Chair's Report for Friends of Steiner Academy Hereford 21 March 2016

Oct 2014 to Sept 2015

This has been a year of transition for Friends. Toni Fagan stepped down as Chair after many years of sterling service along with Caroline Bennet and Sarah Doyle, so we had three new officers take up posts of Chair, Secretary and Treasurer.

However the wheel of fundraising events turns smoothly and the usual various fundraising activities were allocated to specific classes such as Bonfire Night for Class 5 and the Summer Fair for Class 4. Class 1 had another successful Easter Market. The market is now an established fundraiser. In keeping with the festivals Class 3 held a Harvest Supper, and in the early summer term class 2's May Festival welcomed in the new season. The Advent Fair was held in the Shire Hall again despite building works taking place. Thanks once again to our resourceful community under the direction of Clare McGowan, assisted by Sue Parkinson

We are blessed with a dynamic parent body and there have been a number of new initiatives at the school over the past year. The Friday Market was the brain child of Nada Meredith and out of this has come the Food Festival which was held in October of 2014. It was a great success incorporating informative talks on all matters of food and health providing a good foundation for years of fairs to come. Thanks go to Rachel Wood, Nada Meredith and Juliet Ablett.

The Advent Market was another new initiative which was held in Birch Hall the week after the Advent Fair. It proved to be a popular event and was well attended.

There was a very successful open mic night held by class 8 which combined pizzas and music by former pupils. Class 10 cabaret, which was cancelled the year before, did go ahead this year and was an enjoyable night but was poorly attended.

Arts Alive events continue to be supported by various classes providing refreshments. It was another successful year for open day. This year Open Day was successfully held alongside a Celebration of Work and numbers attending were way up on the previous year, and proved to be a good fundraiser on the catering side.

Friends provided catering and children's activities for the Garden Festival at Hellens Manor in June. There was some doubt about whether there would be the energy amongst parents to undertake this year, but a team lead by Jo Ockwell and Alice Adcock put in a lot of work and the weekend was a very successful fundraiser for the school helped along by the wonderful weather over the two days.

The donation scheme continues to be supported by approximately a third of parents with whatever they can afford, amounts ranging from £5 to £90 a month. The important point being that it is regular amount that can be relied upon for budgeting purposes. We now have Mel Whitehead spending one day a week on administering the scheme. Thanks as ever to all Parents who contribute. It is recognised that we need to constantly engage with all parents, new and old, stressing the importance of these contributions for the school and the richness of our children's' education.

Friends have also been working with Brendan O'Keefe, the business manager, on encouraging those eligible for free school meals to make applications as this attracts significant additional funding for 6 years after first successful claim.

The allocation of fundraised money was kept at 80% to school, 15% emergency funds and 5% to other Steiner education initiatives, although during this financial year no funds were allocated to any other projects. Friends continues to retain funds for the option of supporting an emergency or supporting other Steiner Education projects. As agreed, £12,000 was donated from Friends funds towards the school, from fundraising activities. Gifts made by parents, and the gift aid, are donated to school on a quarterly basis. The Charity Checkout account has the capacity to raise funds online, both for the school and external charities if we so choose.

Most classes managed to achieve their fundraising targets at £500 per class and £1000 by Kindergarten, and it was agreed that these targets (to be donated to school) would be met before classes fundraised for individual class projects.

Classes continue to provide food for Workdays, although on a reduced basis, one a term and a Monday morning for those unable to make the Saturday. We thank everyone for their much appreciated participation in this contribution to supporting the community spirit and beautiful grounds.

Class Reps continued to be run as a crucial link between classes, parents and Friends, a sometimes endless task of involving parents in the needs of their individual classes and the perpetual fundraising. Often class reps reported the difficulties of engaging parents in their classes for various class activities and they need strong support from the parents of each class. Thanks go to Helena Trethowan, class rep lead, and all the class reps for the invaluable work they do.

Friends took a more proactive role in meeting with prospective new parents at open days and mornings with the intention of not only answering questions but also stressing that parents are expected to get involved in all aspects of the school as much as they possibly can, as this not only supports the school but importantly the experience of the child through their educational journey. To this end a leaflet was produced and Friends presence has been incorporated in to the day with display boards and a couple of people present.

Thank you once again to the tireless efforts of those parents who throw themselves into the healthy social life of our school and to our committee for their ongoing support and to the new people who have stepped up to take Friends forward.
