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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 December 2022

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The primary object of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) is the promotion of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England. The PCC (Powers) Measure 1956 states that the PCC "is to co-operate with the minister in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical".

The PCC continues to achieve its primary objective by:

- Maintaining the whole mission of the church and supporting the ministry team. This includes the regular provision of opportunities for divine worship, the promotion of the Gospel and of Christian fellowship;
- Managing and maintaining the church premises at St. Martin's and St Stephen's so that they can be used in a variety of ways both liturgical and secular; and
- Supporting the Church of England by paying our calculated contribution to the Guildford Diocese Parish Share Fund.

Sub-Committees

During the year the sub-committees worked to further the work of the church within the realms of the PCC. The following committees met and reports from the sub-committees are contained within this report:

- Standing Committee
- Mission & Outreach Committee
- Events Committee
- Fabric Committee

Occasional offices

There were sixteen baptisms. There were two marriages at Church and the clergy conducted the funerals of twelve people.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Review of the year

Throughout this year the PCC has met six times with the Standing Committee meeting in between each PCC meeting to discuss relevant issues and topics before making recommendations to the PCC. Issues which have been on our agenda this year include the following:

- Brathwait memorial we have heard from Judith Mitchell about how this project has been progressing with the academic research from Alana Harris about the history of John Brathwait. Judith visited Bristol Cathedral to view the outcome of a similar project and it has been interesting to see how they have responded to this complex situation. At times this has led to some lively discussions within meetings and the PCC is looking forward to considering recommendations from the research project later this year.
- Upgrading Audio Visual equipment following the major project of installing new lighting and AV equipment in 2019 we have continued to develop our use of the screens and cameras to live stream the vast majority of our weekly services. This year we have added some additional cameras and hardware to make the live streaming of our services easier and more flexible.
- Buildings This year has seen the PCC working to generate a new lease for the Langley Vale Village Hall and St John Chandler Hall. As part of this process we have been reflecting on how we can best use the resources available to us to ensure the sustainable future of our church.
- Parish Needs Process in the second half of the year we have begun the engagement with the Guildford Diocese Parish Needs Process. This is a self reflection process that gives us the space to think about our core aims and purposes to ensure that we have viability and sustainability for the future.

Fabric

- In February, the concrete steps (on the southside) leading up to the western terrace from the car park were repaired and refaced.
- In March, the lighting control to the external light outside the north door was revised and improved
- --In April, the heating system in Church developed a fault and a leak was discovered in the boiler room. Both issues were rectified by our regular heating contractors.
- In May, the dishwasher was installed underneath the servery at the west end of Church.
- In July, the sound and audio/visual system was upgraded with additional cameras installed for the choir in the Chancel and in the organ loft for the organ pedals, two dedicated microphones were installed in the chancel for the choir, and associated improvements and enhancements to the sound and a/v system controls.
- In September, we met with the stonemason, Chris Anstey, who has provided us with a quotation to reform the box tomb at the top of the western steps on the north side, by removing the concrete kerb at the base of the tomb. The PCC has accepted Mr Anstey's quotation and the work will be carried out in the Spring of 2023.
- In addition, the Gas heating system in Church was serviced and the appropriate test certificate provided.

Epsom Deanery Synod

The Synod has met three times since the last APCM, moving around the Deanery as normal. Each Synod meeting includes a short act of communal worship; an introduction from the clergy of the host church about the parish's history and recent events; updates from the deanery and diocese; and a guest speaker presenting a discussion on a relevant topic.

The June 2022 meeting was held at St Mary the Virgin, Headley, featuring the Diocesan Environment Officer discussing the merits of Eco-Church (towards which St Martin's is already working) and the refresh of the "Growing Leaders" course within the Deanery.

The October 2022 meeting was held at Ruxley Church, and featured the Diocesan Director of Mission and Training Lead discussing lay discipleship and the renewed set of Diocesan training courses. This was selected in light of the Archbishop's visit to the Diocese of Guildford in September.

The February 2023 meeting was due to be held at All Saints, West Ewell, but was moved online at short notice. The meeting was due to hear from the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer, but this was not possible and so the meeting shared prayers and encouragement for each other.

Vicar's Report

This was the year we gradually emerged from COVID related restrictions and cautions in our Church life. As things settle down, we appear to have emerged with a changed congregation - numbers attending worship in Church are down, but a new online congregation has emerged. Whilst it is not a precise science, the sum of physical and online attendance appears to show our wider congregation has increased post lockdown. This new shape has allowed those who are housebound, struggle with mobility or health vulnerabilities, together with people who simply cant come some Sundays, to engage with our regular Sunday services. On the other hand, it has presented us with a challenge in engaging with people who are rarely in Church, but very much part of our worshipping Church family. I hope that as we work to improve our communications we will find ways of enabling those who are online to participate more in Church life.

As ever, I am deeply grateful to my colleagues in ministry - particularly to Andris, who is semi-retired from his duties in the Lutheran Church, and Andrew, chaplain at Epsom College - who are willing to share their gifts in leading worship, preaching and pastoral ministry with us all. And on all our behalf to acknowledge with gratitude the work and commitment given by our wardens, Sarah and David. As well as volunteers, I am blessed with paid colleagues; Richard, Nicky, Lois, Jay and Iain, whose work on our music and on making the Parish run smoothly (at least, most of the time!) are invaluable.

