#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing Document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, being a constitution adopted 11th October 1996 and as amended on 14th March 1997, 18th November 1998 and 9th June 2008.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Potential new trustees are identified normally from regular donors, volunteer workers and others with experience of and interest in, the areas of work in which the charity operates. Guidance notes on their responsibilities are given to new trustees, together with a similar document produced by the Charity Commission and also a copy of the Charity's constitution. Notential new trustees are invited to attend one or two trustees meetings before being formally adopted.

#### Organisational Structure

The Charity has three partitime paid employees with the remaining work being undertaken by unpaid volunteers. The day-to-day operation of the charity is delegated to the partitime Director of Operations (Mr. Paull Guyver) assisted by the partitime Office Manager (Mrs. Carmen Denham) and part-time Accounts Assistant (Mr. Kevin Denham). These three employees work to an agreed programme and budget which is overseen by the trustees. The Charity benefits from a number of regular volunteers who assist with the Stitches of Hope project, the Ray of Hope project, packing in the warehouse and office administration. Other volunteers help on an occasional basis.

#### Risk Management

The trustees recognise their responsibility to identify and review potential nisks to which the Charity may be exposed and have sought to ensure that appropriate controls are in place to manage those nisks. We have protocols in place relating to the Ray of Hope child sponsorship project and a policy for the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults. Two members of staff have DRB cleanance. We have also had fire risk and general nisk assessments carried out at the wavehouse and offices:

#### Reporting of a Serious Incident

The wards the end of the financial period recorded in this report and overlapping into the next financial year, we became aware of an attempted fraudulent use of information relating to the charity. Air organisation calling themselves "Hope Humanifarian and Allied Services United Kingdom!" begam using an addiversion of the CHII website to masquerade as a reputable charity and were quoting our charity registration number to support their unlawful activity. Their website www.hhasuk.org contains a logo and telephone numbers which are not ours but the remainded of the information is taken from our website (although it is several months out of date). Their homepage also contains the current address of CHI and our charity number. There is no facility on the bogus website to access our shop and our new website has not been affected and can be used without thisk. We have received 3 enquiries from individuals concerning attempts to obtain credit or tender for the purchase of goods. This matter has been reported to both the Charity Commission and to the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau.

Jesus! life and teaching are the motivation for our work! We work in partnership with the existing Christian community in the developing world, mainly with the Anglican Church in Rwanda and Uganda. We seek to glorify God through the Christian ethos of helping others less fortunate than ourselves but the aid is provided to those in need, regardless of religion or ethnicity, C.H.I. also links with some other charities with a similar ethos, through whomeaid is sent to countries in Eastern Europe and the Middle East. In planning our activities for the year, the trustees kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidence on public benefit. C.H.I. has been providing care in Africa fomover 20 years and has also given support in liadia and Eastern Europe: Our partners in these parts of the world work towards helping vulnerable people in countries that are amongst the poorest in the world. Our works is principally directed to halping widows and childlen especially those orphaned by wantor disease. It is our belief that children are the future of the countries in which they live and we seek to help them develop their potential through the provision of improved education and healthcare combined with the love and support provided by our partners in the local communities. #### Ray of Hope

At child sponsorship programme operating in Uganda, Rwanda, and Burundithat assists approximately 280 children with primary and secondary education expenses. Vulnerable and needy children are sponsored by individuals or small groups. Five schools are also supported with direct funding through our Bursary Project which has now been renamed as the School Partners Project.

#### Stitches of Hope

The provision of knitted clothing and blankets to vulnerable families in Eastern Europe and to refugee camps in the Middle East.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

C.H.I. has continued to receive enthusiastic supportufrom the charity's supporters up and down the U.K. and abroad. This has enabled us to maintain, and improve cases expand, our work despite the suspension of our containentwork and the worldwide economic climate. Some projects have come to a natural conclusion. A more detailed analysis of our activities is shown below.

Elfaison and communication with our overseas partners is vital to maintaining a successful oversight of our works. We endeavour to have regular email our telephone: contact with the supervisors of our overseas projects to ensure that funds are being used wisely and as designated. The difficulties experienced by our partners in some remote areas inevitably means that a prompt response to communication is not always possible, but generally we are able to monitor the projects successfully by ensuring that our partners provide us with regular photographs, testimonies and receipts. We have formulated a policy whereby representatives from the chanity endeavour to visit some of our overseas projects to meet our partners and to review the work personally. We have decided to attempt to visit ligands and Rwanda on a two-year rotational basis in i.e., each country is visited every four years. Four members of the charity will make the next visit to Uganda include: 2016, with a visit to Rawanda proposed for 2018.

