STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Trust arose from an identified need to build up a fund to which schools can apply in order to increase their resources for developing their religious education and collective worship. The Trust was established in April 2008.

Its objectives, as described in the Trust Deed, are:

To promote and advance education in the Christian religion in the principality of Wales for the benefit of the public.

In furtherance of this principle object, to provide funds for the purchase of resources for the promotion and development of religious education and collective worship in Church in Wales and other schools in the principality of Wales, and to provide books and other materials for the purposes of religious education and collective worship in the principality of Wales.

These objectives were very close to the late Archbishop Alwyn's heart throughout his period in office, whether as a Parish Priest, a Cathedral Dean, a Bishop or Archbishop, and it was in his memory that the Trust was established.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 5 April 2016

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable Activities

The Aim of the Trust is to give to teachers in any school who have enthusiasm and energy for RE teaching and collective worship the tools to share that enthusiasm with other staff and with the children they teach. The past year has demonstrated once again that we are a small Trust but one which has a special niche, a continuing impact throughout schools - far beyond the size of the specific Grants.

In a relatively small but critical way, we are investing in the future - the future of our children.

And, so that we can support appropriately as many schools, teachers and pupils as possible, we do this in partnership with colleagues and networks in the Diocese. In particular, we are grateful for the input of the Diocesan Education Team together with the broad vision and support of Canon Robert Griffiths and Canon Chancellor Pam Powell.

With the continuing support of the 2014 Diocesan Offering, the Trustees have been able to consider innovative ways of supporting Collective Worship and Religious Education in all schools, not just Church Schools, in partnership with other organisations and people. Three particular examples of this have been:

- Promoting the Rights of the Child by Gungrog Church in Wales Nursery and Infant School. Their application to the Trust included hand-written letters by their Super Ambassadors, both aged 7, for UNICEF's Children's Rights.
- Rev Freddie Fisher a puppet with bilingual English and Welsh Resource Packs is a popular way of engaging with children through story-telling. And this is a continuing resource, for more than the year of the Grant, as well as an expanding resource, used by Schools in an area.
- Brass rubbing materials for pupils coming to St Asaph Cathedral as part of the programme of School Visits which promote learning, personal and spiritual growth.

At the same time, our role in enabling Schools to purchase new materials and resources for their own Collective Worship and Religious Education needs remains strong.

In the last year, we awarded 13 Grants totalling £2,768, bringing the total amount we have granted over 8 years to some £12,700 to 71 Applicants.

A potentially major development is that the Charity Commissioners have agreed to the Trust extending its terms of reference to include the Diocesan's Partner Diocese in South-West Tanganyika as well as the Diocese of Lesotho. Discussions have started to explore the processes by which staff and pupils in these areas of Africa can benefit from the work of the Trust.

For this increasingly broad range of activity we are indebted to the commitment and expertise of the Trustees and to the support of our Patron, Mrs Meriel Jones, and of our Welsh Language Adviser, Mrs Bethan Roberts - both of them critical members of the team! To everyone, we give thanks.

And the Trustees could not perform their duties without the invaluable professional guidance of Llyr Williams of Swayne Johnson (Solicitors) and Melanie Langton-Davies and Joanne Baldwin of Gardners (Accountants), professional support in which they demonstrate also their own personal commitment and enthusiasm to the work of the Trust.

We emphasise that we work in a very collaborative, hands-on way with schools and their communities, and this Report demonstrates that this remains central to our purpose, particularly in the context of the changing scene of the Diocese. We look forward to playing our small but special part as Mission Areas develop, with their emphasis on relationships and partnership working.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Archbishop Rice Jones Charitable Trust

I report on the accounts for the year ended 5 April 2016 set out on pages four to eight.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Charities Act 2011 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
