VICAR'S REPORT

Staffing

We continue to have a vacancy of an Associate Priest for the Benefice. There were 2 informal visits in March but no interviews. Our Advert in Church Times was withdrawn in Sept at the request of the Archdeacon. As the vacancy neared 18 months, we needed to re-apply for permission to advertise. We heard in Nov that we had approval from the Deanery Mission and Pastoral committee. By late Dec we heard we had Diocesan permission. I have met with Archdeacon and Area Dean and the Archdeacon has spoken to each PCC. The Archdeacon recommends a Re-envisioning of the ministry of the post. We also had a vacancy of a Parish Administrator following resignation of Sharalyn; from October, the new administrator is Jocelyn Walsh who is steadily and capably taking over administrative tasks.

The Rev Alan Pierce joined us from March 2015 and The Rev Lynne Taylor from June - both on a similar basis to that of The Rev David Evans. We are very grateful for all these supporting retired clergy do for us. We meet together occasionally to discuss rotas, pray and eat together. Hugh, Reader Emeritus, continues to lead most of our Morning Prayer meetings and take some funerals. John Crosby, our ALM (authorised lay minister), is now pursuing training to possibly become an OLM (Ordained Local Minister). I have attended a couple of meetings at church house and some supervisory meetings with John. John is away on a training placement from Nov 2015 through to after Easter 2016.

Bible Studies

The Theology Book Club continues to meet monthly at the Vicarage, discussing the book 'Jesus through Middle-Eastern Eyes' by Ken Bailey. A monthly Bible study on Mark's Gospel is being run by Rev Alan Pierce.

Lent Talks ran on Wednesdays after the Communion service; Theme - Sounds of the First Holy Week. Over £100 was raised for the Guide Dogs. In November, Lyric the guide dog visited us after our Wednesday communion service and Heather gave us an informative account of their work and training.

Social & Fundraising

We initiated a Social Afternoon in November - dominoes, cards, coffee& cakes - raised £40; approximately 25 folk attended. We are beginning to think about our 2016 celebrations for our 120th anniversary; possible flower festival. Pancake Party enjoyed by all. Larry and I staffed Splat the Rat at the day 'Party in the Park' in June.

Mission

Our website was updated - http://www.christchurchheaton.org.uk/ Special services and events are promoted; efforts to keep things up to date. Most events also on our FB page https://www.facebook.com/ChristChurchHeatonBolton. In some months over a thousand people have seen something of our church on Facebook. Events may be promoted in other ways e.g. delivered local directories; other websites etc.

Messy church

With several helpers and a lot of support, we began running Messy Church. We have had two sessions so far, each was well attended. We saw some new people at each event. Children attend with their accompanying adult(s). In the Centre, there are various crafts, games and activities based around a theme. The theme is continued as we move into church for some songs and a Talk. We go back into the Centre for simple meal together. In July we cooked jacket potatoes for 65 and October pizza & chips for 45. Our themes were Prodigal Son & Good

Samaritan respectively. The event is free but donations are welcomed. We are looking forward to our next session in February.

Youth

I have had several meetings with Susie Mapledoram, Diocesan Youth Officer, together with Harold. Susie has been to discuss matters with PCC, led an open meeting in June and a youth consultation. We are continuing to look at supporting our young people here at Christ Church.

Stewardship

We are grateful for the work done in our Trio stewardship campaign and the positive responses pledging an increase in giving.

Morning service - The red-9.30am service book is being reviewed.

Groups and Organisations; Deanery & Diocese

I was invited to speak to the MU at their AGM. I continue to be chair of the Women's Guild and president of MCC. I attend meetings and committees when possible. Guild - attended some meetings including AGM, Guild Lunch and coffee morning. MU - attended some meetings including Christmas meal. I hosted Heaton and Halliwell Ministers Lunch in the Centre in April. I attended The Players AGM. I did not re-stand for Diocesan Synod because of vacancies in Benefice; my last meeting was in February. I am still serving on Deanery Synod Standing Committee.

Archdeanery Meeting - I was one of a selection of clergy invited from across the Archdeanery to participate in a facilitated discussion about barriers to mission in our own locality and across the diocese. We realised there were many considerations and that working together across the diocese could enable us to attempt bigger projects.

Summit - I attended a day conference at Liverpool cathedral called to discuss progress on the UN development goals and how the church has related to them notably in relation to the role of women. The speakers gave us many facts and figures on key issues such as poverty, trafficking and violence against women and information local aid was shared.

Archdeacon's quinquennial visitation took place in March and a good report was received.

Magazine - In-between editors I took on the editorial tasks for four editions of the church magazine (Sept - ending with Dec 2015).

