#### Objectives and activities

#### Summary of the purposes of the charity set out in its governing document

To relieve poverty, hardship or distress through the provision of food to people in need of emergency supplies in York and the surrounding area and by such other means as the trustees may determine.

# Summary of the main activities in relation to those purposes for the public benefit, in particular, the activities, projects or services identified in the accounts

The collecting of donated food by members of the public, the training of care professionals in giving out emergency food vouchers, the supporting of local churches (Gateway Church, Living Word Church, York Community Church, York City Church, Vineyard Church, Clifton Parish and St Joseph's) who run Foodbank sessions where vouchers can be redeemed for three days' worth of food. We continued with a reduced emergency delivery service to ensure food provision for those who could not access Foodbank sessions, and the ongoing development of a Community Advice Service in partnership with Peasholme charity and Citizens Advice York to support Foodbank clients. York Foodbank continues to depend predominently upon the work of a dedicated team of approximmately 140 volunteers who give their time to help local people in need.

The trustees consider that they have complied with their duties to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

#### Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity, identifying the difference the charity's work has made to the circumstances of its beneficiaries and any wider benefits to society as a whole.

This year our service and sessions saw an increase in demand associated with the Cost of Living Crisis. Across the '22-'23 financial year York Foodbank received and distributed 82,181kg of donated food with estimated total value of £194,768 (based on a standard Trussell Trust conversion value of £2.37/kg). Almost all of this was distributed to local people through the fulfilment of 3,428 vouchers representing 5,431 adults and 4,092 children (9,523 individuals in total). This represented a dramatic increase of 64.2% in vouchers fulfilled in comparison with financial year '21-'22, and 98.2% more than the last complete financial year which was unaffected by the Covid-19 Pandemic ('18-'19).

Our new Distribution Point at Clifton Moor Community Church completed a 6 month trial before relocating into St Joseph's Church Hall in the Kingsway North area of Clifton, closer to a known area of relative deprivation. We also opened a sixth Distribution Point location in partnership with Vineyard church on 6th September 2022, serving the south side of the city of York and ensuring a Foodbank opening in York for each day of the week covering Monday-Saturday. In December 2022, the new Vineyard opening would play a role in assisting newly arrived asylum seekers who were accommodated in a nearby hotel, and Vineyard were able combine to their foodbank opening with a drop in provision offered by Refugee Action York. York Foodbank continued to offer a Volunteer Collection ("Delivery") option to those unable to access these sessions for physical or mental health reasons, as recognised by our referral agency partners, delivering 304 packages.

A generous Financial Inclusion Grant provided by the Trussell Trust funded a substantial increase in the advice services delivered within York Foodbank Distribution Points. This ensured that the Community Advice Service delivered by Peasholme Charity could be expanded to 30 hours per week with their drop-in generalist advice service covering 4 Foodbank DP locations. The new service launched in July '22 and in the intervening period to the FYE Peasholme Charity reported supporting 299 people with 172 receiving intensive support, and 32 either prevented from becoming homeless or securing accommodation. Peasholme Charity's service also achieved 'expected' financial gains amounting to £79,783 for clients.

The same grant also facilitated the launch of a new complimentary advice service in July '22 amounting to 30 hours per week provided by Citizens Advice York, including 8 hours of appointment time per week located within 4 Foodbank DP locations (CAY over-delivered 12 hours/week of appointment time from October 2022 to the FYE). CAY reported that 234 people benefitted from appointments, and their interventions achieved a further £82,991 in 'expected' financial gains with £95,279 of client debt managed, including £73,161 in debt written off.

During the '22-'23 Financial Year our Taste and See Gift Card scheme afforded 7100 clients the dignity of purchasing £35,500 of food items of their choice from participating local shops (all Coop stores), giving them access to fresh and frozen food items which the Foodbank cannot provide directly. Suitable controls in place with the participating shops ensured that the provision was strictly for food items only. York Foodbank also contributed £12,720 to facilitate services for people in poverty, partnering with local churches running Christians Against Poverty services, and operated a Grant Fund initiative which distributed £72,204 to local charities and funded projects aligned with our charitable aims to alleviate poverty, hardship and distress. The objectives of these projects included developing long term resilience against the need for emergency food and providing access to relevant advice and support.

# Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period

York Foodbank continues to receive substantial public and corporate giving, notably with individual giving increasing substantially by 29% compared with 2021-22 in addition to the receipt of a substantial Trussell Trust Financial Inclusion grant. The outcome was to change a planned budget deficit for the year into a £120,084 increase in our unrestricted funds available at our FYE. This is in addition to us holding a 16,178kg of food stocks at the FYE (estimated value £38,341 based on £2.37/kg). As was the case in 2020-21, this means that York Foodbank will be able to develop a number of initiatives in accordance with our charitable objectives which will be included in next year's report.

# Statement explaining the policy for holding reserves stating why they are held

The trustees of York Foodbank had previously set an aim to have at least 3 months running costs in reserve. However, due to the unknown nature of future demand, the trustees desire to maintain a reserve of the equivalent of around 12 months running costs. With allowances for inflation, increased energy costs and recent increases in Foodbank referrals, this total is currently estimated to be £150,000. A further £35,000 may be retained and ring-fenced to safeguard food stocks in the event of reduced food dontaitons or an unexpected increase in need. York Foodbank reserves continue to exceed this total at the present time which will permit further consideration of initiatives which will provide long term benefit to local people experiencing poverty, hardship or distress in and around York, and/or emergency provisions which will offset the wider impact of the increased cost of living for Foodbank clients.

#### 1 Basis of preparation

#### 1.1 Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and with the Charities Act 2011.

#### 1.2 Change to previous accounts

The prior year accounts have been restated to transition from receipts and payments to accruals accounts format. This is due to the income of the charity breaching £250,000 in the current financial year such that accruals accounting became mandated for the charity.

#### 2 Accounting policies

#### Income and endowments

#### Recognition of income

Income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when:

- the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- receipt is probable; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

#### Income with related expenditure

Where income has related expenditure, the income and related expenditure are reported gross in the SoFA.

#### **Grants and donations**

Grants and donations are only included in the SoFA when the charity has evidence of entitlement to the resources and receipt is probable.

#### Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

#### **Expenditure and Liabilities**

#### **Expenditure**

#### Charitable activities

Charitable activities expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

#### **Assets**

#### Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year and cost at least £100. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt, less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided at rates to write off the costs less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds are funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
