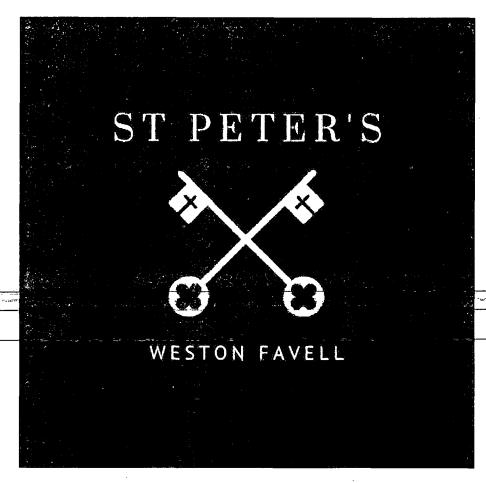

Structure, governance and management

The Parochial Church Council is a corporate body established by the Church of England. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure (1956) as amended. The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and to consider standing for election to the PCC.

Trustees' Report (continued)

Year ended 31 December 2022

Aims and purposes

The PCC has the responsibility of cooperating with the incumbent in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The PCC is also specifically responsible for the maintenance of St Peter's Church Building in Weston Favell, together with the Church Hall and Peter's Patch.

Objectives and Activities

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church and to become part of our parish community at St Peter's. The PCC maintains an overview of worship throughout the parish and makes suggestions on how our services can involve the many groups that live within our parish. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

When planning our activities for the year, we have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the supplementary guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. In particular, we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through:

- Worship and prayer; learning about the Gospel; and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus.
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish.
- Mission and outreach work.

To facilitate this work, it is important that we maintain the fabric of the Church of St. Peter's.

Work of the PCC

The PCC met 7 times in 2022 and continued to address the five Marks of Mission both through working groups and sub-committees and in PCC meetings. We also prepared our response to Living in Love and Faith, following meetings and study during Lent 2022.

The five Marks of Mission are

- TELL to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- TEACH to teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- TEND to respond to human need by loving service
- TRANSFORM to transform unjust structures in society, to challenge violence of very kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- TREASURE to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

Trustees' Report (continued)

Tell

During the year we continued to use Facebook (both public page and private group) to publicise our work. We completely revamped our A Church Near You website to make it more accessible and to include more and up to date information. The significant investment in the new Audio Visual system has enabled us to enhance both our online worship presence and our in-person worship so as to attract a younger generation and support an older one.

Our work with children and young people has developed. Tiny Tots continues to attract new families. Our work with primary age children has now been incorporated into our 4 o'clock service and Breakfast Club for secondary age has been replaced by Youth Café at 6pm twice a month. Our schools' team has continued to support the work in our Primary School and in other schools within the parish, with new creative ideas.

Teach

Our regular and special services have continued together with our weekday online morning prayer. These provide a range of style of worship, teaching and prayer. The 4 o'clock service is beginning to become established, with Wild Worship particularly popular. Live streaming of Sunday 10am service and some special services has continued.

During 2022, 21 people were baptised. Following discussion at the APCM, the PCC agreed to admit children who are baptised to communion, with an annual event to prepare children, and to offer education on baptism and communion to children who are already communicant. Following the first of these, 10 children were admitted to communion. The teaching event (which is a lot of fun for the children) will be held on 15 July this year. A Christian basics and confirmation course was organised in 2022 by Revd Matthew Smith and Rachel Cooley, and two candidates were confirmed in June by Bishop Donald. Following a Christian basics course offered in the autumn, a number of candidates have gone on to join a confirmation class for 2023.

Tend

<u>Lay pastors have continued to provide pastoral care to those in their care. We are looking at extending the range of this work.</u>

Once Covid restrictions were lifted we were able to recommence our support to those unable to attend church by taking Communion to their homes.

Prayer partners - a total of around 40 people who pray regularly in threes, twos, or individually for the sick, lonely, bereaved, those troubled in any way, our Church, Diocese, locality and far beyond, for our world, and for peace – have continued faithfully. We have been able to continue producing our monthly prayer diary which is used by many in their daily prayers.

Tea@2 has continued to meet monthly. Due to lack of demand, Memory Café closed during the year.

Our support for St John's Home has continued and we are able to provide regular worship and pastoral support for residents.

Tell (continued)

In Autumn 2022, we learnt that refugees and asylum seekers were being housed at the Westone Hotel. Working with welcome Churches Northampton we were able to respond rapidly to establish the community Hub in the church Hall, meeting every Thursday morning. This has been able to give huge practical, emotional and spiritual support to the people who come.

Transform

Details of charitable giving is set out in note-8d to the accounts. -We are pleased to report that over £13,000 was raised, together with large amounts of donations in kind to both Baby Basics and Foodbank.

Church members continued to generously support the work of Weston Favell Foodbank by volunteering and providing donations of food and supplies. We acknowledge that there has been a large rise in demand in the number of people using the foodbank. As such, we encourage people to continue to donate regularly to the foodbank, supporting local people who are in great need.

