REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 December 2022

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102, effective 1 January 2019).

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published in October 2019.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

Open Hands objectives are to promote the relief of sickness, poverty and financial hardship in places as the directors from time to time think fit, and the advancement of education in such ways and in such parts of the community as the directors from time to time may think fit.

These objectives are worked out in the following ways:

- 1. The charity's work through the Compassion Centre
- 2. The charity's work through Hand in Hand, our preschool.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's aims, objectives, and activities for both areas of work which will be outlined separately in this document.

1. Work through the Compassion Centre

Objectives, Aims and Values

Our desire is for people in Leicester to see their desperation lifted, dignity restored, perspective shifted, and hope grown through community care.

To facilitate this goal Open Hands supports people in need with emergency practical help, skills training, and mentoring. We love to go the extra mile showing the love of Jesus through everything we do. We offer care, dignity and hope for the future to everyone we meet.

In our work through the Compassion Centre we support a large range of people who fall into different societal categories (e.g. low income families; homeless; refugees and asylum seekers; unemployed). At Open Hands we choose not to view people through this lens, but instead we refer to the people we help as 'guests' - welcome and valued as themselves rather than their circumstance. A warm welcome is extended to every visitor in response to this understanding. Guest is also a temporary word that demonstrates our hope that the people we help will come to a place where they are independent and no longer in need of our support.

Achievement and Performance

2022 was a distinctly different year to 2020 and 2021. As the first year without Covid-19 restrictions such as lockdown, tiers, and social distancing for 2 years, Open Hands had the opportunity to review and strengthen its work, vision and aims in line with a new landscape of need. However, whilst lockdowns no longer affected the services we provided, many of our guests faced increasing financial pressure due to the Cost-of-Living Crisis which began to have an impact in early 2022.

This was also the first full year in our new Compassion Centre based in St Matthews Leicester (LE1 2HP). We continue to be incredibly grateful for the many people, trusts, organisations and faith groups who fundraised and supported the renovation of this space. The new centre has released much needed additional space for the charity's services to expand in line with increased demand. It has also allowed for greater joint working across Open Hands Compassion Centre teams now that all work is centrally located.

Emergency and Reduced Cost Services

"Just want to say I had to visit your premises today for the first time I was really really nervous and really scared about what was going to happen. I can't remember the people that I spoke to but they all made me feel very welcome. The gentleman in reception, the lady that showed me the kitchen where I could get a cup of tea and the other lady that took me into the supermarket bit you've all made me feel so reassured thank you so so much."

In 2022 we continued to offer in-person emergency and reduced cost essential services (which include our Food, Furniture, and Drop-In Projects) that were re-introduced towards the end of 2021. Inviting guests inside our building for these services was greatly missed in 2020 and 2021. In person service delivery has been beneficial in many ways in 2022, including:

- Increasing dignity through choice Guests are given the opportunity to choose their own items according
 to their tastes, preferences and needs in comparison to being given a pre-packed bag of items.
- Increasing care offered The conversations guests have with our team when visiting allow care to be
 extended beyond practical provision, our volunteers actively listen to provide emotional support, and
 signposting where additional need is identified.
- Increasing understanding of people accessing our services Meeting guests in person provides greater
 insight into the wide range of people referred to Open Hands for help. Notably, this has included a
 higher number of families and pensioners as many people who were managing have now been tipped
 into a place of financial difficulty. In 2022 we also received a high number of referrals to support asylum
 seekers housed in hotels.

Food

The number of average households accessing the Open Hands Food Store weekly increased from 64 in January 2022, to 96 in November and December 2022. This can largely be attributed to the Cost-of-Living Crisis, but may also be linked to the variety, choice, and amount of food we offer in comparison to other food banks in the city. Access to toiletries is also provided through the Food Store. In October we started an additional food hamper collection morning to give referral partners and guests who would prefer to receive a pre-packed hamper an alternative and faster service.

In May we officially launched our Social Supermarket, an affordable shopping service for people with reduced financial means. Food is priced at half retail prices and is designed to reduce and prevent food bank dependency and to provide a steppingstone towards independent shopping. 119 households accessed the social supermarket post launch, spending an average of £5.94 per visit.

"Today I sat and talked to a group of ladies who had all come together from a house for women escaping domestic violence. They spoke of the challenges of each living in one room with children, how they support one another and how coming to Open Hands for affordable shopping makes all the difference. One of them said, 'we all like to cook our own food so when we visit food banks we end up discarding tins of food we won't eat. Here we can feel special because we choose our own food and we are all struggling financially and it is so cheap compared to the shops."

Throughout the year we also continued to offer hot meal provision in the form of a hot pie meal on Tuesday evenings.

Drop-In

"During one of our Drop-In sessions I spoke to a guest who had been referred for emergency clothing. I noticed that he was wearing a pair of really good shoes but had some old, very worn-out slippers nearby. I admired his new shoes and he said "yes, you have done me proud". That morning he had arrived in his slippers having no other shoes, but he left wearing clothes and shoes that he was proud to wear."

We continued to provide emergency clothing and bedding through our Drop-In throughout 2022, and in October re-introduced household electricals and cooking equipment on to our referral form for the first-time post pandemic. Demand for the essential items offered through the Drop-In significantly increased throughout the year. In January we received 102 visits for the Drop-In, but from March onwards we received an average of 176 visits monthly (all but June and August were higher than this, up to 265 visits in November).