Confirmation - two groups were run in the autumn concluding with the Deanery Confirmation service in November at St Peter's Halliwell at which 8 candidates were confirmed - 4 adults and 4 young people.

ANNUAL REPORT ON THE PROCEEDINGS OF PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL 2015

The Council met on six occasions in 2015. As usual the agendas for the meeting included a wide range of matters affecting the church locally, at Deanery and Diocesan level and also nationally.

Financial matters continue to occupy much of the agenda. The results of the TRIO Stewardship Campaign in 2014 have been monitored. The PCC is grateful of the increased giving by Parishioners in response to the campaign.

In consultation with the Diocesan Youth Officer, who visited the Parish on a number of occasions during the year, the PCC are looking to introduce a Youth Worker to the Parish in order to improve the activities we can offer our older children, in particular those of Secondary School age.

Other topics discussed included future Deanery and Diocesan plans for Parishes, staffing and buildings; the continuing maintenance of our church building, Parish Centre and gardens, and looking at the various charities we support as a church.

The PCC have been able to support our Authorised Lay Minister John Crosby as he trains for Ordained Ministry. It is however a disappointment that no appointment has been made to the post of Associate Minister in the Benefice. The PCC has met with the Ven David Bailey, Archdeacon of Bolton, to explore the way forward and the options we have available to us.

CHURCH WARDENS REPORT ON THE FABRIC, GOODS AND ORNAMENTS OF THE CHURCH AND CHURCH PROPERTIES

Numbers in the congregation have stayed at a similar level to the previous year. The number of children attending one of our groups has increased. The number and type of services has been maintained throughout the year with Alan Pierce, Lynne Taylor and David Evans providing support to Janet

CHURCH BUILDINGS AND CONTENTS

The church building is overall in a good state of repair. The Archdeacon, following his visit in March, commented "the PCC are to be congratulated on their attention to the church building". The church is regularly inspected by us. Gutters and drain pipes have been cleaned out and some minor roof repair work carried out. In November a partial 'deep clean' of the interior of

our church was carried out by volunteers from MCC. A full inventory of the contents of the church was completed and all items were present. There were persistent problems with the security alarm and so a new system will be installed early in 2016. Various small works identified in the last Quinquennial inspection have been carried out. Full insurance is held for all church properties and contents of the church and centre.

VICARAGE

No works were carried out to which the parish must contribute. A water meter has been installed which should reduce the of cost water supply by around £400 p.a.

CHURCH PROPERTIES

The properties on Markland Hill and Welbeck Road are now both let, the latter since March 2015 and the former let for the whole of 2015. We have good tenants from the wider church 'family' and both have 12 month leases expiring March 2016 and September 2016 respectively. Both properties are inspected regularly and are 'managed' by two members of PCC. Both properties are being kept in good order by the tenants. We have continued a programme of investment in the properties e.g. new lawn and paving at Welbeck, so that costs are spread and expenditure made when funds allow. The properties generate is excess of £12,000 per annum.

The land at Markland Hill continues to be let to the Scout Association. The terms of a new lease have been agreed and a draft agreement is being put together for approval. The Scout Association is a key part of the outreach and mission of the church. We are fully supportive of them and it is important that their presence is maintained.

CHURCH GROUNDS

Maintenance of our beautiful gardens remains a challenge. More garden tidying events were undertaken but unfortunately not that well attended. Nevertheless we are grateful to those who did lend a hand for their hard work. Some new plants were added. The gardens need to have ongoing maintenance and so options to achieve are being considered including use of the Community Payback scheme.

The annual leaf clearing by the Beavers, Cubs and Scouts was washed out on two occasions to the great disappointment of the Cubs etc. as they had been looking forward to pastie and peas! Thanks go to a member of the congregation who has moved a significant amount of leaves.

The land to the rear of our car park was purchased by a house builder and we await details of what is proposed and how it may impact on us.

Church Centre

The centre continues to be well used by church organisations and for one off events as well as outside organisations. Regrettably we have lost a couple of long term regular users and so income has dipped though we continue to get numerous enquiries. Refurbishment work and installation of a dishwasher in the kitchen was completed in February 2015.

New wall mounted notice boards were installed saving room in the hall and removing the need to move the wheeled notice boards. The Fire Exits in the hall have had breakable plastic seals put on them and access to the patio is now via the middle doors.

Our grateful thanks go to the Centre Manager, the volunteers and cleaner who assist in the maintenance of the centre and keep it well presented.

