#### Constitution

## Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2022

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 March 2021.

#### Objects of the Charity

The objects of the Charity are to offer practical help and supportive friendship to parents who have young children in local communities across the area. We offer a unique service, visiting families with at least one child under five to offer them informal, friendly and confidential support in their own home surroundings. We also offer group 'Stay and Play' sessions in Bicester and Banbury.

#### Summary of activities 21-22

This last year has once again seen an increase in the demand for Home Start support. The previous year was strongly influenced by the Covid pandemic with so many negative effects on vulnerable families (for example: increased isolation, anxiety, loneliness, and domestic abuse), and in 2021-22 the impact became noticeable.

Despite the ongoing pandemic and the associated difficulties, Home-Start Banbury, Bicester and Chipping Norton responded by offering special training for both telephone befrienders and home-visiting volunteers. Face-to-face volunteer home-visiting, our unique and primary way of providing assistance, was able to restart, and 70 families received such 1:1 support. Stay and Play group sessions were begun again and were run in both Bicester and Banbury, with 104 families supported in this way. In addition, a family picnic was held during the summer and we hosted Nature Play sessions at Evenley Woods and Bridge Street Garden.

During the year we sadly said farewell to Jane Skelton, our senior Organiser, who retired after many years' service, and were pleased to welcome Aimee Evans, her replacement.

#### Review of financial affairs

2021-22, and the preceding year, will be remembered for many years for the Coronavirus pandemic and the associated lockdowns of normal activities. It increased the financial uncertainties generally while having a very negative effect on the support we would normally give to families, whose need was now greater than in normal times.

After the remarkable 34% increase in income in 2020-21 to £170,264, it was not surprising that it fell in 2021-22 to £131,171. This was still the 3rd highest in our history. The reduction was almost solely attibutable to the mid-year ending of the 3-year Home-Start Oxfordshire-wide grant from The National Lottery, which we were unsuccessful in getting renewed.

Expenses in 2021-22 rose by 20% to £145,301 (20-21: £116,831), much the same as they had been pre-Covid in 2019-20 (£146, 933). In the interim period, it had not been possible to recruit replacement staff for those departing, with the consequence that there was an inevitable increase again when new staff members started in 21-22. In addition there was a period of overlap between the recruitment of our new Senior Organiser and the retirement of her predecessor. Management and administrative costs also returned as the office was partially reopened.

The combined effect of lower income and increased expenditure led to a deficit of £14,130, a significant change from the previous year's extraordinary surplus of £53,433. The year end reserves consequently decreased to £109,342 (2021: £123,472). The unrestricted year-end reserves represented 75% (9 months) of the year's expenditure.

In the current post-Covid environment, we see a much greater competition for funds, and are anticipating an increasingly challenging financial period. We really appreciate all the financial support we receive, as well as the outstanding family support provided by the staff and volunteers, even in the face of the great practical difficulties during the Covid pandemic.

Report of the Trustees continued for the year ended 31 March 2022

#### Trustees' Responsibilities

#### 1 Accounting Policies

#### The following accounting policies were used consistently:

#### Accounting basis:

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The statement of Recommended Practice by Charities, issued by Charities Commissioners has also been followed.

#### Grants:

Grants received are credited to the Financial Activities when they are receivable, split between restricted and unrestricted funds.

#### Resources expended:

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual basis, inclusive of VAT and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. The value of volunteers' time has not been reflected in the accounts.

#### Depreciation:

Depreciation is calculated to write off the assets on a reducing balance basis. Items for which grants have been received, as well as all other items under £1,000 are written off to revenue.
