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#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

To advance education, promote understanding, appreciation of, and participation in digital art, film and media for the benefit of the public. Through:

- Maintaining a media arts centre for the benefit of the public.
- Helping young people and the disadvantaged enjoy and achieve through creative activities, allowing them to develop skills, advance in life and contribute positively to society.
- Encouraging the development of the art of digital media and film.

Signals uses digital arts for social, learning, and creative outcomes and is recognised as a specialist in digital and film education. The organisation's programme is focused on education and outreach that is community centred, developing creative skills and practical, collaborative productions.

Mission: Signals supports and facilitates the development of new creative ways of using digital technology to tackle social need within the region. Signals promotes learning, diversity, experimentation and equality and achieves this by working in partnership with artists, communities and other organisations.

#### **Public Benefit**

In deciding a programme of activity and development the Trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit. In seeking to achieve our aims Signals is strongly committed to working inclusively with all people in the communities it serves, much of its project work is aimed at disadvantaged children and young people who would not usually have access to media production. It is fundamental to Signals work that everyone should be able to have access to, and increase their understanding of, digital, media and film.

Signals uses digital technologies, film and animation for social, learning and creative outcomes. Signals is a public facility that offers guidance, facilities and courses to all. Signals operates primarily in Essex but also across the Eastern region and works in partnership with other organisations and schools. Signals provides projects for disadvantaged groups that are free for participants and provides resources at its centre or travels to groups enabling full access to resources. Signals is especially interested in inspiring people to learn and develop personal skills and prioritises groups that face barriers in formal education, either through exclusion from mainstream education or a disadvantage that prevents full participation. This could be behavioural, physical or lack of opportunity.

#### Volunteers

Usually Signals works with several interns, hosts placements and volunteers, however due to Covid-19 restrictions Signals were unable to host placements or interns during the year.

Many of Signals volunteers go on to full-time training or careers in media. Signals has a volunteer policy and agrees a plan of work and training with each volunteer on commencement. Internships are frequently paid and supported by the University of Essex employability schemes.

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Covid-19

Due to Covid-19 there were significant changes to our work over the last two years, with planned projects halted and new ways of working remotely developed. However, Signals continued to work throughout in providing community projects, creative digital support and workshops online. Whilst income from charitable activities was severely reduced from prepandemic level of £159,691 in 2019/20 to £61,340 in 2020/21 it has recovered to £96,296 in 2021/22, the charity has continued to remain financially viable due to the Covid-19 support grants received of £50,755 (2021: £53,000) towards core costs/equipment, £1,843 (2021: £5,991) from the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme, rent concessions from our landlord and lower expenses.

#### **Achievements**

Some achievements for 2021/2022:

Signals continued its creative and education work through projects and workshops. This year Signals directly engaged with over 7,000 people, through online and live work. 81% of those Signals engaged live were children and young people.

Some key projects were:

- 'BFI Film Academy' in October 2021 returned to live activity. This is a national scheme to promote young talent (ages 16 to 19 years old). The course provides access to professional filmmakers, production skills and supports the development of local talent towards media training and careers. This project is funded by the Dept of Education through the British Film Institute.
- 'BFI Film Club' is a new initiative and Signals was selected to provide a club in Ipswich, the successful delivery of this project was postponed to May 2021 in line with lock down easing.
- 'Computing Curriculum' continued providing professional development and resources for KS2 primary teachers delivering the computing curriculum and produced creative code lesson plans.
- · Filmmakers' networking events aimed at upskilling local creative practitioners with special speakers.
- Beginning of a three-year Autism friendly workshop programme for children and young people aged 9 to 18 years funded by Children In Need.
- Trailblazer workshops for schools were delivered in person and online for schools in Thurrock as part of an ongoing project supported by the Royal Opera House – Bridge.
- Continued work with Jaywick Martello Tower to create resources and improve digital interpterion of the tower, this
  year we were able to deliver games design workshops that will help create a game for the tower and produced an
  animation that tells the tower's history.
- · Signals also contributed to the Brighton Digital Festival in November 2021.
- Delivered a course of experimental animation workshops for the Red House in Aldeburgh.

**Organisational** 

Signals continues to review and update policy and procedures and consult with stakeholders. It seeks to increase quality and productivity in all that it does and inspire those qualities in the people it works with. Signals will continue to do all that is possible to keep overheads to a minimum and diversify its income streams. In this changing economic climate Signals will regularly review and revise its organisational practices.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### **Financial position**

Signals has a diverse income from earned income streams such as commissioned work, equipment, space and skills hire as well as experience in project fundraising. Signals is also increasingly developing partnership working.

