The Friends of Lichfield Cathedral Annual Report for the year ending 31 December 2022

Governance

The Friends of Lichfield Cathedral, founded in 1937, is governed by a constitution approved on 21 May 2011, revised on 29 June 2022, and is constituted as an unincorporated association.

Trustees

The trustees are set out on page 1. The chairman is an ex-officio officer and trustee. The four officers of vice chairman, secretary, treasurer and events secretary are elected every three years by the membership and are trustees. Two trustees are appointed by the Chapter of Lichfield Cathedral. Nine trustees are elected by the membership for periods of three years and retire in rotation. No elected trustee may serve more than two terms of three years in one position. In addition, the Executive Council may appoint up to two trustees to represent the wider interests of the diocese.

Objects

- To further the religious and other charitable work of Lichfield Cathedral.
- To assist and promote the restoration, maintenance, repair and improvement of the Cathedral and to support the worship, music and ministry of the Cathedral.

Aims

- To draw into fellowship the people of the Diocese and others with an interest in Lichfield Cathedral.
- To work with the Chapter in furthering the religious and charitable work of the Cathedral.
- To assist the work of repairing and preserving the fabric of the Cathedral and its precincts, its furnishings and vestments and to enhance it with special gifts.
- To support the worship and music of the Cathedral.
- To arouse, stimulate and maintain parish and public interest in the Cathedral.
- To provide a means whereby people who have at heart the wellbeing, mission and purpose of the Cathedral can keep in touch with its life and work.
- To raise and invest money to further the objects of the Friends.
- To organise social events and opportunities of fellowship, and to support such other charitable purposes relating to Lichfield Cathedral as the Executive Council in its absolute discretion shall see fit.

Review of Activities and Achievements

The Friends have enjoyed a busy year being able to return to a programme of events which we might have expected to see before the pandemic. Trips out were to Hartlebury Castle in Worcestershire, a most fascinating place, John Taylor & Co Bell Foundry in Loughborough, where the Cathedral's peal of ten were recast in 1947, and Ely Cathedral's Christmas Market. In June, the Annual General Meeting was held in the Cathedral, followed by a talk by The Dean about the new Shrine of St Chad, and in September, the St Chad Supper was held at the Guildhall in Lichfield with 65 Friends in attendance. In November, the new Shrine was consecrated, and the Relic brought back into the Cathedral. An event which has taken many years to achieve. The Friends supported this with several projects, including purchasing new copes for Area Bishops, the restoration of a Victorian cope hood, a processional cross and candle holders to stand by the Shrine and a contribution towards the flowers for the consecration service. We are grateful to all the Friends who pay an annual subscription which contributes to our funds. However, fundraising is not limited to this and in 2022, two very successful Classy Cast Offs sales were held raising a surplus of over £1,700 and the Christmas Tree Festival contributing almost £18,000 to funds. The Friends have, this year, prepared and introduced our own Safeguarding Policy and appointed two Safeguarding Officers.

Financial Review

i) Year End Results

The accounts for the year ended 31 December 2022 are attached.

It has been an extraordinary year with the balance sheet showing net assets totalling £907,206. This is a huge increase on last year's total of £113,679 and is largely resulting from the receipt a legacy of £775,000 from the estate of the late Mr Mark Farrant. This is an interim payment as the estate is not yet finalised and when the property is disposed of a further substantial final payment is anticipated.

Overall income during the year therefore increased massively to £825,150 up from £111,216 in 2021. It is encouraging to see an increase in our supporters' donations which amounted to £19,381 up from £17,623 in 2021 (see accounts note 2). As our programme of social events has returned to some normality a healthy surplus of £1,410 was generated up from £342 in 2021. We held two Classy Cast Offs sales during the year which raised the amount of £1,794 (see accounts note 4). The Christmas Tree Festival was very successful raising almost £18,000, a record amount since the festival began. The income associated with the festival is shown in the accounts (note 4) and the costs on the Statement of Activities page. Income from investments and interests on cash deposits rose considerably to £6,976 from £2,078 in 2021 (see accounts note 5) and is largely resulting from monies received from the Mark Farrant legacy mentioned above, being placed on deposit.

Expenditure was £24,306 and much less than £129,869 in 2021. The main reason for this is that a large grant to the Cathedral Resource Appeal of £100,000 was accounted for in 2021, even though £50,000 was actually paid during the current year. Grants made during the year totalled £13,468 (see accounts note 7). There was a modest increase in general expenditure to £8,117 from £6,230 in 2021. Details are shown in the accounts (note 6).

The value of investments decreased to £55,121 from £62,438 in 2021. This is largely in line with movements in the stock market and had we not sold some of our holdings in 2021 the fall would have been greater.

Also, during the past year:

- The Friends entered into a new Service Level Agreement with the Cathedral and a revised monthly administration charge of £425 was agreed, to be reviewed annually.
- A Share Gifting Scheme was introduced which is hoped may appeal to members who wish to dispose of unwanted shares and donate the proceeds to The Friends in a tax efficient manner.
- Membership rates were reviewed. Annual membership now comprises an individual rate of £25 and a joint rate of £40. Life membership now comprises an individual rate of £425 and a joint rate of £600. It is hoped that the new rates will have wider appeal.

ii) Financial Reserves Policy

Cash reserves are held in a Lloyds Bank current account for everyday purposes and a Church of England Deposit Fund account. A Church of England Investment Unit Trust Fund is also held which is designed specifically for the charity sector to generate both income and capital growth. The fund or part thereof can be readily liquidated should the need for cash arise. The trustees regularly monitor interest rates and investment performance and may adjust the ratio of cash to investments depending on the performance of the stock market at the time and the prevailing rates of interest on cash deposits.

Net assets are unrestricted, and the funds can be freely used by the trustees. The trustees review the total reserves at each of their quarterly executive council meetings. They have estimated that a

minimum reserve of £25,000 is required to maintain the efficient running of the charity and to provide the required level of services to supporters for a period of one year. Further reserves are required from time to time to meet the commitments made to the Dean and Chapter and as a contingency should unforeseen circumstances arise. As such the trustees may consider holding larger amounts of cash on deposit or investing in appropriate Church of England investment funds. The trustees consider that the net assets at the present time meet these criteria.

iii) Financial Controls Policy

The trustees have put a Financial Controls Policy in place as recommended by the Charity Commission in guidance note CC8. This is to ensure that assets are properly used, funds are spent effectively, and financial affairs are well managed. The policy is reviewed annually.

Risk Review

The trustees have examined the major internal and external risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to minimise these risks.

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and have complied with their duties under the Charities Act 2011.
