# **Notes to the Financial Statements**

#### For the Year Ended 31 December 2015

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 together with the Charities Act 2011, and the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting by Charities. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### **Funds**

Unrestricted funds represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC. Funds designated for the particular purpose by the PCC are also unrestricted.

#### Incoming resources

#### Voluntary income and capital sources

Giving is recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC. Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised when received.

Income tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is recognised when the associated income is recognised.

#### Other income

Rental income from the letting of the church hall is recognised when rent is due.

#### Income from investments

Interest is accounted for as earned. All interest earned is credited to the Unrestricted Fund unless monies are separately invested.

#### Resources used

#### Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation on the PCC.

#### Activities directly relating to the work of the Church

The diocesan parish share is accounted for when it falls due.

#### Fixed Assets

#### Consecrated property and movable church furnishings

Consecrated property of any kind is excluded from the accounts by Part 1, Chapter 2 (10) of the Charities Act 2011. Even though it is not technically consecrated property, the Church Hall is not recognised in the accounts.

Movable church furnishings held by the Priest in Charge and Churchwardens on special trust for the PCC, and which require a faculty for disposal, are accounted for as inalienable property unless consecrated. They are listed in the church's Inventory, which can be inspected (at any reasonable time).

Expenditure incurred on consecrated buildings or individual items under £5,000 is written off as incurred.

# Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Individual items of computer and office equipment are capitalised and written off over three years.

#### **Current assets**

Amounts owing in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors.

Short-term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the DBF, Church of England Funds or at the bank.

# Independent Examiner's report to the PCC of St Peter, Broadwater

I report on the accounts of the church for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> December 2015, which are set out on pages 1 to 10, in respect of an examination carried out under Regulation 3(3) of the Church Accounting Regulations 1997 to 2001 (the Regulations) and s.43 of the Charities Act 1993 (the Act).

# Respective responsibilities of the PCC and the examiner

It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

#### **MINUTES**

It was proposed by Barbara Cutler that the minutes were a true and accurate record of the meeting held on Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> April 2014, seconded by Ken Aknai and agreed by all. Revd Tim Horlock duly signed the minutes.

#### **ELECTORAL ROLL**

On behalf of Gill Gibbs and Maxine Howarth, the Electoral Roll Officers, Revd Tim Horlock reported that we have 155 names on the Electoral Roll, a reduction of one from 2014/15. Tim extended his thanks to Gill and Maxine for their work.

# ANNUAL REPORT ON THE LIFE OF ST PETER'S CHURCH

Revd Tim Horlock spoke of the new initiatives that have started this year – Tea & Company which has had huge support and is really enjoyed by all who attend, and Messy Church which has just celebrated its first anniversary. The vast majority of people who attend are not regular churchgoers and many of them attended the Crib Service at Christmas, swelling the usual 70/80 to around double that amount.

Tim thanked Tracy, Julie and Sami for their hard work with Launch Pad and Launch Pad Plus, Tim also thanked all the other people who work hard in the background on behalf of the church.

Tim also talked about the financial difficulties St Peters has been experiencing and wanted to offer huge thanks to all those who have raised their giving following recent presentations on the matter. Tim also announced Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> May 2015 as a Gift Day – 'one off donation or pledge' and asked that everyone consider if they could make a one off donation on that day in order to help improve the situation.

#### ANNUAL REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL AFFAIRS OF THE PARISH

Revd Tim Horlock thanked the Finance team including Busola Awani, Helen Henry, John Hollands, and Betty Cockerton.

Tim opened the floor to questions.

Maurice Gordon asked – have the PCC considered charging for tea/coffee and activities?

Helen Henry responded by advising that the PCC had discussed this matter and had decided against it. It is part of the church tithe/giving to put money towards our activities and tea/coffee. However, if anyone would like to make a donation for tea/coffee then please leave it on the counter. Some of the groups are given donations and use this money towards activities within their groups.

