| Trustee Selection Method | Trustees are Elected by and from the Members of the Society at the Annual General Meeting. The Governing Document dictates that a third of the Trustees stand down at each Annual General Meeting but, in practice, all of them do so. The Governing Document allows them to offer themselves for Re-Election and the Society has no Rules or Regulations that place any limits on how regularly or for how long they may do so |

Additional Governance Issues

Membership of the Society is open to all, subject only to the Governing Document giving the Trustees the power to resolve that it is in the best interests of the Charity to terminate the Membership of any Member. In practice, people under the age of twenty-six do not choose to become Members of the Society, as they would derive no financial benefit from doing so

The Trustees are solely responsible for determining and organising the activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to the Objects of the Charity but take due regard of constructive feedback and suggestions offered by the Members of the Society

The activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to the Objects of the Charity do not require the Trustees to take personal responsibility for the safeguarding of children or vulnerable adults

The Charity does not work with any other bodies but has reciprocal links with Haywards Heath Music Society, the Nicholas Yonge Society and Uckfield Music Club that enable all four organisations to offer discounts to the Members of some if not all of the other three

All of the Trustees give their time voluntarily and received no remuneration or other benefits from serving the Charity as Trustees during the Accounting Year under review

| Summary of the activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these Objects | Taking due regard of its activities needing to further its Objects and be undertaken for the public benefit, the Trustees decided that the sole activity of the Charity during the Accounting Year under review would be the continued presentation of public Concerts and Recitals. These are generally presented at Seaford Baptist Church and attract audiences from across East Sussex and beyond. More specifically, they provide the residents of Seaford and its immediate environs the opportunity of accessing live, professional-quality music, largely in the western classical tradition, without the cost and inconvenience of their having to travel to Brighton, Eastbourne or Lewes. People under the age of twenty-six are admitted to these Concerts and Recitals without charge and some Concerts are aimed specifically at families |
| Additional details of objectives and activities | The Charity does not make Programme-Related Investments or engage in Grant-Making The Trustees are grateful to two Members of the Society who regularly volunteer to display and distribute promotional material and to assist with stewarding and the provision of refreshments |

SECTION D: ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Summary of the main achievements of the Charity during the Year

The Charity currently markets the Concerts and Recitals that it presents in the form of Seasons that usually straddle adjacent Accounting Years. The COVID-19 Pandemic made it impossible to present a 2020-2021 Season but it eventually became possible to present three pairs of ad-hoc Concerts under COVID-19 Secure Requirements with audience numbers limited to fifty at each. That being the case, the Concerts that were presented during the Accounting Year under review consisted of two of these three pairs of ad-hoc Concerts, five of the Concerts in the 2021-2022 Season and an additional Grand Concert that was experimentally presented in Eastbourne and accompanied by an optional Cream Tea

On 06/06/2021, Sebastian Comberti, Cello, and Maggie Cole, Piano, played works by Beethoven, Kenneth Victor Jones, Popper and Schumann. The two Concerts attracted audiences of thirty-seven and thirty-four people

On 11/07/2021, the London Mozart Players Chamber Ensemble played works by Beethoven, Britten and Mozart. The two Concerts attracted audiences of forty-two and forty-six people

On 24/10/2021, the London Mozart Players Chamber Ensemble played works by Beethoven, Devienne and Paul Lewis. The Concert attracted an audience of ninety-one people

On 05/12/2021, the Bach Players played works by Biber, Clérambault, Erlebach, Kasperger, Élisabeth Jacquet de La Guerre, Marin Marais and Robert de Visée. The Concert attracted an audience of eight-seven people

On 09/01/2022, the Marmen Quartet played works by Brahms, Salina Fisher, Haydn and Ligeti. The Concert attracted an audience of seventynine people

On 06/02/2022, The London Mozart Players and Howard Shelley, Piano, played works by Beethoven, Hummel and Mozart. This was the additional Grand Concert that was experimentally presented in Eastbourne and it attracted an audience of one hundred and thirty-three people

On 06/03/2022, Ruth Rogers and Kate Comberti, Violins, Sally Beamish, Viola, Sebastian Comberti, Cello, Viv McLean, Piano, and Peter Thomson, Vocals, along with the New Sussex Singers, Sebastian Charlesworth, Director, and Howard Beach, Piano, presented a Tribute to Kenneth Victor Jones, curated by Sally Beamish. As well as works of his own and some of his arrangements of works by Gershwin, it included works by Bartók, Glière and Walton. The Concert attracted an audience of one hundred and twenty-one people and was made possible by the unexpected receipt of a Legacy from the Estate of Kenneth Victor Jones

On 03/04/2022, the Birdsong Band presented a mixture of classical, jazz and folk music under the title of King Alfred, the Owl and the Nightingale. It included works by Irving Berlin, Jeremiah Clarke, Albert Eric Maschwitz and Manning Sherwin, Messiaen, Prokofiev and Stravinsky, together with arrangements of folk music by Tim Laycock, Eliphalet Oram Lyte and Charles E. Pratt. It attracted an audience of thirty people and was one of the Concerts aimed specifically at families

Brief statement of the Charity's Policy on Reserves Musicians of the calibre that has enabled to Society to establish its current reputation need to be engaged between one and two Years before the dates on which they will be required to perform. As a result, the main

| | financial risk to the Charity is that Concerts and Recitals have to be planned in the absence of any certainty that Income from Membership Fees and the sale of Single Tickets will eventually prove to be sufficient to cover the Expenditure associated with presenting them. That being the case, it is the Policy of the Trustees to aim to hold Reserves that would be sufficient to cover the Expenditure associated with presenting all of the Concerts and Recitals in a typical Season. This is currently in the region of £10,000. At the end of the Accounting Year under review the Charity held Assets that were considerably in excess of this figure but this was due solely to the unexpected receipt of the Legacy from the Estate of Kenneth Victor Jones |

They pay a Membership Fee that generally gives them a discount on the cost of purchasing Single Tickets for all of those Concerts and Recitals. As a result, Income generated by Membership Fees usually exceeds that generated by the sale of Single Tickets |
| | The Society is eligible to receive subsidies from the CAVATINA Chamber Music Trust that underwrite the cost of people under the age of twenty- six being admitted to qualifying Concerts without charge but no such subsidies were received during the Accounting Year under review |
| | An Estate Agent in Seaford provides benefit in kind by acting as a Box Office and printing Programme Notes |
| | Membership of the National Federation of Music Society provides access to cost-effective Third-Party Liability Insurance and a Database of Programme Notes |
| | Membership of the Brighton and Hove Arts Council raises local awareness of the Society and assists with the promotion of Concerts and Recitals |
| | The Charity holds no Financial Investments |
| | The Governing Document dictates that the Financial Accounts of the Charity are Audited or Examined only to the extent required by Legislation but it is the Policy of the Trustees that they be Independently Examined even when there is no such requirement |

SECTION F: OTHER OPTIONAL INFORMATION

The Society had already planned to present a 2022-2023 Season of Concerts and Recitals. This is currently underway. The unexpected receipt of the Legacy from the Estate of Kenneth Victor Jones has allowed the Season to be more expansive than usual with larger Ensembles, higher-profile Musicians and two Concerts that require a Piano to be hired