SUMMARY

We are grateful for the support of the Assistant Wardens, Emeritus Wardens, Sidespersons, PCC members, leaders of organisations, Cleaners, Flower Arrangers and all who give so freely of their time to ensure the continued life of our church. We are also grateful for the support of retired clergy and the understanding, support and encouragement of the congregation.

Once again it has been an honour, a pleasure and a privilege to serve as Churchwardens of this beautiful church, Christ Church Heaton.

GIFT AID

Although income, excluding legacies, saw an increase on 2014, disappointingly the Gift Aided income saw a slight fall. In the tax year to April 2015 there was a slight reduction in Gift Aid income from £78.901.60 to £76,749. This resulted in a decrease in the tax claim from £19,725 to £19,187. The tax claim of over £19,000 is a substantial amount and very important to our church's finances. I sincerely thank all those who have contributed and trust that they will continue with their financial support.

The Gift Aid envelopes in the pews are still proving to be successful. However, when completing the personal details on the blue envelopes please ensure that only the person who signs the declaration is named on the envelope. That said, it would be really helpful if people who make regular contributions via the blue envelopes considered using a standing order for their giving. Giving by standing order reduces the time and cost of dealing with cash and helps in the planning of the church's finances. It is likely that there are still some parishioners who are taxpayers and are not in the Gift Aid scheme and so I appeal to anyone in this situation to contact me (or the Vicar or Wardens) to maximise their giving. Conversely, if any Gift Aid donor has ceased to be a taxpayer then it is important I am informed. During the year there were no receipts from one-off appeals.

FAIR TRADE

Our Fair Trade stalls on the first Wednesday and the second Sunday of the month have continued throughout 2015 and into 2016 as an established part of our Church calendar, with Fairground in Blackburn continuing to provide foodstuffs and cards each month and Justicia in Bolton providing a selection of unusual gifts for Christmas, Easter, etc.

Since May 2015 we have had Izzy Harper working with us as part of her Duke of Edinburgh Award and we are delighted that she has agreed to continue to help us for the foreseeable future. We remain grateful to Lucie Wilson for her invaluable help with the Sunday stall.

Fairtrade Fortnight this year invited us to 'Sit down for breakfast, stand up for Farmers!' accompanied by the shocking fact that over 795 million people world-wide are under nourished - with the Farmers who provide the food for our tables falling into that category! As part of our campaign to raise awareness of this we held a Fairtrade breakfast between the 8.00am and 9.30am services on the Sunday at the end of Fairtrade Fortnight. This was voted a success by all who attended and raised over £82.00 in donations for Fairtrade. A huge thank you to those who set up, served and cleared away afterwards.

May we take this opportunity to thank those who organise the goods for sale, those who help to staff the stalls and clear away afterwards, and especially all those who purchase Fairtrade goods both here in Christ Church and elsewhere. Our small but significant contribution directly benefits an estimated 7.5 million people (farmers, workers and their families) in over 66 developing countries. Thank you.

CHRISTIAN AID

The theme for Christian Aid week in May 2015 focused on supporting women in some of the poorest communities in the world who are discriminated against in their efforts to provide a living for their children. This year ten people collected in 16 streets around the Parish, the Uniformed Organisations and Junior Church collected at the end of our morning services, and envelopes were circulated with Church magazines and hymn books to encourage as many people as possible to gift aid their donations. 49% of the money raised was gift aided this year, giving us the staggering total of £1361.25 to send to Christian Aid.

DEANERY SYNOD

Deanery Synod has met four times during 2015. At the first meeting in January, John Hughes spoke about Green Energy Co-operatives. He talked about a day organized at the Cathedral on Green Issues and said that children understand and want to be partners. Nearly all schools in the diocese are eco-schools but less than 10 parishes are eco-parishes. He posed the question: "Are we called to be hospice workers to a dying planet or midwives to a new creation?" He suggested that every parish should have a Green Apostle and do an eco-audit. In March, in view of the impending General Election the meeting focused on political issues. Andy Salmon talked of his political career, starting prior to going to theological college and standing as a candidate in the county elections. This was followed by a question and answer session with local councilors. This was Rodger Petch's last Synod as Area Dean and he was thanked for all he has done in the deanery over the last five years. In June we welcomed our new Area Dean, Vinnie Whitworth and the speaker was Phil Edwards, the Diocesan Reader Training Officer, who said that his job was to support readers in training. Stephen Hamer told us why he became a Reader and described what he did in the Parish. Carol Pharaoh concluded by speaking about vocations. The final Synod was held at St James's school. Tania Lewyckyj, the head, gave a presentation stressing the school's Christian ethos listing both its achievements and the difficulties it had faced and could face in the future.

