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<u>Chairman's Report</u> for the Year Ended 31 December 2022

It is with great pleasure that I present the annual report for The Moorlands Community Charity for the year 2022. As the Chair of the Board, I would like to express my gratitude for your unwavering support, which has allowed us to make a significant impact in the lives of those in need. This report aims to provide an overview of our achievements, financial summary, program highlights, and future plans.

In the past year, The Moorlands Community Charity has accomplished remarkable milestones. Here are some highlights:

- Provided advice, information or support to 5,941 contacts in 2022 on a range of topics, such as, completion of DWP and Personal Independence Payment applications, loneliness & isolation, health matters, emergency food parcels, debt management, support to align utilities payments, and domestic abuse, to name but a few.
- We made a rapid response to food poverty: addressing immediate need by providing food assistance; while also working towards long-term solutions through advocacy, education, and sustainable initiatives. Working through the East Riding Food Poverty Alliance, our collective efforts aim to alleviate hunger, improve food security, and promote equity in access to nutritious food for all.
- By building collaborative partnerships with East Riding Active Towns, Brelms Trust, NHS Health Trainers and Social Prescribers we have continued to deliver a successful weekly Luncheon Club to foster social connections, combat loneliness and improve health. Those involved have created an inclusive and supportive environment where members now run the session, with the support of staff and volunteers. Many have made new friends, share experiences, and now enjoy each other's company outside of the group setting.

I will finish with my heartfelt thank you to our volunteers, who we could not function without. In particular, our longest serving volunteer, Alan Jefferson, who sadly passed away on the 9th January 2023. Alan was a quiet and kind individual who gave so much to the community of Old Goole, and the Centre is not the same without him.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2022

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

To further or benefit the residents of Old Goole and the neighbourhood, without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, race or of political, religious or other opinions by associating together the said residents and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving the conditions of life for the residents.

In furtherance of these objects but not otherwise, the trustees shall have power: To establish or secure the establishment of a community centre and to maintain or manage or co-operate with any statutory authority in the maintenance and management of such a centre for activities promoted by the charity in furtherance of the above objects.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Our programs and initiatives are the backbone of our charity's work. Here are some key programs we implemented in 2022:

Migrant Support Service

Our Migrant Support Service plays a crucial role in assisting individuals and families who have migrated to the UK. In 2022 our Migrant Support Worker, Inga, supported 312 individuals or families. Here are some key benefits of the charity's well-established Migrant Support Service:

- "Integration and orientation
- " Access to essential services
- " Empowerment and skills development
- " Social support and community building
- " Legal and immigration assistance
- " Advocacy and policy influence

Emergency assistance and crisis intervention

This service, being along with several volunteers provided crisis support to five Ukrainian refugee families and 6 individuals, many who arrived with just the clothes on their back. We not only provided practical support, such as clothing, outdoor wear, footwear, toiletries and toys, but also a place to meet and chat about their experiences and with translation, utilising the skills of our Migrant Support Worker.

In summary, the Migrant Support Service provides invaluable assistance to migrants, promoting their integration, well-being, and empowerment. By addressing the unique challenges migrants face, this service contributes to creating more inclusive, cohesive, and welcoming communities.

Meals on Wheels Service

Unfortunately, costs for this service, in particular utilities, wholesale goods and fresh meat started to creep up from September 2022 as the cost-of-living crisis hit us and we had a challenging time keeping this service within the forecasted budget. Trustees met on a more frequent basis to monitor the budgets, and after it became apparent we could no longer sustain this service, the Trustees made the difficult decision to find an alternative provider or close this service down at the end of March 2023. Trustees were acutely aware of the impact this would have on those vulnerable and isolated in our communities so commenced a consultation with partners within HEY Smile Foundation and East Riding of Yorkshire Council to find an alternative way to ensure customers continued to have a warm meal each day. Thankfully we secured Nancy's Larder, a meals-on-wheels service in Hull to take on our routes and they are due to commence April 2023. Unfortunately, this meant the closure of our Community Café as we make plans to transfer catering staff across to the new provider.

The Moorlands Community Charity has delivered a Meals on Wheels service to 4,160 people since 2007 and we are greatly saddened that we cannot continue, however, Nancy's Larder delivers to a larger audience across a larger geographical area so can therefore absorb these rising costs. Our aim is to ensure the charity survives and can carry on providing the range of services offered to this community.

Services for Adults Looking for Friendship or to Support Independence

We continued to provide a Special Friends Home Help & Befriending Service, Wednesday Bingo sessions and working in partnership with other voluntary groups supporting this area, such as Men in Sheds to support adults in the community. We have also supported 274 adults on little or no income with food parcels from the Moorlands Pantry, and 201 with social welfare support, CV writing, employment support, along with furniture and household goods for families, or parents who have children accessing support from ERYC Children's Services and 34 experiencing domestic abuse.

Our Luncheon Club, held every Thursday at Ilkeston Avenue Community Centre, continues to be a huge success. Set up from the premise of a self-directed group, it is supported by one Luncheon Club Coordinator and nine volunteers over 2022. Seventy-eight members attended at least 80% of sessions, with a maximum of 55 each session (the group is so popular there is a constant waiting list). The group consists of mixed gender, including two who identify as transgender, members who have a neuro-diverse or learning disability condition, and many

members who say they feel lonely and do not interact with others socially any other time in the week. Along with their regular weekly meetings, there have been four special events such as, an Afternoon Tea with a live act, a Christmas party, again with an act, Halloween party and Easter Bonnet Extravaganza. Members, including those with disabilities, also chose four trips during the year, to Whitby, Dobbies Garden Centre, Barnsley Market and Glassoughton Freeport.

