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Report of the Trustees

for the year ended 31 December 2015

Structure, Governance and Management

The trustees present their report along with the financial statements of the charity for the period ended 31 December 2015. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 9 and comply with the charity's trust deed and applicable law.

Brighton Voices in Exile was incorporated as a company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 29 April 2009 and attained charitable status on 25 June 2009.

The management committee, which comprises the trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) issued in March 2005 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in April 2008 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

Appointment of trustees is governed by the Trust Deed of the charity. The Board of Trustees is authorised to appoint new trustees as they deem appropriate.

Investment Powers

The Trust Deed authorises the trustees to make and hold investments using the general funds of the charity, but no such investments are presently held.

Objects and Principal Activities

Brighton Voices in Exile is constituted as a charitable company limited by guarantee and is therefore governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association which are also its objects. The objects of the charity are to offer a holistic service, reflecting the needs of its service users, collectively and individually. This service has to be broad and flexible in order to encompass the wide range of people who are supported, namely asylum seekers, refugees and those with no recourse to public funds (just under half of whom have mental health or physical disabilities), and the extensive obstacles in all areas of life that these people can face. As one of the key support organisations in the Brighton & Hove area working with these groups, and with the closure of a huge amount of relevant services this year the need for these services is increasing dramatically.

The objectives of the charity fall within the criteria of section 3(1)(a), 3(1)(h) and section 3(1)(j) of the Charities Act 2011 and thereby the organisation, which has been established for charitable purposes, is for public benefit.

Report of the Trustees

Policies

The policy of the Charity continues to be to seek funding from a variety of sources to ensure the stability for both the group and those accessing the services it provides. The charity aims to provide an acceptable minimum standard of living for those who are destitute.

Achievements during 2015

The trustees consider that the performance of the charity this year has been satisfactory in difficult economic conditions

During 2015 the charity identified the following areas where support was most needed:

- Immigration Legal Advice & Representation
- Welfare & destitution support for those claiming asylum, awaiting support, "failed" asylum seekers, those who arrived as unaccompanied minors who are leaving care, refugees & those with no recourse to public funds (i.e. not eligible for benefits). With a distinction between those who are "long" term destitute and those with more "short" term problems, due to delays in benefits & papers

The period ended with an overall surplus of £21,250 (2014 deficit of £2,780) which the trustees consider to be a fantastic result. At the 31 December 2014 the charity had net assets of £29,034 (2014 £7,784) which the trustees consider to have surpassed expectations and as such are sufficient to provide for charity's short term future. The Trustees do note however that in these challenging times significant work will need to be undertaken to secure funding for 2016, 2017 and beyond.

The trustees are acutely aware of the scarcity of available funds and employ rigorous budgetary controls to manage the assets of the charity.

Refugee Trust

In 2010 the Trustees of the Refugee Trust have invited Trustees of Brighton Voices in Exile to join them and in June 2010. The Refugee Trust has continued to serve the interest of our clients by fund raising.

Casework

Brighton Voices In Exile provides a casework service to support people throughout the United Kingdom's asylum and other immigration processes, whether they are refused in their applications or are successful with being granted status within the United Kingdom. Those who are refused are supported around any changes in entitlements, and those who are accepted are supported with integration needs within the U.K.

We have continued to support people with expert support on immigration matters, solicitors, benefits & finance, healthcare, education and destitution. Throughout 2015 the areas where most support was needed was within the destitution support, welfare applications, and also with solicitors. All clients were seen in person and were mainly seen through face to face appointments, with a high level of telephone support and additional follow up work. Clients were able to access support through our weekly drop-in, where volunteer interpreters were also available. For follow up appointments we were also provided professional interpreting through Sussex Interpreting Services, funded by Brighton & Hove Clinical Commissioning Group. Since April 2013 we have employed a part time non-immigration caseworker, whose hours were increased during this period, to administer the high level of support that is needed for our destitute clients, and supporting with integration needs.

We have continued to operate our Immigration Legal Service throughout 2015 and employ a part time Immigration Caseworker as well as maintaining Voices In Exile to Level 2 with the OISC. Those needing immigration legal advice have been able to access support through our weekly drop-in.

Destitution Support

Brighton Voices in Exile has provided a destitution service since 2006. This is run in conjunction with our casework service to enable our clients to be supported out of destitution as quickly as possible. Part of this service is funded by The British Red Cross, which funds Brighton Voices In Exile to give clients £20 every two weeks for a maximum of 12 weeks. The British Red Cross provides Brighton Voices In Exile criteria by which this support is granted, through a Memorandum of Understanding. From January – December 2015, those in need continued to be supported through the Red Cross Fund. In line with the National Red Cross guidelines, the Memorandum states that we would no longer reimburse for client travel. In addition to this service, Voices In Exile runs a weekly food, clothing & toiletries bank, and receives Food Donations from the local charity Fareshare (who we pay an administration fee to), to distribute to those accessing our services. This service is also supported by local schools, churches and local refugee support groups.

