STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Allens Croft Project is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 11 February 2008 and is registered as a charity with the Charities Commission.

Governance

The charity is administered by up to nine trustees. They are appointed for three years and three of the trustees retire each year at the Annual General Meeting. They have no benefits. All of the trustees are covered by indemnity insurance with Ecclesiastical Insurance Group.

Organisation

The Board of Trustees meets bi-monthly. The Project Manager has delegated authority for day to day operational and business matters. Significant decisions are passed to the Board for ratification.

Related Parties

Allens Croft Project has a close relationship with The Hub, Hazelwell and carries out work on behalf of The Hub. The Hub made a donation during the year to assist with the salary for a key worker. The total received in both the current and previous years was £10,000

Funding

The Company receives grants from various grant making bodies in order to assist with salaries and pay for various activities. It also receives donations.

Risk Management

The Trustees have a Risk Management strategy which involves:

- * Operational Service quality, safeguarding, child protection and health and safety.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives

Our objectives are to identify ideas and opportunities to improve the quality of life for local people and bring about changes for the better in the area in which they live. We aim to achieve this through a number of projects:

- (i) training projects.
- (ii) a domestic violence support project.
- (iii) a security and maintenance project.
- (iv) families in difficulty.

We also offer activities for the over 55s, give advice and information, and we work with families and in an inter-generational context.

In planning our activities during the year we have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and how the activities will contribute to the overall aims and objectives we have set.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Celebrating the Allens Croft Project's 25th Anniversary of active service

Background

The Allens Croft Project (ACP) in its present form was registered on March 27th 2008 but was first established some 25 years ago in 1991 so this is a significant year for trustees as we reflect on the past and look to the future. The project began in a former council house in the middle of the Allens Croft estate and this remains our base but increasingly, due to the specific expertise we have developed, we now deliver activities in a number of venues around the area and further afield.

Currently ACP employs a part-time manager, two workers who support women who have suffered domestic violence and a development worker with older people. Both areas of work are well regarded around Birmingham as 'best practice' and other organisations are keen to learn from the expertise of our staff members

Work with women experiencing domestic violence

Freedom Project

The Allens Croft Project continues to develop its work with women impacted by domestic violence through our 'Freedom Project'.

Through a grant from the Big Lottery: Reaching Communities we are able to deliver a number of programmes of training and support on an ongoing basis throughout the year. Each of the following programmes runs three times a year for women who have been affected by domestic abuse.

Freedom Programme is an 11 week programme exploring the abusive tactics, controlling behaviours and belief systems of the dominator and the effects on women's health and well-being. The feedback from 72 participants who completed the programme and completed the evaluation form is overwhelmingly positive and all felt safer, less isolated and in control of their lives. The course increases their understanding of support services and enables them to identify abusive behaviours.

Comments from participants

"I have achieved so much, the course has help me stay separated from my abuser and make sure my son's safety always comes first".

"I would be very happy to recommend the programme to someone else the group is very welcoming friendly. The course providers are extremely understanding so friendly and supportive the programme is challenging but so rewarding when you complete the programme".

"It made me realise that I was suffering abuse and gave me an understanding why I felt the way I did and why I did the things I did to survive. It is an amazing program and I believe it saved my life and changed it for the better"

"Life changing, so supportive, confidence boosting. Can't wait for the next group. This Programme is a real life saver!"

Recovery Toolkit

Recovery Toolkit is a 12 week programme to assist in building confidence and self-esteem, and developing positive lifestyle coping strategies. This programme carries an OCN Level 1 qualification in Employability and Developmental Skills.

The course uses a recognised tool for measuring self-esteem and all 34 participants were higher at the end of the course compared to the beginning with a healthy increase from low self-esteem to a normal range.

Comments from participants:

"Each subject has given me a clear understanding of why I felt the way I felt, no pills could have done for me what this programme has given me. We need to make sense of how we felt and the effect on our mind and body. I can now think clearly and see a future for myself and my children"

"Changed the way I view myself. I've let go of guilt and really enforced positive reinforcement. Changed my whole life and calmed down my anxiety. Pushed myself to go into town or go to a club, even speaking at my company AGM".

"I think differently about myself now and am proud of who I am and how far I have come. I am back to myself, I know I am special and an amazing strong woman. I have lots of good qualities. I have become positive. I have outgrown the abuse".

"I have now decided on my new career path and I am determined to return to work to utilise my new found self-worth and skills".

You and Me, Mum

You and Me, Mum is a 10 week programme where mothers have the opportunity to safely explore the impact domestic abuse has had on themselves and their relationships with their children. It also explores preventative strategies for keeping safe. The course focuses on self-empowerment and mutual aid, recognising the central role of mothers in the protection and positive development of their children.

