#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The Infection Prevention Society is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 8th June 2007 and registered as a charity on 12th July 2007. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects of the charity; these are to promote the advancement of education in infection prevention and control for the benefit of the whole community. The Society's governance requirements, as a company and a charity, have been met for 2015.

#### Organisation

The Infection Prevention Society (IPS) has a Board of Directors, seven of whom are elected and four of whom are appointed. The elected Honorary Officers are: President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Deputy Secretary, Deputy Treasurer, and Member without Office; the four appointed ex officio members of the Board are the coordinators of the four standing committees, the Education and Professional Development Committee, the Editorial Management Board, the Research and Development Group and the Scientific Programme Committee. At the Annual General Meeting in 2015 members voted in favour of electing a second Member without Office to act as a trustee and member of the board of directors.

The IPS board holds monthly meetings five of which are face-to-face, the other seven being conducted by teleconference or web communication; additional face-to-face meetings are scheduled according to business requirements. There are two Consultative Committee meetings per year.

### **Education and Professional Development Committee**

The EPDC focuses on developing and supporting the professional development of members and the advancement of infection prevention knowledge in the wider healthcare and education sectors. It does this through competency-based education activities, development of resources and collaborative working.

#### **Editorial Management Board**

The EMB focuses on publishing a high quality peer reviewed publication that advances professional knowledge and skill in the art and science of infection prevention and control practice. It is responsible for increasing the profile of the journal and increasing the number of high quality original papers published in each issue.

#### Research and Development Group

The R&D Group focuses on building research capability and capacity among the IPS membership through education, initiating collaborative research projects and awarding annual research grants. In addition they work with other external groups to further the evidence base for infection prevention and control.

#### Scientific Programme Committee

The SPC focuses on creating robust and topical scientific programmes for the IPS annual conference and works in parallel with Fitwise, the events company, to deliver a high quality, well evaluated professional networking and learning event for members and the wider national and international infection prevention and control community.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The objects of the charity are to promote the advancement of education in infection prevention and control for the benefit of the whole community and in particular the provision of expert advice and opinion, educational development, training courses, accreditation schemes, educational materials, meetings and conferences.

The policy of the charity continues to be to seek further development of the educational agenda of the society and better dissemination of the information through a variety of promotional vehicles, including a three day national conference, one day national conferences for specific interest groups, local branch conferences, plus a series of catheter EPIC3 hub and spoke events run in cities across the UK.

Special Interest Groups are supported by the Society and are seen as an area of future development in the provision of good infection prevention and control practice in specialist areas. Currently these interest groups influence practice through the IV, Ambulance, Audit and Surveillance, Commissioning and Mental Health Forums.

Both education and research and development grants are available to members with ongoing funding from both the Society and an externally funded educational grant of £5,000. The Society also provides 10 free places at conference to members of the society, in addition to providing conference registration fees for members funded from local branches and for some branch officers.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

#### Strategy

The current strategic plan (2011-2016) can be viewed on the IPS website (www.ips.uk.net). The plan is reviewed annually during business planning and activity is tracked against outcomes throughout the year. As we are approaching the end of this strategic planning cycle the process for renewing the Society's strategic plan commenced in September 2015 and will continue throughout 2016.

#### Key achievements for 2015 and plans for 2016

#### **Education and Professional Development Committee**

Education and Professional Development achievements include:

- Delivery of the 12 regional Implementation Learning Laboratory events, free of charge, which were attended by over 800 delegates;
- Financial support for educational and professional development of seven IPS members through the Ethicon Educational Grants. The total amount awarded £5000;
- Increased number of meetings with Education Leads to align branch and EPDC objectives.
- Approval of educational and practice development resources including the Guidelines at a Glance initiative;
- A review of the IPS competences and completion of a position paper to guide updating of the competences in 2016;
- Publication of an isolation on-line learning programme in collaboration with Nursing Times, in January 2015.

