Trustees' Report

The trustees (who are also directors of West Howe Community Enterprises for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Principal Activity

The principal activity of the company is the operation of a charity shop and to improve communications in the area of West Howe and make it a better place to live. Our vision is to improve the quality of life for people in West Howe and surrounding areas.

Achievements

West Howe Community Enterprises was set up in 2009 by residents from the local area. West Howe is a large area of social housing predominately made up of social housing which endures high levels of deprivation. Many of the residents here may not enjoy the opportunities commonplace in other areas.

We are a charitable company limited by guarantee. This year on 7/7/14 our Charity Commission registration came through to enable us to work as both a Non Profit Company limited by Guarantee and a Charity with the following aims:

Object 1 - Urban or Rural Regeneration:

The promotion for the benefit of the public of urban or rural regeneration in areas of social and economic deprivation (and in particular in West Howe, Bournemouth) by all or any of the following means:

(a) the relief of financial hardship:

(b) the relief of unemployment:

(c) the advancement of education, training or retraining, particularly among unemployed people,

and providing unemployed people with work experience:

(d) the provision of financial assistance, technical assistance or business advice or consultancy in

order to provide training and employment opportunities for unemployed people in cases of financial

or other charitable need through help: (i) in setting up their own business, or (ii) to existing businesses:

(e) the creation of training and employment opportunities by the provision of workspace, buildings,

and/or land for use on favourable terms:

(g) the maintenance, improvement or provision of public amenities:

(i) the provision of recreational facilities for the public at large or those who by reason of their youth,

age, infirmity or disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances, have need of such facilities:

(j) the protection or conservation of the environment:

(k) the provision of public health facilities and childcare:

(1) the promotion of public safety and prevention of crime:

(m) such other means as may from time to time be determined subject to the prior written consent

of the Charity Commissioners for England and Wales."

Trustees' Report

Object 2 - Community capacity building

To develop the capacity and skills of the members of the socially or socially and economically disadvantaged community of West Howe in such a way that they are better able to identify, and help meet, their needs and to participate more fully in society.

Object 3 - Social Inclusion

To promote social inclusion for the public benefit by preventing people from becoming socially excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded and assisting them to integrate into society.

Being excluded from society, or part of society, as a result of being a member of a socially and economically deprived community.

Object 4 – Recycling

a) The protection and preservation of the environment for the public benefit by the promotion of

waste reduction, re-use, reclamation, recycling, use of recycled products and the use of surplus;

b) The relief of financial hardship by the recycling and provision of furniture, clothes and other

household items.

2014-2015 has been a great year for us, we have employed 3 part time members of staff to build stronger foundations and it has been a period where we continue to grow. Bournemouth Borough Council continued to support the post of our Manager until October. Thanks to The Tudor Trust for providing £23,000 this year as part of a two year grant to enable us to employ a part time project manager direct. This has given us the opportunity to manage other projects and provide line management to project staff, scale up and embed our work with local residents. Thanks to People's Health Trust using the money raised by HealthFull through The Health Lottery for £27,866 this year as part of a two year grant to enable us to employ a part to enable us to employ a Growing Inspiration Co-ordinator to further offer support to local people, help set up more community led projects, provide more training, events and regular fun activities giving local people the opportunity to try new things, volunteer and build their confidence and skills. This year we have also extended a service for Public Health Dorset to recruit and support local residents to volunteer as peer health helpers within the local community. We have employed a part time Health Champion co-ordinator and have delivered local training, giving residents the opportunity to gain qualifications from the Royal Society for Public Health. WHCE has an active role on the West Howe Regeneration Partnership board.

This year 35 local residents have volunteered for us, with 10 going on to further training or paid employment. Training to the volunteers has included Equality and Diversity, Food Hygiene, Event Management Support, Design and Desktop Publishing, Confident Communication, Understanding Policy and RSPH Understanding Health Improvement level 2. We embed a Rights Respecting ethos and volunteers continue to contribute to the planning of projects and value each other's contributions. New activities that we have arranged and delivered include Car maintenance for beginners, fun and fit, walk and click, cycle rides, bingo and a pop up social cafe some of which, due to popularity now run as regular sessions. Inspiring Change shop sales and user levels have continued to increase due to the volunteer's commitment to the project. We enjoyed a successful AGM and have increased our membership levels throughout the year. Our monthly Give or Take days continue in the local community supporting waste reduction, recycling and the re-use of items. This year we have saved 1,281kg entering landfill from this event alone. Our partnership weekly job club has 63 registered users, 41 of these now have active C.V's, 15 have gained employment and a further 12 have entered into further training or volunteering. Volunteers decided with the event management support to celebrate diversity again this year by planning The Howe Diverse day community event for 14th June and plan to make this an annual event.

