Beavers have enjoyed tubing at Silksworth Ski slope, participated in Durham Scouts 'Big Day Out' picnic, had a sleep-over in our hall, and celebrated the Queen's Jubilee with a party alongside the cubs. The cubs also enjoyed hikes through Herrington Country Park, participating in Durham Scouts Cubboree, a stay and sleep over at Beamish Museum along with the scouts and had a fun filled weekend at Whit camp. The scout section also had a great time at Whit camp and also held a very successful week long summer camp at Lake Bassenthwaite. During their camp they experienced 'Go Ape' at Grizedale Forest, climbed at Keswick indoor wall, went ghyll scrambling and had fun with 'The Crystal Maze wide game'. Closer to home the scout section has skied at Silksworth and rowed down the River Wear in a dragon boat. They have also participated in several events organised at District and Countyl level including an incident hike and camp at Kielder Forest and Confido. The Trustee Board has gained members with useful skills and experience. The group has secured investment and initiated projects to improve the HQ facilities for those within scouting as well as for other community groups. The group has ensured a stable financial footing for the coming year through careful financial management and the efforts of the fundraising team.

Injury to leaders, helpers, supporters and members. The Group through the capitation fees contributes to the Scout Associations national accident insurance policy. Risk Assessments are undertaken before all activities.

Reduced income from fund raising. The Group is primarily reliant upon income from subscriptions and fundraising. The group does hold a reserve to ensure the continuity of activities should there be a major reduction in income. The Trustee Board could raise the value of subscriptions to increase the income to the group on an ongoing basis, either temporarily or permanently.

Reduction or loss of leaders. The group is totally reliant upon volunteers to run and administer the activities of the group. If there was a reduction in the number of leaders to an unacceptable level in a particular section or the group as a whole then there would have to be a contraction, consolidation or closure of a section.