Furniture

"Earlier this year we were contacted by a support worker looking for help for a family of 2 adults and 11 kids. The family were living in a 3- bedroom house with no working furniture and extremely limited space. We were able to help the family and deliver 4 single beds, 3 double beds, 2 sofa beds and 4 double wardrobes - ensuring every family member had a bed to sleep on, and no one had to sleep on the floor anymore! Thanks to a large furniture donation from local student accommodation, all beds delivered included built-in drawers and storage space - maximising the limited space of the home. The Lord knew what we needed."

In line with the increase in demand seen in our Food Project and Drop-In, we received a high number of furniture referrals for our in-house service throughout the year. From March we paused taking new non-emergency referrals whilst we worked through our waiting list and grew our volunteer teams. In October we re-launched a new emergency referral form for the furniture service which gave clearer guidance regarding how we help and other services available in the city. All guests were means tested to determine whether they were eligible for free or affordable furniture.

Compassion In Action Leicester Limited (CIA)

'Compassion In Action' (company number 10587115) is the trading subsidiary of Open Hands. Through this company Open Hands' Furniture Project partners with Work-Link Project (Hinckley) to form the Leicestershire and Rutland Re-use Network (LRRN). The LRRN outworks a tender for Leicester City Council to provide furniture to recipients of Community Support Grants. Our bid for a new 3-year tender was agreed in 2022. We received a reduction in orders after the new tender began, dropping significantly towards the end of the year. We believe this is due to limited Leicester City Council resources and changes to council work practices. In response to this Open Hands' Furniture Project increased in-house appointment capacity so that community benefit of the project was not impacted.

The charity's social enterprise 6 Degrees Coffee House is also outworked through CIA. All profits are invested into the work of Open Hands.

Skills Courses

"Open Hands is like a family for all of us. I'm very happy to be a part of this big family. As the name suggests, you, our dear teachers in this warm home, have opened your hands and your hearts to us with love and sincerity. And also, you played a significant role in our adaptation period to a new country and culture. You all have a special place in our hearts. The things you have done for us are totally precious.

Open Hands continues to offer free part-time English classes to asylum seekers, refugees and other adults who are in need of language support and community. The project is entirely volunteer led (with the oversight of Open Hands management). In 2022 7 different ability level classes were offered, and 90 students took end of year exams with Open Hands at the end of the 2021/22 academic year.

The Furniture Project trialled relaunching its furniture restoration skills course 'Restore' for the first-time post Covid-19 restrictions. However participant attendance didn't allow for the course to run, and so the course has been suspended until there is an increased demand for the service.

Mentoring

Covid-19 restrictions and ongoing increased need required Open Hands' financial resources and time to be focused largely on emergency service provision in 2020-2022. Thanks to support from The National Lottery Community Funds Awards for All Grants programme, Open Hands will explore mentoring opportunities and launch a pilot mentoring programme in 2023.

Acts of Kindness

In 2022 Open Hands incorporated alternating bi-monthly Emergency donation and Acts of Kindness Appeals into the rhythm of our work. Emergency Appeals helped to fill gaps in our essential donation needs, and Acts of Kindness appeals allowed us to connect with churches and individuals in the community of Leicester to show love beyond meeting practical need. Through these appeals in isolation (external to regular donations received, or donations received outside of our appeal collection dates) the community of Leicester mobilised to donate an additional 2,500 items.

2.Work through Hand in Hand, our preschool

The aim of the charity's preschool Hand in Hand is to provide quality nursery education for children aged 2-4 years in Leicester.

In 2022 Hand in Hand continued to offer good quality nursery education through its two early years settings located at the One Centre in Highfields and the Oak Centre in Braunstone.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees have adopted a reserves policy which requires 3 months of expenditure to be held in unrestricted reserves. This will allow the Charity to continue to operate for a minimal period of time should income reduce. The value of the reserves will be monitored on a regular basis in the light of current giving levels, expenditure and annually as part of the budget process. At the end of 2022 unrestricted reserves were below this amount. It is the intention of the trustees to build into the budget savings to increase the reserves.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by the company's Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

At every annual general meeting, one third of the trustees who are subject to retirement by rotation (longest-serving) shall retire. Appointment of new trustees can be from retiring trustees or individuals showing an interest in the work of the charity, who are willing to serve and have appropriate giftings.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019)', and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

Open Hands Trust (Leicester) is a private company limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 1 of these financial statements.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

Preparation of consolidated financial statements

The financial statements contain information about Open Hands Trust (Leicester) as an individual company and do not contain consolidated financial information as the parent of a group. The charity is exempt under Section 399(2A) of the Companies Act 2006 from requirements to prepare consolidated financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost relating to the category. Where cost cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

It is policy that monies received relating to building and capital projects are transferred to unrestricted funds once the building works and projects have been achieved.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Improvements to property10% on costPlant and machinery25% on costFixtures and fittings25% on costMotor vehicles25% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension Costs and other post retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Debtors and creditors receivable/payable within one year

Debtors and creditors are stated at transaction price.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and cash on deposit.

Investments

The investment in the wholly owned subsidiary, Compassion in Action Leicester Limited, is included at cost.

Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have concidered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.
