Trustees' Report

The Trustees present their annual report together with the unaudited financial statements of ArriveAliveAppeal Charity (the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022). The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document

ArriveAliveAppeal ("the charity") is a Charitable Trust that was formed at a meeting of the Trustees in November 2012. The charity is governed by its Trust Deed dated 16th November 2012 and amended on 7th October 2013, 11th February 2019 and to its current document dated 11th May 2022

Method of appointment and induction of new Trustees

New Trustees are appointed at the Annual General Meeting and are briefed on their legal obligations under charity law, the content of the charity's constitution, and its recent performance.

Organisational structure and decision making

The board of Trustees oversee the running of the charity on a day to day basis. All operational decisions are made at board meetings which are held frequently throughout the year.

Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and Activities

Summary of objectives

To relieve sickness and preserve the good health of persons within communities of England and Wales via the provision of suitably adapted medical response vehicles and equipment approved by the ambulance services. All response vehicles and equipment is solely used and demonstrated by medically trained CFRS (Community First Responders) groups trained by their local ambulance services and dispatched via 999 calls.

Achieving objectives

Arrive Alive is the UK's only registered charity of its kind, it is solely funded by public donations and is dedicated to funding vital lifesaving vehicles and equipment for Community First Responders (CFR's). CFR's are medically trained volunteers who are regulated and dispatched to life threatening 999 calls by West Midlands Ambulance Service (WMAS).

Demand is greater than ever on our current operational lifesaving vehicles and equipment. An additional eight voluntary operated lifesaving equipped vehicles are urgently needed to join the existing fleet of Arrive Alive vehicles on the frontline. WMAS is the largest the ambulance service in the UK they cover over 5000 square miles with a population of approximately 60 million people. At present there are just over 400 WMAS road ambulances to cover this area and receive approximately 4000, 999 calls everyday.

"Arrive Alive has already funded some amazing pieces of equipment in addition to a number vehicles for Community First Responder groups who are trained by West Midlands Ambulance Service. They operate off the same radio system as a standard road or air ambulance to attend 999 calls within the community. Arrive Alive has been a lifeline to these groups as for every vehicle that becomes operational that is potentially another life saved. There are still a large number of groups who still require resources which Arrive Alive hopes to be able to fund in the near future." — Andy Jeynes Community Response Manager for West Midlands Ambulance Service UNHSET.

During this period additional lifesaving vehicles and equipment have become operational to support West Midlands Ambulance Service. The trustees would like to thank all of the sponsors and supporters of Arrive Alive for their continued support.

At present there are ten operational voluntary operated lifesaving 999 vehicles with further planned for next year subject to funding availability.

A new Chairman was also appointed by the trustees of Arrive Alive;

The charity's plans for the future are to continue raising funds to support it's aims and objectives.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

1) Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)' issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the charities Act 2011.

Fund accountancy policy

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Incoming resources

Donations are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Costs of generating funds are the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those cost of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advise to trustees on governance or constitutional matters,