Maurice Gordon - asked what we are doing about the shortfall?

Helen Henry advised that following our recent request for people to review their giving we have seen an increase and this month we are expecting to break even. Helen offered a huge thanks to everyone who has taken this step to increase their giving and confirmed that it is really important that we continue to do so in order to get the church back into better financial shape.

Brian Temple asked - why has our Parish Share increased?

Helen Henry confirmed that it is partly because of us having Kate and partly because of other churches in the parish having a reduction, we have queried our new parish share and we are in receipt of a letter confirming why our parish share has increased and advised that it is available for anyone to see if they wish. The Diocese is aware of our current financial situation.

Maxine Howarth asked – is there a longer term strategy plan to deal with the shortfall?

Helen Henry said that apart from asking for more giving there is little else we can do as we have already cut back on our spending in every area we can; this matter is regularly discussed by the PCC.

Helen also wanted to take this opportunity to thank Alan Walton for his help in the preparation of the accounts.

Corinne Headington mentioned that the Church Bank Details are now on the notice sheet as asked – can people use these details for one off giving?

Helen advised that this was the best way to make regular or one off donations but stressed the importance of people signing up to gift aid if they are tax payers. Helen also reminded everyone that she can claim gift aid on any giving of £20 or less at a time via the envelope system or any money put into the collection bowl.

#### **CHURCHWARDENS' ANNUAL REPORT**

John Hollands spoke on behalf of both churchwardens. He advised that there was a Churchwardens' Report and a Resources' Report in the pack for people to read at their leisure.

John advised that the important thing is for our building to support the things we want to do as a church. About a year ago the buildings committee sat down to discuss how the church buildings can support what we want to do as a church. Three important words that came out were "Welcome", "Inclusive" and "Accessible". We are now carrying out a feasibility study with an architect, Mark Edison who was involved with a project at John & Rebecca Bell's last church.

We are looking at various options for the church but the main areas are Building Accessibility and Accessible Toilet, however we don't want to compromise the building for future needs by not thinking ahead and that is why we have consulted an architect.

We praise God that you have responded to our financial need and money is now coming in, and although we don't have the funds to carry out any work at present we felt the need to go ahead with the feasibility study and trust in God that when the money is needed it will come.

John offered thanks to all the people who have been involved with the process so far and offered special thanks to Roger Busfield for all the work he has done within the church including painting, building storage seating in the new room, fixing the downpipes, fitting a new fire extinguisher and help on the kitchen.

#### ANNUAL REPORT ON THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE DEANERY SYNOD

Tim offered thanks to Jill Adam, Richard Brooks and Kay Collier for their involvement as representatives of St Peters on the Deanery Synod.

Tim explained that it is a great way to see what his happening in the local church families. It is good to know that we are not alone but are part of a bigger picture both locally and nationally.

Tim announced that St Andrew and St George are going to have Chris Bunce at their new vicar and the inauguration will be on 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2015. This will be a big change for the church following Farther Melvin's retirement. All the churches in our area now have incumbents which is really good news.

There is one change in the Deanery with St Marys Aston now being assigned to Jenny Grey of Watton at Stone.

Tim asked the congregation to break into groups of two or three to discuss what is going well at St Peters and also what we would like to improve. He then went round the room for questions and feedback from the groups.