#### **Editorial Management Group - Journal of Infection Prevention**

Journal achievements include:

- Over 40,000 downloads of JIP papers in 2015;
- Format of journal updated to enhance scientific content and page numbers increased;
- New IPS Spotlight section to inform and promote Society activities;
- IPS royalties increased from 25% to 32.5%;
- First meeting of the international Editorial Advisory Board held in September at the annual conference:
- Successful application to PubMed Central, which will enable wider access to journal content and potentially increase journal citations.

#### **Research and Development Committee**

R&D committee achievements include:

- Review of R&D committee activity and a plan to develop an R&D network in 2016 to involve IPS members who are enthusiastic about research and who wish to become actively involved and/or lead on a collaborative research study.
- Publication of the WINCL study by Curran et al. (2016) from 54 participating centres, the authors concluded that the true index case is commonly not identified as the cause of a Norovirus outbreak and with at least 50% of index cases being misclassified.
- Award of the novice investigator grant to Liz Kingston, for a hand hygiene exploratory study and the collaborative small projects grant to Andrea Denton to explore how health care students learn and apply principles of infection prevention and control in practice.

#### YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2015

#### Scientific Programme Committee

Scientific Programme Committee achievements include:

- 'Infection Prevention 2015' at the Arena and Convention Centre (ACC) in Liverpool with 545 delegates attending matching the previous highest attendance numbers in 2013.
- Positive evaluation of the scientific programme, which included presentations by Professor Andreas Voss, Dr Jennifer Gardy, the Cottrell lecture delivered by Carole Fry, Dr Jennie Wilson, Professor Peter Hawkey and the Ayliffe Lecture delivered by Professor Ziad Memish on the emergence of MERS.
- Increased number of exhibitors from 98 in 2014 to 102 in 2015
- 10 funded registrations for IPS members
- Highly successful SoMe campaign surrounding #WhyWeDoIPC

#### **Quality Improvement Tools Project**

The Quality Improvement Tools (QIT) Project has been established to evaluate the uptake and impact of the QIT to date and to identify a sustainable model for the QIT, that serves the needs of members and the wider infection prevention community. Achievements in 2015 include:

- The QIT 'Super User' group collaborated to share lessons learned and identify the optimalway forward for the QIT;
- The IPS Board endorsed the continuing of the QIT on a sustainable basis, starting with a refresh;
- A new approach to partnering with willing software providers was agreed and negotiations with prospective partners begun;
- A plan was agreed to deliver refreshed tools to the membership and software partners in 2016.

#### **International Engagement Project**

As part of annual plan for 2015 an International Engagement Project Group was set up led by board members with aims to broaden its membership and attract international members, particularly from countries without a similar IPS support network.

- Eight IPS members joined this project group and have been exploring how IPS could attract and support international members more effectively and carrying out a survey to assess their needs and current use of IPS resources and communication tools.
- At IP2015 in Liverpool we held a welcome breakfast for 41 international delegates.
- The international virtual community of interest discussion forum was opened to all IPS members to allow for discussions.
- The project group will continue to work over 2016 and make recommendations to the Board for future activity.

#### One Together Project

OneTogether is a partnership of professional organisations supported by 3M who are committed to promoting and supporting the adoption of best practice to prevent surgical site infection (SSI). IPS is a leading member of this partnership. Activity from 2015 includes:

- Development of a self-assessment tool and scorecard to evaluate compliance with best practice to prevent SSI in seven areas of care across the surgical pathway.
- Pilot testing of the self-assessment tool in 15 operating theatres in 7 hospitals and incorporation of changes identified by this evaluation.
- Promotion of the work of the OneTogether partnership through presentations at national and International meetings, including IPS conference and the American Practitioners in Infection Control conference.
- Planning of the launch meeting for the finalised assessment tool in April 2016.

#### **Annual IPS Awards 2015**

The annual awards programme recognises the achievements of IPS members at an individual, team and branch level.

