Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

To promote humane behaviour towards humans, animals and the environment by:

- 1. providing capacity building to those who can then offer appropriate care, protection, treatment and security for animals which are in need of it by reasons of sickness, maltreatment, poor circumstances or ill usage;
- 2. raising public awareness and educating consumers in matters pertaining to animal welfare, environmental protection and compassionate behaviour
- 3. providing advice, assistance, training and support to members of the public and/or organisations who require such advice, assistance, training and support in connection with animal welfare and/or cruelty issues;
- 4. under-taking research into matters pertaining to human behaviour change, human or animal welfare and environmental protection.
- 5. establishing humane education programmes in primary schools and kindergartens, to improve the welfare standards of animals, and to promote the respect for all life, including humans and the environment.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that

trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit)

The charity carries out a wide range of activities in pursuance of its charitable aims. The trustees consider that these activities provide benefit to those who are concerned about the welfare of humans and animals, as well as environmental protection both in the UK and Asia.

We plan and implement projects on different animal protection issues, always in partnership with local groups. We focus on long-term solutions to problems, instead of quick fix 'band aids' – this allows us to work towards a permanent ending of animal abuse.

The charity focus on the following programmes:

- 1. Establishing Humane Education programmes in schools and offering Professional Development to teachers.
- 2. Developing Consumer Education by promoting a compassionate lifestyle through cruelty free and fur free alternatives.
- 3. Continuing Professional Development in sectors such as Veterinary Medicine, Social Sciences and Law.

Section D Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

1) Caring for Life: Humane education programme in kindergartens and primary schools - teaching Chinese children to care for animals, kindness towards people and respect for environment.

1.1 Objectives:

- To deliver the programme in primary schools/kindergartens, focusing on children aged 5-12 years, using Chinese Humane Educators.
- To train student teachers as Humane Educators, through workshops and on-the-job training.
- To motivate school teachers to develop their own humane education programmes, specific to the needs of the Chinese society.
- To enable effective dialogue between Humane Educators and students, thereby strengthening their mutual understanding of the interdependence of all living things.

1.2 Key Achievements in 2015.

- We conducted summer camps in 2 Provinces: Guangdong and Fujian. In Xiamen city, Heping county and Ding Tang county for 237 students total. Outreach to rural areas is particularly important as the majority of students are left-behind children. Their parents have moved to urban areas in seek of work and only see their young once a year or even less. This means that providing moral guidance and coping mechanisms to these students in particular, is of extreme importance to their wellbeing, their future and their relationships with others (humans, animals and the environment)
- We started a collaboration with a school in Xinjiang province.
- Year 1 curriculum officially became a publication for teachers to use.

- A total of 83 state run primary schools taught our Caring for Life Education curriculum in 2015
- In 2015, more than 17,000 students received our education course with 10 learning sessions in one academic year and almost 300 teachers were trained as humane educators to deliver the course. At the end of 2015, CLE had reached in the region of 36.000 children, in 100 schools, 10 Provinces, 8 cities, and 836 teachers trained as humane educators since it began the course's start.
- CLE was also taught in 18 community centres, which taught kids from less advantaged families in Shenzhen city.
- Evaluation results were published based on the 2013-14 data collected. This research has indicated an increase in students' pro-social behaviour and that they become less disruptive.
- Production of the Yulin Dog Meat Festival video in support of Education being a catalyst for longterm social change
- ACTAsia awarded by the Chinese Government as one of the Top 10 Most Influential Organisations in Urbanisation

2) Fur Free China programme

ACTAsia is giving increased emphasis to the Fur Free issue as a lifestyle choice. This approach which focuses on living a Fur Free Life, has more appeal and meaning for Chinese consumers and potential sponsors, than repetitive protests and criticism.