We also took the opportunity to introduce professionals from other services, such as Nat West to talk about legal matters as we grow older and regular visits from the Health Trainer providing advice and health checks.

Youth Services:

Our Healthy Lifestyle Pathway developed by the young people we engage with focuses on promoting and encouraging healthy lifestyle choices and aims to educate, empower, and support young people in making informed decisions that positively impact their physical, mental, and emotional well-being. Here are some key components and elements that are included in this Healthy Lifestyle Pathway:

- "Physical activity
- " Nutrition and healthy eating
- " Mental health and emotional well-being
- "Substance abuse prevention
- " Sexual and reproductive Health
- " Sleep hygiene
- " Stress management and resilience building
- " Health education and life skills
- " Peer support and mentoring
- " Community engagement and volunteering

This Pathway provides a comprehensive and holistic approach to promoting a healthy lifestyle and supports young people in becoming active participants in their own well-being. Over the past year we have provided a wide variety of groups activities, individual support, campaigns and advocacy when engaging with the 471 participants, and their families, who have meaningfully interacted in this strong community orientated service on more than 15 occasions.

Foodbank - a growing concern

We have seen a startling growth in demand for food parcels from our food bank, Moorlands Pantry, outstripping our access to resources to replenish our shelves. There was an average weekly growth of 15-20% in referrals towards winter 2022. This required, not just food, but people resource, volunteers and co-ordination in gaining funding, accessing food sources and ensuring we provided appropriate support alongside the food itself. We have free daily freshbakery, fruits and vegetables food donations from the Co-Op, Morrison's, Tesco, Sainsburys, Aldi, and Lidl.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

As the cost-of-living crisis deepens and we head towards a possible recession, generating income and finding financial stability is our main challenge, whilst those that depend on our service increases. This is compounded as donors, and grant givers are finding it harder to contribute to our cause, whether they are individuals, Trust Funds, companies or local fund-raising initiatives.

We have struggled with increased cost of utilities for the Community Centre, as well as managing wage increases and higher prices of stock, supplies and equipment. This may result in the loss of a vital service to the most vulnerable in our society, so we are working hard with East Riding of Yorkshire Council, and HEY Smile Foundation to review our financial situation and reprofiling of our services on an ongoing basis.

We are truly a community led, responsive small charity, who rely on the generosity of volunteers and a small staff group, to provide an outstanding service with exceptional support to individuals and families.

Reserves policy

Chair of Trustees Report

As the 2021 accounts state, the financial position for The Moorlands Community Charity has risen 19% from 2020. Thanks to The National Lottery, we have secured £25,000 for our reserves, contributing to the aim of £75,000 total reserve security. We secured a three year The National Lottery funding to contribute to our Adult Services in January 2021 which has given us the opportunity to work towards our service priorities.

FUTURE PLANS

Looking ahead, we have ambitious plans to continue expanding our impact and serving those in need. Our key future plans include an exciting new build Community Hub in the heart of Old Goole.

Over the past three years we have continuously consulted with residents, the Board of Trustees, staff, volunteers, children and young people, older people, people with additional needs, residents from of our migrant community, and our strategic partners to design a brand-new, purpose built Community Hub.

The Charity has a piece of land (corner of Swinefleet Road/Humber Street, Old Goole), gifted by Wilcocks Contractors Ltd, an established local builder's firm, which has been designated for commercial/community use by ERYC. A purpose-built Community Hub in a public location will allow residents to come together to enjoy group activities, social support, public information and many other purposes that will with enrich the lives of residents:

- Raise the economic aspirations for the community
- Promote community cohesion
- Positively impact the lives of young people
- Promote healthy living
- Encourage creativity & culture
- Share valuable information
- Offer educational/training opportunities
- Promote community safety
- Provide volunteer opportunities and work/educational placements

The Hub will be a beacon of inclusivity for all members of the community and continues to evolve as funds are secured and planning permission is granted. Architect, Nula Roarty of NU Architects, commissioned to design the Hub, has worked tirelessly with all partners this year.

However, whilst we continue with these ambitious plans, we are also looking at our services and what the community have asked of us. So, in 2023, with approval to reprofile our main fund from The National Lottery, we will develop:

- An International Friendship Group
- Intergenerational Craft Group
- Redesigning the lower floor of the Community Centre so it is more welcoming and user friendly
- An Us Boys Group
- An additional Luncheon Club, in Old Goole to meet demand
- Refurbish the Charity's IT Suite

The Moorlands Community Centre provides other services on a needs-led basis, including a low cost printing service, information and referral on to specialised services.

2023 will also be a challenging year as the Charity itself grapples with the cost-of-living crisis, whilst meeting the increase of individuals and families seeking information, advice and support to meet their needs in this uncertain time.

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The charity trustees:

- (i) May require applications for membership to be made in any reasonable way that they decide;
- (ii) May refuse an application for membership if they believe that it is the best interests of the ClO for them to do so.
- (iii) Shall, if they decide to refuse an application for membership, give the applicant their reasons for doing so, within 21 days of the decision being taken, and give the applicant the opportunity to appeal against the refusal; and shall give fair consideration to any such appeal, and shall inform the applicant of their decision, but any decision to confirm refusal of the application for membership shall be final.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 33% on cost Short leasehold - 20% on cost

Fixtures and fittings - 20% on reducing balance

Motor vehicles - 25% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
