immediately required are held in bank and building society deposits under powers contained in the memorandum and articles of association.

Income has decreased in the year to £454,777 (2021: £575,760) resulting in a net expenditure of £48,972 (2021: surplus of £124,751). This is expected and planned following the impact of the previous couple of years.

#### Reserves policy

The trustees actively review the reserves available on a regular basis and given the general uncertainty surrounding funding and project income aim to maintain reserves equivalent to approximately £130,000 (2021: £130,000). This figure is based on the expected level of expenditure over 6 months. This level of reserves takes into account existing and future commitments.

At the 31 March 2022 the free reserves held for general purposes amounted to £158,767 (2021: £171,540). The trustees will look to expense excess funds over the reserve target in due course.

#### Achievements and performance

#### **Our Workstreams**

- 1. Legal Advice Clinics: Our Legal Advice Clinics (LAC) continued to provide free legal advice through a range of specialist law clinics family, employment, immigration, housing, personal injury and wills & probate, as well as a general law clinic. Following the switch to telephone advice in response to the pandemic, we have continued to offer clinics by phone, with email follow up information where required. Over this year our legal volunteers advised 557 clients. Although face-to-face callers were considerably reduced in 2021-22, our Triage and Reception Officer took over 1,729 enquiries by phone or email, making this our busiest year to date. We have 57 active volunteers on rota (with 13 who volunteer for us occasionally). We are very grateful to Tudor Trust for awarding us another two years funding from April 2022.
- 2. Tackling Discrimination in the East Project (TDE): Our flagship discrimination legal casework service, Tackling Discrimination in the East, offers legal casework to clients in Suffolk and Norfolk. Funded by the National Lottery Community Fund, TDE combines discrimination casework with a project to enable people with learning disabilities and autism to tackle discrimination: co-produced with peer educators from Ace Anglia under the banner of 'The 3C's: Complain + Challenge = Change'. Over this year we offered legal casework to 87 clients. We also got to know our brilliant peer educators and worked together (online) to develop and deliver the training. The funding ended August 2022 and we are seeking replacement funding for this important service.
- 3. Legal Aid (Discrimination): Our Discrimination (Face-to-Face) Legal Aid Contract, which supplemented our discrimination casework was suspended by mutual agreement between June 21 until April 22, due to sickness of our Discrimination Supervisor and the decision by her to cease doing casework. So, the caseload of client cases eligible for legal aid was only 9 clients over this year. We have now trained up a replacement Supervisor so the legal aid contract has resumed, though will build up slowly.
- **4. Housing Team Grow Your Own funding:** Supported by funding from The Legal Education Foundation (TLEF), our Housing team has continued to progress over this year, with 1 trainee legal caseworkers joining us. This 3-year flexible development grant is enabling us to build capacity and develop in-house expertise to meet need and address legal advice deserts.
- **5. Legal Aid (Housing):** We have successfully managed our Legal Aid Agency (LAA) contract over this year, enabling us to support more clients to stay in their homes. We also won a contract for the Court Duty Desk at Bury St Edmunds County Court. We are building a steady income-stream through legal aid funded work. In total, the combined caseload of legal aid funded, pro bono work and those advised at the Court Duty Desk over this year has been 122 clients.
- **6. Nationwide (Housing):** To support the development of our Housing team and to keep doing work that falls outside of the scope of Housing Legal Aid, we secured funding from Nationwide (starting April 2021) to enable us to extend caseworker's contracts into 2021-22.
- 7. Family Legal Advice and Casework team: A service to offer expert legal advice to people making an application to the Family Court or seeking help to find a Family lawyer. The staff team has helped 105 clients this year. Our fortnightly Family Support Clinic, which is run with the generous support of expert legal volunteers offered 171 appointments to clients during the year. Our Family Helpdesk at Ipswich Magistrates Court has been impacted by physical courts being closed during 2021-22, but we are working to reopen it in 2022
- 8. Legal Support to Litigants in Person (LSLiP): In partnership with Norfolk Community Law Service (NCLS), the LSLiP project was funded by Access To Justice Foundation and the Ministry of Justice. Our Legal Triage Officers offered initial advice, warm referral and triage to 129 clients with clustered and often complex legal issues.

#### Plans for future periods

Our priorities in our Strategic Plan for 2022-23 are:

- 1. Striving for sustainability in a post Covid19 environment,
- 2. Continuing to "Grow Our Own" legal staff and helping to train staff in other law centres in our specialist areas
- 3. Grow our Reserves to ensure we have funding for posts in periods between grants
- 4. Maximise efficiency so that we can do more with what we have,
- 5. Expanding our social policy, scrutiny and public legal education work
- 6. When resources are available, filling legal advice gaps in terms of social welfare legal issues, in rural areas and those areas in Essex and Cambridge bordering Suffolk

#### Structure, governance and management

Suffolk Law Centre is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation and a charity registered in effect from 12 December 2017. The charity is constituted and governed by trustees under the terms of its memorandum and articles of association.

The current board of trustees and the changes which have occurred since the previous annual report are as stated in the reference and administrative details of these accounts.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

New trustees are invited to attend a meeting with the Chairman and the trustees to familiarise themselves with the charity and the context within which it operates.

Our policy for appointing new trustees is to search out people who have skills and characteristics that will be beneficial to the charity. On appointment the trustees receive a copy of the governing documents and Charity Commission trustee documents. New trustees are briefed on the background and work of the charity and future aims.

#### Risk management

The trustees have identified the major risks facing the charity and have assessed their potential impact. Appropriate systems have been established to monitor and manage these risks.

The Board of Trustees follows the Charity Commissions guidance 'Charities and risk management in identifying and weighting risks.

#### Related parties

The trustees are trustees of the associated charity Ipswich and Suffolk Council for Racial Equality, known throughout these accounts and locally as ISCRE, who have a close working relationship with Suffolk Law Centre and share space and expertise.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

#### Notes to the financial statements

#### Year ended 31 March 2022

#### 1. General information

The charity is a registered Charitable Incorporated Organisation in England and Wales. The address of the principal office is 46A St. Matthews Street, Ipswich, Suffolk, IP1 3EP, United Kingdom.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and UK UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued in October 2019 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

#### 3. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

## Going concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

#### **Government grants**

Government grants are recognised at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the company will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received.

Where the grant does not impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income when the grant proceeds are received or receivable. Where the grant does impose specified future performance-related conditions on the recipient, it is recognised in income only when the performance-related conditions have been met. Where grants received are prior to satisfying the revenue recognition criteria, they are recognised as a liability.

#### 3. Accounting policies (continued)

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

#### Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- Income from grants and contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the
  contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual
  requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may
  be regarded as restricted.

## Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities
  that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and
  costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

#### Operating leases

The lease payments are for rent and recognised as an expense over the lease term on a straight-line basis. The aggregate benefit of lease incentives is recognised as a reduction to expense over the lease term, on a straight-line basis.

#### 3. Accounting policies (continued)

#### Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

#### Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.
