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# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2023

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

# Our purposes and activities

The object of Thames Life (CIO) is, for the public benefit, the promotion of urban regeneration in areas of social and economic deprivation. This is focused on the London Borough of Barking & Dagenham, with a specific focus on Thames View and Barking Riverside estates. It is also realised through the following means of:

- a) the relief of poverty or financial hardship.
- b) the advancement of education, training or re-training.
- c) the provision of financial and technical assistance.
- d) the provision of recreational facilities for the public.
- e) the protection of conservation of the environment.

#### **Public benefit**

The Trustees have referred to the Charity Commission's general guldance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's purposes and objectives and in planning its activities for the year. In particular, they have considered how planned activities will contribute to the purposes and objectives detailed above. The trustees are satisfied that the charity meets the Charity Commission's guldelines with regard to delivering public benefit.

# ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Review of the year

2022/2023 has seen Thames Life continue to expand its services and support as a new charity in one of London's most deprived areas. The Trust for London Poverty index highlights the borough as having the highest rates of premature mortality in London alongside a host of other social challenges. The following review is organised around external aspects of our work, including the most significant projects, programmes and activities we are delivering:

- 1. Barking Food Forest we continue to develop a community garden on a site leased from our local developer, Barking Riverside Ltd (BRL) to Riverside School, providing weekly activities during the growing season. Over the summer we partnered with Creative Barking & Dagenham to deliver a range of events under the theme of green social prescribing.
- 2. The River View Newspaper having sourced stories for BRL's resident newspaper, we recruited and support a resident editorial board who oversees all aspects of the production and distribution of the paper, which went to around 6,000 local homes during the year.
- 3. Ripple Nature Reserve we have supported the formation of a resident steering group with the goal of reopening an 8-hectare local site that has been closed since 2018 due to safety concerns. The group has engaged with a range of partners including the council parks department to add our support to efforts made to bring the site back into use.
- 4. Young Citizen Action Group we have continued to hold weekly leadership sessions with students of Riverside School, focusing on their priorities and concerns and working with Citizens UK on wider empowerment for young people around safety and environmental action.
- 5. Sports for Development programmes we co-chair the Barking Sports 4 Change partnership working with a coalition of community groups and funders, notably Laureus Foundation. We have also delivered sports and wellbeing sessions, typically via local groups through funding secured from London Marathon Community Trust and London Sports.
- 6. Locality Lead health outreach we are one of five borough groups who secured health inequality funding to explore new ways of working across the health system. Our focus has been on triage, design groups, prototypes and systems change. We also led on work with OHID on weight management working with local groups who ran a range of events and classes and completed a one-year pilot with LBBD (wellbeing navigators) that recruited and trained 20 residents.
- 7. Resilience and civil contingency we continue to meet weekly with the British Red Cross and supported a local volunteer trainee. Our focus has been on developing partnerships to tackle extreme events proactively building networks of support and assets that can be mobilized as required. This has included mapping the local area, identifying areas of vulnerability and areas of support for example excessive concrete due to housing density is a risk in regard to extreme weather, whereas the Ripple Nature Reserve is a cool space, that provides solace, hence an asset for wellbeing, but also as a relatively wild space.
- 8. Planning Forum we have worked with Planning Aid London, Just Space and UCL Bartlett School of Planning, via monthly meetings, to support residents to understand and influence the planning system, noting the unprecedented growth of housing and wider social infrastructure under way.
- 9. Ripple Effect resident action group we have supported residents to identify issues and priorities they want to address via weekly meetings, as well as building relationships of trust with each other and with wider stakeholders. Priorities have included knife crime, green and blue spaces and safeguarding community buildings.
- 10. Thames Community Hub former Sue Bramley asset activation we have continued as an anchor tenant of this former Sure Start center, to activate the building as part of the council's hub agenda and explored a range of collaborative activities with those using the building.
- 11. Wider Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS) collaboration in addition to partnerships with London Borough of Barking and Dagenham (LBBD), NHS and Barking Riverside Limited (BRL) we play a leading role in BD Collective, a network of networks and also with BD Citizens, a chapter of Citizens UK, ensuring we support wider efforts from residents and local communities.

In addition to these external activities the internal aspects of our work include communications and marketing, including a monthly e-newsletter, updated website and social media posts. Ensuring robust governance via our trustee board meetings. Stakeholder management, which includes regular updates, meetings and collaboration with key partners. Ensuring relevant policies and procedures are in place and updated as appropriate. Finance and bookkeeping, ensuring robust financial control and regular reporting. Impact assessment including monitoring, evaluation and learning from our work and reporting to funders. IT and administration, strategic and business planning and all aspects of HR (human resources) including staff supervision and performance management.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Financial position

Total income for the year was £367,524 (2022: £316,353) of which £363,982 was deemed as restricted funding (2022: £294,108). Total expenditure for the year was £348,520 (2022: £308,643) of which £339,660 was spent on restricted activities (2022: £307,837). Reserves carried forward at 31 March 2023 were £104,657 (2022: £85,653) of which £83,534 were deemed as restricted (2022: £64,214).

#### Reserves policy

As a new organisation we are developing our reserves with a commitment to review the viability of a specified amount of financial reserves to be set aside in June 2023 and which we estimate to be equivalent to six months' operating expenditure.

The charity is able to meet its current working capital regulrements based on the cash flow generated and modest operational surpluses. There are sufficient cash reserves to manage cash flow on a day to day basis

#### Going concern

The trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist even after taking Covid into consideration. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

### **FUTURE PLANS**

We continue to develop our strategic and business plan to reaffirm vision, mission and outcomes and also explore options for long term income streams from the Council, NHS, Barking Riverside Ltd and other grant making bodies, which will help shape the development of our resident-led Community Development Trust (CIO) and provide a strong community anchor organisation for the area.

We will continue to work closely with all strategic partners to ensure residents are at the forefront of local decision making and able to contribute actively to local opportunities and services.

In light of the continued effects of the pandemic the short-term future is challenging for the residents of the area, notably in the impact on health and wellbeing, including mental health and also in regard to the cost of living and Impact on employment. The charity will continue to support those in most need who are directly affected by local development and regeneration, which also offers unprecedented opportunities for local people. We will continue to develop our social enterprise offer, health outreach work and resilience activities to help maximise the economic advantages the development will bring.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing document**

The Charity is controlled by its governing document and constitutes a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO).

Prior to the CIO being established the charity ran as Thames Ward Community Project, this ceased activities on 1 October 2020 and transferred all funds to Thames Life.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Risk management

The trustees have reviewed the major and financial risks that impact on the work of the charlty. The systems that have been established enable the trustees to review and take necessary steps to lessen these risks. The trustees consider the following to be the principal risks that the charity faces:

- Main risk #1: securing funding to maintain core activities. In mitigation trustees review finances at board meetings and monthly executive meetings to ensure strategies and actions are undertaken. Trustees and staff are also proactive in seeking a balanced portfolio of funding sources as a progression from heavy reliance on one single funder, i.e. the Lottery Reaching Communities Programme.
- Main risk #2: turnover of staff and trustees. In mitigation regular support, supervision and one to one meetings are planned with both staff and trustees to ensure good communication, a relational culture and speedy identification of people disengaging. We also seek to broaden and diversify our staff and trustee cohort by reaching out to less represented groups.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2023

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All Income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Income from government and other grants are recognised at fair value when the charity has entitlement after any performance conditions have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. If entitlement is not met then these amounts are deferred.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Expenditure on charitable activities includes those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment - 20% on cost

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

# **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
