# REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT For the year ended 31 December 2015

### Main Activities and Achievements during 2015

The UK Environmental Law Association (UKELA) aims to make the law work for a better environment. This is achieved by providing training and promoting knowledge exchange between professionals working in the environmental sector, as well as by providing information and public education on environmental law, rights and responsibilities.

### Overview

The highlights of the year were:

- 1. Hosting our annual conference at Liverpool University on the theme of water and the environment, with over 200 delegates.
- 2. Wider student involvement e.g. in our Conference through additional subsidised places and published articles in our e-law journal.
- 3. Relaunch of our bursary programme for students, made possible by our fundraising work.
- 4. A review of our communications and main website to identify improvements that will be implemented in 2016.
- 5. Cementing our work in Wales, providing input to key aspects of the legislative programme and seeing a strengthened Working Party make good use of the platform established by two years of Esmee Fairbairn Foundation funding.
- 6. Attracting a wide audience for some 30 UKELA educational events across the UK, on topics as diverse as EU Exit, Magna Carta and the permitting process for fracking.
- 7. Reaching as diverse an audience as possible, through our Webinar programme with Lexis Nexis and video link-ups to as many as ten remote sites for large events such as the annual Garner lecture.

UKELA is very grateful to its patrons: its President, the Right Honourable Lord Carnwath of Notting Hill CVO, Maria Adebowale, Sir Crispin Agnew QC Bt, Tom Burke, Prof. Malcolm Grant CBE, Prof. Sir Francis Jacobs QC, Prof. Richard Macrory QC, Lord Woolf of Barnes and Baroness Young of Old Scone. We also welcomed a new Patron in 2015, Justice Frances Patterson.

The Council Members, who are also the Directors of the Charity for the purposes of company law and the Trustees for charity law purposes, submit their Annual Report and Financial Statements for the period 1 January to 31 December 2015. The Council Members confirm that the Annual Report and Financial Statements of the charity comply with current statutory requirements and the requirements of the Charity's governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

### **Objects**

The primary objects of the Charity, which was established in 1988, are to promote for the benefit of the public generally the enhancement and conservation of the environment in the United Kingdom and, in particular, to advance the education of the public in all matters relating to the development, teaching, application and practice of law relating to the environment. There were no changes to the objects during the year.

### **Organisation of the Charity**

The role of the elected Council is to set the policy and the direction of the organisation and to monitor performance against agreed targets. UKELA worked in 2015 to deliver the aims in its 2012-2015 Strategic Plan. Work to implement the Strategic Plan was undertaken by three members of staff - Executive Director, Linda Farrow, Events & Membership Manager, Alison Boyd, and Working Party Advisor, Rosie Oliver, with substantial and invaluable help from the organisation's many volunteers. Dr. Norma Barry, a contract member of staff funded for a two-year period, continued to develop UKELA's activities in Wales as Wales Coordinator until 9 October, when Norma handed her work back to an invigorated Wales Working Party. UKELA is most grateful to the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation for their financial support for this initiative.

The Council met quarterly during the year. UKELA Chair, Richard Kimblin, completed his second year of office in July 2015, well supported by Vice Chairs, Begonia Filgueira and James Taylor and Treasurer, Paul Evans. From July 2015, following scheduled elections, the current Trustees took on roles as follows:

Chair – Stephen Sykes Vice Chair – Anne Johnstone Vice Chair – Kirsty Schneeberger Vice Chair – Ben Stansfield Assistant Vice Chair – Haydn Davies Treasurer – Nick Whitaker

The Executive Committee oversaw UKELA's day-to-day operations between Council meetings. Council Members undertook roles such as editing our journal e-Law (this role was undertaken by Hayley Tam during the year) and project coordination was achieved via a range of roles that the Trustees shared amongst themselves. The Company Secretary was James Taylor until July 2015; Simon Tilling took on this role from August 2015.

#### Risk

Council carries out a formal risk review annually and monitors risk between times.

In addition, UKELA assesses risks presented by major events outside the usual seminar format by means of a risk assessment in each case.

UKELA complies with the law on charity governance, employment, data protection, equality and intellectual property, and has a small team of Trustees to assess new contracts. The risk planning process and governance guidelines are included in UKELA's operating manual, which is kept under regular review.

### Method of appointment or Election of Council Members

Council Members are appointed annually. The annual general meeting was held at the annual conference at Liverpool University on 3 July 2015. There was an election for Council places. Over 100 members were in attendance at the AGM. New Trustees received induction from the Chair and staff. The Charity has no issued share capital or debentures, hence there are no directors' interests.

#### **Public benefit**

When planning our activities for the year, the Trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

## Resources

Volunteer support

A huge vote of thanks goes to the President, Lord Carnwath, for all his help, both behind the scenes and at UKELA events. The Patrons have provided much needed advice and helped with high profile activities including chairing meetings. As ever, the backbone of UKELA is the membership, which continues to support the organisation with suggestions, organising and attending events, sharing ideas and knowledge and generally making the organisation work effectively.

