Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document The Charity's responsibilities are to maintain the properties in their ownership and to oversee their cash investments, thereafter using the proceeds on the following basis: one-third is given directly to St Peter's Church to assist with the maintenance of the fabric of the building, onethird is allocated to a Relief in Need fund and the final third is allocated to an Education fund. Trustees consider all applications received on their individual merit. Some applicants may be ineligible for various reasons.


The overarching criterion for assistance is that the recipient must be resident with the ecclesiastical parish of Brackley, which comprises the town of Brackley and the small nearby village of Halse.

Applications are accepted from individuals, from schools, clubs and organisations. Others may be received via local healthcare professionals, via local churches, via housing associations, via local Money Advice Officers.

## Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year Annually the charity divides its income into three parts. One third is granted directly to St Peter's Church for assistance towards the maintenance of the fabric of the building. This year, that sum was  $\pm 10,000$ .

A second third is transferred into our Relief in Need "pot". During the year over £13,000 was distributed among a number of individuals. Grants included

- furniture for victims of domestic abuse who had been rehomed in our town with little to their name,
- carpeting for some who were moving into housing association properties that had none.
- white goods, generally a washing machine or a cooker, for someone on a low income who could manage the day-to-day expenses but might not be able to cover the "hump" of a large outlay such as this,
- and also some replacement goods for one family, single-parent and low income, who suffered a house fire.
- Finally, Christmas gifts of money were delivered to around 24 elderly or disabled local residents.

The final third goes into our Education fund. During this year the state schools in the town were invited to put forward a proposal for something for their school which would benefit the whole school, or most of it, and which would not normally be provided from their capitation. Three schools asked for outdoor furniture, both to encourage outdoor play and to enhance socialising (one school now has outdoor table football which the students play and thus converse rather than simply looking at their mobile phones during breaktime) and in view of some ongoing Covid restrictions. Another school asked for assistance to update their audio-visual system thus making it more efficient and more adaptable to changing circumstances, in particular pupils with a disability. A total in excess of £11,000 was granted..

The trustees have already noted that there is hardship because of increased costs principally in utilities and food, and we have granted money to two local organisations who help families in need as well as isolated and lonely older people.

Although in the above two categories, grants exceeded our income for the year, there are reserves of under-used funds from previous years, and it may be that our "rainy day" is now here. We will continue to endeavour to help as many people as much as we can.

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#### BRACKLEY UNITED FEOFFEE CHARITY STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustee's Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.
