#### STRUCTURE AND OBJECTS

The Association is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (COI). The registration of the CIO is charity number 1176277. The registered address of the association is 2 Dignum Street London N1 0FJ.

The objects of the Association are to maintain and manage an open space in the borough of Islington for the benefits of its members and local residents.

The site is held on a 50 year lease at a peppercorn rent from the London Borough of Islington; and registered as a Field in Trust.

In planning our activities for the year we kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit at our Management Committee meetings.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Seen as a model of good practice for many years, Culpeper Community Garden, established in 1982, continues to be a source of inspiration, pleasure and relaxation for members, volunteers and visitors alike. Our relatively small open space in inner London is run by members and volunteers on sustainable, organic principles.

It includes 46 plots cared for by local people without their own gardens, plots for supported community groups, and communal areas, including a pond, a wildlife area, lawns, a dry garden, a rose pergola; and a 'tea hut' for members. We have a small community building used regularly as a classroom, a meeting room for community groups, and available for rent to our members for birthday parties and weddings.

The day-to-day management of the Garden is run by 2 part-time members of staff, Mandy Graham and Anna

# Review of the year 2022/2023

At the start of the year, we had a full and varied programme of activities here at Culpeper.

We had secured funding from Garfield Weston Foundation for one year to employ a resident Artist who ran a drop-in Arts Group on Monday afternoons, and a Craft afternoon on Thursdays. Further funding from Groundwork enabled us to build a new Insect Hotel in Culpeper Park.

Our Plant a Rainbow project, funded by D'Oyly Carte, saw a new Plot planted up with annual flowers which we used to make natural dyes. The project ran successfully on Wednesday mornings throughout the Summer; and the Plot has been conserved for future Projects.

Our twice weekly open volunteering sessions continued to be popular: we are able to provide meaningful and practical gardening tasks for all levels of skill, and everyone is welcome to attend. Volunteers also attended the 37 free Events we provided over the year which were open to the whole community. They helped out with private bookings, plant sales, and leading guided tours, and joined us on supported visits and, at the request of Islington Parks department, they planted up and maintained six on-street planters adjacent to the Garden in Dewey Road, and continued to improve the condition of the adjacent Park.

Our exploitation of the Garden's potential for hosting community activities continues to grow. We provided a fabulous venue for the Nest Collective, who held six Campfire Clubs here, including a wonderful solo performance by Martin Carthy. We enabled the Bread & Song Project, Cubitt Arts, the Claremont Project, Everyones' Music Jam and Singalong Choir to use the Garden for their events. We also enabled more than 30 Private Hires of the Garden for Birthday Parties, Weddings and other events throughout the year. such as Emily Thornberry MP's annual party.

# Highlights of 2022/2023

We provided a wide range of free events for our members and the wider community including:

- Members' visits to Kew Gardens, the British Museum as part of their Community Outreach Scheme; the William Morris Gallery, the Farms & Gardens Harvest festival, Freightliners Farm and The Calthorpe Project
- A Garden Open Day as part of London Open Garden Squares Weekend
- The May Plant Sale: a grand affair, with a Gardening Book sale, Arts & Crafts and a fantastic selection of homemade cakes, raising a record £1,000 for the Garden
- Summer and Winter Solstice Barbecues
- A Strawberry Tea for 120 local Pensioners, with strawberries donated by Dave & Pam from Chapel Market
- Our annual Halloween Party; including pumpkin carving, magic wands, face painting and apple bobbing, was attended by over 30 local young children and their carers
- Hosting a Private View for Ifti, a young disabled artist. We displayed his canvases around the Garden, and he sold the majority of his work, to his delight
- Card & Wreath making workshops; inviting new participants from the Islington Carers Group

- A two week Summer Play scheme using the HAF funding administered by Islington Council to provide activities and a healthy lunch and snacks for up to 20 young children per day who had additional needs
- A celebration of Diwali, the Indian festival of Light. All our regular Groups participated, painting jars and foil containers to light up the Garden
- We were awarded a Level 5 'Outstanding' from the RHS' It's Your Neighbourhood, and an Our Space Award from the Groundwork Trust

# **Working with Schools**

Our Environmental Education programme was accessed by five local primary schools this year; bringing over 400 children into the Garden for hands-on activities looking at seasonal variation, soil invertebrates, frog life cycles and plant growth.

# **Working with Partners**

The Elfrida Gardeners Group, Culpeper Crafts & Walking Group are predominantly comprised of adults with learning difficulties and poor mental health. Elfrida Gardeners is a much-valued regular session on a Wednesday afternoon throughout the year. On Thursday afternoons we organise regular weekly sessions of a mixture of arts & crafts and supported walks to local parks, museums and community gardens & farms.

Room to Heal is an Islington-based Charity which works with asylum seekers and refugees across London. Communal Cooking continued very successfully this year; with a small hiatus due to ensuring our compliance with Food Hygiene legislation (our Community Room was up-graded and storage improved). The Group held a beautiful Summer Party where members performed their own musical numbers and dancing to music from Sierre Leone.

#### **GOVERNANCE**

During this busy year a committed Management Committee directed the work of the Garden and staff. The Committee is elected annually by the members and is responsible for the governance and management of the Garden.

Early in the year, the Trustees had to terminate the membership of two plot holders, the first time this had happened in our 40 year history. Unfortunately their behaviour was so extreme that there was no alternative. This has led us to refine our membership policy, and review some of our procedures and our Code of Conduct.

# **FINANCES**

Our finances remain sound. Our main charitable funding for our activities, including environmental education, came from the Cripplegate Foundation, City Bridge Trust, Islington Council, the Estate of the late Christine Moyse, and our neighbours, CTO Lighting. Funding for specific projects came from Community Chest, Groundwork, D'Oyly Carte and Tesco Giving. Other income came from members' subscriptions and donations, plant sales and from lettings of the Resource Centre and Garden.

Recent events in the charitable sector have shown how important it is that we continue to hold reserves equivalent to approximately six months of our running costs. In the event of reduced income in the future, this would enable us to run a basic service in the garden, while we sought future funding. It would also mean that we could meet our responsibilities to our staff if we needed to terminate their contracts.
