Report from the Managing Director - Claire Hardy

Who would have guessed that what started as 2 programmes, facilitated by 4 facilitators, piloted in one school could turn into a small and mighty beyond its years organisation. An organisation that continues to grow from strength to strength.

Those two programmes turned into 52 programmes this year; reaching 1,350 students throughout the Ga West Region in Ghana. This coming year, 2023, will continue to see this number increase as our impact grows and reaches more young people.

This year has seen some big changes, most notably with Megan stepping back from the charity after 10 years. She has been influential in our journey thus far and I know she will continue to support from a distance.

The charity sector as a whole continues to take hits both financially and through individual engagement, however I am so proud of our amazing team who have continued to push, strive for more and get comfortable in the uncomfortable. A team that pushes so hard that I am honoured to announce that we received a generous donation from Ghana International Foundation, landed our first multi-year grant from Global Fund for Children and begun conversations with our second corporate partner, Pearlstone Alternatives.

A massive thank you to our supportive board of trustees who continue to encourage and get involved in the day to day. Thank you to Lawrencia, Caroline and Stephen who work hard to see the progression of Move the World. Thank you to our 11 facilitators who not only dedicate themselves to the empowerment of students but strive for the best for the organisation and community continuously.

Finally, thank you to our donors and funders because without you 1,350 students (and growing) wouldn't have access to our Global Citizenship Education Programmes.

Our company motto, "Sailboat not a speedboat" continues to push us and our journey has been the epitome of this analogy. We've sailed in some beautiful sunshine moments and buckled down the hatches in some rough seas, but through it all our incredible team ensures the boat stays afloat and gets back on course.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Move The World is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) registered as a charity with the Charity Commission. We work in partnership with our subsidiary in Ghana which is responsible for the delivery of our education programmes. The UK entity is responsible for strategy and fundraising and we work with Move The World Ghana on curriculum development and delivery.

Organisation

The board of trustees oversees the charity and meets quarterly. There are sub-committees covering fundraising, finance, monitoring and evaluation and curriculum development which meet more regularly. The charity's governing document allows the trustees to meet and conduct meetings virtually which we do, given the diverse geographical distribution of our trustees. The board works closely with the Managing Director who manages the day to day operations of the charity. To facilitate effective operations, the Managing Director has delegated authority, within terms of delegation approved by the trustees, for operational matters including finance, employment and design and delivery of programming. The small UK team works hard to raise income for the Global Citizenship Education programmes which are delivered by our project implementation team in Ghana. The core team and support services cover both organisations.

Appointment of trustees

Trustees are appointed on a two-year term, which is renewable, upon agreement with both parties. Trusteeship is a voluntary role, and trustees receive no remuneration for carrying out their duties, but can claim for legitimate expenses.

Trustee recruitment is conducted on an 'as and when required' basis through a formal interview process led by the chair of the board. New trustees are inducted through a range of discussions with key members and supported by our trustee manual which was last updated in September 2022 and includes a trustees' code of conduct.

Each trustee brings key skills to support our goal of enhancing the quality of education and promoting Global Citizenship Education in Ghana. As chair and incoming chair, Megan and Kellie both assist us with a focus on our overall strategy, financial management, building organisational capability, and implementation of strong management and governance practices. Abigail supports our fundraising team and supports alongside Jamal in expanding our funding streams. Emmanuel has supported programme strategy given his knowledge of education in Ghana. Alyssa adds relevant operational experience. Kellie also offers support and skills in regards to all financial tracking as her role as treasurer, before moving to her new role as chair.

The trustees meet at least four times a year, and receive periodic progress reports and management accounts between meetings. All trustees, except Megan Taylor, remain in post at the date the report and accounts were approved.

Objectives and activities

Move The World works in Ghana to improve the quality of education and access to opportunity for young people.

Our governing document states our charitable objects as follows:

- 1) "to advance in life and relieve the needs of young people principally (but not exclusively) in Ghana in particular (but without limitation) through the provision of recreational and leisure time activities provided in the interest of social welfare, designed to improve their conditions of life and providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as mature and responsible individuals."
- 2) "to advance education; by providing grants, items and services to individuals and communities in need principally (but not exclusively) in Ghana."

The trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance published by the Charity Commission on the operation of the public benefit requirement.

These charitable objectives translate into the following Vision and Mission:

Vision: A world of confident young people, equipped to tackle the challenges they face in their communities and beyond.

Mission: Educating youth in Ghana to be active Global Citizens.

We pursue our mission by delivering Global Citizenship Education programmes in schools and community settings, using the UN's 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as learning themes. Students, young adults and teachers engage with each other in experiential activities to build life skills whilst learning about local and global issues.

Get Global and Get Local: an experiential education programme

At the heart of our approach is a commitment to delivering radical change in educational outcomes through a 3-pronged model that is community centred, run in collaboration with schools, and centred wholly on enhancing levels of engagement in learning - putting experiential learning tools in the hands of the young people in line with SDG4.

We run two Global Citizenship Education programmes designed and delivered by local, trained 'change-makers' over a 7 month period that syncs with the school calendar. Get Global engages pupils aged 10-12 on SDGs 1-6 in weekly play-based and activity-centred sessions. Get Local, created to sustain and build upon the learnings achieved from Get Global, engages pupils aged 13-15 and focuses on SDGs 7-12.

Achievements and performance

Since 2019, we have run over 52 programmes reaching over 1,350 pupils and 25 facilitators and teachers with inspiring impact stories.