Sadly, we have lost friends in the congregation who have died in the past year, as well as some for whom life has moved them on to new pastures. We have also welcomed people who have joined our worshipping community in that time, not least the children (and adults) who have been baptised.

To everyone who participates in the life of our Parish, thank you. Some will report on their activities elsewhere in this annual feedback to you all; some quietly get on with their Christian lives and ministries, whether it be in the Church or community. I hope you will continue to find spiritual food at St Martin's and St Stephen's so that you may feed others.

Ministry Team

The Ministry Team generally meets once a month, though occasionally there is a longer gap. During 2022 one additional single-issue meeting was held at Epsom College, to discuss evening worship at St Martin's and the generally low attendance (higher on-line figures). The membership comprises the clergy, lay ministers and readers, and the pastoral team. The Agenda and Minutes are also sent to Richard Dacey, Director of Music, and to Andrew Haviland, Chaplain at Epsom College who also takes occasional services at both St Martin's and St Stephen's, though they rarely attend.

Unlike the PCC, the meetings are relatively informal and we seldom vote on issues raised. It is a forum for an exchange of views and discussion and an opportunity to catch-up with each other. At most meetings there are common items for general discussion or comment, namely Service Review; the Service Pattern (i.e. rotas for preaching etc); Pastoral Updates; General Church Issues for information (staffing, buildings, outreach and mission); Study Groups.

Within this general pattern some of the main discussion areas have been:

- Timing of services, especially evening services. After debate both at the usual meetings and the single-issue meeting at Epsom College, it was agreed that although there may be a case for moving services to an earlier time in winter to encourage more to attend, the reverse might be true during the summer, and it was felt that we should adhere to a consistent time.
- The Service Review gives members an opportunity to comment on recent services and take into account any problems which should be addressed in the future, and indeed any promising aspects which could be built upon or expanded.

- Pastoral issues sometimes concern individuals which are confidential and cannot be addressed at open meetings, but occasional general matters arise such as the lack of volunteers to take Communion to care homes and private homes especially during holiday periods. Despite a plea in the Newsletter for volunteers to assist with this, only two had volunteered.
- Sermon series and study groups are suggested and devised. A sermon and Bible study series was arranged for July 2022 on the theme of Sin and Atonement; this year a series of sermons for Lent 2023 was agreed, and is to be followed by Bible Study sessions on OT topics once a month between April and August. The excellent Pilgrim Course which took place weekly under Graeme Lodge is now in abeyance as he no longer has a free evening in which to conduct these.
- Living in Love and Faith was discussed and Howard Bluett presented a paper which was later discussed by the PCC.
- From time to time the Ministry Team is presented with a book/chapter(s) of a book/article to read and to discuss. It must be said, however, that not all members present manage to find time to fit this extra reading into their busy schedules!

Mission and Outreach

One of our main tasks each year is the recommendation to the PCC as to which charitable organisations St Martin's should support financially. In 2022 local beneficiaries were: The Spinnaker Trust, the Epsom and Ewell Refugee Network, the Epsom and Ewell Food Bank, My Time for Young Carers, St Martin's School Hardship Fund, Love Me Love My Mind, Epsom and Ewell Phab. National beneficiaries were: CMS, the Church Army, the Medaille Trust, the Church Homeless Trust. Charities operating mainly abroad were: USPG, the Bible Society, the Mission to Seafarers, Redress, DEC Relief for Ukrainian victims of war, the Leprosy Mission, Mercy ships, AMECA, Wheels for the World, MAF.

Between April and May, we presented a sequence of talks featuring three of the charities that St Martin's supports: Mercy Ships, The Children's Society and Christian Aid. The latter benefited from a discrete collection in May. Additionally, we suggested the USPG's "Growing Futures" appeal as an appropriate beneficiary of donations at our Harvest thanksgiving service and the Children's Society benefited from a collection at Christmas.

We also heard from Ruthie Marcus who updated us on the most recent progress at her clinic in Malawi; and from Stephen Lubari on how the St Martin's Garden Party collection was disbursed in war-torn South Sudan.

Thanks are due to the generous suppliers of cakes for our Tea and Activities initiative, in conjunction with Epsom College, which started as a fortnightly venture in September. More volunteers willing to participate in socialising with the elderly who attend would be very welcome.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

Reserves policy

Policy: It is the policy of this church to hold in reserves:

- · the equivalent of three months general running costs and an additional one month's salary costs
- · an amount for likely building works at the next quinquennial inspection.
- · an amount for the next internal redecoration of the Church Building

After these reserves have been designated, the PCC believes that the remaining reserves left over should be spent on projects for which there is a vision but no resources, so as to enhance and improve the building of St Martin's to make it fit for the future, and where possible to carry out capital projects now that will reduce long term running costs in the future.

This Reserves Policy will be reviewed at regular intervals as necessary.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income was £299,947, over 4% higher than the equivalent figure last year thanks mainly to an increase in ancillary income offset by a drop in legacies and a reduction in committed giving from the congregation.