The main thrust of the programme takes place between the months of November to February, i.e. the months leading up to and including Chinese New Year. These are the months when fur products are being promoted as desirable gifts and acquisitions, as Chinese New Year symbolises new beginnings for wealth and prosperity. During the other months of the year ACTAsia concentrates on building and training an active network of campaigners, (includes student groups in universities and colleges); creating additional materials; researching new opportunities through internet sources; researching and liaising with key personnel within the media and fur fashion industry; monitoring trends and changes within the Fur Industry. Public awareness through our on-line WECHAT (social network) blog, keeps the issues alive until the next season's concerted efforts.

2.1 **Objectives:**

- To create awareness in China of the cruelty and suffering of animals used in the fur trade
- To influence and encourage consumers in China to say NO to fur products.
- To promote the International Fur Free Retailers Scheme in China.
- To influence and encourage Chinese brand retailers, fashion designers and the fashion marketing industry to promote No Fur products.
- To build a network of animal protectionists to build over time, on the initial work of the campaign.

2.2 Key Achievements in 2015

- We organised the second Fur Free Fashion Show in Beijing, to promote compassionate lifestyle choices. It included Caring for Life Awards ceremony and was covered with extensive media interest.
- We conducted another Public Attitude Survey on fur purchasing and general knowledge surrounding the issue.
- European reports on the findings of toxic chemicals in fur clothing were publicised through billboards and videos in China.
- The highest number of participants tool part in our workshops and 45 events were held across China to raise awareness on the fur issue.
- We signed up six new Chinese retail chains to become official "Fur Free Retailers, even though the concept of going fur free is a new concept in China.
- We continued to monitor the most popular TV shows of the year, the Chinese New Year Gala, to ensure that the celebrities are 'fur free'.

- The dog and cat fur report, funded by Dogs Trust, was completed and presented to the FFA
- Assistance was provided to a director for production of a documentary in Germany on the fur issue.

3) 5th China companion animal welfare veterinary programme

Since 2009, ACTAsia and Vets Beyond Border jointly train Chinese vets and promote higher welfare standards for companion animals.

In 2015 Dr. Elaine Ong and her team (formerly Vets Beyond Borders,) Vets for Compassion visited all seven China Vet Trainers to provide additional training and carry out assessment of their facilities and skills. The Trainer Guidelines book was updated and re-distributed. In addition, the China vet Trainers provided theory training for 40 vets and practical training for an additional 12 vets.

4) Promoting humane dog population control and management in China

Pet ownership is increasing in China and this has resulted in different companion animal problems.

Regulations on pet keeping vary from province to province, with differences in restrictions on the height and numbers of pets allowed, vaccination requirements, neutering awareness, animal care, and commercial breeding and sale of these animals. Registration of owned animals is compulsory in cities where dog keeping regulations are in place, but owners often avoid registering their animals for various reasons. The current standard government response to a case of human rabies in an area is indiscriminate massive killing of owned and stray animals, even vaccinated animals.

ACTAsia works with Chinese animal protection groups to build capacity and increase their understanding of the elements needed for humane and effective companion animal population management. It also produced a policy paper on the humane dog population and rabies control for the replacement of current larges scale indiscriminate, inhumane catch and kill efforts. This policy paper has been sent out to different municipalities throughout China.

5) Promoting animal welfare legislation in China

The millions of animals living in China are not currently protected by any law. Because animal welfare doesn't have high priority on most political agendas, and laws have proven difficult to amend once accepted, we continuously make effort to discuss with media, academics and relevant officials and to help them to understand the importance of animal welfare legislation in China through various animal cruelty issues.

6) Our Chief Executive Director continued to give **presentations** in various countries such as the UK, China, Japan, Australia and the US to address the success of ACTAsia programmes in China and other Asian countries and the progress has been made in the region.

The charity's main source of income is grants from grant bodies or other animal charities, which are interested in promoting animal welfare in Asia. We also receive a few small and irregular donations from the general public.

The expenses are mainly related to project implementation in China. The administrative and management expenditure is tightly controlled to keep it as low as possible.

The charity has no investments. Our cash balances are held in a savings account.
