TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's memorandum and articles of association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Charity overview

Established in 2005, Newcastle Rugby Foundation (reg. 1107851) (NRF) is the official charity of Newcastle Falcons and Newcastle Thunder professional rugby teams. The charity comprises of two sections, Falcons Community and Thunder Community.

Each year we work with 15,000+ people in the North East and Cumbria in some of the most deprived communities to activate positive change.

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects ("the objects") are for the benefit of the public generally and, in particular, the inhabitants of the North East and Cumbria and their surrounding areas:

- to promote community participation in healthy recreation by providing facilities for the playing of rugby union, rugby league and other sports ("facilities" means land, buildings, equipment and organising sporting activities);
- to provide and assist in providing facilities for sport, recreation or other leisure time occupation of such
 persons who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, age, ethnicity, infirmity or disablement,
 poverty or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and
 with the objective of improving their conditions of life; and
- to advance the education of children and young people through such means as the trustees think fit in accordance with the law of charity.

The main objectives of the year continued to focus on the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation through the advancement of the education of children and young people.

The strategies employed to assist the charity to meet these objectives included the following:

- · Provide a wider range of activities in addition to rugby union and rugby league;
- Providing additional coaching to young people in the wider geographical area of the North East and Cumbria;
- Increase social inclusion and educational activities;
- Delivering a range of activities to the community that offer the opportunity for them to have a healthler lifestyle;
- · Using professional rugby players as excellent role models;

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance Issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

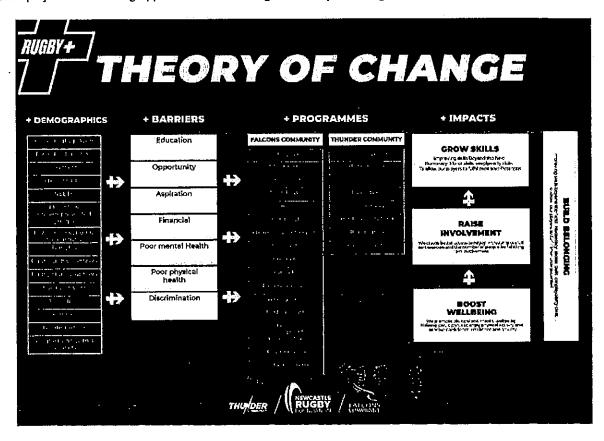

The RUGBY+ theory of change gives NRF a framework on which to build the programmes for each year which are reviewed on a quarterly basis. NRF started to invest in data systems in this financial year (2023/2024) to give NRF staff a better platform to understand the outcomes achieved by participants to enable better understanding to shape future projects and funding opportunities and testing our Theory of Change.

RUGBY+ Community Programme Strategy

This financial year (2022/2023) saw the formal launch of our Rugby+ Strategy on 10th November 2022 at Kingston Park. Hosted by Jill Douglas with guests including Trustees, Tony Underwood, Semore Kurdi, Chris Thorman, Business leaders, supporters, and programme participants. The event aimed to introduce our new Theory of Change themes, impact measurements and demonstrate to our community the work NRF have undertaken to date, as well as looking forward to what the future holds for our charity.

This season has seen a refinement of our projects to ensure we have a balanced approach to the demographics we serve. The delivery of all programmes is reviewed against the key impact drivers to understand if the delivery is addressing barriers so that the programme can be adapted or changed to ensure the delivery;

- 1. Prioritises Boosting Wellbeing to ensure the demographics we engage overcome their barriers;
- 2. The range of demographics are engaged and challenged at an appropriate level;
- 3. Raises involvement and grows skills to ensure progression opportunities are realised.

The review/ appraisal of the programme also considers these other factors;

- · Local and national priorities and needs
- Balanced against wider Foundation projects
- · Barriers are addressed
- Ensure the demographics are targeted within our communities
- · Data and insights both internally and externally
- Delivery staff are suitably resourced and they have the appropriate training and skills
- · Partnership working opportunities

Achievements and performance

This year NRF have delivered 23 different projects, reaching 14,727 individuals.