In 2022, we scaled our programmes to 5 new schools and trained teachers in 9 schools to work with facilitators to ensure greater ownership within the schools, reduce cost, increase sustainability and to allow for the transfer of good practice between teachers and facilitators.

Our mission is to support youth to become active global citizens and this means to have the skills to be able to take personal and social responsibility, be engaged with local issues and be informed about global challenges and their relevance to their personal context. We measure these outcomes through a range of processes. Given the qualitative nature of our work, we find stories bring our impact to life most effectively. We run Most Significant Change interviews with key stakeholders including students, facilitators, teachers and headteachers at specific points during and post programme and highlight these voices as well as monitoring patterns and themes. Below are some examples of stories we have collected:

- "As a Get Local Facilitator, Get Local has impacted my life in several ways. One of the ways that Get Local has impacted me is learning to make a solar oven from pizza boxes and aluminium foil. I never knew something like that existed until Get Local, in as much as I go to the classroom to facilitate sessions, I'm glad it's a learning process for me too and I'm amazed how much energy(electricity) I can save if I'm able to use some of our affordable and clean "natural" energies". - Hawa, Facilitator
- "It has helped me in my studies, Things I learned from the Get Global programs reflects in things I learn in school". Student graduate
- "My biggest impact is that it has drawn me closer to my students than ever and has helped me to see the importance of giving a positive impact back to my community". Agorah, Teacher
- "As a facilitator at Move The World for the past four years, my interest and love for training kids has increased. When I reflect back to my first experience as a facilitator, I understand now why one needs to be a sailboat and not a speedboat. Throughout my four years, I have learnt how to effectively manage kids and train them to be self-responsible as students and as citizens in their community. I have also gained skills in managing time and multi tasking. I believe through my work I have impacted a lot of young people and have become a role model to them through the way I relate with them. Being a Move The World Facilitator gives me an opportunity to teach others and to learn as well. Within these four years with Move The World, a lot of positive changes have happened in my life and I believe as we continue the journey, there's a lot more changes to come as gratitude turns 'what we have into enough". Year in review

Get Local; Programme Expansion

In January 2022, we launched a total of 15 programmes of our follow on programme; Get Local.
 Get Local is an important next phase of our work so we can continue the learning journey with our students throughout their school life.

Connections

- This past year has continued to see an increase and sustained partnerships and connections with other NGO's in the sector both in Ghana and around the world;
- We continued to diversify our investment into fundraising this year, unfortunately losing Wonu to new adventures but fortunate to bring Stephen on board to focus on accessing funding through trusts and foundations. Given the limited time we have been doing this, we have been really pleased with our success so far - receiving our first multi-year funding from Global Fund for Children;
- Our Managing Director, Claire continues to play an active role in the Small International Development Charities Network (SIDCN) based in the UK which sees us advocating and supporting the development of small international development charities; and
- The Global Citizenship Collective has been a great support to us as we connect with leaders and connections around the world focused on enhancing Global Citizenship Education.

Facilitator updates

We are very proud that we have kept all facilitators engaged and employed over the past few years despite COVID and more excited to have had the opportunity to expand on our wellbeing and maternity policies welcoming 3 new "Move the World babies" to our team.

Financial review

Fundraising

Whilst community fundraising continues to make up Move The World's most significant funding stream, we have started to see some success this year from our investment in applying for grants from trusts and foundations. This year we were honoured to receive our largest grant to date from Global Fund for Children. In summary:

Successful grant applications

- Global Fund for Children worth \$17,000 USD to support our 2022 programming;
- Oakdale worth £1,000 to support our 2022 programming; and
- Cordis Charitable Trust worth £2,000 to support our 2022 Get Local programming.

Lovers and Bluffers; our in-person fundraising gala

This event was held in May 2022, raising funds worth £20,000 towards our programming.

Sponsored events and campaigns

- Our Big Give 2022 successfully raised £4,187; and
- We hosted a leaving dinner for Megan which raised £1,500.

In addition to these fundraising events, we continued to grow our Monthly Movers; our monthly donors, who provide consistent support and security through their ongoing commitment.

The trustees aim to maintain a target level of funds held in reserves of £13,000 to ensure the charity's educational objectives can always be fulfilled. Due to the continuing impact of the pandemic, the global landscape and reduced funding opportunities for all small charities, we have, with the agreement of the board of trustees, continued to operate within our reserves. There is a plan in place to rebuild the reserves fund alongside delivering our programmes over the next two financial periods, if not earlier.

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

Statement of responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102: The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the incoming resources and application of resources, including the net income or expenditure, of the charity for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the constitution. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charity's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Independent examiners

Godfrey Wilson Limited were re-appointed as independent examiners to the charity during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity.

Notes to the financial statements

For the period ended 31 December 2022

1. Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities in preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

Move The World meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

b) Going concern basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared on the assumption that the charity is able to continue as a going concern, which the trustees consider appropriate having regard to the current level of unrestricted reserves. There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

c) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from the government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

d) Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item, is probable and the economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

e) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity: this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

f) Funds accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

h) Allocation of support and governance costs

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity, including the costs of complying with constitutional and statutory requirements and any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities. These costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities based on staff costs as follows:

i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

i) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

k) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

I) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently recognised at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

m) Pension costs

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. There are no further liabilities other than that already recognised in the SOFA.

n) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at rates prevailing at the date of the transaction. Balances denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the year end.

o) Accounting estimates and key judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

There are no key sources of estimation uncertainty that are deemed to have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.