#### Ray of Höpe Child Sponsorship Project

The number of children in the child sponsorship programme supported by C.H.I. has increased to approximately 280. Within that figure there have been a number of interchanges with both some children and some sponsors leaving the project and others coming on board. We continue to look to increase the number of sponsored children. Sponsored children are in the following locations: In Rayanda.— Byumba, Kibungon Gasabo, in Uganda.— Kigabwenni, Kimwanyin and in Burundi—Bujumbura.

Letters, testimonies and photographs have been received from nearly allifo our sponsored children; giving details of the difference that sponsorship has made to their lives. In particular, we have been encouraged to hear from some of the senior students who have moved on to either tertiary education on tompaid employment. This information has been forwarded to the sponsors. As well as regular sponsorship, many sponsors have also sent small gifts or additional financial aid to their sponsored children on occasions like their birthday. Easter on Christmas. We have regularly received reports on how these additional gifts have made a difference to the quality of life of the families of the sponsored children.

We have continued to support three part-time Field Workers; who assist with communications to and from the children. They are Miss Mariem Bira at Kijjabwemi, Uganda; Mrs Angelique Nyoni at Gasabo, Rwanda and Mrs Didacienne Mikakayange at Byumba, Rwanda.

We have continued to support: five schools through the School Pantmers Project, namely, in Rwanda - Gikonko Secondary School, Gahima Agape Secondary School, Kibungo, St. Peter's College, Shyogwe, Hope Academy Nursery, Gasabo and in Uganda, Kijjaliwemi Primary School, Masaka. We funded Christmas parties for the children at these schools.

Harge quantities of new Ministed and crocheted clothes and Blankets produced by our supporters continue to be delivered to our warehouse both by mail and in person. These are sorted and packed by our teams of volunteers. They have then been sent to countries in Eastern Europe through our partnership with the charity. Mission without Borders We have sent funds to Mission without Borders to assist with the cost of transportation. We have also continued our link with Mrs. Samara Levy and live charity - Samara's Aid. Samara's Aid is involved in sending containers and lorries of humanitarian aid to reffigee camps in the Middle East, particularly to assist those fleeing from violence in larg and Syria. We have used our warehouse as a "drop-off" point for goods for Samara's Aid and we have: fitte littled the loading of three 40ft lorries with goods destined for the Middle East.

#### a) Matendo Vocational Training Centre (MVTC), Kibaale, Uganda

MVTC"is a project in Kibaale, a rurallregion of western UgandauC.H.L has been involved with this project since its inception some years ago. The facility is the vision of Rev. Jackson Kasozi, a Ugandan national who had previously worked in the UK. The aim of the project is to provide courses in various practical skills for the youth of this remote and economically deprived area, thereby enhancing their employment prospects and supporting the community. Short courses have been offered in car mechanics, hairdressing and cosmetics, tailoring and building skills. C.H.I. has previously sent funds for glazing of windows, internal decoration of the centre, finance for teachers and student support. We have also diaised with a Dutch organisation who have provided some financial and logistical support to Matendow MVTO is still not accredified by the Uganda Ministry; of Education and this continues to create difficulties in the recruitment of both students and staff. It lis intended that the centre should ultimately be self-financing, but this requires a combination of official Government recognition and sufficient numbers of fee paying students. We became aware that the Centre was not functioning in the way that had been hoped and that action was necessary to my and revive the project. We had a meeting with Rt. Rev. Nathan Kyamanywa, Bishop of Hoima diocese, whilst he was visiting the: UK. Matendo: is situated in Kikangahara parish which is within the Hoima diocese. With the Bishop's guidance it was agreed that a team from OHI would visit Uganda in 2016 and a meeting would be arranged with Rev. Kasozi, representatives from the diocese, representatives from the local community and the feam from CHI.(This took place during our visit in June 2016 and will be the subject of a future report)