CHILD PROTECTION CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT

I took on the role of Child Protection Officer in the summer, taking over from Lucy Clark. As there were no records or paperwork to be found I took advice from the Diocese. It was agreed we should start from scratch in order to meet with Diocesan policy. I thank all those involved for their patience in having to do this!

Christ Church is now registered with the CCPAS (Churches' Child Protection Advisory Service) who oversee safeguarding procedures, with myself as Child Protection Officer.

All current volunteers attached to various church groups have completed a new online DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) disclosure, previously known as a CRB check, and I am currently processing a couple of application forms for prospective volunteers. Each volunteer has been

given an updated copy of the Parish Policy and an example of Good Practice Guidelines issued by the Disclosure Service. We are now working on completing a Volunteer Agreement form with everyone. All references for each volunteer have been updated, and all are satisfactory.

It is important that prospective volunteers' details continue to be forwarded to me at the earliest opportunity as they must be registered, checked, and appraised in accordance with diocesan policy, prior to their appointment. In some instances a volunteer working with children, who is always with a DBS checked volunteer, may not need to be checked. All volunteers are considered individually, but we need to err on the side of caution with this, as I may have to justify why we did not consider a check to be necessary. Again, I thank you for your understanding in this matter.

I am satisfied that the requirements of the regulations are being met here at Christ Church.

CRECHE

The crèche meets during the 9.30am Family Communion Service and is for children from birth to 3 years old.

We have 17 children on our register with a core group of 8 families who attend very regularly. The children are encouraged to participate in activities such as simple arts and crafts, listening to stories, role play, singing and dressing up. We took part in the Sermons performance last summer singing our own song based on the two builders story, and joined in the older children's Christmas production where we dressed as spiders!

We try to gently introduce the simplest Bible stories and Christian values, as well as encouraging the children to be aware of and appreciate the world around them. Our main themes over the last 12 months included:

New life: we have been thinking about the seasons and how things change as we move from one season to another, dressing up in weather appropriate clothes and making snowy pictures. We looked for signs of spring and linked this into Easter. We made collages to remind us of the fun we all had over the summer and collected leaves to make Autumn tree pictures. We also had fun making Spring shakers decorated with animal stickers.

Thanking God for our families: this year we have encouraged the children to think about their families, especially around Valentine's Day, Mother's Day and Father's Day. We have decorated Valentine's pictures and made Mother's and Father's Day cards and did some role play where the children pretended to be Mums and Dads with the kitchen equipment and dolls/teddy bears. We also had a Teddy Bear's picnic to encourage the children to share with each other.

I am always very grateful to the parents who, at such a busy time, provide such fantastic costumes.

CHRIST CHURCH PLAYERS

Following the huge success of Off The Hook in 2014, the Christ Church Players' 2015 production of See How They Run, a farce rather aptly set in a vicarage, ran from 4th to the 7th February 2015 by kind permission of Samuel French Ltd and attracted four sell out audiences of 110 people each night of the run in addition to an overflow audience for one of the dress rehearsals.

This was the first year that the Christ Church Players had been a member of BATS (Bolton Amateur Theatre Societies) and, following a review by one of their adjudicators, the play, directed by Julie Steele, resulted in a number of highly coveted and prestigious nominations at the annual BATS awards ceremony in August 2015, including Best Comedy and two individual nominations for Brenda Griffiths in the categories of Best Newcomer and Best Actress in A Comedy.

Rehearsals typically commence in October each year and for this production took place weekly on a Monday evening from 8.00pm-10.00pm. After Christmas, additional rehearsals were included on a Sunday afternoon each week from 2.00pm-5.00pm with a further Saturday afternoon rehearsal added. The feedback for See How They Run was extremely positive from those who came to watch, culminating in an excellent review in the Bolton News.

The back-stage aspect of a play can often go unnoticed and unrewarded but our fantastic crew seems to grow and grow each year. The CCP committee are enormously grateful for their help, support and tireless dedication behind the scenes on every level, for without them this production could not have taken place. It is appropriate to particularly mention the set-builders Geoffrey Pearson and Martin Miller who give up extraordinary amounts of time and effort to move heavy pieces of scenery from storage and subsequently design and construct a safe and often technically challenging set every year within a narrow time window. The set for See How They Run was one of the most challenging yet with no less than 5 different exits including an under-stairs cupboard, a staircase and a set of patio doors! It was outstanding and received praise and admiration from even the most seasoned of theatre goers.