Mixed Support Group

This was temporarily put on hold this year to enable us to concentrate on re-introducing the Immigration Legal Service and to extend the non-immigration casework.

Cookery Group

Brighton Voices In Exile began a weekly cookery group in 2010 which has continued to meet throughout the year providing a meal to those attending our drop-in and destitution services. Those volunteering within the Cookery Group have been provided with training in Level 2 Food Safety for Catering.

Risk Management

The trustees actively review the major risks that the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at sufficient levels, combined with an annual review of the controls over the key financial systems, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The trustees have also examined the other operational and business risks faced by the Charity and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate significant risks where they are identified.

Responsibilities of the Trustees who are also the Directors

The directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of accounting

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and include the results of the charity's operations which are described in the Directors' and Trustees' Report, all of which are continuing.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued March 2005, applicable Accounting Standards and the Companies Act 2006

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions of the Companies Act 2006 and adapted the Companies Act formats to reflect the special nature of the charity's activities.

1.2 Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than investment properties and freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Office equipment

- 20% reducing balance basis

Charity equipment

- 20% reducing balance basis

Computer equipment

- 25% straight line basis

1.3 Stocks

Stocks of goods for resale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1.4 Taxation

The Society's income and capital gains are exempt from taxation due to its charitable status

1.5 Value added tax

Value added tax is not recoverable by the charity and as such is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.6 Income

Voluntary income and donations are accounted for as received by the charity. The income from fund raising ventures is shown gross, with the associated costs included in fund raising costs.

No permanent endowments have been received in the period, but these are dealt with through the Statement of Financial Activities when received.

A significant proportion of services are provided to the Charity by volunteers. The value of services provided are not reflected in these Financial Statements

1.7 Fund raising costs

Fund raising expenditure comprises costs incurred in inducing people and organisations to contribute financially to the charity's work. This includes the cost of advertising for donations and the staging of special events.

1.8 Expenditure on management and administration of the charity

Administration expenditure includes all expenditure not directly related to the charitable activity or fund raising ventures. This includes costs of maintaining office premises and professional fees. Where costs include a direct charitable element, together with an element of management or administration such cost has been apportioned between the cost centres.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the period ended 31 December 2015

1.9 Restricted funds

Donations, bequests or incoming resources for which the donor has earmarked for a specific purpose are treated as restricted funds. These funds may be income only (where the capital must be retained) or income and capital (where the donation and the income there from may be utilised).

1.10 Designated funds

Brighton Voices in Exile may at it's discretion set aside funds for specific purposes which would otherwise form part of the general reserves of the Charity.

1.11 Unrestricted funds

Funds which are expendable at the discretion of the Trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the charity.

1.12 Cost allocation

Where possible, costs have been allocated directly to the activity to which they relate. However, there are also shared support costs that enable Charity's charitable, income generating and administrative activities to be undertaken. These costs have been allocated to the Charity's activities using appropriate cost drivers.

15. FUNDS OF THE CHARITY

- (1) Refugee Trust The charity has developed a strong relationship with the Refugee Trust, a charity which has coopted three Trustees of Voices in Exile onto its board. The Refugee Trust has similar objects and has made grants available to the Charity which in turn have been distributed to those accessing the services available.
- (2) Capital Fund during 2011 a 'mustard seed' grant of £5,000 from the Church Urban Fund. These funds were used to fund a significant development of the kitchen area which has facilitated the expansion of the 'Cookery Group' which teaches members of the group key cookery skills.
- (3) Destitute Support Fund Due to the number of individuals accessing the services it became clear that a dedicated fund needed to be put in place to properly administer the aid given. The Destitute Support Fund was created to raise funds to support those who are destitute and with no access to public funds. In return food is provided to those accessing the services, as well as clothing and provisions for new mothers. The charity has benefited from two grants to provide food as well as being supported by the British Red Cross on a monthly
- (4) Drop In Service During 2012 a grant of £6,000 was received from The Allen Lane Foundation. This grant provided the core funding to support a service which members of the group could access to assist with immigration legal advice under the regulations of the Office of the Immigration Services Commissioner ('OISC'), and other Casework Support. It is hoped that further grants will be received and to support and develop this
- (5) Syrian Vulnerable Persons In December 2015 the charity participated in the Syrian Vulnerable Persons Relocation Scheme in conjunction with Brighton & Hove Council. The charity provides casework and other support to the beneficiaries of this scheme which is expected to run throughout 2016 and into 2017.