- 1. Andrea Kelly suggested that we are good at looking out to the community but not so good at looking after our own church family when they have health, financial and emotional problems.
  - Tim responded that we are all responsible and if we notice someone having problems we should act or if we are not able to help, then notify Tim or Kate. Don't assume that someone else will do it. We have support available through the Pastoral Team and House Groups.
- 2. Joanne Sinclaire said that she is fairly new to St Peters and she feels we do Welcoming very well. She has felt really involved and welcome and has received much needed support from the church family. She also asked if Alpha Courses could be advertised at the Living Room.
  - Andrea Kelly advised that they usually do advertise them when there is a new course starting.
- 3. Corinne Headington said that she and John were finding it difficult to find a House Group and asked if there is evening praise at St Peters every week.
  - Tim Horlock advised that there is Prayer and Worship every Sunday for 1 hour at 6.30pm.
- 4. Maxine Howarth said that many of the duties within the church are carried out by the Core worshipers and she is concerned that our Core is reducing and wonders how we can convert the Periphery into the Core.
  - Tim Horlock agreed that we do have a lack of volunteers in some areas of church life and sadly if we don't have enough volunteers we may have to close down some of our work, eg Youth Work. If it can't be resourced then we have to close it. Large amounts of church life are carried out by a small number of people. If everyone got involved in one thing at least once a month we would be in a lot better shape.
- 5. Tracy Plumpton who runs Launch Pad with said that we need to nurture our own church children. She believes we are all on a faith journey even if it's not a God journey. We have to be dealing with this inside our own church as if we haven't grasped the children by the time they are eight years old we will lose them.
  - Jean O'Neill spoke about us not knowing who the unchurched children in Broadwater are because there is no meeting ground for them. She believes it should be as much for the mission of the church as it is for bringing the families in the church up in the Christian way of life. Maybe people don't feel equipped to do that, but then the church should be a resource to bring people into a situation where every child who's a member of a family at St Peters gets the support and help.
  - Tim Horlock responded that he is hugely grateful for the work that Jean does in outreach but confirmed that we do some really good work with Messy Church and Launch Pad. There are some lost souls out there and we are called to do more work to restore them. We are called by God to work with him in his mission to the world, offering the good news to all those out there.
- 6. Kim Walton agreed that we do need to look inwards and outwards but we need the resources to do this. She praised Tim's sermon about mending the nets and agreed this is exactly what we need to do. Kim said that youth work is a difficult area and in St Peters we need more staying power and we give up too easily. Maybe we need to have specific training for those who want to work with the youth and provide them with the resources they need.
  - Tim Horlock agreed that training is an area we need to look at.

- 7. Alan Walton said that it is a balancing act he came across a term recently called Heat Circles. Hot being red and cold being blue. Heat radiates and therefore if you put your resources into the hot circles, loving our Christian Community first and investing in our own youth then they will become ambassadors' and will bring their friends along.
- 8. Jill Adam, on behalf of the church, wanted to thank Tim & Alex and Kate for all they do. Their energy is phenomenal and is much appreciated by us all.
- 9. Doris Cork said that she is a firm believer in prayer and if we all spent 5 minutes praying for our youth then God would answer our prayers and the problem will be solved.

Revd Tim Horlock concluded with his own thanks to Kate Sharples for all she is doing at St Peters. The meeting closed with all sharing The Grace together.

# Electoral Roll Report 2016/17

The church electoral roll has been revised between 13<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> March 2016. There are 135 names on the electoral roll this year; this is a reduction of 20 from 2015/16. Of the people who are registered there are 47 male and 88 female, 66 live inside the parish and 69 reside outside. Six names have been added and 26 taken off following the update of the register.

# **APCM Vicar's Report 2016**

Revd Tim Horlock –Holy Week - March 2016

In November 2015 we celebrated 60 Years as God's gathered community at St Peters and praised God for his provision and blessing. One of the highlights in our calendar was our evening 60<sup>th</sup> celebration banquet where we reacquainted ourselves with previous vicars of St Peters and continued to share the stories which were encouraged by our magnificent displays around the church. It is at milestones like these that we are truly humbled as we reflect on the fact that we all carry the banner of faith in our season making Christ known to all. As I prepared to speak at our evening celebration banquet, I felt drawn to the words of Acts 2:42 as a scripture that defined and continues to shape our community, "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." ### Accounts for the Year ended 31 December 2015 - Report of the Treasurer