The Trustees decided to designate (set aside) £7,800 of the unrestricted reserves for costs associated with vacating the premises at some future date. Signals unrestricted and undesignated fund surplus reduced in this financial year from £20,900 to £7,645.

Reserves policy

Signals strives to ensure that it develops a reserve fund of 3 months operational costs. At this time, it has not achieved this figure. It aims to build up reserves annually from earned income, each year Signals aims to increase reserves by a minimum of £3,000 per year until this target is achieved.

#### PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Trustees have identified the major risks to which Signals is exposed and consider that the systems in place are adequate to mitigate those risks. The risks and systems are continually reviewed as appropriate:

The major risks identified include:

- maintaining funding for services.
- ensuring correct policies are in place and adhered to when working with young, vulnerable individuals.
- effects of Covid-19 pandemic upon activities and with staff having to work remotely.

### **FUTURE PLANS**

Next year's developments are to continue to implement the new business plan:

- To be established as experts in creative digital learning
- To increase the reach and diversity of the organisation amongst its workforce and audience
- To improve quality in output and process
- To create sustainable growth
- To develop talent

Signals aims to focus on audience development and build back audiences for live activities.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is therefore governed by a memorandum and articles of association.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Signals appointment of trustees is by invitation from the existing board. Signals strive to have a balance of expertise, diversity and experience represented on the board of trustees.

A structured and open recruitment programme operates, recruitment in 2022 has successfully focused upon increasing diversity on the board with 3 new trustees being appointed.

#### Organisational structure

The charity is organised so that the trustees meet bi-monthly. Ad hoc meetings of the board are also called when the trustees see fit.

#### Induction and training of new trustees

Signals have a board induction pack which is aimed at providing members of the board with all the relevant information to make them aware of their responsibilities.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2022

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grant income is recognised when the charity is notified that the grant has been awarded and the amount of the grant has been confirmed. Where grants are received before the period for which the grant has been awarded the income is deferred until that period.

Education and production income is recognised in the period that the services or courses were provided.

Income from equipment and studio hire is recognised in the period to which it relates. Hire income received in advance at the year-end is treated as deferred income.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

# Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs are those costs which have not been directly allocated to an activity of the charity but nevertheless support those activities. Support costs have been allocated on the basis of the estimated time involved.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings Computer equipment - 20% on cost for first year and 10% on cost thereafter

- 50% on cost for first year and 25% on cost thereafter

For simplicity assets costing less than £1,000 are written off in the year of purchase.

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for a particular purpose.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in note 15 to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### **Designated Fund**

The designated fund was established this year by the trustees with the intention of providing reserves for costs associated with vacating the premises at some future date.

#### **Restricted Funds**

Resources expended on completed projects exceed incoming resources, by virtue of the staff costs attributable to the project. These costs are included in unrestricted expenditure.

Royal Opera House Bridge: to support the development of primary school resources for the computing curriculum.

Essex Community Foundation: Towards school animation project supporting better mental health

Colchester BC events support: Towards free places at holiday workshops

Colchester BC Covid recovery support: For equipment and resources to help business recovery

BBC Children in Need: Accessible workshops: Autism Friendly workshops supporting smaller groups with special educational needs, learning digital and filmmaking skills alongside communication and team working.

BFI Film Academy: a course of twelve days to support the skills and career development of local young talent.

BFI Film Club: For young people in Ipswich to develop creative technical and personal skills, trial project by BFI

#### 16. OTHER FINANCIAL COMMITMENTS

The five-year lease on its premises at St Runwald Street, with an annual rental charge of £15,000, expired on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2019. Signals have continued to occupy the property since this date having security of tenure under the Landlord & Tenant Act on the same terms as the previous lease. Negotiations with the freeholder to renew the lease were suspended due to the Covid-19 pandemic, this also resulted in limited use of the premises with staff working from home when required by government restrictions. Regular virtual meetings were held with the landlord to agree and record the rent concessions granted of £7,184 (2021: £11,250). Signals has been at this address since 1998.

#### 17. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

Key management remuneration

The key management personnel comprise the trustees, Chief Executive Officer, Operations Co-ordinator/ Company Secretary and Digital Producers. The total employee benefits of the key management personnel were £82,737 (2021: £84,470).

#### 18. GOING CONCERN

Unrestricted and undesignated reserves reduced during the year to £7,645 and remain short of its reserve policy goal of £32,000. Since the year-end Signals have been successful in securing further grants of £81,200, the board believe with the funds already secured and with the expected new grants that will become available, Signals will be able to maintain positive cash flows for the foreseeable future. As a result, the going concern basis of accounting has been adopted.
