Trustees' Annual Report for the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023

Objectives and activities

The charitable purposes are as set out in the constitution, to advance education and, in particular, the education of people not in full time gainful employment who are in their third age (being the period of time after the first age of childhood dependence and the second age of full-time employment and / or parental responsibility) residing in Haslemere and its surrounding locality.

Public benefit

The trustees consider their activities operate in the public benefit, in accordance with the duty imposed by section 4 of the 2006 Charities Act. The trustees have also had regard to the guidance on public benefit published by The Charities Commission.

Achievements

The word normal is an attractive choice to describe our activities this year with healthy numbers, flourishing groups, and well attended speaker meetings. There have also been social events including a coffee morning for new members, a Christmas party and a Group Leaders' party in the summer. We have also attended local events, keeping The Haslemere u3a in the public eye.

As described last year we have produced an updated trifold flyer which has been widely distributed. An energetic campaign has resulted in The Haslemere u3a's presence in local media being well marked. Internally the Newsletter has been a colourful and informative adjunct to our activities.

The membership has continued to grow but there is still scope for more participation by new group leaders and playing a part in running the organisation. A welcome innovation is the occasional Basic Life Support course, which is popular and potentially lifesaving.

Quizzes have been a welcome growth area with not only several of our own including at the Christmas party, but also an inaugural inter-u3a one, to be repeated shortly. We are lucky to have an energetic in-house quizmaster.

Excursions, too, have been a popular and lively area. Shortly, these will be run under a new Excursions Secretary and will continue as an important part of Haslemere u3a.

There remains scope for further expansion of Haslemere u3a in membership, groups and other activities. The best recruiter is an enthusiastic existing member.

Structure, governance and management

The Haslemere U3A is an unincorporated association. Its governing document is the constitution adopted at the annual general meeting (AGM) on 14 November 2005 as amended at the AGMs on 14 November 2016 and 8 November 2021.

New charity trustees are elected by members according to the constitution.

None of the trustees receive any remuneration for their services. There are no employees. Trustees meet regularly, around twelve times a year. Trustees incurring necessary expenses are reimbursed.

Financial review

Self-financed activities and membership fees

Most activities are carried out by self-financed interest groups and other social events.

Membership fees are used to meet the costs of belonging to the u3a movement and other overheads.

2022/23 saw a rise in membership fees received because of a higher number of members and an increased annual membership fee of £10 for 2023/24 (£6, 2022/23).

There was a cash surplus in 2022/23 of £1,864 (-£5,190, 2021/22).

Assets including reserves

The charity had assets of £31,207 at the end of the 2022/23 year (£29,074, 2021/22). None of its reserves are restricted.

Reserves have been used to finance deficits in recent years with the aim of reducing reserves to an appropriate level.

The investment policy of the trustees is to hold reserves in a mixture of a deposit account and an equity investment fund.

Going concern

The accounts are prepared on a going concern basis as:

- fees for group activities and other events are charged to break even,
- · the annual membership fee can be adjusted to cover overheads, and
- · reserves are sufficient to cover any cash flow deficits.

Accounting policies

The financial statement is prepared on a receipts and payments (or cash) basis. The holding in the COIF Global Equity Income Fund is valued at the mid market price

Trustees' responsibilities for the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies above and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and the "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard" for Smaller Entities published in October 2019.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

I report on the Financial Statements for the period ended 31 August 2023 which are set out on pages 4 and 5.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act). At the request of the Trustees, I have conducted an independent examination.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act
- follow the procedures laid down in the general directions given by the commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act
- state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiner's Report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeking explanations from you as Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the next statement.

Treasurer's report for year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023

Receipts and payments

The financial statement is prepared on a receipts and payments (cash) basis. It shows amounts received and payments made during the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023. Some receipts and payments will relate to an earlier or later membership year.

Assets and liabilities

The charity's assets increased by £2,133 from £29,074 at 31 August 2022 to £31,207 at 31 August 2023.

The investment policy is to hold reserves in a mixture of a deposit account and an equity investment fund. Reserves were maintained at £23,868 (£23,754 in 2021/2022).

Self-financed activities

The Haslemere u3a's activities are mainly carried out by self-financed interest groups and through other self-financed social events. The financial statement shows fees received from group leaders and other event organisers and the relevant expenses, such as room hire, paid from these receipts.

Membership fees

Each member of The Haslemere u3a pays an annual membership fee, which was £6 for the 2022/2023 membership year (1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023). This fee goes towards the costs of belonging to the u3a movement and other overheads, including speaker meetings. Gift Aid is no longer made available on membership fees to allow benefits in excess of the limits under Gift Aid.

Since 2018 reserves have been used to meet some costs, with the aim of reducing the overall level of reserves. Instead of an anticipated deficit of around £3,500 for 2022/2023 there is a surplus of £1,864. One reason is that payment for the annual Third Age Trust magazine for 2022/2023 (£1,386.90) was made in the previous financial year. The other main reason is the receipt in August 2023 of membership fees for 2023/2024 at a higher rate and from more members. The annual membership fee for the 2023/2024 membership year is set at £10 with a view, when originally calculated, to reducing the use of reserves to about £1,000.

Summary

The surplus for 2022/2023 is £1,864 and reserves have increased by £114. A larger number of members paying a higher annual membership fee ahead of the start of the new membership year has helped avoid both the anticipated deficit and a reduction in reserves in 2022/2023.

We have around 700 members, a good recovery from the early years of the 2020s.

The website has continued as a popular and important resource of Haslemere u3a. Our Webmaster, Nic Monks, is to be congratulated for the calm and authoritative way that he dealt with the outage that effected all u3a branches early in the year. Further developments are in the pipeline.

Apart from group activities, there have been a number of events, notably regular quizzes, presided over by Colin Sherlock and his team of supporters. An inter-u3a quiz has also been initiated by us.

Our speaker talks have presented a variety of informative and entertaining talks supplemented by short presentations from our own groups including books and ukulele.

The Committee, as well as Group Leaders, continue sterling work in the background, ensuring the smooth running of Haslemere u3a. A few deserve special mention: Lorna Wright is relinquishing the post of Groups Coordinator after long and excellent service; Mandy Blanks, also retiring, has been an exemplary Secretary; not on the Committee, but leaving the post of Excursions Secretary after a long stint is Don Stacey. The Treasurer, Liz Nuttall, has also resigned.

I look forward to the year ahead.