Comments from participants:

"Have now more compassion for myself and not feeling so guilty, realise the emotional impact the abuse had on my parenting and how it affected my relationship with my children. Now I understand more our relationship has improved immensely"

"Helping my children talk about their feelings, 'Name It to Tame It' has made a huge difference in how I respond to them. I've gone from reacting to responding. I used to flip my lid and so did my children, now we contain it and talk about how we are feeling"

"Now I understand the roles children take on, I understand their behaviour and don't take it personally. I have learned that their behaviours are just barriers to communication, we now communicate better. We are free to have fun together and share how we feel."

The underpinning strategy throughout the programmes is for the women who participate to identify and value their strengths and resources and the coping skills that have helped them to survive. We believe this empowers women to contribute positively to their own safety and well-being, and that of their children, on a long term basis.

In addition to the core funding we have received from the Big Lottery we have also benefitted from building strong relationships with Birmingham City Council Victims Support Fund and Birmingham South Central Clinical Commissioning Group who have appreciated the difference our work has made to the lives of the women we work with and have contributed resources as a result.

Work with Older People

Our work supporting older people has continued over the last twelve months and has seen us stay connected with 265 older people across our local neighbourhoods, many of whom experience loneliness, isolation and vulnerability and have limited contact with support agencies. Our work is underpinned by the belief that social activity and participation in the life of the community are vital for healthy ageing, the maintenance of independence and well-being of the individual and the wider community.

We do this by offering

- A programme of informal and fun activities which create contact between older residents
- Exercise and activities aimed at improving the physical and emotional health and wellbeing of older people, preventing falls, improving awareness and mental agility, reducing anxiety and protecting against the development of depression and the onset of dementia
- Practical support for older people, carrying out risk assessments, gardening and essential repairs
 which is about safeguarding some of the most vulnerable members of our community so that
 they can feel safe and secure in their own homes and when they are out and about in our
 neighbourhood.

This activity is facilitated by our Development Worker who is able to:

- encourage participation and inclusive approaches to activity
- enable older people to have a voice in their community through networks and forums
- provide administrative support for these groups and activities
- work with older people to access the best support for them

This year we have continued to receive funding through our participation in the Body, Mind and Spirit Partnership which is a partnership of 14 church-linked organisations contracted by Birmingham City Council to deliver a range of activities to support older people to remain independent. This partnership has worked hard to support and influence the city council as it has developed its prevention agenda as our model puts the older people's voice at the centre of development and delivery and is seen as a a model of good practice by some of the council officers.

A new development this year has been our involvement with Ageing Better in Birmingham, a Big Lottery Programme which aims to empower and enable the most isolated older people to lead more fulfilling lives. We were successful in delivering an Ageing Better Mini Hub and in this role worked towards identifying local services, activities and gaps, promoting local networks and working towards older people having more social and community connections in their local area.

Our monitoring and evaluation through both programmes has demonstrated how important this work is to those involved and we have also greatly benefitted from the different approaches taken elsewhere in the city by other organisations involved in the Body, Mind and Spirit Partnership. The learning we have gained together continues to shape and develop our work as well as our thinking about how to sustain this element of the Allens Croft Project's work for the longer term

FINANCIAL REVIEW

General

The charity is almost totally reliant on grants and donations and carries no fundraising activities other than bidding for grants and a small amount of income from sundry chargeable services provided for work such as PAT testing or gardening. This latter income was negligible during the year. The vast majority of grants are provided for specific purposes and have therefore been treated as restricted. Total incoming resources were £9,131 (2015: £24,198). General expenditure on general funds was £8,257 (2015: £35,082) leading to a surplus of £874 for the year. In addition a donation received in the previous year towards refurbishing the kitchen was transferred, with the donor's approval, into general funds to assist with maintaining core activities. The overall effect was a surplus for the year of £3,892. The deficit brought forward was £4,485 and therefore the accumulated deficit at 31 March 2016 was £593.

Restricted income for specific purposes increased to £128,483 (2015: £104,734). This was all consumed within the year and there were no reserves either brought forward or carried forward.

Reserves Policy

The charity's reserves are currently in deficit. The trustees recognise that that action is required to remove this and plans and negotiations are in place to resolve this. The trustees also recognise that a reserves policy is desirable. At present, in view of current economic circumstances and the priority of continuing to deliver core activities and maintaining services we consider that we are not in a position to formulate a policy.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Like so many charities, this year our trustees have been forced to consider how to secure the future of the project given the increasingly difficult task of raising funds for the important work we do due to reductions in funding available through charitable trusts, Birmingham City Council and other funding agencies who over the years have generously supported the work of the Allens Croft Project. Currently the project has funding to continue its work responding to domestic violence and meeting the needs of older people for the coming year and is developing strategies and partnerships to sustain both areas of work for the longer term.

Conclusion

As Chairperson I wish to put on record my thanks to our part-time manager and her staff for their excellent work over the last year. I would also like to thank our trustees for their work and our generous funders for their support which has enabled us to continue our work this year and to find a way forward that will hopefully enable both parts of our current valued work to thrive in the future
