Trustees' Report

The Trustees have pleasure in submitting their report, and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2015. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 7, and comply with the statement of recommended practice.

Constitution, objective of the charity, principal activity and organisation of our work The charity is constituted under a trust deed dated 25th October 2011 as amended on the 18th February 2012, and registered on 10th April 2012, with UK registered charity no. 1146816 The objectives of the charity as set out in Declaration of trust are:

- The advancement of the Christian faith, the word of God and the full gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ in accordance with the tenets of faith in such ways and in such parts of the United Kingdom and the world as the trustees may from time to time determine.
- 2. Such charitable purposes for the public benefit as are exclusively charitable according to the laws of England and Wales as the trustees may from time to time determine.

The ministry was involved in Christian outreach programmes designed to increase Christian awareness and spread the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Development activities and achievement in the year

The trustees are pleased to report that the Church has been successful spiritually by ministering to many people.

Our Achievements:

- 1. The RPC Family in the year under review organised seminars/workshops whereby Christian values and morals were taught with the focus Healthy living (life styles), Good parenting and the society. Parents were advised to keep watch on their children and support them in doing their home work.
- 2. Through our Tuesdays Counselling and Advice services, we have supported the sick, poor, needy and others facing divorce, separation, and various crises in life. Through this services, many people were sent to seek GP advice and are now receiving treatment for their diabetes and HIV/Aids
- 3. We are in partnership with Organisation for Better Environment and Childcare (OBECC), where we help children and young people in Derby and in Kenya, supporting them in their education, through after school home work clubs. We also support both spiritual and physical well-being. This Organisation is successfully helping a lot of Orphans especially in Kenya and we are quite happy to be involved in their work and to continue supporting them.

- 4. A welcome pack was developed by the RPC Family Hospitality and Welfare Ministry to welcome and supporting the new comers, the refugees or asylum seekers, who first came to the community and have nobody to assist them. We discovered these people through our Outreach Ministry.
- 5. Supporting the Local community with donation for them to purchase food to feed themselves and their families. The beneficiaries are those who do not have access to public funds for a variety of reasons and this is a valuable means of support until their financial situation changes. We freely distribute food and household products which are donated by the local church community (with the assistance of individual church and none church members).
- 6. Our volunteer workers have been assisting the sick in washing their clothes (laundry), transportation those who are unable to come for our services due to lack of transport and shopping for them, taking them for a walk, to a recreation centre and church programmes.

Many Christians and non-Christians attended out services and many re-dedicated their lives to our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Review of the financial position

The charity made a surplus for the year amounting to £5,596.

1. Accounting Policies

(a) Accounting basis