2015 saw some challenges to our finances, our outgoings were out stripping our income almost every month and we were having to dip into our savings on a regular basis. This was partly due to a large increase in the parish share and the loss of some givers of the past 18 months. In April we had a gift day and asked people to consider reviewing their giving to the church. Many people were very generous and we received over £4000. This helped to bring our reserves back to what they were at the beginning of the year. We saw the number of regular givers increase over the next 4 months, some who started to give weekly or monthly, others who now gift aid their offering. The money we receive each month from HMRC, around a £1000 a month helps pay our running costs. Although there have been a number of changes in amounts given there has always been enough to keep us on an even keel and we are very grateful to all those who give financially as well as in other ways; by not claiming expenses or donating time that would otherwise have to be paid for. We were also left a £16000 legacy last year, and have recently received another of £8000 both from people outside of the church family. God provides in unexpected ways. Our accounts show that we ended the year with just under £6000 more than we started with, not including the legacy.

The PCC is aware that God has blessed us financially and we want to be more generous with what God gives. We presently regularly support The Living Room, Bridge builders and Cornerstone. A small working group has been formed to look at our giving and ways that it can be increased so we are giving away at least 10% of our income. This will include some form of overseas mission as well as short term projects.

As we look to the future to have the much needed changes to the building we will be trusting God for the provision of the money needed as well as asking the congregation to help raise the money needed.

I would like to thank all those who are involved in the finances, John Hollands, Betty Cockerton, Doris Cork, Barbara Cutler, Alan Walton and Busola Awani who has now stepped down as treasurer.

The prayer of the PCC is that God will richly bless all who give cheerfully to His work in this church.

The new welcome team and procedures, led by Rosie Busfield, is now fully functioning. This has included making new people feel at home as they come in for the first time to helping them to become settled into the Church.

A pastoral care team has also been started this year led by Rosie Busfield and Sue Dungey and this is developing to care for those with in the church who need extra support or visits.

Our amazing team of caterers led by Kim Walton, have again been very busy with many events over the year which with thank them all for.

We are very conscious that to run the Church it takes far more than the paid staff and Churchwardens. We would like to thank all those who give of their time whether it is to maintain, build, garden, flower arrange, AV/Sound or serve coffee.

### **Resources Report**

Last year I said at the APCM that we were in process of carrying out a feasibility study with a creative architect, Mark Eddison of MEB Design to identify our immediate priorities and to plan for the next 10 years.

The eventual result was the plan on the Celebrate 60 wall.

On Sunday 13 December 2015 I fed back to the congregation. The buildings team had met and after much prayer and discussion felt that God was saying we should go back to basics. The key words were welcoming and accessibility. When we later discussed the feedback from you, the congregation I noticed that in my summary of the feedback the number one point was; accessibility and a welcoming entrance.

Overall there were a lot of positive comments on the plan on the wall as well as some concerns. We felt that there was a general overall feeling from the congregation that the ideas were nice but it would never happen. How would we ever find the money to do such an extensive amount of work?

Consequently we went away, prayed and thought about what we should do next.

As I write this summary in early March we are thinking about 2 significantly different options for an entrance. We are waiting on the architect to come up with some plans. I may be able to tell you more at the APCM.

The good news is that we have agreed a plan for an accessible toilet and ramp into the hall. This is not affected by our plans for a new accessible entrance or if we wanted to do something with the hall at some later date. Once we have an updated plan we will seek to obtain agreement from the St Albans Diocese and then go ahead with the work. Hopefully I can provide more information at the APCM.

I would like to thank the Buildings Team for their commitment and support to get us to this point.

My thanks go particularly to Roger Busfield for all his help with maintenance over the last year and to Richard Brooks and Rod Cutler for all the work they do mowing the lawn and keeping the garden tidy as well as other various maintenance items.

### Things to give thanks for over the past year:

- For the enthusiasm of all the team to embrace the new September start time and for the joy that this has been seeing the children engaging with each other, the team and in the worship time at the front of church.
- For the six secondary age helpers who have come on the rota and have been a wonderful support in both groups, really adding to the quality of the sessions.
- For the Scripture Union material, which provides enough ideas to fill the session time and engage
  the children in age appropriate and interesting ways and for the children's increased knowledge of
  the Bible and willingness to pray for and help others.
- For the support of the St Peter's community in response to the enthusiasm of the children and parents to take part in the summer Christian Aid cake sale which raised £73.50, the Christmas Shoe Box appeal and the spring term toy donation and cake sale which raised a wonderful £207.91 for the Women's Refuge.

# **Difficulties we have experienced:**

- Getting to church for 9.15 to set up can be a struggle for those with family or work commitments but it has become an essential start time as both the hall and Xstream-Splash room often need to be cleared and cleaned before set up can even begin.
- Finding enough people with the time, ability and enthusiasm to plan and lead groups this was made particularly difficult with the need to increase the rota to include the first Sunday in the month, following the PCCs decision to approve the stopping of a once a month All Age Service.
- The unpredictable and fluctuating number, age and ability of children attending each group has made it hard to plan and sometimes deliver appropriate material. This is also increased by the limited space for the Xtsream-Splash group which rules out many suggested Scripture Union activities.

#### Plans for the future:

- To continue to ensure that the Children of St Peters, the future generation of the church, are appropriately catered for on a Sunday morning. That they will be able to access worship, prayer and teaching in the main body of the church as well as their small groups in a way that will deepen and strengthen their faith and equip them for the challenges the world throws at them.
- For the children to be more involved with other areas of service for the church e.g. with prayers, reading, welcoming, in appropriate services

#### Report of the Year:

• It is with sadness we report that the average attendance numbers for Children's Church have been in a slow but steady decline since 2012. This was most noted at first in the age ranges 7-1 lyrs and so in September we made the decision to merge the two older groups. This has significantly increased the leaders planning time. Although the figures are incomplete we are seeing an approximate attendance average of 15 children on a Sunday morning compared to 24 back in 2012. We believe this is a reflection of church attendance as a whole.

### **Points for Prayer:**

# Messy Church

What are the aims of the Group?	To reach out to young families in the parish of Broadwater who have little or no church attendance. To share God's love and teaching with them in a relevant and engaging way.

# Things to give thanks for over the past year:

- That on average 45 children between the ages of 0-9 attend with their carers, (the majority being 2-6 age range), which is helping to bridge the gap between Stepping Stones and Launchpad.
- For the 20 people on the activities team, 7 people on the catering team, 8 people on the planning team & a further 4 people who will pre-prepare crafts when asked and the fact that all of these people are regularly committed to Messy Church once a month.
- That having re-arranged the tables and carpeted area, parents are now more engaged in the story, song and prayer at the beginning of the session.
- That we have seen an increase in God centred prayerful conversations with the children, now that we have incorporated the Prayer Space Zones in to the main hall with the craft activities.

# **Difficulties we have experienced:**

- The occasional wet and windy day has had a serious impact on how long the children can sit and
  engage in a story. It is difficult to be flexible to accommodate this with such large numbers of
  children and when some are only minimally supervised by their accompanying adult.
- How to ensure that Messy Church becomes more than just a 'craft club' with dinner, by making
  craft activities meaningful, of a high quality but not so easy they are done too quickly or too difficult
  that the children need a great deal of support, as both of these things stifle Godly conversations.
- How to give the parents and carers an opportunity to engage with God and explore deeper questions with the team while they are supervising their children.

#### Plans for the future:

- To continue to prayerfully seek and trial ways in which we can address the issues that have been raised in, 'difficulties we have experienced'.
- To consider ways in which Messy Church could lead to baptism or/and attending an adult Alpha/discovery style course
- To advertise St Peter's child centred events, clubs and services to a greater extent.

