The Committee consists of 3 independent representatives, Chair, Treasurer and Secretary together with the Group Scout Leaders, individual section leaders (if opted to take on the responsibility) and parent's representation and meets 6 times a year.

Members of the Executive Committee complete 'Essential Information for Executive Committee' training within the first 5 months of joining the committee.

This Group Executive Committee exists to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of the appointments and is responsible for:

The maintenance of Group property;

The raising of funds and the administration of Group finance; The insurance of persons, property and equipment; Group public occasions;

Assisting in the recruitment of leaders and other adult support;

Appointing any sub committees that may be required;
Appointing Group Administrators and Advisors other than
those who are elected.

The Group's policy on reserves is to hold sufficient resources to continue the charitable activities of the group should income and fundraising activities fall short. The Group Executive Committee considers that, because the Group is reliant on income from letting the hall which is not guaranteed, the group should hold a sum equivalent to 24 months running costs circa £35,000.

The Group held reserves of approximately £55,000 against this at year end which is above the level required for operating expenses. However the Group will be entering negotiations for the extension of our Lease Agreement with our Landlord. The funds will be used to secure another building if the negotiations are unsuccessful.