Following our strategy review, this year saw the launch of several new projects to address gaps in our provision;

- 1. Tackling Insights with Sage Foundation an innovative project to utilize the Women's 6 Nations game taking place at Kingston Park in 25.3.23 as an inspiration for KS2 pupils to engage in STEM activities relating to the smartable technology and data interpretation techniques employed by Sage and 6 Nations. This project saw over 666 pupils from deprived areas engaged in activities with fantastic outcomes; for example, new female players joining grassroots rugby clubs, 26% increase in confidence levels in STEM curriculum skills, 31% improvement in physical/mental wellbeing, 33% improvement in confidence.
- Thunder Community Women's Project with the RFL a project to encourage more female players to
 participate in rugby league which was supported by Rugbees and Futures project also supported by the
 RFL, the NRF were able to stage several women's fixtures against other local teams for the first time in our
 history.
- 3. Walking Rugby with Gallagher a new project to support the return and/or introduction of people over 50 to take part in physical activity at their local rugby clubs following the break from covid. Five hubs were identified and teams from a variety of backgrounds to enjoy a social way to return to activity. The frequency of physical activity by the participants increased by 43%. With a 31% increase in participants' mental well-being and a 90% increase in their confidence since the beginning of the programme.
- Try for Change with Ministry of Justice a new pilot project working with young offenders and those at risk of offending.

Existing projects have also developed over this period.

Hitz

The HITZ programme is Newcastle Rugby Foundation's employability and enrichment programme which looks to support young people in the region in getting employment ready. This season we have invested in further staff support to enable the best possible support for young people at a challenging time in their lives. The need for this project has increase dramatically since the pandemic. Last season saw 56 participants, rising to 103 in this financial year.

Rugby College

Falcons Community Rugby Excellence Programme with Tyne Met College is a joint rugby and education partnership, set up to provide girls and boys, aged 16-18 with the opportunity to pursue their rugby ambitions, alongside their studies. Newcastle Rugby Foundation have invested in classroom facilities to enable a growth in numbers able to attend this project which has seen great successes on and off the field, including a huge 8 girls being selected to represent the North of England Centre of Excellence.

Learning Disability Rugby

The delayed Rugby League World Cup presented a fantastic opportunity for engagement in the sport as well as increased funding. A wide variety of projects enabled NRF to present opportunities to engage to a wider audience, including a huge Squads on the Tyne participation festival, Club Development project, schools' engagement, rugbees and futures girls projects and more playing opportunities for players with learning disabilities.

Cast volunteer project

The CAST is an inclusive volunteer group which started back in 2018. The CAST is an inclusive environment for people who may be facing challenges and barriers to participation. Many of our volunteers' experience anxiety, a lack of confidence, disabilities and loneliness before joining the CAST family. The Cast volunteer project has gone from strength to strength with a core group of 50 people including an increasing number of young participants many of whom have progressed from other projects, such as Hitz.

Financial review

Income has reduced compared to last year to £603,084 from £640,136 in the previous year. Expenditure has also reduced to £637,716 from £675,468. The charity has made net deficit of £34,632 which is very similar to last year, £35,332 which was budgeted for as an investment in future planning from the reserves.

The Board accepts the deficit recorded is due to the investment in its staff, training and development and are confident that going forward the Foundation will continue to be sustainable and if necessary, will make the necessary adjustments to ensure this. Trustees approved a cost-of-living increase for Staff of this financial year. The Board also agreed an investment in research and professional services to develop a new and innovative project, "Rugby+ Futures." This project has been developed by NRF Ambassador, Tony Underwood, Olympic swimmer Chris Cook and Lysa Morrison MBA and aims to use emotional intelligence techniques to engage and improve the lives of young people within our region. This is a long-term investment and the Trustees intend to commit further reserves to this project as well as to supporting the costs of rugby league development in the aftermath of the Covid pandemic and increased funding to support the Rugby League World Cup in 2021. Trustees also committed to further reserves to support the role of Safeguarding Officer within NRF as we continue to experience more challenging circumstances our communities face.

The Foundation continues to have reserves of £369k down from £403k in year ending 30 June 2022. The Board have reviewed the Reserves Policy to ensure that sufficient funds are held to meet its commitments without tying up excessive funds that limit the objectives of the Foundation along with the community benefits that investing these funds can bring forward.