#### b) Shyogye Diocese; Rwanda: :

We have been able to sendifurther funds for the purchase 20 goats and 30 pigs for needly families in Shyogwe diocese; Rwanda. As well as these animals providing nutrition, they also provide manure which enables the mainly subsistence farmers in the area to improve the fertility of their land for crops. Revenue from the livestock rearing enables these families to: buy foodband to pay for school fees and medicallinsurance. We have continued to provide funds to support two additional nurses at health clinics in Shyogwe diocese through our Nurse± project. These nurses provide advice on healthcare; hygiene, nutrition and family planning as well as giving nursing ware at the clinics and in the local community. Vietty Rubayiza at Shyogwe clinic is principally involved with paediatric healthrand. childhood a vaccinations and sees approximately 800 people permonth. Brighte Makangwije at Gillomerochas had a baby herself this year but is now-back at work and is busy with general nursing duties on a daily basis in a very understaffed clinic. Letters of thanks have been received from both nurses as well as detailed reports from their supervisors about their work. We also sent funds for malaria medication in this area following a steep rise in reported cases of this disease. School Pantner funds sentito St. Peter's College, Shyogwe have been used for the building of a workshop to teach construction work; for the purchase of drawing tables and cooking pots; for the purchase of football kit and for funding of an outreach preaching programme in a nearby parish. #### c) Kibungo Diocese, Rwanda

We have funded the purchase of goats for needy families in Rusera parish in the same way as we did at Shyogwe. These families: were identified locally as being eithernelderly or child-led families. Our sponsorichildrenat Kibungo attend Galvima Agape Schoolland the school also receives School Partner support; which this year has assisted the purchase of 2 cows. We have also supported two girls in their final year at school who would otherwise have had no sponsorin. We have funded the purchase of library, furniture; library books and 3 computers at Itetero Primary. School We also funded the purchase of the purchase o

#### d) Gasabo Diocese; Rwandal

We have continued to support students at several locations in this diocese through our Ray of Hope child sponsorship scheme. We have linked a Mother and Toddlengroup at South Woodham Ferrers, Essex with a Nursery school line Gasablo diocese. The M & T. group have sent funds through CHI's School Pantners: Project for the refurbishment of this indows and doors at Gasabo. Thanks and testimonies were received from the head teacher and some of the children themselves. We sent funds for the purchase of 3 cows at needy parishes in this diocese; for the purchase of musical instruments to aid the youth project at the eathedral and for the purchase of Health Insurance for 350 needy people. We are investigating the funding of several community projects at tameedy parish within this diocese.

#### e) Kigeme Diocese, Rwanda....

C:H:I. has continued to support Loans Hope - a local initiative to provide microfinance loans to parish groups in this region. This initiative encourages communities to take responsibility for managing small loans, mainly to individual women or small groups, to finance various small projects within their parish.

#### f) Byuml/a Diocese, Rwanda ii

We have continued to support students at several locations in this diocese through our Ray of Hope child sponsorship scheme. We have sent funds for the purchase of goats for 30 needs families in this diocese:

#### g) Butare Diocese, Rwanda:

We have sent funds to Mübumbano Vocational Training Centre for the purchase of sewing machines and accessories and also for the part-purchase of a motor cycle. We sent funds to Gikonko Secondary. School for the refurbishment of their library and for educational materials. We liave also provided funds from the purchase of a keyboard and Bibles to assist worship at nearby Mugombwa refugee camp. We are investigating the funding of several small community projects at Nkamatira parish.

#### h): Kimwanyi Parish, Uganda!

We:continued to fund an additional nurse at Kimwanyi health clinic for a fourth year through our Nurse+ project. Prossy Nalutaaya is also a trained midwife and this forms an important part of her work at Kimwanyi. Kimwanyii clinic also received ongoing funds for the restocking of medicines; particularly anti-malarial drugs and for the purchase of new equipment. As well as supporting Kinewangi health clinic as detailed above, CIHII. continued to maintain a strong association with the local church pastor, Rev. Patrick Ssimbwa. Patrick has forged blose links between his church, the clinic and the local Primary school. Assmentioned in last year's Armual Report, the rebuilding work at Kinawanya Primary School has been completed thanks to ausignificant donation from a local Businessman in the UK. Paston Patrick reports a massive boostato the physical, educational and spiritual wellbeing of the community. This has been a huge encouragement to all concerned and a shining example of cooperation between folk in the UK and Africa. The community has itself been encouraged and they have repaired a hand operated water pump near the school which further assists with the supply of clean water Kimwanyi School has also neceived some funds for connection to the electricity grid; for playground equipment and for the cost of providing pupils with a middley lanch of porridge. We have two sponsored children at Kimwanyi School, both orphans who are currently being caned for by Rev. Patrick and his family. Patrick also received funds for the purchase of a bike and for medical expenses for one of his children. We have received updates from Kimwenyi parish concerning the provision of funds for purchase of piglets and encalyptus plants. These projects provided some work experience for the youth in this community. We have sent funds for the purchase of Bibles and hymn books for Kimwanyi Rarish Church. We have sent founds to assist with the running of the Easter Oup - a sports event for local youth. This event was attended by over 1500 people from local communities. We are investigating proposals for a major refurbishment project at nearby Kagganda. Primary School, also within Patrick's parish.

