Trustees' report

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2022 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements compy with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards for Smaller Entities.

Governing Document

Firvale Community Hub (Company number 08409928) was incorporated on 19th February 2013 and its Memorandum and Articles of Association govern it. Its legal status is that of a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity (Charity number 1152121). It has no share capital and the liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £1. Overall management of the Charity is the responsibility of the trustee directors who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the memorandum and articles of association. Day to day project activity is carried out by paid staff and volunteers.

Aims and Objectives

The objects of the Charity ('the Objects') are to relieve poverty and advance education and training amongst the inhabitants of the Area of Benefit by providing advice, information and assistance in relation to the provision and effect of English law which they would otherwise not be able to access through lack of means, and providing facilities for the relief of unemployment in the particular through the advancement of education and training, and providing facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals in the area of benefit who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disability, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving the conditions of life.

Key Activities/ Achievements

Firvale Community Hub is committed to improving social equalities and inclusion for communities experiencing disenfranchisement and marginalisation in Sheffield. FCH empowers groups and individuals to find their voice and find leadership, to influence and inform a more inclusive society, through targeted and deeply personalised education and confidence based projects.

A key civil society innovator in Sheffield, FCH works in partnership, in leadership, and alongside local agencies, leading development strategy and implementing pioneering methodology in the projects we deliver in our lively community hub.

FCH is the Proud winner of the: Burngreave Area Panel Awards (2005,2007,2008,2010 & 2016) Sheffield Trade Unions Award 2015, Sheffield City Council Recognition Award (Lord Mayors award), Community Achievement Award 2011, Diversity of the Year Award 2011 & Children and Young Peoples Award 2010 and Womens Centenary Award.

Our community space for hire is bringing in increased revenue from partners and we have developed our enterprise further by hiring out first floor office space. We have established a Community Youth Hub to most vulnerable young people aged 16- 24 into training and employment. Our work with the NHS and SHSC has increased significantly to improve health outcomes for service users.

Reserves Policy

Although it is generally agreed that we should accumulate adequate reserves, this is difficult to achieve as our core funding has been static for a long time and our expenses have increased. However we have now increased use of the upstairs floor which is generating income and we are accepting donations. Our aim is that current reserves will increase sufficiently.

Future Plans

We are working towards renovating the third floor of the building and the outside space to offer more projects and opportunities also to enable the community to hire space for community projects.
