Message from Lorna McGinty, the Chair of Chol

2021-22 was a year of challenge for Chol, but also of significant triumph. Throughout a year when the fallout of the Covid pandemic, and the associated instability tested the whole organisation financially, practically and personally, Chol leant into our values of care and collaboration to deliver an exceptional programme of activity. In the face of adversity, the team pulled together to make work with and for communities across Yorkshire, and develop new and innovative strategies for doing so.

I am especially proud to introduce accounts that reflect the full move into the Chol-Operative business model. This innovative approach to leadership and governance has brought the organisation's management structure more in line with our values and approach to working in communities. The commitment to this model, and the tenacity required to implement it effectively, has proven to be of great value to Chol. We enter into the new financial year with a team of talented and driven co-directors, who each have agency over the direction of travel and are equally accountable for, and to be celebrated for Chol's success.

Artistic Programme Highlights

This post-pandemic period has seen Chol continue to grow and develop. Our continued relationships with funders and educational institutions in addition to the increased demand for our expertise is testament to the quality of our work. Paul Hamlyn Foundation (PHF) has supported our work in education by funding our 'Caring & Creative Schools' project (2021-25) and contracting Chol as a key consultant on their UK wide TDF programme.

Other national partners & NPOs have sought to bring in our expertise & uphold Chol's methodologies of cocreation with young people as examples of best practice. During this period we have delivered training on cocreation for the National Theatre, joined the Young Vic's Advisory Board - INNOVATE, and delivered training for The Lowry - Stage Directions Programme.

Due to our academic rigour, Chol has been appointed to share our work at Universities: delivering a module on Drama in Education at Manchester University, as a founding member of the Story Makers Company at Leeds Beckett, and delivering a variety of modules and workshops at LIPA, Huddersfield University, Sheffield College, Kirklees College and Salford University.

Highlights from our programme of events during April 2020 and March 2021 have also included co-creating three live performances, five Artist in Residency in school programmes, an Oral History Heritage project, two Young Producer Programmes, our first Cholavan outing, followed by a summer of Cholavan Workshops and a week long schools residency in Tolston Museum.

Chol-Operative

We transitioned to the Chol-Operative in April 2020 and have continued to develop and embed this model throughout this period. The model involves the core company members working in a flat hierarchy structure, with equal pay, a commitment to diversity, and action led research. In addition to the core Chol-Operative team we have been working with an incredible group of Chol-Operative Associates, bringing in diverse and fresh perspectives into the Chol company, again at strategic level, but also offering these local freelance artists extended work and longer term contracts working with the company at leadership level.

During 2021 we began working on our Anti-Racist Strategy - Strive. This involves quarterly Chol-Operative meetings where the core team and associates examine and scrutinise our programme of work, our company structures, our working culture, policies and approach to recruitment, ensuring we are inclusive and accessible to all.

Imaginary Communities

In Imaginary Communities (IC) every child is acknowledged and respected as part of the classroom community through their imagined characters and worlds; every child has the opportunity to be an equal playmaker. The project was designed to enable Chol to work with more teachers and children across England in order to give them the opportunity to become confident in using this unique dramatic story-making process and enjoy learning.

During this period we wrapped up our A World of Imaginary Communities (AWOIC) programme and were successful in securing funding for a further 4 years from Paul Hamlyn Foundation to begin our Caring and Creative Schools programme.

Finance and Fundraising

The charity relies on project grants, fees, ticket sales, commissions and donations from individuals. We were successful in being awarded a project grant from Arts Council England (£49,855 over 12 months) and securing a new funding grant from Paul Hamlyn Foundation (£325,000 over 4 years) to run the majority of our artistic programme.

In addition, we were successful in gaining a grant from Church Urban Fund (£17,794) to produce the Kirklees Windrush Mural, and we were commissioned by Paul Hamlyn Foundation to deliver consultancy on their Teacher Development Fund £24,962.50 and Kirklees Council and Heritage England (£17,400) to lead the High Street Action Zone Consortium.

This was supplemented by income from individual donations of £2,024 and earned fees of £84,807.50 through workshop delivery, partnerships and consultancy. We transferred £22,373 to reserves to end the year with unrestricted reserves of £47,324.

Partnerships and Collaborations

During this financial year we have partnered with a number of organisations, delivering workshops and events that supported our aims and objectives. These have taken place throughout our three geographical regions, Barnsley, Kirklees and Sheffield and beyond. These have included Barnsley Council, RSPB, Fusion (Barnsley LCEP), Children's Art School, Tolson Museums, Kirklees Libraries, KLTV, Evoke (Kirklees LCEP), Kirklees Council, Huddersfield HSHAZ, Site Gallery, Arts Catalyse, By Parley, The Montgomery Theatre, Create Sheffield (Sheffield LCEP), Sheffield Volunteer Libraries, Walkley Festival.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT
