S2 Food Poverty Network - Trustees' Report 2015

The charity is run according to its constitution which was adopted on 11 September 2013 and amended on 19 May 2015. It became registered as a charity on 11 June 2015.

Objects and activities

The charity's objects are the prevention or relief of poverty, in particular among people living within the S2 postcode are of Sheffield, by the provision of emergency food parcels, items, services and facilities to individuals in financial need.

Achievements and performance

This past year has been a busy year for the Foodbank with a steady increase of clients each month. The year started with an average of 50 food parcels given out per month and ended with an average of 150.

The S2 Foodbank is open three days a week at St Swithun's, Cary Road and four days a week at the Salvation Army in Duke Street. It is volunteer-led and relies totally on donations of food and money and occasional grant aid.

Activity through the year

- Grant-aid from The Community First Programme and the City Council enabled us to purchase much needed computer equipment, freezer and fridge
- A CAB advice worker is based at St Swithun's one day a week
- We received charitable status in June
- We joined Fareshare
- Due to the generosity of the taxi drivers from City Taxis a trip to the seaside was organised in July and 96 clients were able to go
- line
- We received funding to support clients facing fuel poverty
- We launched a Christmas card and £500 was raised

- Special Christmas parcels were handed out which meant that 123 adults and 96 children received a Christmas meal through generous donations of food and money.
- With thanks to Hallam FM, we were able to provide Christmas gifts for the 96 children and a number of homeless teenagers.

Challenges

- The ever increasing number of referrals
- The fact that 50% of all our cases are ongoing due to long-term debt, complex health and social problems and the erratic nature of the sanction process
- The introduction of universal credit, the increase of asylum seekers and the increase of cuts in the budgets of our donors

Response to the challenges

To mitigate the risk of demand exceeding supply we have reviewed our situation and introduced the following actions:

- We have now introduced a 4-parcel cap for our clients unless the CAB worker authorises otherwise
- We have written to all our referrers pointing out our financial position and requesting that they carefully consider each case before they refer them to the Foodbank
- We have reduced the content of food parcels to match those recommended by the Trussell Trust.

Public benefit

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Financial review

At 31 December 2015 total fund balances were £4,536, all of which were freely available. Restricted funds made up £1,739 of the total. Unrestricted reserves are held only to allow the charity to continue to function month to month. There is no specific reserves policy in place at present.

In conclusion

The Trustees would like to express their sincere thanks to all the volunteers and donors who have made our work possible in an increasingly challenging environment.

The Foodbank set up by the S2 Food Poverty Network was always intended to be a response to what was expected to be a temporary situation, and the expansion of its provision is an indication of the continuing level of need to which there seems to be no immediate solution. We retain our commitment to working together with all who seek a long term resolution of the issues underlying this on-going crisis.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of S2 Food Poverty Network

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2015, which are set out on pages 1 to 7

1 Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16/07/14 and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

1.2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Donations and grants received for the general purposes of the Foodbank are included in unrestricted funds.

Goods donated and held as stock for distribution by the foodbank are recognised as incoming resources within voluntary income only when distributed, with an equivalent amount being included as resources expended.

1.3 Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the year they are incurred.

1.4 Stock

Donated food is not included in stock at the year end.
