# **Annual Report 2016**



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#### Introduction

The Trustees of Ware District Scout Council present their report and financial statement for the year ended 31 December 2015.

The Council's governing documents are those of The Scout Association. They consist of a Royal Charter which in turn gives authority to the Bye Laws of the Association and the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

The Council is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Scouts.

The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

The aim of the Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities. The Council's method of achieving the aim of the Association is by providing an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training based on the Scout Promise and Law and guided by adult leadership.

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Council and of its excess of income over expenditure for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- 1) select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- 2) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- 3) follow applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- 4) prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Council, enabling them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Standard Statements of Recommended Practice. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Council and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Legislation requires the protection of Young People to be scrutinized closely. It is the policy of The Scout Association to safeguard the welfare of all members by protecting them from physical, sexual and emotional harm. We, as a District Organisation, are fully committed to complying with this policy in all respects and it is the responsibility of all our members over the age of 18 to ensure that this is done.

Legislation requires Health and Safety to be scrutinized. It is our policy to provide Scouting in a safe manner without risk to health, as far as is reasonably practicable, and to ensure that we comply with all the requirements of The Scout Association safety policy as laid out in the Policy Organisation and Rules of the Association.

The Council has in place a system of internal controls that are designed to provide reasonable assurance against material mismanagement or loss. These include two signatories for all payments and comprehensive insurance policies to ensure that insurable risks are covered.

The Council meets the Charity Commission's public benefit criteria under both the advancement of education and the advancement of citizenship or community development.

## **District Chairman's Report**

The Scouting year of 2015 was one that can best be remembered as being dominated by two things, our District Commissioner Karen Hale stepping down, and sadly the deterioration of our District Headquarters building.

It was early February that we learnt that due to work and personal commitments, Karen was stepping back temporarily as our DC. To fill the gap, Ian Leach from Watford was appointed by the county as Acting DC, and he has been able to attend some of our meetings, and has been able to give us direction on several matters. In June we heard that Karen was unable to return, and a search committee was formed to find a replacement. The DC job description and nomination forms for a successor were sent out to all adults in the District in early November, with a closing date for the end of the month. In the meantime, with help from Bob Cooper, I have been covering much of the local work as far as email communication and general organising. We hope a successor will be appointed before too long.

The condition of the headquarters building is now ageing very fast, and it is no longer justified in spending funds to improve its condition, but only for essential work. A survey was carried out in the late summer, and 74% of respondents were strongly in favour of continuing to have a DHQ building. We are now in communication with East Herts Council regarding obtaining a long lease on the site, to enable us to look at alternative structures.

On a positive note I am pleased to report is that our District's growth during 2015, showed an increase of 6.3% in our membership, beating the overall County's total which came in at 5.3%. A further measure was that our Peter Geer Trophy, awarded for attendance rather than just winning, ran through the year with our members taking part in all 15 District competitions and events.

We were pleased that Charlie, George, Matthew and Morgan represented us in the summer at the 23<sup>rd</sup> World Scout Jamboree in Japan. The District had sponsored them financially, and we also arranged support for them from two of our local Rotary Clubs. From our District they took with them a neck scarf from each of our eight Scout Groups, to show other participants what our uniforms looked like, which added to all the other items they took with them to swap with Scouts from around the world.

I would like to thank and congratulate all of our leaders, helpers, and committee members in our District, the Scout Groups and the Explorers and Network who work tirelessly for long hours providing exciting, challenging, fun and enjoyable Scouting, and also our ASU members who run the Scout Shop

and help at various scouting events, and the Appointments committee and our local training manager. We can proudly say our achievements are a measure of our success during 2015.

The Group cannot be successful without the dedication of our Leaders who each week provide a range of activities for their sections, provide a listening ear to the young people sharing the highlights and the lows of each week and help to guide them on to learn new skills, achieve new goals and to become independent, confident young people. We are very fortunate that our funds are healthy at the moment. However, we are having to pay out more bills for the upkeep of the hall. Our funds are kept healthy by the Group's involvement in a number of set fundraising activities throughout the year. The Ware Fireworks display and Ware Carnival are great opportunities for us to raise the profile of the group, help our community and also to raise much needed funds.

During the year we had an operating surplus on general funds and activities of £5,218.66 which will be utilised in the coming year. At 31<sup>st</sup> January 2016 we had cash of £52,490.23 in general funds and no designated reserves.

I thank all those in the Group leadership team and helpers who have made the last year of Scouting happen. The future for the Group will need help from parents and new leaders; we can continue delivering an exciting and challenging range of activities in the future.

When I checked the statistics for the district adult:youth ratios I was pleased to see that ours is at the top.

Behind the scenes we have a devoted, effective and experienced executive committee, recently joined by two new parent representatives, and I really appreciate their continued support.

We attend just about everything going on in Ware and District Scouts, we run programmes packed with fun and activities, and we go on some brilliant adventures of our own. None of this would be possible without the dedication and energy of the leaders and young leaders, who make it all happen.

In financial terms we had another solid breakeven year, and we have been able to maintain our subscriptions rate for the 5th year running. Our healthy financial position has enabled us to purchase a new tent for leaders and some new catering equipment, having already updated Cubs & Scouts and the mess tent in the 2014. We also bought some new skills equipment.

Our three Young Leaders have been a valuable source of help during 2015. They have made such a difference and we are really pleased that they are so keen to continue with their Young Leader Training in the group where they were Scouts themselves not so long ago.

Out Scout section is small, and runs with about 10-12 members. The leader team (of 5) is extremely skilled, dedicated and organised under Martin's lead, and our Scouts are really lucky to have the opportunity to learn Scouting skills from such a great team. Apart from the know-how you might expect any Scout leader to have, between them they hold permits for nights away, green field camping, abseiling, climbing and water activities.