NRF has developed a Reserves Policy which has been developed in line with Charities Commission guidelines to:

- · Provide sufficient funds to meet the liabilities of the charity in the event of an unplanned event
- · Justify and explain why a particular level of reserves are held
- To allow NRF to maintain the services that it provides
- Recognises the funding risks and nature of the activities undertaken
- · Reflect the risk of a small number of funding resources drying up

In considering the above the Trustees agreed to set the Reserves that covers 2 months wages plus 3 months operating costs and staff redundancy costs. Trustees agreed to review the policy annually.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and is a registered charity. The company has no share capital, All the Trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of winding up the Foundation.

The Board of Trustees administers the charity, a Head of Foundation is appointed by the Trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the Charity supported by a senior management team and programme delivery staff. To facilitate effective operations the Head of Foundation has delegated authority, within terms of delegation approved by the Trustees for operational matters.

The Trustees have established three sub-committees to support the work of the Trustees, Head of Foundation and to deliver the objectives of the Foundation. The sub-committees all have terms of reference with all Trustees allocated to a sub-committee together with some additional members with specialist skills and knowledge who are not Trustees, co-opted onto the committees. To maintain confidentiality, these sub-committee members who are not Trustees are required to sign non-disclosure agreements.

People - chaired by Trustee Tracey Lynch

The People committee has been active during Y/E June 23 implementing a PDR process and looking at recruitment/ retention and training to make sure the staff and management of the Foundation feel valued and recognised for the great work they deliver.

This year we have increased the number of hours available to staff for CPD, completed a small restructure and salary review and increased our extensive training programme including leadership training, team building, mental health at work and safeguarding and E,D and I.

Marketing and Commercial - chaired by Trustee Sunii Mehra and Mick Hogan

The Marketing and Commercial Committee have had a good year of progress across digital, refining the brand, developing a marketing strategy, website refresh and attracting commercial partners. Outside of funding partners most of the other fundralsing will come from the Foundation having a robust marketing and commercial plan.

Over the 12 months the group intend to co-opt a digital expert in to the Marketing & Commercial Committee. This area is crucial if the Foundation is to remain as relevant, efficient, and modern as is possible. Supplementing this was a brand update to ensure the Foundation positions itself correctly for participants, our staff, our commercial partners, the media and other delivery partners.

Our Marketing strategy provides direction across all MarComms activities and keeping us true to the Foundations objectives. Our purpose sits at the centre of this and is embedded in every aspect of what we do. The commercial plan takes the excellent positioning our strategy gives us to provide tangible income via sponsorship, events and fundraising initiatives.

Governance and Finance- chaired by Trustee Jeff Ball

The Governance and Finance Committee manage the policy and procedures which the NRF adopt to ensure compliance and are regularly reviewed via a Governance calendar agreed at each meeting.

Safeguarding is a priority for NRF. Staff training and development has been undertaken to ensure participants are safe. All staff and potential members of staff have advanced DBS checks. Staff are all briefed on the escalation policy should an issue arise.

Two new Trustees were appointed on 27 February 2023, Dave Thompson and chartered accountant Jack Spoor has been appointed as Treasurer.

The NRF has a Risk Register that is regularly reviewed at the Governance & Finance working group meetings and is on the agenda, made available to all Trustees and reviewed at all quarterly Trustee meetings.

NRF adopts the Newcastle Rugby Limited Sustainability Policy, Championing The Future Of Sport and The Planet: Where Passion Meets Sustainability. NRF are also committed to driving sustainability in all the programmes that the Foundation delivers.

NRF is a responsible corporate citizen and we recognise that, as a registered charity, we are deeply intertwined with environmental, social and governance (ESG) concerns. We consistently strive, in all we do, to deliver sustainable, equitable and healthy programmes within the diverse communities we serve.

The Governance and Finance Committee is also responsible for ensuring the financial records are maintained at a high standard and in line with Charities Commission and Companies House guidelines. This financial year the group has undertaken a review of the reserves policy and larger spends which are proposed by the Head of Foundation.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Newcastle Rugby Foundation is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Kingston Park, Brunton Road, Kenton Bank Foot, Newcastle Upon Tyne, NE13 8AF.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's memorandum of association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2023

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Resources expended are included on an accruals basis.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those expenditure categories.

Other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities, Governance costs are those incurred in the Trust and primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.7 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors are Initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.8 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

1.9 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