#### i) Kijjabwemi, Masaka Uganda

We have continued to support students at Kijjahwemi Primary and Secondary schools in this diocese through our Ray of Hope child sponsorship scheme and School Partner funding. Kijjahwemi Primary School has also received funds for school uniforms; drums and dance costumes, basic educational materials and for the rebuilding of a lattine.

#### j) Rakai Parish, Uganda

We have sent funds to Rev. Canon Eriab Mugerwa, a partners in Bagonvu Eldenly Womens' Foundation at Rakai. Kaleere Parish in Rakai has ambight proportion of senior citizens who have minimal income and often care for their grandchildren with have bleen orphaned by HIV/Aids and conflict. We have funded the building of a new lawine black for this extremely poor community. Education materials and some school uniforms have also been funded for St. Daniel's Primary School, Kaleere. We are investigating ways to to provide further support for this parish. We have also sent funds for the purchase of education materials at the nearby Sango Bay refugee Camp.

#### k) Būjumbura, Burundiii

We have continued to support students at the CRIB (Children Rescued in Burundi) Orphanage through our Ray of Hope child sponsorship scheme. Burundi has undergone serious civil unrest and internal conflict and our partners at CRIB nequire considerable prayer and financial assistance. We have also sent some general funds fourthe Orphanage. A number of our sponsors have continued to send funds to support students who have gone on to tertiary education outside of Burundi although this is beyond usual CHI policy.

#### **MUBLICITY**

C.H.I. has produced three magazines free of charge to supporters this year with the following themes: (a) Sharing Hope b) Faith and Hope and c) Together. The magazine is also available online. We have also produced regular news updates on specific topics, as 2016 calendar and some specially designed. Christmas cards. We have carried out 35 speaking and 3 preaching engagements this year: We also have a website and appresence on Facebook. Our website has been completely revamped this year and the new format gives much easier access to information as well as an clearer and more user-friendly shop for donations and purchases.

We were delighted and privileged to host a visit from Most Rev. Onesphore Rwaje, Archbishop of Rwanda, from 1st-6th February 2016 Evening events with the Archbishop were held at Church of the Good Shepherd, Collier Row Essex and Wesley Methodist Church, Leigh on Sear Essex. Informal meetings were also arranged with the Bishop of Barking, with Rev. Canon David Banting, vicar of St. Reters, Harold Wood, with South Woodham Ferrers Mother and Toddler group, and with CHI trustees and volunteers. The discussions and interchange of views enabled us to have ancleasen picture of the priorities for projects that CHEmight support in Rwanda.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

Our underlying income has shown a modest rise, helped by the encouraging number of additional child sponsors. Comparinglyear on year incomes presents a challenge e.g. when Giff Aid claims are submitted, the number and amount of any degacies during the year and the effect of five figure dibrations from time to time. We will continue to provide funds through the School Partners project to five schools (Four in Rwanda and one in Uganda).

The current projects to supply cowsugoats, pigs and egg-laying hens to needy families will continue and we are considering other potential areas of agricultural support

We are in the process of identifying new initiatives at several of our project locations.

As well as continuing to produce an informative and challenging magazine three times pernyear, we are seeking to raise the profile of the charity through speaking preaching engagements and by the use of social media. The charity continues to thrive and expand into new areas in challenging economic times and we look to the future with excitement and optimism.

#### FUND TRANSFERS 8---

Fund accounting

Unrestricted founds are those that can be used by the trustees for any purpose. Within these is the General fund, which is used to pay for the overall running cost of the charity and trustees aim to maintain a balance offiatious £9,000 and two designated funds set up by the trustees for the following purposes:

The Reserve Fund which is used to ensure there are funds from planned relatively large items, such as audit fees and visits to the field and receives a regular transfer of funds from General Fund;

The projects Fund, which is used to support new projects or to supplement projects mainly supported by restricted funds. This Fund receives unrestricted funds over and above those required to maintain the general Fund reserve at its minimum level.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted hourposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor on when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