Total expenditure amounted to £267,237, falling from £295,380 in 2021 albeit the 2022 figure includes a write back of £39,672 relating to historical accrued expenditure. This provided the Christian ministry costs including the contribution to the Diocesan parish share which largely provides the stipends and other clergy overheads (including housing for the clergy). It includes the costs of four employee roles.

Overall we report a net surplus for the year of £32,710 (2021: loss of £9,346) before other gains and losses. The net movement for the year is a surplus of £271,207 (2021: £130,304) once investment gains and losses and a revaluation of the Worple Road property are included.

After adding reserves brought forward at the beginning of the year, the balances carried forward at 31st December totalled £2,262,087 (2021: £1,990,880)

The PCC reports that we continue to operate as a going concern:

- We continue to be prudent in our expenditure, despite having reserves in place it is becoming increasingly difficult to balance income with expenditure year or year.
- Our reserves position is strong, although we will need to use some of these for essential building work and renovations in the medium term. Likewise it is important to hold reserves to cover the impact of unforeseen events.
- The PCC is confident that we can continue to meet our critical commitments.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) hold office in accordance with the Church Representation Rules - either ex-officio; or by election or appointment at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting; or by co-option. The Vicar is an ex-officio Trustee.

The charity is unincorporated and registered with the Charity Commission in February 2010 under number 1134149 having previously been an exempt charity. The Charity is governed by the Parochial Church Council Measure (1956) as amended by Church Representation Rules.

The PCC is responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish, ncluding deciding how the funds of the PCC are to be spent. All eligible members of the congregation are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and to stand for election to the PCC.

Risk management

Members of the PCC have reviewed the major strategic and operational risks which the church faces, in order to be satisfied that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced and that all necessary steps have been taken to minimise the effects of all such risks which may exist.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with SORP (FRS 102) and the financial standards applicable in the UK and republic of Ireland.

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

INCOME

INCOME RECOGNITION

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the Church has a contractual or other right to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Income with conditions attached to its receipts is recognised when the church has fulfilled those conditions.

INCOMING RESOURCES

Collection and planned giving under gift aid are recognised when received. Income tax recoverable on Gift Aid is recognised when it is claimable. Grants and legacies are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its agreed legal entitlement. Parochial fees from weddings and funerals are accounted for net of associated payments to the organist, verger and others.

DEFERRED INCOME

Income received which is contractually or otherwise not expendable until a future period is deferred.

EXPENDITURE

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

RESOURCES USED

Missionary giving and donations by the PCC are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation of the PCC. The Parish share, payable to the Diocese, is accounted for when due.

GOVERNANCE COSTS

These are costs associated with the governance arrangements of the church which relate to the general running of the church as opposed to those costs associated with fundraising or charitable activity and are costs associated with constitutional and statutory requirements such as Examiner's Fees.

TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

CONSECRATED PROPERTY AND MOVEABLE CHURCH FURNISHINGS

Consecrated and beneficed property of any kind is excluded from the accounts in accordance with Charities Act 2011. No value is placed on movable church furnishings held by the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure on consecrated buildings and moveable church furnishings is written off as incurred.

PROPERTY AT VALUATION

This consists of the clergy house in Worple Road which was valued informally in 2023 at £750,000, in consultation with a local estate agent.

PROPERTY AT COST

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the year ended 31 December 2022

TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

Income is received from Church House which is used as a Community Hall and Parish Office and is a functional property used by the Parish. The cost of these Premises is unknown and it is held at nil cost. The Cost of Improvements is shown in the Balance Sheet and depreciated over the estimated economic life of those improvements. The estimated life is 25 years.

OTHER PROPERTIES

A further property is St John's Church Road, this has no cost in the Balance Sheet as it was a consecrated property. Rental income is received and is shown in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The cost of Valuation is in excess of any benefit which might arise from such a Valuation.

EOUIPMENT

Office Equipment is stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computers being part of a Network - 50% on cost per annum Other office equipment - 33% on cost per annum

Piano and musical equipment

- Piano 4% p.a. however some equipment at 10%, 20% and 25% rates.

Sound and AV equipment - 10% on cost per annum
Lighting equipment - 4% on cost per annum

Other items of equipment and furniture are only capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £1,000. All Software is written off in the year of acquisition.

STOCKS

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

TAXATION

The Church does not trade or undertake non-charitable activities and has been exempted from tax on the surpluses generated by its charitable activities by HMRC.

FUND ACCOUNTING

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS

Unrestricted funds represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for the general purposes of the PCC.

DESIGNATED FUNDS

These are General funds which the PCC has decided to earmark for a specific purpose, it can decide to amend these designations at any time.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the Donor. Direct and support expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund together with a fair allocation of other costs.

PENSION COSTS AND OTHER POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

VOLUNTEERS CONTRIBUTION

No financial benefit has been reflected in these financial statements in respect of the time and effort, freely given by many members of St Martin's and St Stephen's Churches, involved in the running and administration of church activities.

CURRENT ASSETS

DEBTORS AND PREPAYMENTS