The shortlisted candidates for Team of the Year were:

- Somerset IPC
- Plymouth Community Healthcare
- Defence Medical Services IPC

The winning team was the **Defence Medical Services Team** for their contribution to the UKs Ebola response in Sierra Leone.

The shortlisted candidates for Branch of the Year were:

- IPS Yorkshire
- IPS Wales

The winning branch was **IPS Yorkshire** for a broad range of innovative and support activities including: guidelines at a glance; Twitter school; use of experienced members to support and mentor new members; leadership skill development and effective succession planning.

- Gary Thirkell Leeds Teaching NHS Trust

The winning practitioner was **Gary Thirkell** for his work in a relatively unrecognised area of IPC in the estates team of a large teaching NHS trust. In particular his collaborative and inclusive approach with housekeeping staff was highly regarded.

### Representation and IPS Collaborative Activity

The Society is represented on a range of national working groups and collaborate with other infection related organisations nationally and internationally. Of particular note in 2015 are the following:

- Support for a travel scholarship to the annual International Federation of Infection Control meeting, this year in New Delhi, India. In addition Dr Neil Wigglesworth delivered a presentation in the IPS sponsored symposium.
- Board members also represented the Society as invited guests at the APIC and IPACC conferences in North America; Debbie Wright (IPS Secretary) presented work at ICPICC in Geneva and the Society delivered a plenary session at HIS Conference 2015 in Lyons.
- The Federation of Infection Societies Conference was held in Glasgow, where IPS hosted a plenary symposia and a joint morning session with HIS.
- The Society is a partner in the updating of the Joint Society MRSA Guidelines (BIA, BSAC, HIS and IPS), working with HIS to produce the IPC component of the guidance. This will be completed in 2017.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The overall net surplus for the 2015 was £63,107, which was a reduction of £14,000 on 2014 results. This was mainly due a lower surplus being generated by educational activities such as IPS organised branch study days and a higher level of irrecoverable VAT (+£10,000). Conference performance in 2015 was strong with a £25,517 higher surplus than 2014. The overall 2015 surplus was £64,000 above the forecast deficit for the year of £778. The Infection Prevention Society remains in good financial health with £900,000 in available reserves.

#### INVESTMENT POWERS

The Memorandum and Articles of Association empower the Board to make and hold investments using the general funds of the charity within the terms of Memorandum 4.17 and 4.19 and currently the Society holds investment funds of over £327,387 at the end of the financial year. The Society investment policy is reviewed annually by the Board of Directors to ensure that it is relevant and meets the requirements of the Society. The trustees also have responsibility for meeting the requirements of the Trustees Act 2000 and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015)(SORP 2015). There are no restrictions on the trustees to spend any income generated from investments or capital in any way, provided such spend meets the objects of the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

#### RISK MANAGEMENT

The IPS Board identifies the level of potential risk and appropriate actions to mitigate the risk during scheduled meetings, and the business planning and financial forecasting process. In 2015 the Society made the decision to reduce the risk associated with funds held within a single banking organisation (Royal Bank of Scotland) by rationalising branch bank accounts and spreading operational funds across five UK banks, and to explore additional investment options. Membership and conference income are monitored regularly to highlight potential income reductions and plans put in place to mitigate these. At the end of 2015 a new infection prevention association was formed in the Republic of Ireland and this may have an impact on the membership of the ROI Branch and the Society overall.

- Appointment of a cost effective external communications provider by tender.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of accounting**

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and investments measured at market value. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015), and the requirements of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) (SORP 2015).

#### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant. Incoming resources from the provision of education and training services are accounted for when earned. Incoming resources in respect of specific charitable activities or projects are included in the period in which the project or activity is undertaken. Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included. Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. VAT which cannot be fully recovered has been separately identified.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income. Charitable expnditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Computer and office equipment - 33.3% reducing balance Fixtures & Fittings - 25% reducing balance

#### Investments

Investments held as fixed assets are revalued at mid-market value at the balance sheet date and the gain or loss taken to the statement of financial activities.