Council Members and other members of the Charity continued to provide their services on a voluntary basis - on Working Parties, the Executive Committee, Regional Groups, and in other ways. UKELA enjoys a high level of support from engaged and knowledgeable volunteers who provide the governance, organisation of major events and advice on the formulation of UKELA's published views.

UKELA is fortunate to find such a supply of committed volunteers amongst its members and Trustees, most of whom are busy working professionals.

UKELA is also grateful to the Young UKELA organisers and students who helped with events and provided some much needed energy and enthusiasm. The London meeting organisers did an excellent job in securing a stimulating programme of seminars on a range of topics that proved of great interest to members. Our thanks to Herbert Smith Freehills and their staff team for hosting and organising these meetings.

The numerous speakers who willingly give presentations, sometimes travelling long distances to do so, are the mainstay of much of the work UKELA does in informing, educating and provoking debate which furthers environmental law. They often do this for minimal expenses. Thanks go to all of you.

Sincere thanks also go to all UKELA volunteers: the trustees, those who assist in special areas like Wild Law and the websites, those who help with the student competitions and careers advice and those supporting us with fundraising and sponsorship.

Sponsorship and Partnerships

UKELA could not do all it does without such a high level of support from its member private companies and legal partnerships with related interests. Support was provided either in kind (e.g. by providing venues for meetings and administrative support) or by financial contributions. It really would be impossible to hold such high quality meetings and conferences without help of this kind.

- 3. Launch of our new corporate identity and revitalised website will improve our public information and membership benefits.

4. Increased resource for UKELA in Scotland will help us collaborate with policy makers and regulators on the emerging regulatory reform agenda.

### **Financial Review and Reserves policy**

The Charity ended the year with a net movement on unrestricted funds of £4.3k excluding the donations to the Lord Nathan Memorial Fund.

At the year end there was some £154k in the general fund, which is well above the reserves policy limit stated below.

UKELA runs a number of events and any sums paid for attendance at events (e.g. the annual conference) are designated for that purpose until the event is held.

UKELA's reserve policy is to maintain a free reserve level (excluding restricted and designated reserves) sufficient to cover projected fluctuations in working capital, agreed investment requirements and an amount based on an evaluation of the identified material risks to operations. An aggregate minimum level of reserves of £70,000 was identified as at the year end for these purposes. The minimum level of reserves is reviewed annually or more frequently as required.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2015

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below, have remained unchanged from the previous year and have been consistently applied.

### Basis of preparation of the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015), the Companies Act 2006, Accounting and Reporting by Charities: the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16 July 2014 and applicable regulations.

#### Company status

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee. In the event of the Charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the Charity.

## Incoming resources

Annual subscriptions, which are payable on 1 January and run for a calendar year, are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities evenly over the calendar year provided that they are received before the financial year-end. Subscriptions received for that calendar year after the year-end are taken to income wholly in the following financial year. Subscriptions received for the following calendar year are carried forward in the accounts as deferred income. Conference income is recognised in the accounting year in which the conference is held.

## Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for gross and when incurred except for conference expenditure which is recognised at the time that the conference concerned is held.

### Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The Statement of Financial Activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

#### **Pensions**

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

### 2. COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT

None of the members of the Council of Management (2014 - same), who are the directors for company law purposes and the trustees for charity law purposes, received any remuneration from the Charity (2014 - same). During the year, 7 members of the Council of Management (2014 - 6) were reimbursed travel and subsistence expenses totalling £1,807 (2014 - £1,860).

#### 9. SUMMARY OF FUNDS AND LORD NATHAN MEMORIAL FUND FOR THE ENVIRONMENT

In 2008, the Council established the Lord Nathan Memorial Fund for the Environment in two parts. £20,000 was transferred into a designated fund to help under-write the Fund and donations were received into an expendable endowment fund. The purpose of the fund, which celebrates the work of Lord Nathan as a past president of the Charity, is to pay for the development and upkeep of a public information website "The Law and Your Environment". All interest income to the fund was fully expended on this purpose during the year. The money raised during the year was also used to pay for maintenance work to <a href="https://www.environmentlaw.org.uk">www.environmentlaw.org.uk</a>. The combined total income in 2015 from donations and interest was lower than the total spent on maintenance. The Council has decided in future years to draw down on the fund in the same manner.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2015

Both designated fund and endowment fund are represented by money in the bank.

The restricted fund, all represented by money in the bank, is comprised of the Esmée Fairbairn grant which was made to fund the employment and related costs of UKELA's 2 day per week Wales Coordinator post, a two-year award from 20 May 2013 to 19 May 2015. This post developed UKELA's profile and membership in Wales, with the objective of making UKELA's activities in Wales self-sustaining by May 2015. As this award ceased in 2015, a transfer of the remaining funds was made to the unrestricted fund as an agreed charge for management.
