Summary of the purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document	Para 1.17	 For the benefit of the public, to relieve the suffering of animals in need of care and attention and in particular, to provide and maintain rescue homes or other facilities for the care and treatment of such animals. To promote humane behaviour towards animals by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for animals which are in need of care or attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage and to educate the public in matters pertaining to animal welfare in general and the prevention of cruelty and suffering among animals.

Our fundraising activities and donations from supporters Summary of the main Para 1.17 and 1.19 (see next sections) have enabled us to carry out our activities in relation to those main objectives ie. to rescue as many unwanted. purposes for the public mistreated and abandoned dogs as possible, give them benefit, in particular, the veterinary treatment where necessary, microchip to activities, projects or prevent future strays, neuter and find them new forever services identified in the homes. accounts. We have continued to offer to take in animals via the dog pounds and from members of the public who could no longer care for their pets. This year we have mainly taken on a number of ex-racing Greyhounds due for retirement from their trainers/owners. Our policy remains to take as many dogs as possible from risk of being put to sleep as we believe they deserve a chance of life. They were given a full vet check, vaccinated, scanned for microchips and if appropriate, given necessary medical treatment. All were either neutered or we provided a free neutering voucher. They were also cared for in kennels or by one of our fosterers until suitable homes could be found. Before rehoming, potential owners were usually subject to a home check to ensure premises were suitable and that gardens were properly fenced and gated. We had to work round this during the Covid-19 pandemic and in most instances vet reference checks were undertaken instead to ensure dogs were being rehomed to responsible owners and we also made use of Google Earth to check on premises. We have continued to adopt this policy as it has proved to be efficient and successful. Individuals were made aware of the commitment needed to care for the lifetime of a dog and assurances sought that dogs wouldn't be allowed to stray, that they wouldn't be left for extended periods without companionship, that booster vaccinations would be administered and that proper diet and exercise would be given. Rehoming of dogs has continued to be exceptionally slow going in 2022/23. This is due to a number of factors - many people got pets during the pandemic and there is therefore less demand; working from home is less prevalent so people have less time to spend with a pet and the cost of living in particular is preventing people from committing to the extra expense of dog ownership. There has certainly been a sharp rise in vet costs and the price of pet food over the last year and we have noticed a marked increase in the number of calls we are getting asking us to take in dogs.

We have continued to help with the rehoming of exracing Greyhounds via the retirement coordinator at a local Greyhound stadium. They are a lovely gentle breed, easy to look after and make great pets. Of the 24 dogs rehomed during the year, 18 were Greyhounds, however, this is considerably less than the number rehomed in previous years. We know that other rescues are in a similar position and as a consequence dogs are staying with us longer and available kennel space is at a premium.

Our Facebook page has continued to flourish and is, in part, responsible for the number of dogs finding homes. Facebook attracts many visitors every week, we get photo's and regular updates on dogs that have been rehomed and is really popular with our supporters.

We have teamed up with the Sighthound Social Club as their nominated charity and have received donations of cash, sardines and miscellaneous dog accessories from their supporters. We joined them for the Great Global Greyhound Walk in September and had a stall/tombola. It was a great success, around 300 dogs turned up with their owners and we look forward to repeating it in 2023. We took the opportunity to also do a joint fundraiser with the group in November last year and took two of our harder to rehome Greyhounds on their Valentines walk in February to promote the breed and to try and find them forever homes. Claire & her mum Cath from the Greyt Yorkshire Walkers (another Sighthound group) are also promoting our cause having both adopted Greyhounds from us and have made regular contributions during the year.

The charity's principal sources of funds (including any fundraising)	Para 1.47	Our fundraising venues finally opened their doors to us following the Coronavirus pandemic and we managed to do several events although we were thwarted by the very hot weather in July 2022 resulting in one of our principal gala's (including a popular dog show) being cancelled. We charge an adoption fee for our dogs but taking account of vet and kennel costs etc, this is heavily subsidised. Kennel costs increased again this year and vet fees have gone up substantially. We are reluctant to put people off adopting by increasing our adoption fees but we will continue to keep this under close review going into the next financial year and we will continue to match intake of dogs with income to live within our
		means. By taking in retired Greyhounds we were able to get some financial help from the owners which went towards some of the costs of rehoming. The Greyhound Board of Great Britain have also provided backing via the Greyhound Retirement Scheme which is very much appreciated.
		Staff at Wilkinson's store in Wombwell have arranged collections of pet food, treats and knitted blankets on our behalf. The donations have been put to very good use for our dogs and we extend sincere thanks to all the staff and customers for their support. Thanks also go to Greenside Podiatry & New Lodge Post Office for filling collection boxes on a regular basis.
		We also received donations from our Trustees and regular contributions from numerous individuals. Our grateful thanks go to them. A special mention goes to Mark (supported by Tania) who did a sponsored ultra marathon last May, raising around £900 for us.
		We received substantial donations during the year from the Pets at Home Foundation and would like to thank all the staff for their continued support and generosity. They donated monies raised during the Santa Paws fundraiser (Give a pet a Christmas dinner) at our partnered stores in Rotherham and Cortonwood. We have also partnered with the Barnsley store in 2023 and look forward to jointly fundraising with them.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023