# Report of the Year:

We have had another wonderful Messy Church year, culminating in 58 children, (and their carers), attending our Christmas extravaganza, where they made their own nativity sets to play with at home with their friends and family. Apart from covering the major religious festivals we have also shared the stories of Creation, Noah, Daniel, Zacchaeus, the disciples big catch of fish and Jesus command, 'Do not worry!' These have not only generated some amazingly creative craft activities but have also encouraged many meaningful conversations with both the children and their adults. It has been such a privilege to lead so many to worship God through his word, drama, multi-media, song, prayer, cookery and the creative arts. Do come and see what God is doing amongst us on the third Tuesday of every month, you will be inspired and amazed.

#### **Points for Prayer:**

• For God's continuing sustaining power both in the planning, preparation and execution of the whole of Messy Church, both in the kitchen, in the hall and in the church and that all who attend, in whatever capacity, will not only be blessed but will in turn be a blessing to others and through it all God will be praised.

#### **Aims**

Our original Aims were set in 2013 and have not changed substantially since then. They are:

- To contact, befriend and mentor young people from 13 years old upwards and help them build wider relationships in the community and the church.
- To spend time sharing breakfast with them each Saturday in order to build up their self esteem, to facilitate conversations and to build trust.
- To meet and talk with the group from the cafe in the area around the Marymead shops
- To encourage members of St. Peter's to relate to non-church goers in the local community
- Through our activities, to make contacts with parents, guardians or carers of the young people, as and when appropriate.

# Do you think that your group is achieving that purpose? The café project:

In terms of the first three bullet points, I feel that the group is achieving this purpose. The cafe owner has been very supportive and interacts with one or two young people who have been coming for some time. **Bullet point four,** 'to encourage members of St. Peter's to relate to non-church goers in the local community'.

There are three people at St. Peters who have prayed for specific young people for more than two years. The two young people that they have prayed for, do not come to the cafe, but have come to the Homework Club, and recently have come to church, and been taken with three or four other young people to youth events in other churches, and the cathedral. This means that the majority of the young people are unknown to the majority of people in the church. Of course the amount of interaction between the church and these young people depends on the number of people from the church engaging with them.

In the early days (in 2013) we regularly had three or four adults from the church who were committed to the cafe project, in the last 18 months there have been just two of us.

The Club on a Wednesday: The launch of a new club on Wednesday 9th March 2016, will involve four regular leaders; Andrea Kelly, Martha Botros and Jean and Chris O'Neill. John Hollands has offered to give back up when other leaders are unable to attend. The club will be limited to those who have membership cards - currently 12 people. Apart from cooking (requested by the group) and games, another feature of the club will be 'St Peter's got talents'. We are planning to invite members of St Peters to speak for 5 minutes on their talents at work, or in leisure. This will enable these young people to gradually get to know people in the church.

**Bullet point 5** 'through our activities, to make contact with parents, guardians or carers of the young people as and when appropriate'

We have had a range of contacts with parents, guardians or carers of young people, and in one or two cases with young people in a children's home. The contacts with parents have included going with a mother to attend the police station where her child was being held, ringing a range of social services for a young person who was sleeping in the park after he was thrown out from home and following that through until he was housed and had sufficient money to live (he now comes to the cafe on Saturday). We have also made a visit to the family home of a girl (and her partner). She came to the cafe when it first started, and now has had a baby. We also drove an older young man to prison three times, spread out over the

summer, to visit his father who has a long term sentence. This represented the early stages of reconciliation between them.

One set of parents comes to the cafe occasionally; they sit separately, and buy their own breakfast. We have also met them in the town centre on several occasions and they are always very friendly. Other people ask us who we are, some see us every week when they are buying food, and we frequently have an opportunity to talk to other customers

It takes time to build friendships with those at the cafe, and it is a great environment to talk to people. At present Chris and Jean run the café project, but two people are not sufficient. A bigger team would also mean that the young people would realise that 'it's not just about the two of us,' and would widen the variety of people on the team who would have different personalities and gifts. It would also mean that we could cover holiday breaks.

# Question 3 - What help can come from the wider church?

More people to pray, and more people to help on a Saturday and on a Wednesday.

As has been described in the answer to question 2, more people are also needed, including someone to look for opportunities to take this group to events, as we were able to do last year. The Wednesday club will also give opportunities for young people to meet people in the church

#### Summer camping: -

We have some tickets for Soul Survivor 2016 12th -18th August and have decided to take some of the young people from the café project. It is camping, and the young people will be in tents – but Chris and I are going to be in a caravan - we gave up many years of camping some time ago! Please pray for the young people who may come, it will be a new experience for all of them.

# **HOMEWORK CLUB** (up to Christmas 2015)

### Question I - What is the main purpose of this group?

This was set up in Pod 53 in 2013 and was originally for young people who wanted help for their examinations. There were five young people, and they were given support largely in English, Maths and Science. In 2014 as some people moved on to college, the approach was to give individual support for three people, and the club moved into the church building in September 2015 and ran up until Christmas. This group has stopped at the moment. (January 2016).

#### Question 2 Do you think that your group is achieving that purpose?

I think that the first year, in 2013, - was quite difficult to manage, but young people did benefit from the support. Contact was made with the school, but that was not responded to. When the group moved into the church and the support was individual, it was more difficult. It should be said that the young people went through some personal difficulties in this period, one with severe illness, and the other in hospital after attempting suicide. During this period we were able to visit the parents at home, and also visited the young people in hospital and spent some time with their parents there.

#### Question 3 - What help can come from the wider church?

None needed at the moment.

#### **Additional Information**

**Finance:** At present the cost of the breakfast and the homework club has been met by donations from church members (accounts are available for scrutiny for the café project). There are also some funds from the church which support outreach to young people, which will help to fund the club night.

# Report of the Year:

We typically have twenty or so visitors to each session. About a quarter of these are members of St Peter's. Some folk choose to play games; whilst others like to chat with each other or members of the team. A lot of tea is drunk and cakes eaten! Once a term we have a craft session for those who wish to join in; at Christmas the group made decorations for the church. At the last session before Christmas we had a sing song and quiz prepared by a member of the group.

There is a real sense now of relationships being built - between the team and group members, many of whom live locally, including some who are, or have been, involved with the community use of the hall. New friendships have been built between members who meet socially outside the sessions.

One member has said that joining the group has been 'life-changing'

To expand our work outside of The Glebe. Janis to write a blueprint of how to set up TLR elsewhere and to market this through the UK. We are also setting up a project within women's refuges, and setting up another project in Luton working with women involved in prostitution.

# Report of the Year:

The Living Room is now 16 years old and Janis has felt that this is the right time for her to retire as CEO and allow someone else to take TLR to the next level. Janis will continue to work for the charity developing new projects and being an Ambassador for TLR.

The highlight of the year was the visit by The Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby, this was a truly amazing and spiritual time for all who were there. The Archbishop spoke freely about his understanding of addiction and he also spent time talking to some of the clients individually.

We also had a number of other visitors one of which was a Psychiatrist from a Hospital in Sydney who had heard about us as the result of a talk Janis gave to a Doctors Conference while she was there.

We are still enjoying a 60-70% success of clients achieving abstinence from their drug of choice which is good news.

We have received a further three years funding for the crèche from Children in Need, which is a major achievement as they have funded us for the past nine years.

We have a new Funding and Development Manager, Amanda Morgan, and she is working very hard on securing new funding streams

Our Variety show in November was well attended, and our clients gave some wonderful performances. The evening was closed by Stevenage's own Gabz who travelled back from switching on the Christmas lights in Southend to perform some of her songs for us.

Our two charity shops continue to raise valuable funds for TLR, as well as having volunteers from our clients groups when they are ready to return to the work force.

#### **Points for Prayer:**

That we still find favour with God for our work. That we secure sustainable funding that will allow us to grow. That we find a suitable candidate for the role of CEO when Janis retires in July. That new premises will be found in St Albans.