Treasure

During the year a lot of work was done to work towards living more sustainably as a Church and congregation and reaching net zero carbon emissions by 2030. We finalised our Environmental policy that sets out our vision and strategies. As key steps we declared a Climate Emergency and registered under the A Rocha Eco Church scheme, obtaining the bronze award. We have replaced the Church hall Boiler with a much more efficient one and have installed more effective heating controls. Work on encouraging greater natural diversity in the churchyard and Peter's patch has continued.

Ministry Team

During 2022 we said goodbye to Reverend Matthew Smith as Curate as he moved to Virginia Water as an Associate Priest. We welcomed Reverend Evie McNally as a part time Curate. Clare Pearce was licensed as Reader in September 2022. In October 2022 Richard Pestell (Lay Reader) and Eileen Fox (Licensed Lay Minister) retired. Sarah Howard (Lay Reader) left us to move to Northumberland.

Fabric

A significant investment was made in new Audio-Visual equipment, costing £39,826. Major electrical repairs to the Church were required, costing £1,925 and roof repairs cost £960. For health and safety reasons it was necessary to replace the chairs in the Church Hall at a cost of £8,816. The replacement boiler and controls in the Church hall cost £5,320.

Safeguarding

The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).

Financial review

Reserves policy

The PCC currently considers that the Church should hold reserves to cover approximately two months of expenditure plus a further one months of salary costs, together with an amount to cover future fabric costs and redundancy entitlement. In total this amounts to approximately £50,000. At 31 December 2022, free reserves totalled approximately £108,000. However, there is a significant budget deficit for 2023 which will reduce these excess reserves significantly.

Treasurer's Report

Year ended 31 December 2022

The income for the year was £142,745 compared to £138,106 in 2021. Excluding charitable giving and money raised by Friends of St Peters, planned giving, donations and consequently gift aid income fell by £7,000. Friends of St Peters raised £5,492 for the Fabric Fund, compared to £1,382 in the previous year

Total expenditure was £185,297 compared to £154,804 in 2021. A major difference being the expenditure on the Church Hall, both increased running costs as it became fully functional after Covid, and the exceptional repair and replacement costs set out in the Trustees Report.

We suffered from unrealised losses on investments of £29,987.

We raised £13,207 for 11 different Charities.

The PCC has planned a major stewardship campaign in 2023 in order to address the shortfall of income compared to expenditure.

I could not do the job of Treasurer without the support of many people, and I would like to thank everyone who has helped me in any way, however small. I would like to thank in particular the following people, John Fazackerley, who produces the formal accounts that you have before you, Carol Fordyce, who extracts large amounts of Gift Aid from HMRC, Jackie Payne, who looks after the PAYE for the Parish employees and Howard Leatherland, our independent examiner.

Lastly, for their help and general support throughout the year, I would like to thank the Churchwardens and the Clergy.

Parochial Church Council of St. Peter's Weston Favell Independent Examiner's Report

Year ended 31 December 2022

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31st December 2022.

Respective responsibilities of the PCC and the examiner

As trustees of the charity, the members of the PCC are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. They consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Basis of this report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanations from the management committee concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in a full audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.

Independent examiner's statement

In connection with my examination, no matter has come to my attention:

- 1 which gives me reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect the requirements:
 - a. to keep accounting records in accordance with section 137 of the Act; and
 - b. to prepare financial statements, which accord with the accounting records and comply with the requirements of the Act and the Regulations

Parochial Church Council of St. Peter's Weston Favell Principal Accounting Policies

Year ended 31 December 2022

The financial statements have been prepared to give a "true and fair" view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to give a "true and fair" view. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2016) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK-and Republic of Ireland (FRS-102) and Charities Act-2022.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets which are shown at market value.

The financial statements include all transactions assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. These include the specific charity fundraising undertaken by the church. This had previously been recorded only by way of note, which did not accurately represent the legal position. Prior year amounts have been rested in this respect, but there is no effect on the total of net income. The financial statements do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body nor those that are informal gatherings of church members.

Funds

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be maintained; only income arising from the investment may be used as restricted or unrestricted funds depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established

Restricted funds represent (a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended only on those restricted objects provided for in the terms of the trust or bequest and (b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for any PCC ordinary purposes. If the PCC sets aside part of these funds for a particular purpose these are called Designated Funds. Funds so designated may be redesignated by the PCC and so these funds can be spent for any purpose.

Principal Accounting Policies (continued)

Year ended 31 December 2022

Income

All monetary donations are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable, provided that there are no donor-imposed restrictions as to the timing of the related expenditure, in which case recognition is deferred until the pre-condition has been met. For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the Charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Charity that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the Charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the Charity or the Charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is a treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Investment income is recognised when receivable. Dividends are recognised once the income has been declared and notification has been received of the dividend due.

All other income is recognised when it is receivable and is accounted for gross.

Resources used

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably

Property, plant and equipment

Consecrated and benefice property is not included in the financial statements in accordance with the Charities Act 2011.

Other fixed assets are included at cost and are depreciated over their estimated lives as follows:

Church Hall	50-years—
Organ	15 years
Equipment	5 years
Audio Visual equipment	10 vears

All expenditure incurred in the year on consecrated or beneficed buildings, individual items of equipment with a purchase price of less than £500 and costs of refurbishment are expensed.

Investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The Statement of Financial Activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.