The Christ Players use Fair Trade products for their rehearsal and interval refreshments as far as is practical. Ticket prices were fixed in 2015 at £8.00 each or £7.00 for concessions on the Wednesday night only. Donations were kindly received by members of the audience who came to watch the dress rehearsal. Despite an increase in income of £140 on ticket and programme sales, the resulting profit of £2,175.03 was £400 less than for 2014. This was due in part to the increase in expenditure on the scenery, lighting and costumes. Large pieces of timber are typically purchased year on year for the set and often have to be disposed of due to insufficient room to store them. Due to the lack of available storage space available on Church premises, the Scouts kindly offered the use of space in their Scout Hut for the storage of some of the Christ Church Players scenery and it was agreed at the CCP AGM in 2015 that an annual donation of £200 will be made to the Scouts for this. A donation of £2,000 was made to the Church which the Rev. J French and the PCC kindly acknowledged. This resulted in £1,277.07 remaining in the Christ Church Players account for future use.

It is hoped that the donation made by the Christ Church Players can be increased in 2016. More importantly the play allows us a unique opportunity to reach out across the Parish and beyond to promote the Church and indeed fellowship and community.

At the end of the year rehearsals were well under way for the 2016 production of "Out of Sight....Out of Murder." We have been pleased to welcome new faces to the ranks and we look forward to continually welcoming new members to the CCP family to ensure the future of this society.

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INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS/TRUSTEES OF CHRIST CHURCH, HEATON PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

I report on the accounts of the PCC for the year ended 31 December 2015, which are set out on pages 2 to 8.

Respective responsibilities of the Trustees and Independent Examiner

As the members of the PCC you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts; The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission, and to be found in the Church guidance, 2006 edition.

An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the PCC and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.

Independent examiner's statement

In connection with my examination, no matter has come to my attention:

- (1) which gives me reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect the requirements
 - to keep accounting records in accordance with section 130 of the 2011 Act; or
 - to prepare accounts which accord with the accounting records and comply with the accounting requirements of the 2011 Act and the Regulations have not been met; or
- (2) to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

FOR YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2015

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 together with applicable accounting standards and the Charities SORP 2005.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at market value.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body nor those that are informal gatherings of Church members.

Funds

General Funds

These represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC.

Designated Funds

These are Funds designated for particular purposes by the PCC and are also unrestricted as the PCC can reassign those monies if it so desires.

Restricted Funds These can only be used for their stated purpose(s).

The Church has the following specific funds -

Fabric Fund (formerly the Millennium Fund)

To provide funds for the maintenance of the Church and its environs without recourse to realising fixed assets and to enable such maintenance to be undertaken at short notice.

Organ and Choir Funds To provide funds for the maintenance of the Organ and support of the Choir. A transfer from the General Fund is made in lieu of the organists Honorarium.

Columbarium Fund To provide funds by way of fees for the maintenance of the Columbarium Wall and memorial placques.

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income and capital sources

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC.

Planned giving receivable under Gift Aid is recognised only when received.

Income tax recoverable on gift aided donations is recognised when the donation is recognised.

Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement and the amount due.

Income from investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

Rental income from the letting of church premises is recognised when the rental is due.

Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains or losses are recognised when investments are sold.

Unrealised gains or losses are accounted for on revaluation of investments at 31 December.

Resources used

Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation of the PCC.

Activities directly relating to the work of the Church

The parish share or diocesan quota is accounted for when paid. Any share unpaid is not accrued at the year end (unless a balance payment has been committed by the PCC) as no legal liability exists.

Fixed assets

Consecrated land and buildings and moveable church furnishings

Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from the accounts by s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 1993

No value is placed on moveable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and moveable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off as expenditure on purchase.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight line basis over 4 years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £4,000 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

Investments

Investments are valued at market value at 31 December.

Current assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision.

Short-term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the CBF Church of England Funds or at the bank.

The property values are in accordance with Bairstow Eves marketing reports dated 28 February 2007.

Movable Church Furnishings

These are vested in the Church wardens on behalf of the PCC. They cannot be disposed of without a faculty and therefore no value is assigned to them. Expenditure on additions to such inalienable assets is written off on purchase.

Land at Scout Hut, Markland Hill, Bolton

The land on which the Scout Hut was built was leased to the 17th Bolton (Christ Church Heaton) Scout group on 31 December 1963 for 25 years at a rent of One Shilling per Annum. This was renewed with effect from 25th December 1988 for a further 25 years from then by counterpart lease dated 21st December 1994. As disposal of this asset is not possible for the foreseeable future, and income is effectively NIL, no value has been assigned to this property in the accounts. The Scout Hut itself is not owned by the church.

Expenditure on Church Property

At 31 December 2015 the PCC had no approved expenditure not yet incurred
