- To promote humane behaviour towards the Hungarian Vizsla dog breed by providing appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for this breed of dogs.
- To provide a service to owners of Hungarian Vizslas who are no longer able (for whatever reason) to care for their dog's welfare and for dogs that are in need of care and attention by reason of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage.
- To educate the public in matters pertaining to dog welfare in general

and the prevention of cruelty and suffering amongst all types of dogs.

In exercising their duty, the Charity Trustees have reviewed that all of their activities have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the commission.

We assess all dogs before rehoming and sometimes after evaluation and guidance the dog is able to return to its original owner. We also go through the process of a telephone interview before potential adoptees move onto our official waiting list.

The charity benefits all people who are in need of help with issues surrounding the ownership and wellbeing of the Vizsla dog regardless of their circumstances.

The Trustees ensure that sufficient attention is paid to fund raising activities and cooperation with other breed groups. They continue to monitor grant funding opportunities and manage the charities assets to ensure its sustainability and ability to carry out its charitable objectives. It continues to rely heavily on its volunteers to help foster and rehome Hungarian Vizslas as it has no paid members of staff.

Achievements and performance

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Vizsla Rescue had requests for rehoming of over 240 dogs during this year, of these 85 were rehomed. We also successfully gave guidance to resolve issues and 177 dogs stayed in their homes. Sadly we are being approached by owners of more serious aggressive dogs, which we are struggling in being able to offer our rehoming services due to their complexities, we then try to give further advice and guidance .

We were contacted by 925 people inquiring about adopting a Vizsla and 232 people who were considering rehoming their Vizsla. At the year end there were still 9 dogs in our care and 11 dogs in the process.

We had 34.5k unique visitors for the year on our website with 46k sessions, this is down by around 30% on the previous year. 16% of the users were returning visitors.

Facebook continues to be active and used as our outward-bound communication.

We currently have 434 volunteers on our volunteer map.

We are currently seeing a trend of under 12-month-olds where the owner has not been able to cope – generally first time owners. Another common reason being due to the current economic climate and owners having to go back to work due to the cost of living.

Fund raising via the online shop was down on the previous year but continues to be a good source of income.

During the year some of our Trustees had meetings with the Trustees of Hungarian Vizsla Welfare. The meetings originated due to both organisations getting more and more dogs in with serious issues and not having the resources to deal with these dogs. During the first meeting it soon came to light that when potential owners do the research the websites had misleading descriptions. Between us we came up with a more realistic description which some websites have subsequently changed. Both organisations strongly believe we need to aim at making people realise that the Vizsla is not an easy dog without the necessary training and boundaries.

As demonstrated in our financial accounts, the Charity's principle source of funds comes from fund raising activities and donations. The Vizsla community continues to support the charity through fund raising auctions at "Viz Whizzes" which still provides the main source of income. This is supplemented by our collection of donations from newly rehomed dogs and via our online shop.

Members of Vizsla Rescue attended a number of canine events, for example Crufts and Discover Dogs, to raise wider awareness of the breed and the work that Vizsla Rescue does for the community.

The vast majority of the Charity's expenditure is associated with the wellbeing of the dogs in our care. Veterinary care is our largest expense along with food and medicines.

As a principle methodology, the Charity avoids paying kennel fees wherever possible and uses it's own facilities or those of foster families. This saves £1000's and allows for funds to be utilised on activities that benefit the general public and the dogs that are cared for.

This is the report of the activities of Vizsla Rescue for the calendar year of 2022.

It has been an extremely challenging time for Rescue and Welfare as most of the dogs we are being asked to help have some serious behavioural issues. Some poor souls are so uncontrollable that we cannot handle their complexities, let alone find anyone who can take on their problems. We would love to save every Vizsla but sometimes we can't. We also don't like being in the position where it is down to us to "do the deed" so are finding ourselves saying we can't help more and more.

For the year 2022 we have had 232 official requests for rehoming. (PY = 159) Of these, we rehomed 85 dogs (PY = 60) For 177 (PY = 73). we have been able to give advice and try to guide the owners to work with these dogs, hoping they can remain in their current homes. However, some of these dogs still end up needing help from Rescue to find them new permanent homes. 9 dogs were still in our care at Sylvias and currently Marion is dealing with 8 dogs and I am dealing with 3. The oldest rehome was 11 years old and the youngest was 14 weeks old.

We are currently seeing a trend of under 12 month olds where the owner has not been able to cope – generally first time owners. Another common reason being due to the current economic climate and owners having to go back to work due to the cost of living.

We were contacted by 925 people (PY= 2,393) wanting to be accepted onto our waiting list. This is an average of 3 every day, which is a half of last years average and also considerably lower than Covid lockdown. We are only a small team of volunteers, so sadly we do not have the time nor manpower to contact everyone who applies.

During the year some of our Trustees along with Marion had a few meetings with the Trustees of Hungarian Vizsla Welfare. The meetings originated due to both organisations getting more and more dogs in with serious issues and not having the resources to deal with these dogs. During the first meeting it soon came to light that when potential owners do the research the websites had, in our opinion, incorrect descriptions of the breed and made Vizslas out to be a very easy dog which we all know is incorrect. They can be fantastic family pets but you do have to put a lot of time and effort to get the dog to be comfortable in that environment. After a couple of meetings we came up with some better descriptions which Marion then contacted various websites and some of which have subsequently changed. Both organisations strongly believe we need to aim at making people realise that the Vizsla is not an easy dog without the necessary training and boundaries.

Donations received in 2022 were £36,000 (PY= £23,000) with a further £1,970 (PY= £970) coming from the various Vizsla meetings held throughout the country. We receive a commission from people taking our Agria insurance and this has generated £1,500 in 2022 (PY= £1,400). We spent £12,500 (PY= £16,700) on vet fees and £ 2,700 on food (PY= £2,000). We are thankful to everyone who has donated to Vizsla Rescue be it a monetary contribution or beds, coats and their precious spare time.

We are only a small team and I would like to thank them for their support and help in this ever encroaching on personal time hobby. We also have a number of volunteers who are always so happy to take in dogs and do home checks and assessments – to them the team say a massive thank you. We are always looking for volunteers all over the country so please get in touch if you think you can help us.

It is getting harder year after year and without our helpers and donors we couldn't function.