Trustees' Report

Green Goals community fund have supported us by funding us to increase community recycling by improving the internal environment of the premises and raising awareness amongst customers and donators regarding recycling. The new Wheely Inspired community bike project is now running thanks to a Green Goals Transport Fund grant. Our bike project will help residents new to cycling to build confidence, borrow bikes, demystify cycling, making it accessible and enjoyable especially for residents on low incomes whom are less able to travel easily to shops, work and for leisure. The Big Lottery Awards for all awarded us a grant to produce a community Christmas Pantomime and Summer Show to audiences of local residents. This enabled us to bring a much needed intergenerational project to the area, uniquely bringing people of different ages together, increasing understanding of each other's needs and situations and promoting harmony and friendship. Through this work we have helped 20 young people to achieve or work towards an Arts Award, for some their only qualification to date.

We also continue to enjoy support from our three Local Councillors, who have not only funded elements of our project to increase the outside appeal of our shop but encouraged us to maintain a high profile locally and in the media. We enjoy a relationship with North Bournemouth Rotary and Bournemouth Lions who have donated money to us to help with our Family Halloween Disco which had over 150 residents of all ages attend

Media and maintaining a profile has resulted in positive press coverage for the area and 1 radio broadcast, we have produced 3 Local newsletter publications increasing communication and levels of participation both inside and outside of the local area. We have also supported and delivered training to volunteers to produce media. We continue to run the websites www.westhowc.net and www.inspiringchange.org.uk. We continue to have aspirations to increase awareness and participation in grassroots media to ensure communities have a voice which showcases good examples of citizen journalism.

Public Benefit

The Trustees have given due regard to public benefit when planning the charity's activities, in accordance with the Charity Commission's Guidance on Public Benefit.

The annual report sets out our activities, achievements and performance during the year, which are directly related to the objects and purposes for which the charity exists. The charity achieves its principle objects and purposes through the operation of a charity shop and by improving communications in the area of West Howe and making it a better place to live. These benefits are directly related to the aims of the charity and are fully compliant with the Charity Commission Principles on Public Benefit.

Structure, Governance & Management

The organisation, West Howe Community Enterprises was set up in 2009 as a constituted group. We are a charitable company limited by guarantee and also became a registered Charity in 2014. We are governed by our Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company winding up, members may be required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Trustees' Report

Membership status of West Howe Community Enterprises is open to all local residents and interested parties. Members of the Board arc nominated and elected by the membership at the Annual General Meeting. Currently, one third of the directors retires each year by rotation and is eligible for re-election. Other members are recruited and co-opted for specific skills. Those who are interested in becoming co-opted members of the Board are invited to visit the charity to learn about its work and observe a trustee meeting. They are then interviewed to ensure their suitability for office. If successful members are issued a handbook, support and guidance is given as well as being encouraged to take up specialist training opportunities. The full Board which had six members at 30th June 2015 meets at least six times a year. It is responsible for all strategic and financial decisions affecting the organisation while the Project Manager is responsible for day to day operations. In particular, the trustees have considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

All members of the Board of Trustees give their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the charity during 2014/15. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in the accounts.

The trustees have conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate any impact they may have on the charity. Risks are minimised by the implementation of internal control procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, clients and visitors to the premises and the Project Manager

Financial Review - Reserves Policy

Core funding is currently secured from various trusts and grant making bodies and from income earned through sales, donations and providing services.

In line with Charity Commission advice, WHCE has a reserves policy to ensure viability beyond the immediate future and to provide continuity of service over the longer term. Money which is not committed is allocated to two different types of fund in the accounts at the end of the financial year: restricted and unrestricted.

West Howe Community Enterprises is particularly aware of the need to cover contingency liabilities such as gaps in funding streams, cash flow and meeting the cost of redundancy payments to staff in the event that projects come to an end or that the organisation itself should be forced to close.

The level of reserves has been set by West Howe Community Enterprises taking into account the following

The organisation needs to safeguard against future changes in funding programmes particularly in the current economic climate. Additionally in- kind support which is currently received may not be available in the future.

Funds should be available in order to build capacity internally and contribute to improved productivity and sustainability of the organization.

Funding should be available to deal with contingencies which might arise in the day to day running of the organization e.g. absence cover, recruitment costs etc. A number of costs would be associated with dissolution of the charity.

The target amount for unrestricted reserves given the above is 9 to 12 months of annual expenditure. The unrestricted reserves can be drawn on in an emergency or to take advantage of unexpected opportunities. This reserves policy will be reviewed every year.

Trustees' Report

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)', issued in March 2005, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006.

Fund accounting policy

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 16.

Incoming resources

Donations are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support programme activities and is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Irrecoverable VAT

In ecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Fixed assets

Individual fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:
