# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES Year ended 31st January 2016

The Trustees present their report with financial statements of the Trust for the year ended 31st January 2016. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 6 and comply with the Trust Deed, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16 July 2014.

#### HISTORY AND OBJECTIVES

The Steel Charitable Trust, which was formed by the late Mr & Mrs W.R.Steel, is constituted under a Trust Deed dated 15th February 1976 and is a registered charity in England & Wales (number 272384).

As stated in the Deed, the object of the Trust is to pay the income and, in so far as the Trustees think fit, the capital of the Trust Fund to such charitable bodies or for such other purposes as shall be exclusively charitable as the Trustees may from time to time decide.

It is the policy of the Trustees to distribute the net income generated in the year by way of grants to a wide range of charitable bodies. The Trustees do not make grants to individuals, expeditions or any entity registered or incorporated outside the United Kingdom. There were no policy changes in the year and none are planned for the future.

#### **GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

The power of appointment of new and additional trustees is held by the present Trustees.

Messrs Childs, Hawkins, Maddox and Wright were appointed by the Settlors or the surviving Settlor and are eligible to serve for life or until they either resign or become ineligible. Mrs. Bailey, Dr. Briggs and Mr. Lawford have been appointed by the Trustees until 22nd September 2021, 2022 and 2023 respectively and may put themselves forward for re-appointment at that time.

Future Trustees will be initially invited to serve for a 12-month probationary period. This allows both the new Trustee and the Trustees the opportunity to evaluate their decision. On completion of the 12-month period and, with the mutual agreement of both parties, the position will be confirmed for a term of 7 years, which may be renewable. Before new Trustees are invited to serve their probationary period, they are supplied with a history of the Trust, a copy of the Trust Deed, booklets published by the Charity Commission outlining the responsibilities of Charity Trustees, the Guidance Notes for Trustees, a copy of the minutes of the recent Trustees' meetings and a copy of the most recent audited accounts.

The Trustees meet and consult regularly throughout the year to consider the strategic direction of the Trust and relevant matters including grant applications, investment strategy and financial accounts. In addition the Trustees may attend meetings with grant applicants and recipients.

A Human Resource Committee has been established to advise upon HR policies and a Premises Committee has been established to locate and establish an appropriate new office in Bedfordshire. It is anticipated that the Premises Committee may cease its function during 2016. The purpose of the Investment Committee is to monitor the investments and to approve changes in the asset allocation within an agreed strategy.

The Trust is a member of the Association of Charitable Foundations. The Association represents the interests of charitable foundations and grant-making trusts in the United Kingdom and provides information on good practice and changes in the law affecting charities and in particular grant making charities.

#### INVESTMENT PERFORMANCE

The aims are to continue to maximise the income available for distribution to charitable bodies while still aiming for some capital growth over the longer term. All investments held by the Trust have been made in accordance with the powers available to the Trustees.

The investments held at 31st January 2015, excluding the wholly owned subsidiary, decreased in value over the year to 31st January 2016 by 6.19%. This compared with the decrease of 7.89% in the FTSE All-Share Index over the same period. In addition, investments held in support of the Endowment with the University of Bedfordshire were returned on 24th July 2015 (see note 2 of the accounts).

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

Excluding the investments returned to the Trust (see note 2 of the accounts) the principal source of income of the Trust is from the investment of funds. It is the policy of the Trustees to distribute the net income, which may be summarised as follows:

#### PROCEDURES AND POLICIES FOR GRANT MAKING

The Trust invites applications for grants through its website. Only applications submitted on-line via the website will be considered by the Trustees. In addition, an on-line database holds all on-line applications received since 1st February 2007 and all historical and expected future grant payments. As a result more detailed information, in a standard format, is available to the Trustees.

It is the policy of the Trustees to make grants to a wide range of charitable bodies, and particularly in respect of applications supporting the following five categories:

Arts and Heritage

Health

Education

Social or Economic Disadvantage

Environment

The Trustees do not make grants to individuals, expeditions, political parties, the promotion of religion or any entity registered or incorporated outside the United Kingdom. Applications from Bedfordshire generally and Luton in particular are welcome. There were no policy changes in the year and no changes are planned for the future.

The Trustees have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on Charity and Public Benefit. They consider that the very full information about the Trust's aims, policies and activities, in the many areas of interest that the Trust supports which are set out in this report, demonstrates the benefit to its beneficiaries, and through them to the Public, that arise from carrying out those aims.

The Trustees generally meet in March, June, September and November. At these meetings, having reviewed all applications received during a previous three months period, the Trustees approve the grants to be made to the successful applicants. Payment is then made as soon as practical after the meeting. Unsuccessful applicants are also informed accordingly.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

During the year the Trust made or committed to make 122 grants totalling £1,141,990 of which 113 grants, totalling £1,011,540, were to charities registered in England & Wales; 2 grants, totalling £10,450, were to charities registered in Scotland and 7 grants, totalling £120,000, were to other charitable organisations in the United Kingdom. The other charitable organisations are mainly educational and religious organisations.

The Trust receives many more applications than it has funds to support. 12% of the applications received were successful in receiving a grant. Each successful application is investigated by the Trust Manager and by one or more of the Trustees, and is approved by all the Trustees. As the Trust makes a considerable number of grants during the year, details of which are shown on pages 12 to 16, the Trustees rely primarily upon their beneficiaries to ensure that such grants are used for their intended purposes. In addition, for single or multiple grants of £20,000 or more, it is a condition that the Trustees require, within ten months of the grant being paid, a report summarising the outputs and outcomes of the grant.

#### RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees review the major strategic, financial and operational risks which the Trust faces and confirm that systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

As the principal object of the Trust is to pay its net income to charitable bodies in the form of grants, the major risk facing the Trust is that the income received from its investments might significantly fall, thereby reducing the extent of its grant-making capacity. As a consequence, the policy of the Trustees is that the majority of the investments should be held in unit trusts and/or common investment funds, managed by well known investment fund managers. The Trustees meet the fund managers on a regular basis.

#### RESERVES POLICY

The assets that make up the funds of the Trust are unrestricted, fully expendable and are available as the Reserve Fund of the Trust. However, the Trustees distinguish between capital and income. As indicated above, it is the policy of the Trustees to distribute the net income generated each year by way of grants, while aiming for growth over the longer term in respect of capital. At 31 January 2016, capital funds amounted to £27,004,833 and undistributed income amounted to £112,718.

#### PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

The Trustees will continue to develop the Trust by:-

- \* distributing the net undistributed income to charitable organisations,
- \* making changes to the investment portfolio whenever considered appropriate.

During 2016, a Trust Manager, being a new appointment, and whose role includes the responsibilities previously assumed by the Trust Administrator, began employment in April 2016. A new office has been established in Bedfordshire and the administration has been relocated to the new office.

#### TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Trust and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the Trust for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:-

- \* select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- \* observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- \* make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- \* state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- \* prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Trust will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Trust and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the applicable Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations and the provisions of the Trust Deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Trust and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the Trust and financial information included on the Trust's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

We have audited the financial statements of The Steel Charitable Trust for the year ended 31st January 2016 which comprise the accounting policies, the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. 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# ACCOUNTING POLICIES Year ended 31st January 2016

#### BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of the investments and in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16 July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), and the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a "true and fair" view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a "true and fair view". This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

#### CAPITAL

Additions to capital representing realisations of interest assigned to the Trust in land-owning joint ventures are included at the values received by the Trustees.

#### **INVESTMENTS**

All investments are unlisted and are recorded at cost and valued at market value or the Trustees' estimate of market value at the year end.

Holdings in unit trusts and common investment funds are valued at the bid price.

#### REALISED GAINS AND LOSSES

All gains and losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise. Realised gains and losses on investments are calculated as the difference between sales proceeds and opening market value (purchase cost if later). Unrealised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between the market value at the year end and opening market value (or purchase cost if later).

#### INCOME

Dividend income and Income Distributions are recorded when receivable. Interest is recorded when received.

#### **GRANTS PAYABLE**

Grants payable are payments made to third parties in the furtherance of the charitable objectives of the Trust. Single or multiyear grants are accounted for in the year in which the recipient has a reasonable expectation that they will receive a grant and the Trustees have agreed to pay the grant without condition.

## RESOURCES EXPENDED

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis and are recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. All costs have been directly attributed to one of the functional categories of resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities.

#### ALLOCATION OF OVERHEAD AND SUPPORT COSTS

Overhead costs have been allocated between support and governance based on time and usage.

#### **GOVERNANCE COSTS**

These represent all costs involving the public accountability of the Trust and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs include costs related to statutory audit and legal fees together with an apportionment of overhead and support costs.

#### **FUNDS**

All of the funds of the Trust are unrestricted. These may be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the Trustees.

#### VAT

The Trust is not registered for VAT. All expenditure is therefore stated inclusive of VAT where applicable.

#### 2 INVESTMENT RETURNED

In 1995 the University of Bedfordshire established the Powdrill Chair in English Language Acquisition and, on 24th July 1995, the Trust entered into an Endowment to provide funding for the Chair for a period not exceeding twenty years. The investments in support of the Endowment were transferred to the University and were valued in 1995 at £666,628 and the agreed contributions were provided from the investment income of the Endowment as well as from proceeds of any realisation of investments necessary to finance any agreed shortfall. It was agreed with the University that the Endowment should end and the investments were returned to the Trust on 24th July 2015 and had a value of £1,000,815 at that date.

#### 3 ANALYSIS OF CHARITABLE EXPENDITURE

The Trust undertakes its charitable activities by grant making and awarded grants to a number of institutions in furtherance of its charitable activities. All grants were made to institutions.
