Notes to the Accounts for the Year ended 31 March 2022

- 1 These Accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting by Charities.
- 2 Airport Fines are levied on Airlines whose aircraft are in violation of the Airport's Night Flying Policy. The income from these fines is transferred to the Community Trust Fund.



Birmingham Airport Community Trust Fund Trustees Report for the Financial Year 2021/2022

Summary

The Birmingham Airport Community Trust Fund was established in 1998 to provide a means whereby Birmingham Airport Ltd invests in a range of local projects which benefit the local community and environment. The Trust is administered by a Secretary appointed by Birmingham Airport Ltd and operated by nine Trustees who decide on how funds will be allocated.

The Community Trust Fund supports projects which meet one or more of four criteria:

- Heritage Conservation.
- Environment improvement, improving awareness of environmental issues, environmental education and training, encouraging and protecting wildlife.
- Bringing the Community closer together through facilities for sport, recreation and other leisure time activities.
- Improving health and wellbeing through the promotion of healthy lifestyles and employment opportunities.

The Trust's Area of Benefit covers those areas most affected by the Airport's operations and is defined as lying within the boundaries of a published list of post codes. Under the terms of its Section 106 Planning Agreement with Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council in 2009, the Airport Company agreed to pay £75,000 each year into the Trust, this sum being Index-Linked to inflation. The Fund is also 'topped up' by those fines imposed on airlines that exceed the Airport's noise violation levels.

In 2021/22, the Airport Company paid the sum of £89,571.11 into the Fund, while a further £1,743.10 was received in fines. The Trustees made awards totalling £106,569.92 and a balance of £52,397.15 was carried forward on 31st March 2022 (See Appendix B for full accounts)

The Trustees report no material changes to the operation or organisation of the Fund during the year.

Trustees

The Board of Trustees is made up of two nominees from Solihull Metropolitan Borough Council, two from Birmingham City Council, three from the Airport Consultative Committee and two from the Airport Company. As is normal, local authorities review their nominations to outside bodies at their Annual General Meeting and as a result this year there was one change to the Board, with Solihull Metropolitan Borough Councillor Chris Williams being re-placed by Cllr Martin McCarthy. Additionally, Birmingham Airport Ltd nominated a new representative, with Councillor Bob Sleigh replacing long-serving Trustee Councillor Ted Richards, meaning that at the end of the year, the Board was comprised of the following nominees:

At the conclusion of the October meeting, long-serving Trustee Paul Orton, who represented the Airport Consultative Committee, tendered his resignation. The Trustees recognise the significant contribution made to the Community Trust Fund by both Cllr Richards and Mr Orton over many years of service and wish to place their appreciation on record.

Payment Arrangements

At their meeting in April 2021, the Trustees were asked to endorse the Airport Company's proposal to move away from issuing cheques as a payment method for applicants in favour of direct bank transfers. This was agreed and a new procedure was implemented through the Trust Fund's bankers.

Fraudulent Application

At their meeting in April 2021, the Trustees considered an application from the 'Lyndon Garden for Hope' project, which had requested funding for exercise equipment and a laptop computer to the value of £1,140.74. This was agreed in full and payment was made by bank transfer on Tuesday 22nd June.

On Monday 19th July the Secretary received information throwing doubt on the bona fides of the project. Further enquiries failed to confirm the identity of the applicant or the existence of the project, while an investigation into the IP address used by the applicant gave further cause for concern but did not prove conclusive. As payment had been made by bank transfer, the Trust Fund's bankers were approached for assistance, but were only able to advise that they were satisfied that the relevant industry procedures have been adhered to, that they had been advised by the beneficiary bank that there were no funds available in the beneficiary account which could be returned and that they were consequently unable to reimburse the loss.

The circumstances of the fraud were reviewed by the Secretary with the support of the Airport Company's IT and Finance teams. No systematic failures in procedure were revealed and in terms of preventative actions, it was agreed that increased vigilance in checking the credentials of applicants should be sufficient to prevent the Trust Fund falling victim to a fraud of this type again.

A report was made to both Action Fraud and to the Charities Commission, under its procedures for Reporting a Serious Incident. The Commission subsequently advised that it was content that as corrective action had been taken, no further action would be required.

Deed of Variation

During the preparation of the Independent Examination of the Trust's accounts, the Examiner noted that the trust deed and rules were set up (in 1998) with an 'accumulation period' of 21 years, which had now expired. In the Examiner's opinion, this potentially restricted the

Trustees' ability to carry forward funds, although by intention and in practice the Trustees had always distributed all available funds, this would be unlikely to be anything more than a technical issue. Nevertheless, his recommendation was that this was worthy of review and BAL's General Counsel drafted a Deed of Variation to remove any potential restriction on the Trustees freedom of action in this respect. With the agreement and signature of all Trustees, this was subsequently enacted.

Awards granted

During the year, the Trustees considered a total of 52 applications for funding.

The Trustees may award applicants either the full amount requested, or a partial grant. They may also make awards where they attach conditions, meaning the amount granted will not be paid until one or more conditions were met. The Trustees may also decline to make any award at all, or invite applicants to re-apply. This year's awards can be summarised as follows:

Full Awards without conditions	38
Partial awards without conditions	8
Conditional awards	1
Invited to re-apply	0

In total, £106,569.92 was awarded to 47 projects. Details can be found in appendix A.

Accounts

Project Ref 2473 - Birmingham Impact FC - which was awarded a Conditional Grant of £3,000 At the October 2021 round of grants subsequently requested they be permitted a change of purpose for their award. Following consultation with the Trustees, it was agreed that the grant offer be withdrawn and the applicant be encouraged to make an entirely new application to the April 2022 awards. This has resulted in the £3,000.00 award being returned to the accounts for this year.

Three conditional awards expired this year, resulting in £4,500.00 being added back into the accounts.

One award was unclaimed and expired, resulting in a further £1,000.00 being returned to the accounts.

The Trust Fund's accounts have been prepared by Birmingham Airport Ltd and have been subject to Independent Examination by Mr Michael Kelly, representing MJK Chartered Accountants. They are presented as a separate document in Appendix B.
