The Charity was started to support and develop the villages around Makhalgacha, District 24 North Parganas, West Bengal, India. The charity does this by providing:

Food, Housing, Medical treatment, Empowerment, Clean Water, Education, Family Support. community development.

In the past year the charity has continued in various projects which the trustees ensure are for the public benefit as highlighted in the guidance of the Charity Commission. The charity does this by working with volunteers whom we have worked with for several years and by going on location to West Bengal. These are the following projects which we carried out.

Food Distribution Project

This very worthy project involves providing vital food packs for the most vulnerable members of the community. People who have no income or family support. Specifically, widows, orphans and those with low income or none.

The food pack provides vital nutrition to the most needy.

Empowerment Project

This project involves assisting members of the community who are able to use a rickshaw or a sewing machine but are not able to financially purchase one. The charity provides Rickshaws or sewing machines to these people which empowers them to earn a living.

Water Pump Project

Unfortunately, in this area of India. Clean drinking water is not available to many in the community. The charity identifies areas which are the most needy and installs manual and motorised water pumps. These provide clean water which enables members of the community to use for drinking, cleaning dishes and bathing.

Education Project

This vital project involves assisting children in the community with a good foundation to enable them to grow as individuals and help the community to develop in the future. Financing and supporting their education ensures the community has a better and brighter future and removes the cycle of dependency and hopelessness.

Community Building Construction Project

This very worthy project assists the community by providing support in building and maintenance of infrastructure of places of worship and education institution. This enables the community to have a worthy place of worship. Education institutions ensure that future generations have the right skills and knowledge to progress and become independent.

Disability Support Project

The need to support many disabled members of the community is extremely important. This project provides wheelchairs to many individuals who are not able to afford them. This year nearly a hundred wheelchairs were provided. The wheelchairs have hand pedals which would allow the individuals to be mobile and less dependent.

Eyecare Project

There are many people with eye related illnesses and do not have the financial means to get treatment. This projects supports such people and helps them get treated and improve their lives.

Small Business Grants Project

Many individuals are in need of support throughout West Bengal, India. As part of our objectives to remove the cycle of dependency. This project empowers those with an entrepreneurial spirit to start a business. We provide a small business grant to start their business and empower them to earn their own living and also provide a product or service to the local community. Many individuals have benefitted from the project already. We will continue as there is a great need to empower many more individuals.

Medical Centre

This centre provides treatment for minor ailments for people who cannot afford to pay for it.

All Projects are overseen by the trustees to ensure the donations are used in the right, most effective and beneficial way.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

We are very pleased to say in the past year, once again the charity has continued to provide food packs to hundreds of families in the Villages in and around Makhalgacha, West Bengal, India throughout the year. These packs include rice, lentils and oil. During Ramadhan extra items such as tea, sugar and besan flour were given to ensure they have a happy Ramadhaan. This is a vital and worthy project which is frequently carried out by the charity. It ensures the most vulnerable members of the community do not go without vital food.

The charity supported several members of the community by providing them with a Rickshaw or a Sewing machine which empowered them to earn a living and also to provide a service to the community. Another empowerment project is to provide a small business grant to individuals who have an entrepreneurial passion. This allows to them to provide a product and service to the local community and remove the cycle of dependency at the same time. All the empowerment projects are very worthwhile and reflect the aim of the charity to facilitate the development of the community and remove the cycle of dependency.

Another great achievement of the charity was to provide the community with several new water pumps. Each pump enabling 10 families to have access to clean water to enable them to drink, clean dishes and bathe with. Many hundreds of families have benefitted in the past year because of this vital project.

The charity continued to assist the community by supporting projects to maintain and build places of worship. These are of great importance to the community. Projects where a building is in a state of disrepair and there is a need of financial assistance. This project ensures the community has a place where they can reflect, find peace and comfort.

The charity also distributed blankets and scarves in the winter months. Many vulnerable members of the community do not have essential winter items such as blankets and scarves to help them in the cold winter months. This project enabled us to support the most vulnerable members of the community with essential items to protect them in the cold winter months.

Our housing project continued to improve the standard of living for many who lived in makeshift housing.

Our disability project provided more individuals with pedal wheelchairs. These gave them greater independence and will enable them to have a better quality of life.

This year we provided Eyecare treatment to many who could not afford to pay for it. This project allowed many to see once again and remove discomfort. This project will be continued as many are in need of treatment.

Our medical centre continues to provide treatment for minor ailments for those who cannot afford to get treated.

1. PRINCIPLE ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Companies Act 2006, and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005).

Company and charitable status

West Bengal Charity Foundation is a Registered charity by guarantee. The guarantors are the Trustees. The liability of this guarantee, as set out in the memorandum, is limited to a sum not exceeding £10 per trustee. The Charity registration number is 1148801.

Incoming resources

Investment income

Investment income relates to interest and is included when receivable.

Donations

Donations received are treated as income in the year in which they are received. Donations subject to specific wishes of the donors are treated as restricted funds.

Resources expended

Resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write down cost of tangible fixed assets less estimated residual values by equal annual instalments over their expected useful lives. The rate applicable is:

Freehold land and buildings: 50 years

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are incoming resources received or generated for expenditure on the general objective of the Charity.

Taxation

The Company, as a registered charity, enjoys the tax advantages commensurate with that status.

Trustee remuneration and related party transactions

No trustees received any remuneration during the year. No trustee or other person related to the charity had any personal interest in any contract or transaction entered into by the charity during the year.
